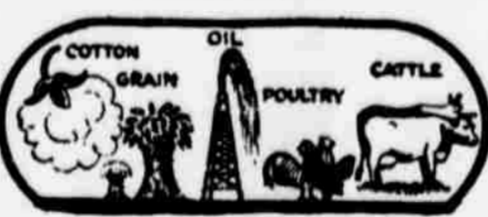

In the Assembly business meeting, minutes were read and approved. The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$2,524.87 in the Scholarship Fund. Six scholarships have

been awarded to a high school graduate.

Royce Adkins, chairman of the nominating committee gave the following report: President, C. H. "Bud" Herren; vice president, Roy "Buck" Everett; secretary-treasurer, Anita Pittman Medford; historian, Carolyn

Williams Pippin; and director, Abe Turner.

Recognition was given to the oldest student, Mrs. Florence Couch Hammer of Houston. Four of her children were present, all graduates of Haskell High School. Oldest teacher, Mrs. Lelia Jean Conner, 1915-1917; the largest family I. D. Killingsworth Sr. Six were present. Largest class, 1940 and 1939 tied with 14 members present. Longest distance traveled Joseph Hammer, Miami, Florida.

All ex-teachers Scholarship winners and Board members were recognized.

Karen Pippin sang the Bicentennial Hymn. Wallace Cox, Jr. presented the memorial services. When the memorial service was completed Karen Pippin sang the "Lord's Prayer."

The benediction was given and the school song sung led by the high school majorettes and the pep squad.

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in 1977 here.

Dr. W. Kemp Elected VP Of AADE

William James Kemp, D. D. S., of Haskell, Texas, a member and former president of the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners, was elected vice-president of the American Association of Dental Examiners at its annual meeting held in Oak Brook, Illinois on October 23-24, 1975. Founded in 1883, and composed of the boards of dentistry from the various states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico, the American Association of Dental Examiners sponsors programs to assist the boards of dentistry in their administration of licensing programs and enforcement of laws regulating the practice of dentistry within the United States.

Graduate of the University of Missouri at Kansas City School of Dentistry, Dr. Kemp practices general dentistry in Haskell. He is chief of dental service at Haskell County Memorial Hospital, and also a staff member of Stamford Memorial Hospital, Throckmorton Memorial Hospital, Knox County Memorial Hospital, and Aspermont Hospital.

Dr. Kemp is a Fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists, and a member of the American Dental Association, American Academy of General Dentistry, and the Pierre Fauchard Academy.

George C. Marks will succeed Edward E. Thomas as state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service effective November 2.

Marks, a native of Heidenheimer, Texas, is currently state conservationist for Arizona. He began his career with SCS at Rusk in 1950 as a soil scientist and later worked as a soil conservationist and district conservationist at Sulphur Springs, Winnsboro, Jefferson, New Boston, and Corsicana.

Marks has a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University, 1950. He served in the U. S. Air Force from February 1945 to August 1946.

Thomas, state conservationist for Texas since 1972, is being promoted to the position of assistant administrator for SCS in Washington, D. C. He is a native of Vernon, Texas and a graduate of Texas A&M University, 1954.

Wayne Phemister of Haskell, signed his Great Plain Conservation Program contract this week, on 300 acres that he owns and operates 8 miles southwest of Haskell. Wayne is planning to establish a grassed waterway of approximately five acres, and six acres of pasture to Selection 75 Kleingrass, and parallel terrace the crop land.

The committee will screen the applications of all persons from the geographical area included in the local State Bar district.

"This is a time-consuming job, but an essential one if our program is to succeed," Lawrence said. "We need lawyers from the local areas to look at these applications from members of their own community and advise the State Board of Law Examiners as to the fitness of the applicants for admission to the Bar."

