

Haskell Receives \$904, Net From Albany Game

Net receipts received by the HHS athletic fund from the Indians-Lions football game played in Albany Nov. 17 amounted to \$904.35, according to the financial statement covering the game re-leased by Supt. Roy G. Hathaway of Albany.

Total receipts at the game amounted to \$2,232.80 from the sale of 2,680 adult and 557 student tickets.

Federal tax amounted to \$360. 59, and expense for officials \$63.50, making a total expense of the game \$424.09,

Insect Damage To Texas Cotton Crop \$107 Million

Insect damage to the 1950 cotton crop in Texas amounted to approximately \$107,035,000, destroyin g 11 per cent of the total harvest, according to an unofficial preliminary estimate compiled by the National Cotton Council, Geo. G. Chance, chairman of the Texas unit of the Council, said Wednes-

"Insects kept approximately 456,000 bales of cotton and an estimated 187,000 tons of cottonseed off the market this year. Based on average prices, this lint would have brought Texas farmers some \$91,119,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of \$15,916,000," the Council spokesman said

"Through the Cotton Belt." Mr Chance said, "an estimated 16.5 per cent of the crop, valued at approximately \$598,565,000 was destroyed. In dollars and cents, losses in 1950 were second highest on record, exceeded only by 1949 when damage amounted to more than \$617 million."

But the rule for allocation of this material set up by the Rub-ber Reserve Section of the R.F.C. is held to be quite elastic, indeed. For example, for anyone to get

an R.F.C. loan, it is necessary for the applicant to establish credit responsibility.

But the reverse is true to secure an allocation of tire servicing materials from the R.F.C. The applicant to qualify for an allocation must first prove irresponsibility and show that his financial position is precarious, or even destitute, to get supplies.

This has led observers to comment that the R.F.C. is writing new social doctrine.

Authorities Offer Solution for Flameproofing

Although no "fireprofing" soluion for the highly combustible Yule tree has been officially tested and recognized, it is now possible safeguard many flammable holiday decorations, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

A mixture the fire authorities suggest is one that will make party decorations, children's costumes and even some of their especially hazardous toys fire-retardant. If they should catch fire, they might char a little, but they won't blaze up spreading the fire. The rinse consists of 9 ounces

of borax, 4 ounces of boric acid and one gallon of warm water. Mix the borax and half the water until dissolved, then mix the boric acid with the rest of the water. Combine the two and dip the garments to be flameproofed in the mixture.

Anything that's safe in water can be rinsed in the solution. It should be applied each time the material is washed, since the mixr tonsils, enlarged adenoids or ture washes off, For heavy drapes or furniture upholstery, the solution can be sprayed on.

Feeding Herd Off In Spring

"Next spring's calf crop percentage will depend a lot on what's done this fall and winter with the brood herd," a timely editorial in The Livestock Weekly pointed out.

"There are too many beef herds A stuffy nose is not necessarily torial added. "In most cases, a per cent on calf crops," the ediprotein supplement will go a long way in balancing the ration of the winter cow, and upping the calf crop."

Experimental evidence backs up this editorial advice. Many ex-periments show that each dollar spent for needed protein supple-ments returns two dollars in more and heavier calves.
California Experiment Station, in an 8-year experiment, found

that feeding a winter supplement, produced from 11 to 45 per cent more calves, and calves from cows fed the supplement weighed 21

to 95 pounds more. The Nebraska Station doubled the calf crop percentage and into 77 pounds per calf when cot-tonseed cake was fed as the win-

ter supplement to prairie hay.

There is a good reason why such supplements as cottonseed meal, cake or pellets increase the number of calves and their weaning weights. Protein is essential for regular breeding, development of strong calves, and milk production. Excellent green pasture contains a lot of protein, but protein drops rapidly as grass matures. Mature grasses usually contain only about one-third as much protein as they had when green. Then, supplemental protein is needed to maintain good per-formance in the herd and aid utilization of the available dry

Best results are obtained when supplemental feeding starts early in the season. When cows lose weight they are drawing on their reserves and weight losses are costly to replace with later feeding. Cows that enter the more severe part of winter in good flesh because of early supple-mental feeding are easier to maintain and are usually in vigorous

condition to calve and produce milk for the young calf.

As grasses become dry in the fall, start bred cows on 1-2 to 1 pound of octtonseed cake, per head daily. As winter progresses, increase the daily allowers to 1. increase the daily allowance to 1 to 2 pounds. After calving, feed 2 to 3 pounds, per head daily, to insure good milk production for the young calf and maintain good condition for prompt breeding when bulls are turned into the

When plenty of dry grass is not available, some dry roughage or silage is needed. Under usual conditions, feed cows 5 to 10 pounds of dry roughage when grazing is short or weather is severe. When grazing is extreme-

severe. When grazing is extremely short or when cattle are confined to lots in severe weather, feed 15 to 20 pounds of dry roughage or 40 to 50 pounds of silage. Cattle raisers in Cotton States find that cottonseed hulls are economical and easy to feed when dry roughage is needed. A good mineral mixture is especially needed in fall and winter seasons because the phosphorus content of forage drops as it matures. During this season cottonseed meal or cake has added value because its high phosphorus content helps insure sufficient

A study of quail wings will show the percent of young birds and indicate the production and survival of the year.

To facilitate mailing of wing collections, the Game Commission will supply special business reply envelopes on request. These provide space for recording pertinent data and require no postage from the hunter.. The active help of hunting clubs and other groups is being solicited.
It is essential that wings from

cocks and hens be placed in separate envelopes but any number of wings from birds of the same sex may be placed together. Only one wing from each bird should be saved. Date and county of collection are also necessary. If oficial envelopes are not at hand, any kind of paper sack will sufice if properly labeled.



Suggests Care In Purchasing New **Washing Machine**

Prospective purchasers of washing machines will do well to stop and study the advantages or disadvantages of the machines that are now available on the market. The time and labor-saving advantages of the automatic washing machines have had such an appeal for the homemaker in recent years that the advantages of the non-automatic machines have often been overlooked, says Thelma Wirges, county Home Demonstra-

tion Agent.
She says a prelimmary report released by the Indiana Experiment Station shows that the number and kinds of automaic machines have been increasing while the older, non-automatic types, which cost less, are being improved by the manufacturers.

Time studies made in connection with the research project showed

with the research project showed that the total time required for doing the family laundry is longer when an automatic washer is used but that the homemaker must spend about one hour more in actually doing the job when a non-automatic machine is used. The tests also showed that about two and one-half times as much water and one and a half times more soap or other detergent was needed to do a family laundry of three loads when a nautomatic machine was needed. machine was used.

The studies also showed that in

The studies also showed that in general, the hotter the water used in doing the laundry, the more thorough was the washing job. Miss Wirges says that if a non-automatic is used, the water for general washing should be as hot as the housewife's hands can endure. For washing cottons in automatic macahines, the temperature setting on the machine should be set at the highest reading.

She says the study showed that the type of agitation used in a washing machine determines the wear on fabrics during the washing process and the type of machine has little to do with this item of wear.

On the basis of this study, Miss Wirges says prospective purchasers of washing machines should carefully consider the advantages and disadvantages of each 4ype of machine and also the items of plumbing, water supply, the conditions under which the machine must be operated along with the initial cost and the cost of operation.






