Bold Thieves Take New Olds 88 From Agency Showroom

Thieves who broke into Darnell Motor Company of this city sometime during Monday night and worked leisurely and boldly for an estimated thirty minutes of an hour, took a new 1951 model Oldsmobile 88 2-door sedan from the display room of the motor agency in one of the boldest thefts committed here in two years.

No trace of the stolen automobile had been reported Thursday morning, although county and city officers had a description of the car to officers over a wide area and also enlisted the help of the State Highway Patrol.

The new car had only been on display a few days, John Darnell, Olds dealer here said. He had planned to deliver the automobile to a Haskell purchaser Tuesday, he added. The sedan was light blue color, with the top a contrasting darker shade of blue.

A check of the establishment following discovery of the burglary failed to reveal anything else taken, Darnell said.

County Gets Three New Wildcat Tests As Oil Development Continues Active

Three new wildcat locations have been staked in Haskell county, and casing has been run in a prospective discovery from a new pay for the Sojourner Field.

Six miles northeast of Haskell, Intex Oil Co. No. 1 J. L. Toliver has been spotted. Drill site is 3,150 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 120, J. Huffman Survey, A-155. Proposed depth is 5,400 feet with rotary.

Pan American Production Co. No. 1 J. R. Berry is to be drilled as a wildcat five and one-half miles south of Haskell. Slated for 5,600 feet with rotary, it will be 467 feet from the north and east east lines of Section 9, Block 1, R. H. Montgomery survey A-505.

A new wildcat test has been announced for the Weinert area. It will be drilled as Ada Oil Co., Houston, No. 1 Lee Estate. Location has been staked 330 feet from the north and west lines of the east half in Section 144, Block 45, H&T Survey. Projected depth is 4800 feet with rotary.

The prospective discovery is the A. G. Hill & Roark, Hooker & Roark No. 1 A. H. Hair. Section 42, H&T, half mile north outpost to production four miles northwest of Haskell.

Total depth was 5,390 feet, and casing was set at 4,829 feet. The project missed the deep pay for the field.

Operator is expected to try first for completion in the zone at 4,753-75 feet a pay which showed some oil, and which has indicated for possible production in several other wells in the pool.

One completion was reported last week 8 miles northwest of Haskell. It is the Hu-ble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 S E Strickland, Section 5, J. McClanahan Survey. Reported potential was 100.08 barrels of 34.2 gravity oil in 24 hours on pump. Production was from 48 perforations at 5,490-98 feet. Plugged back total depth was 5,506 feet and casing was set at 5,744 feet. The section was treated with 3,000 gallons of acid.



Pvt. Leroy Medford Now In Korea With Combat Engineers

Pvt. Marvin Leroy Medford, who was home on furlough in July to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Medford, is now in the combat zone with U. S. forces in Korea.

In a letter to his parents dated Aug. 18, Pvt. Medford told that the unit of Combat Engineers in which he was serving was at that time based 30 miles from the front lines. When he first went to Korea his unit moved up to within 12 miles of the front, but Allied troops had shoved the Communists and North Koreans back some 18 miles.

The Haskell soldier said in his letter that in general the scenery in parts of Korea he had seen might be termed pretty in ordinary times, but that he wouldn't want to live anywhere in that part of the world. "It seems like it has been raining all the time since I've been here," he wrote, adding that he'd like to be back in "good old, dry West Texas."

Pvt. Medford, a 1947 graduate of Haskell High School, entered the Army March 13, 1951, and received his training at Fort Belvoir, Va., with a Combat Engineers group. His only furlough home was in July, and he reported at Seattle, Wash., for shipment overseas on July 31. His unit went first to Japan for a few days before going to Korea.

Paint Creek School Enrollment Up From Last Year

Total enrollment in Paint Creek School for the 1951-52 school year will show a slight increase over the figure for last year, Supt. Dan McRae believes.

A check of the attendance rolls at the school entered its second week of the term indicated an enrollment of approximately 60 in High School and 220 in the elementary grades, he said today. This is a small increase over last year.