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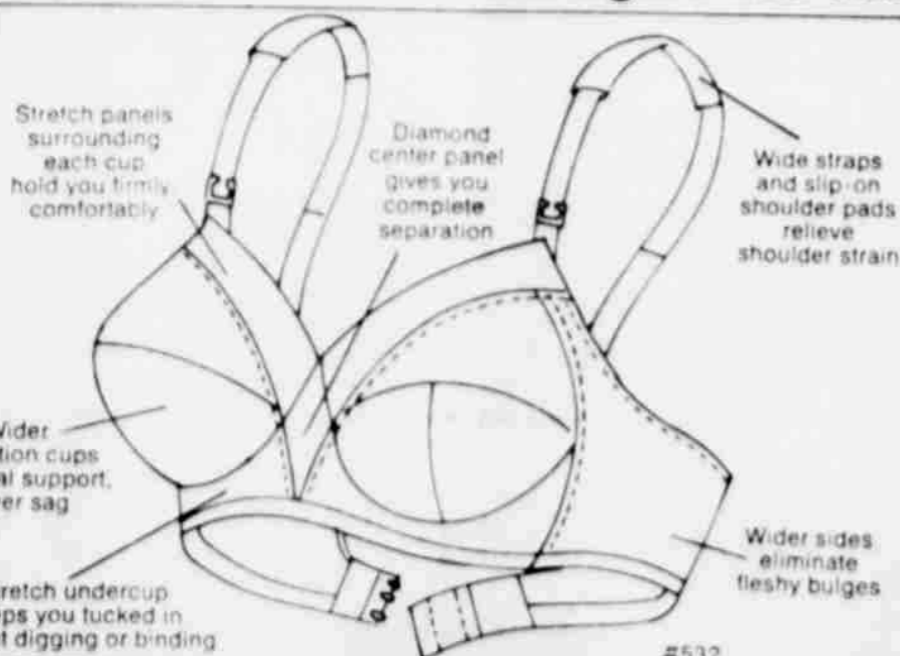

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Mental Retardation

This is the fifth in a series of articles about Mental Retardation prepared by Mrs. Eugene Cochran and the Public Committee of the Texas Association for Retarded Children.

PROJECT ZERO REJECT educational programs for mentally retarded in the Haskell-Knox area are the philosophy of the Education Agency that "Texas schools are based on the principle of one for all children and all children for one." The basis for special education is founded in the fact that EVERY child is capable of full recognition of his or her educational potential consistent with his or her ability to learn."

PROJECT ZERO REJECT is a campaign to help all handicapped children in Texas take advantage of their educational opportunities. Project Zero Reject is a campaign to make sure that every handicapped child is given the same quality special education as the non-handicapped child in public school.

Present Texas parents of handicapped children in either public or private comprehensive special education programs or private programs for which they are making application. As of 1, 1976, however, all school systems MUST provide ALL HANDICAPPED CHILDREN with quality comprehensive special education.

PROJECT ZERO REJECT went into full swing on Feb. 6, 1975, when Texas Attorney General John Hill affirmed that ALL TEXAS SCHOOL SYSTEMS MUST PROVIDE COMPREHENSIVE SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS BY SEPT. 1, 1976.

Hill had been asked to hand down an opinion on whether complete special education programs (for handicapped children ages 3-21 as provided for by the Texas Comprehensive Special Education Act of 1969) had to be started in all Texas school systems by the 1976 deadline specified in the Act.

PLAN A PROGRAMS—Some school systems already have the "Plan A" comprehensive programs called for by the Act. Plan A programs let the handicapped child be educated in the mainstream of education, except when the handicap is too severe for regular public school classroom instruction.

PLAN B PROGRAMS—Until the Sept. 1, 1976 deadline, school systems can operate "Plan B" Programs. These are voluntary, and must be applied for by parents. They are programs specialized and funded according to the handicapped child who ap-

plies. **PROJECT ZERO REJECT IS WORKING IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES TO HELP PARENTS AND INTERESTED PERSONS FIND OUT WHAT SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS THEIR SCHOOL SYSTEM OFFERS HOW TO GET THEIR CHILDREN INTO THOSE PROGRAMS AND HOW TO MAKE SURE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN A PROGRAMS ARE STARTED BY SEPT. 1, 1976.**

Many parents of handicapped children never SEEK TO ENTER them in school, either wishing to "HIDE" them, or feeling nothing can help them. Often in the past, when parents have tried to enter their children in school, the answer in many school districts has been, "WE CAN'T HANDLE HIM" or "WE DON'T PROVIDE SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASSES."

