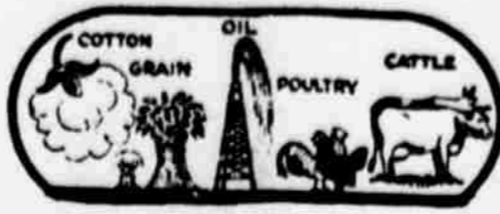

Play Gorman Here STEERS WIN DISTRICT 5-B

Rochester steers won district 5-B championship last time in ten years. The play of the Rule Bobcats in the hard fought game Friday night, November 14, in Indian Field before one of the largest crowds to ever witness a district game.

The Haskell Indians ended the 1975 football season with a bang here Friday night as they defeated the Paducah Dragons 50-0.

It was the last game eight of the Indians will play in high school. The eight seniors are Cris Love, Jeff Teague, Randy Phemister, Jamie Mickler, George Brown, Larry Jackson, Johnny Hawkins and Jerrell Johnson.

All the seniors were captains Friday night. The Indians ended up with a pretty good season record despite losing the first six games. They finished with a 3-7 for the season and a 3-2 in district.

The Indians scored in each quarter Friday, two in the first, four in the second, two in the third and one in the fourth.

With 5:38 left in the first period, Gary McAdams tossed a 30 yard pass to Rex Pittman for the first TD. It took the Indians 11 plays to cover 71 yards. Cris Love's kick was good. Then with 1:32 left,

DPS Monthly Report

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of October, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1975 shows a total of 45 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 34 persons injured.

The rural accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1975, shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured, as compared to October, 1974, with 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured. This was 41 more accidents, one less killed, and 68 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths (18) for the month of October, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Five in Parker; two each in Stonewall, Castro, and Randall; and one each in Baylor, Crosby, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Wise, Armstrong, and Motley.

Haskell Bicentennial Happenings

Bob Wilson, newcomer to Haskell, has created a beautiful wood carving of Early American design in the form of a tavern sign.

Recently he displayed the sign at a meeting of the Brazos West Art Association and members were so impressed they felt it would be of interest to everyone because of this year's Bicentennial emphasis.

Incidentally, it will not grace the location of a tavern; it will identify the Wilson family home as they are planning to build a new house one of these days, perhaps in Georgia.

Originating in England, tavern signs were designed with a notch in the top so that a candle could be placed there for light. The lines at the top corresponded to the roofline.

The frame was made and then the identifying sign which had been carved with hammer and chisel was fitted into the frame.

When craftsmen in Colonial America began to make the signs most of them were carved and constructed in one piece, with a scalloped or curved top, and then painted.

On one side of the Wilson sign is carved an Eagle with the traditional shield and arrows and olive branch. On the other side is the Liberty Bell. He uses a wood gouge and has found that mahogany is the most workable wood for him.

After carving the design a soldering iron is used to bring out the lines and details. Great care must be taken because if the lines are not burned enough they are too light and of course too deep a burn destroys the fine line of the design.

Bob has mastered this technique because the lines and details, such as the feathers of the Eagle, were so uniform and clear that they seemed to be drawn with pen and ink. After the work is finished a transparent finish is applied for preservation.

After the Bicentennial year is over the two sides may be separated and he expects to use them individually, per-

ed according to the Italian theme.

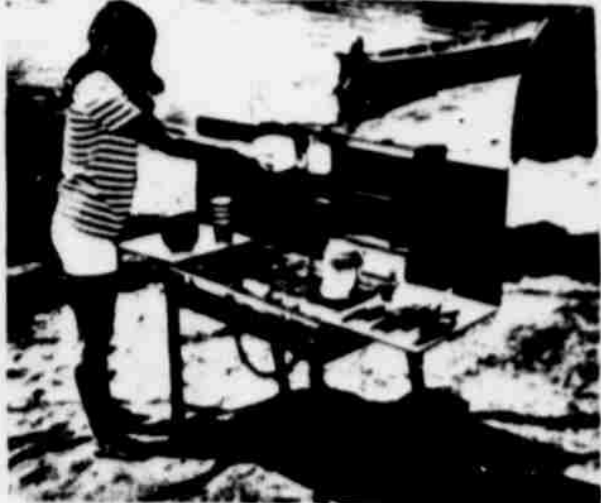

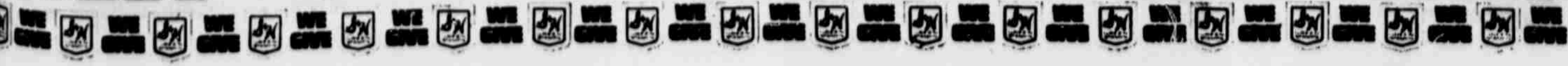