The current school term began at Paint Creek on Aug. 27, a week earlier than most area schools opened. However, the early opening date will permit a full school schedule regardless of weather factors during the winter which have at times caused an extension of the school session.

Graham Men Buy Clifton Grocery And Market

In the deal, which was consummated Sept. 1, Mr. and Mrs. Clifton, former owners of the large food store, acquired mineral wells near South Bend, in Young County, formerly operated by Messrs. Roach.

New owners of the grocery store and market have announced change in name of the establishment to the City Cash Food Store, and will operate the business in the future as a cash and carry food store. A formal opening of the store under the new owners will be held at an early date, with the announcement to appear in the next issue of The Free Press.

In acquiring the grocery store and market, Messrs. Roach also purchased the Clifton Shoe Store in this city, located in the building with The Fashion Shoppe.

Management and operation of the two Haskell stores will be handled jointly by I. A. and Burl Roach, they announced. They also have business interests in Abilene.

Plans Approved For New First Baptist Church Auditorium At Estimated Cost of \$100,000

Congregation of the First Baptist Church has approved a building project for the erection of a new church auditorium costing approximately \$100,000, to be located just north of the present Sunday School Building and which would provide adequate facilities to accommodate the steadily expanding membership.

Auditorium in the present church building, which was erected around 1916, has been inadequate for several years. Substantial increase in the church membership coupled with a steadily growing enrollment in all departments of the Sunday School have given added emphasis to the need for expansion of the church plant.

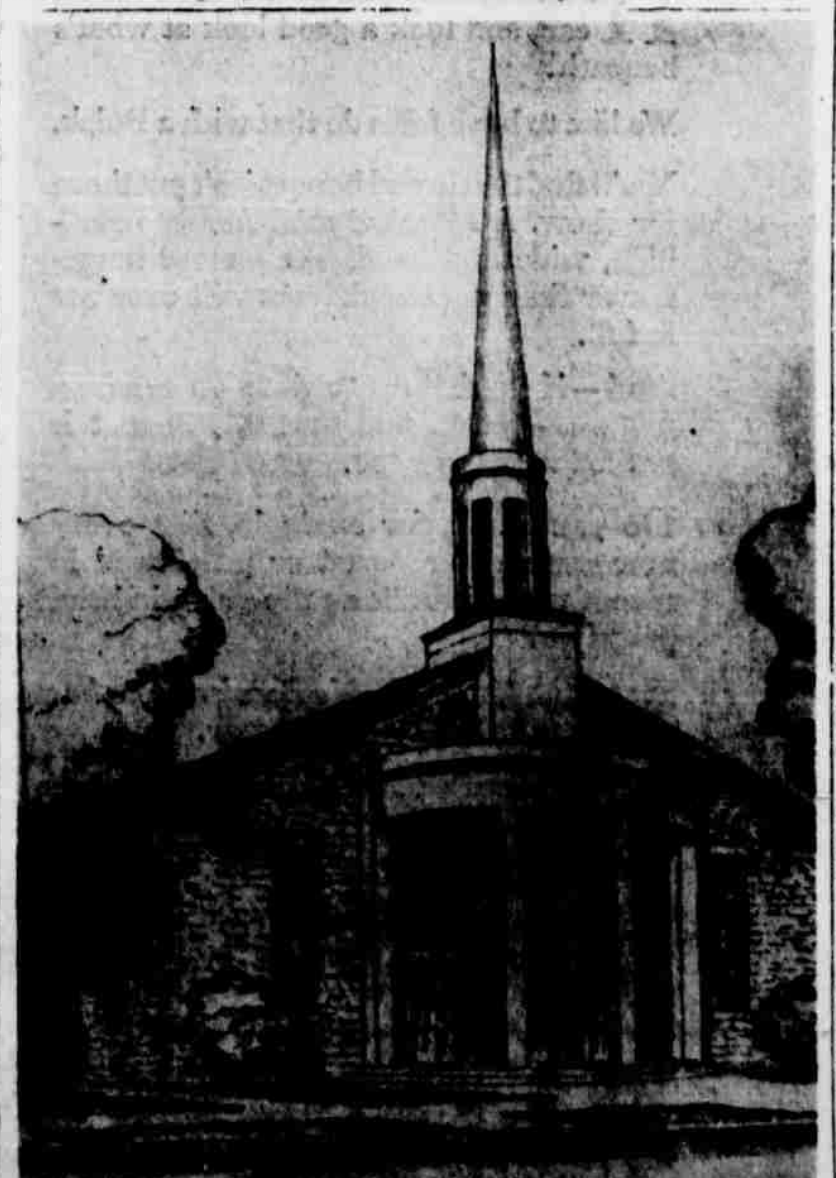
Plans for the proposed new auditorium have been under consideration for some time, and a Building Committee which was recently appointed has been working on the project for several weeks. The Abilene firm of Lindberg & Tucker, architects was employed to draw plans and specifications for the proposed new building and Tuesday night the Abilene men met with the Building Committee to make final approval of plans.

