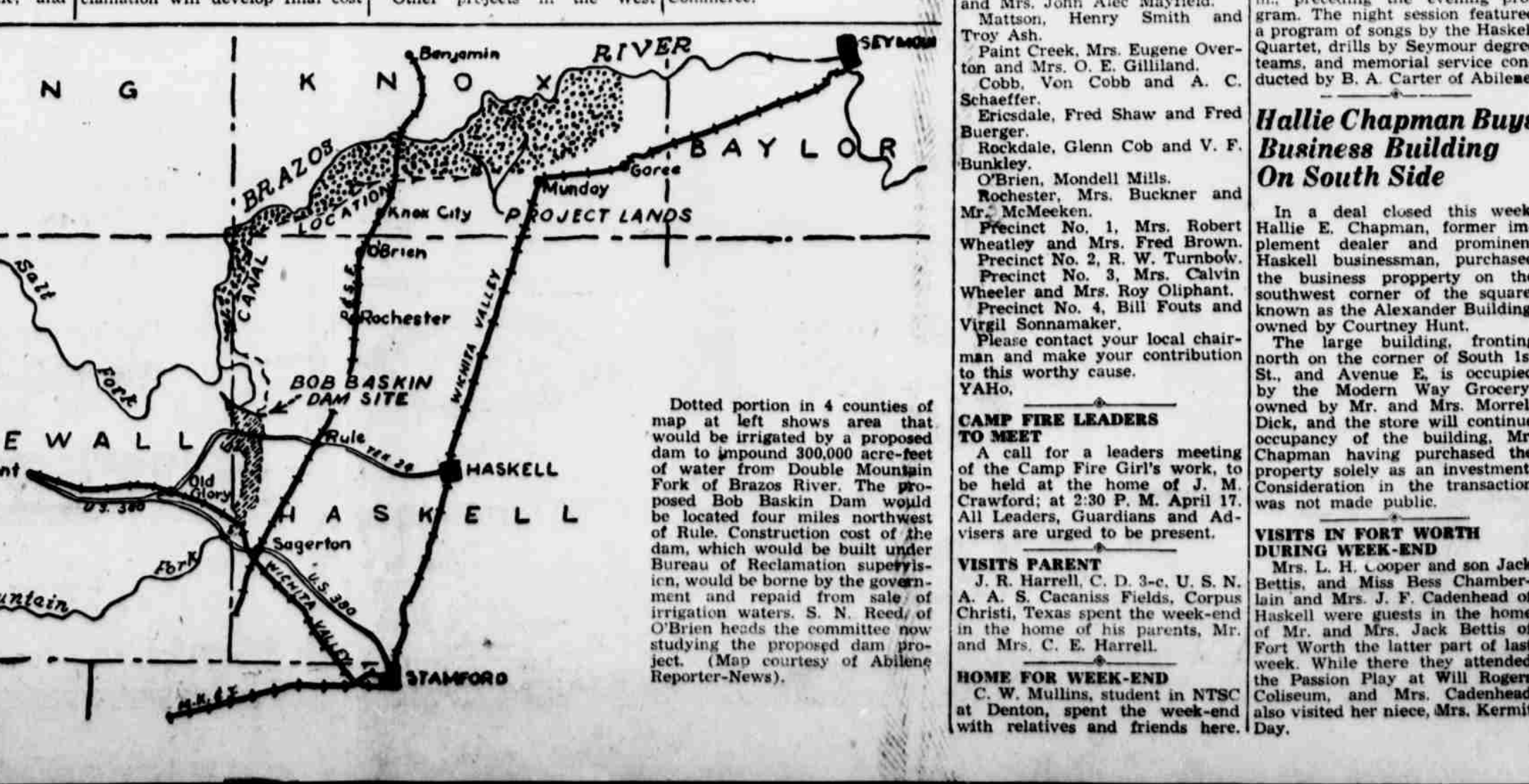

Christmas Gifts To Children In Germany Writing Letters of Thanks To Paint Week Future Homemakers

The result of a Christmas gift to the Future Homemakers of America Club of the Paint Creek Rural High School was their most interesting correspondence with school girls - reports Mrs. Foots, Home Economics teacher and FHA sponsor.

Striking and most noticeable characteristic of the letters is the excellent, almost perfect penmanship of the German students. Accompanying the following letter, the sender included a

daintily colored paper napkin and delicate lace doilie.

Ochsenfurt, 5 March 1950
Dear Mary:

Today I want to write a thankful letter to you. It is a long time since Christmas, but my English is so bad and I had still to learn. It would be easier for me to write in German.

