Amendment two on the ballot is the constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600.00 per month and setting a per diem of \$30.00 per day during legislative sessions and mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

The Haskell Indians, Junior High, Junior Varsity, and Varsity teams will attend the District meet at Abilene Cooper High School Friday.-





The Haskell Field Office was first opened in early 1953 as a sub-unit working out of the District Office at Stamford, then later that year it became a full field office with responsibilities to both the California Creek and the Wichita-Brazos SWCD's. Otis J. Curry was the first District Conservationist located at Haskell. Hervey L. Perkins served for a short period of time following Curry until January, 1959, at which time yours truly took over the reigns of leadership.

The staff at Haskell originally consisted of Curry and J. E. Foster, Technician. It grew through the years until at one time, the staff consisted of the District Conservationist, two soil conservationists, one conservation technician, and one engineer full time, and two part-time conservation technician's. We are back now to the District Conservationist, one soil conservationist, and one conservation technician


