# **DPS Monthly** Report

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of October, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1975 shows a total of 45 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 34 persons injured.

The rural accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October. 1975, shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured, as compared to October, 1974, with 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured. This was 41 more accidents, one less killed, and 68 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths (18) for the month of October, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Five in Parker; two each in Stonewall, Castro, and Randall; and one each in Baylor, Crosby, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Wise, Armstrong, and Motley.





Some flak for farmers is coming in the form of com-plaints about farm chemicals from people who apparently consider the word "chemical" the opposite of the word "ecology". Not too surprising considering all the attention given by ecologists to some misuses of chemicals. Farmers however, are probably the most ecologically minded group in the country have been for years.

Making your living from the land means taking care of it. Proper applications of chemicals enhance vitality of the soil, replacing those elements used to produce the 'last crop. Necessary use of pesticides not only keeps quality of food production high, it also makes possible far greater quantity of production and thereby keeps food prices down. 