The proposed new edifice would be 60x132 feet, with a seating capacity of 850, with additional chair space that could be utilized when needed. Floor arrangement in the proposed one-story new building would be almost at ground level to make the building conveniently accessible for all ages.

When the new structure is completed, it is planned to convert the present church building into Sunday School rooms.

Material to be used in construction of the new building will be stone or brick, or possibly an attractive brick-stone combination. No difficulty is expected in securing the needed materials, and the necessary steel required in the structure has already been purchased, members of the building committee said. After all details of the plans and specifications are worked out, it is believed that actual construction work can be

The piston moves up—compresses the swirling fuel into the comet shape shown here. "Compression ratios" are simply a measure of how much the fuel is compressed.



The ball of fuel is compressed around the spark plug—lets loose its pent-up charge when the spark is fired—delivering a higher percentage of power from each charge of fuel.

It's Everyones Job To Prevent Grass Fires

Recent hot, dry weather has created a situation that is "tailored made" for grass and range fires. Grass and other plants along the highways, in parks and pastures and ranges are all tinder dry and there are a lot ways fires can get started.

The State Farm and Ranch Safety Committee of Texas, headed by J. Walter Hammond of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and E. C. Martin of the Agricultural Extension Service are strong in their plea for every citizen of the state to join with them in conducting a campaign to hold down grass fires.

The nation needs every pound of meat that can be produced, say the committee leaders, and grass is our cheapest source of livestock feed. It must be protected. They urge the organization of community and county groups for combating grass fires.

Ranges should be protected by fireguards. Hazards that might possibly cause fires should be eliminated. Glass bottles have started many fires. They act as a magnifying glass and when the sun's rays reach a proper angle, almost

any bottle may concentrate the heat from the sun sufficiently to ignite dry grass. Fires, for any reason, should not be started, says Hammond unless they can be controlled. Trash should be burned in a closed incinerator so as to eliminate the possibility of starting a grass fire.

Motorists are urged to snuff out the fire on cigarettes or cigars before tossing them on the highway. Many fires are set by motorists who never know what they've done for they are usually miles

down the road before the fire is discovered. Those who drive in the country are urged to be on the lookout for fires and should report them when found. A small fire can usually be put out before it has a chance to spread while on the other hand, if permitted to go unchecked, it may be out of control before it is discovered.

He urged the local chairman, however, to set for the county a goal "high enough to be a challenge to you and your committee."

"The people want a part in the nation's defense effort," he said. "Right now the most practical way

for them to help is for them to buy U. S. Defense Bonds."

Mr. Adams said that volunteers are being organized in every community of the state to conduct intensive campaigns during the drive, which is the first since the outbreak of the Korean war more than a year ago.

Emphasis will be placed on increasing sales through the payroll savings plan, which permits employees to buy bonds by having deductions made from wages or salaries, and the Bond-a-Month Plan, through which bank customers can buy bonds automatically.

