What the Christian Church of Haskell Believes

The object of our existence is not to add another "different" church to the many now existing, for such would be contrary to the teaching of Christ and His apostles. (I Cor. 1:10, 11; Jn. 17:21).

Our pleans Christians is for the absolute Lordship of Christ "as head over all things to the church." (Eph. 1:22).

If He is to be absolute Lord, then His authority allows for no other, temporal or otherwise. His name is supreme, His command is final, His word is final and sufficient, His instructions are to be followed to the exclusion of all others.

The religious world today is already one in many things, consequently they need to be reunited only in those things in which they are divided. They are divided on four things:

- 1. The name.
- 2. Baptism.
- 3. Creed and discipline.
- 4. Church Government.

A suggested plan for unity wou'd involve accepting or restoring the name "Christian" only, which all alrea ty acknowledge and cherish, which is common to all and puts Christ's name above every name.

For the sake of unity, all accept that form of baptism which all acknowledge as valid, and which coincides with the New Testament description of a burial and a resurrection.

That in the matter of creed and discipline all accept the New Testament only as the one and only divine statement of authority, and discard any and all human attempts at creeds and disciplines which hold Christ's followers apart.

As to church government, recognize only that which was practiced and proved for in the New Testament. All that is more than the New Testament way should be discarded for the sake of unity.

The plan therefore, is to restore the New Testament church in name, ordinances and, government as it was before it was divided, thus to have it reunited.