I am very proud that America pupils think of German children. I enjoyed your present; I am very pleased to have it. I got it from my teacher. I am in the 6th grade of a public school in Ochsenfurt, near Würzburg, this is in Northern Bavaria, District Untenfranken. Ochsenfurt lies on the Main River. It is a good place for a good wine; perhaps your parents or friends will know it. But most of the people are farmers.

My father tells me, that Texas your town and the life there. American soldiers are always been very kind for German children. Sometimes we got candies.

That you can see how much I like your beautiful present. I send a little handwork for you, it is made by myself.

My father is Inspector of Bavarian Police. I am living with him, with my mother, who I love very much, and my little 6 year old sister, Maudie. She is in the 1st class of public school. My name is Sieglinde and I am 12 years old.

In another letter to one of the Paint Creek pupils, the little German writer enclosed a picture postcard, a street scene in the town where she lives. Her letter:

Ochsenfurt, 18. 2. 1950

Dear Anita:
I thank you quite heartily for your soap. I am twelve years old, my sister three. I have English lessons since September, 48. Since March 45 I live at Ochsenfurt; our flat in Würzburg was destroyed in the 6th class. In this year we had no snow to ride toboggan. I should be very glad to get an answer from you soon.

Another little German girl Rosemarie Gebhardt, enclosed her snapshot in a letter decorated with flower petals and leaves, and a sketch of a small village beside a river, which she sketched and colored. The letter:

29 January 1950

Dear Gregory:
May I introduce myself first. I'm Rosemarie Gebhardt, eleven years old, visiting the 6th class of the Catholic Ground School at Ochsenfurt. 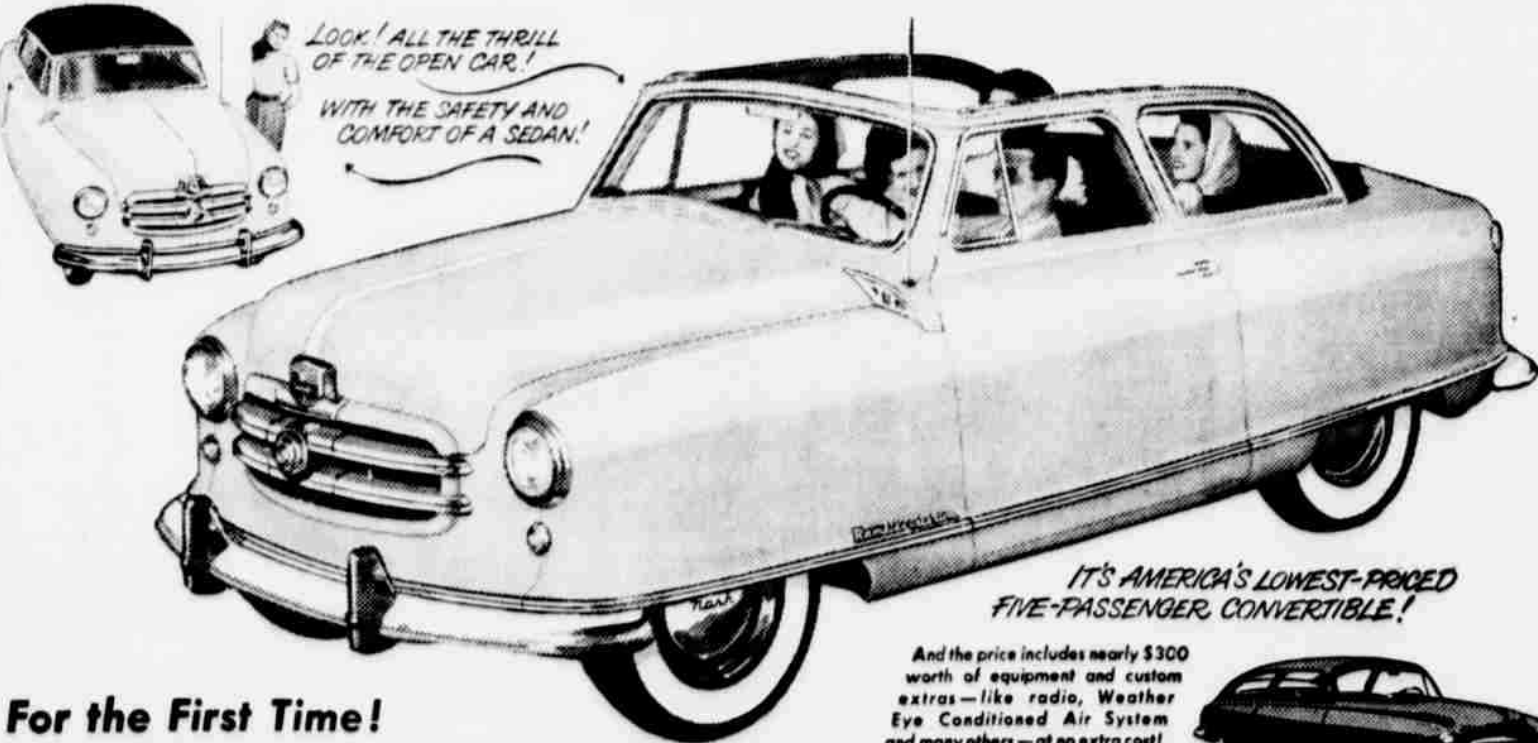