Haskell Red Cross Chapter Active In Nine Services

The Haskell County Chapter of the American Red Cross is active in nine services, and for many years has been rated among the outstanding chapters of the state. During 1950, there were 1,080 cases handled by the local chapter in Home Service alone.

Over one hundred boys and girls participated in the Learn-to-Swim program last year, while this year the number increased to 221.

Twenty-five Home Demonstration groups had representatives who trained as First Aid Instructors who, in turn, instructed members of their respective clubs. There are 27 currently authorized First Aid Instructors in the county.

Haskell County has a disaster organization which has been tried and proved successfully adaptable in an emergency.

That the Red Cross needs no selling in Haskell County is amply proven by the fact that citizens expressed their support and belief in the organization last March by over-subscribing the county quota in the Fund Campaign before 3 p. m. on the opening day of the drive. A percentage of the funds raised was sent to National Headquarters to be used in such disaster as the recent Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Illinois flood.

Miss Wanda Dulaney, executive of the Haskell chapter, and a member of the National Disaster Reserve, was assigned to the flood area for three weeks and is subject to call at all times for disaster assignment.

Miss Dulaney has been executive secretary of the Haskell County Chapter for three and a half years. The Chapter Board is composed of volunteer workers, chosen annually by the nominating committee.

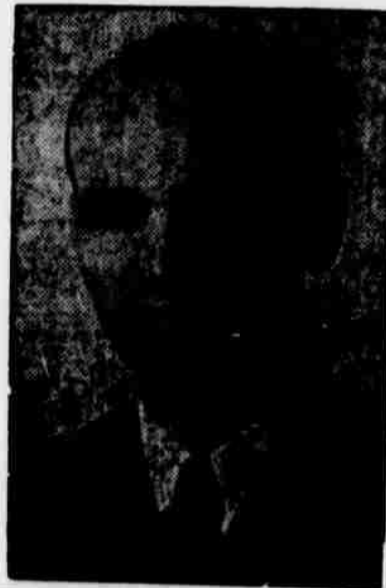

Plants Require Right Kinds Food To Produce Profitable Yields

Plants need plenty of the right kind of food in order to thrive and produce profitable yields.

In addition to the plant food, plants also need a good home in which to live and lots of water to drink.

Miller points out that the test of any program aimed at increasing crop yields and farm profits comes with results and cites as example of research and hundreds of Extension Service demonstrations as proof that it pays to feed the land.

At the Temple Station in the blackland area, cotton, following Hubam sweetclover, which was harvested for seed, produced a five year average of 315 pounds of lint per acre...

certain of the legumes also provide the best known method for controlling cotton root rot.

Hairy vetch, Williamette vetch, winter peas and other legumes also increase yields and reduce root rot losses but are not so effective on the blacklands as sweetclover.

Now is the time, says Miller, to secure the necessary legume seed and fertilizer that will be needed to put in the legume crop.

15 Years Work of ACP Strengthens Nation's Farms

Fifteen years of soil and water conservation work under the Agricultural Conservation program have substantially strengthened the nation's farm production defense plant, says John Brock,

chairman of the Haskell County FMA committee.

As the chairman expresses it, the topsoil that has been held on the farms of this country by grass cover, terraces, contour farming, field stripping and other practices, is now producing food and fiber for defense instead of silting up the nation's river channels and harbors.

The organic matter returned to the soil through cover crops, grass and legumes in rotation and in pasture and meadow has strengthened the soil structure and added to the fertility of the land.

Many practices play a part in holding back the water from rains and melting snows, contributing to increased crop yields often spelling the difference between good and poor yields or no yields at all.

Although many factors contributed to increased production, the conservation practices stimulated and carried on under the Agricultural Conservation program have played an important part.

He points out that conservation practices carried on since 1938 under the Agricultural Conservation program have built up a great fertility backlog and the practices stressed this year are adding strength to the foundation already established.

Each year's accomplishments add to the nation's farm production defense plant. Our record of production is evidence that we are making progress even though in conservation we have to "run pretty fast just to stay where they are."