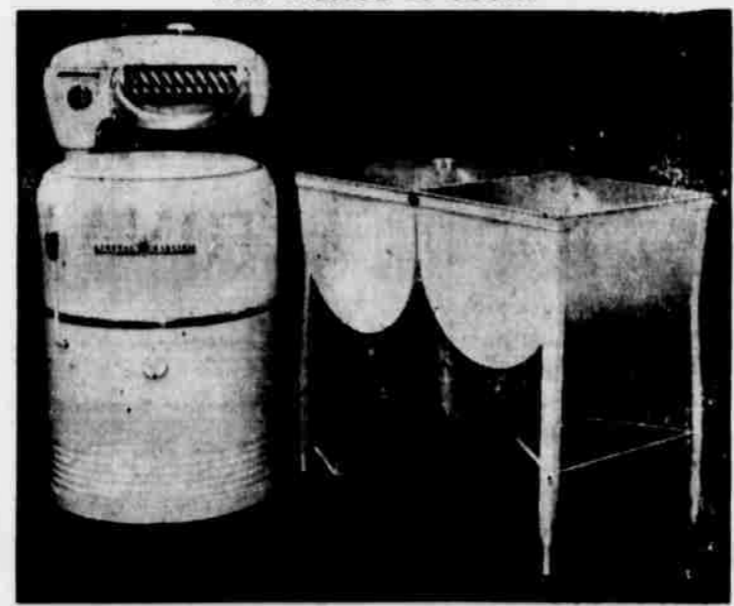

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 tablespoon Fat
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
3 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup unsweetened prune juice
1/2 cup cooked pruned halves
8 shelled nuts

Turn on oven; set at moderately hot (400° F.). Grease a round 8-in. cake pan, 1 1/2 in. deep. Mix 1/2 cup sugar with cinnamon. Add 1 tablesp. milk and the melted butter. Let stand. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and 3 tablesp. sugar. Work shortening in with fork. Stir in quickly a mixture of 1/2 cup milk and prune juice. Spread dough in pan to very edge. Arrange prunes around outer edge. Arrange circle of nuts in center. Spoon sugar mixture over top. Bake on bottom shelf of oven about 25 min., or until brown. Serve warm. *Apricots also can be used.

Security Benefits Provides Insurance On Broad Scale

The worker's social security card represents a family insurance policy that, under certain conditions, can pay insurance benefits to his wife, widow, children, or parents. Every worker who has ever had a social security card owes it to his family to let them know that they may be eligible for Federal insurance benefits in case he should die. Lack of this knowledge, failure to get in touch with a social security office at the death of a worker, may cost his survivors hundreds of dollars in insurance benefits.

Tell your family now that they should get in touch with the nearest social security office in the event of your death!

For further information about your family's rights and responsibilities under the law, write to the social security field office located in Abilene, Texas. Ask for your free copy of booklet No. 35 which tells how you and your family are protected by old-age and survivors insurance.

No Easy Road To Eradication of Disease Carrying Insects, Rodents, Declares State Health Officer

"There is no easy road to the abatement of insects and rodents," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Frequently people get enthusiastic about the destruction of the insects and believe that, if an airplane flies over the town, or if a huge fogging machine rolls through town spreading an insecticide, the insects will be killed instantly and peace from the insect nuisance will remain forever. This is an erroneous and, unfortunately, bad practice, because it creates an unwarranted sense of security.

Before any killing is anticipated, a thorough clean-up of the community should be carried on. This means cleaning up the rubbish and garbage and eliminating all insect feeding and breeding places. It might mean the draining or filling in of wet areas for destruction of the mosquito larvae. When this is done, one will be surprised how few insects are left to become a nuisance and, perhaps, a public health problem.

Following this, it is suggested that insecticides be sprayed manually to those places inhabited by the insects. Experience has shown that a 2 per cent to 5 per cent solution of DDT is still the most effective insecticide to use for general sanitation. This is spread to form a thin coat on the surface, where it can remain for future destruction. A spray that will just moisten the surface is sufficient to be effective. Spray only those areas where you know the insects gather.

Pasture plants need a rest period to regain their vigor and to allow them to produce a seed crop. Now is the time to make plans for carrying out deferred grazing practices for this year, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

Ranchers Advised to Plan For Range Deferment Now

Pasture plants need a rest period to regain their vigor and to allow them to produce a seed crop. Now is the time to make plans for carrying out deferred grazing practices for this year, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

The length of deferment may vary from two to six months or longer depending on the rainfall, condition of the range and the kinds of grasses in the pasture. In areas of high rainfall where grasses get coarse and lose their nutrients upon maturity, a spring rest for vigor and a fall rest for seed production is best, says Walker. In north and west Texas where grasses cure well, a six-months rest from May to November may be advisable.

He points out that many ranchers were surprised at the amount of grass that came back on their deferred pastures. Excellent moisture and good growing condition last year were contributing factors and many ranchmen found tall growing grasses in their deferred pastures that they had never seen before. The explanation, says Walker, the grasses never had a chance to grow up before heavy grazing got them.

More operators, he adds, are finding that there is a dollars and cents angle tied in with the deferred grazing practice and cites as an example the case of Mason county ranchman Elwood Kothmann. Kothmann, he says, has rested one pasture for three years during the growing season from May to November and has grazed it during the winter months. Last year this pasture produced 41 pounds of beef per acre on an annual basis and did it in just six months of grazing and Walker adds the grass is nearly waist high.

Walker suggests that you make plans to defer at least one pasture on the ranch this year. He says demonstrators have proved that deferred grazing is also a very effective aid in any range recovery program and with favorable weather deferred pastures have shown remarkable recovery.

scale drawings of any structural changes such as new doors and windows or an added room. Making changes on paper in advance, he says is easier and cheaper than making them after construction gets underway.

Once the plan is drawn, Allen says you'll be wise if you get cost estimates from many sources — masons, lumber dealers, electricians, heating contractors, dealers in equipment and supplies or local purchasing cooperatives. Then compare prices and the merchandise each has to offer. He points out that farm families can often make considerable savings by using stone, sand, gravel or rough lumber from their own property.

Generally, he says, it pays to employ skilled labor for cabinet work, flooring, wiring, plumbing and for doing other jobs that require an expert. Competent workmen often charge no more than unskilled workers and they do a better job in less time. Home owners can add to the savings by helping with the construction work. Farmers may use their own equipment to excavate, haul supplies and do other necessary jobs in connection with the remodeling and this too will cut expenses.

Social Security Card Valuable To Worker

"No one likes to lose money, and yet when a worker fails to show his employer his social security card he may lose thousands of dollars," stated Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security field office. "You see, the reporting by the employer of the worker's correct name and number, exactly as shown on his card, is the key to the worker's wage account in the records of the Social Security Administration," Fisher said.

The importance of this wage account is apparent when a worker realizes that the benefits he can expect when he stops work at 65 or later, or the benefits that might be paid his family in case he dies, are based on the wages to his credit in his social security account. When the account is incomplete, it may mean a difference in the amount of the benefit or it may mean that no benefits can be paid.

Many workers make it a point to check their social security account periodically, and the Social Security Administration recommends that this be done at least every four years. A special post card form is available which any worker may use to request a statement of his account. The repre-

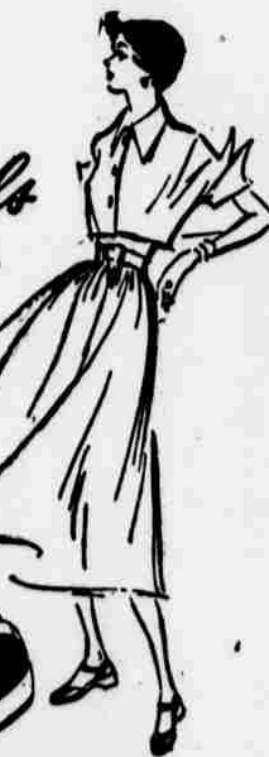