With the Attorney General's ruling and Project Zero Reject, that situation is expected to change. School systems are not required to provide comprehensive special education.

Two recent court decisions related to the Texas situation: In 1971 the U. S. District Court of the Eastern District of Pennsylvania ruled that the mentally retarded have a RIGHT to public school programs of education that meet their needs. And the Mills vs. Board of Education decision (also in 1971) stated that lack of ADEQUATE FUNDING and FINANCING is no sufficient reason to deprive the handicapped of equal education.

THE PROBLEM NOW IS AWARENESS. Currently, a large number of all known handicapped children in Texas are NOT getting an adequate education.

Although 807 school districts do have Plan A programs (Haskell-Knox Consortium) many families with handicapped children are apparently unaware of them. Of the 116,375 mentally retarded children ages 3-21 in Texas, for example, about half (58,134) are not receiving any type of public school special education whatsoever. Many children, furthermore, who are merely visually, auditorially, speech, or orthopedically handicapped or emotionally disturbed actually become mentally retarded due to lack of special education programs or to inadequate programs.

Project Zero Reject is calling for statewide cooperation in alerting people about special education. Radio, television, newspaper, brochures, magazines, meetings, and word-of-mouth are being used to inform parents of handicapped children (or people who know of handicapped children) who are not in special education to respond. The goal is to alert all school districts in Texas of their responsibility both now and by Sept. 1, 1976, to handicapped children. The goal is to make parents of handicapped children aware that quality comprehensive special education is or will be available, and that other programs are now available.

WHAT ARE PLAN A PROGRAMS—Plan A Programs for special education emphasize three major areas: (1) Except for purposes of

diagnosis, handicapped children should not be labeled or categorized (for example, as having a language or learning disability); (2) Educational emphasis should be on ability rather than on the handicap; (3) where possible, handicapped children should learn through regular school programs with modifications and support as needed, instead of in a self-contained special class out of the mainstream of normal life.

Under the Plan A approach, the learning needs of the child himself are carefully evaluated. His academic record, psychological make-up, medical history, and family background are all considered in developing a specific educational plan for him. 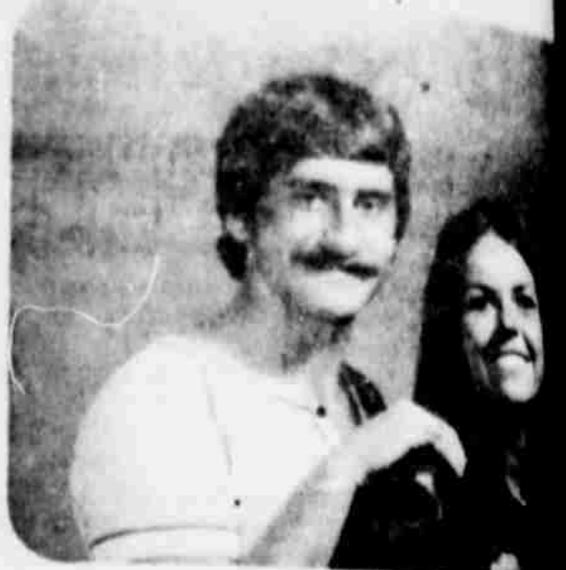

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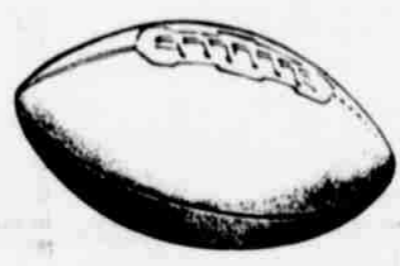

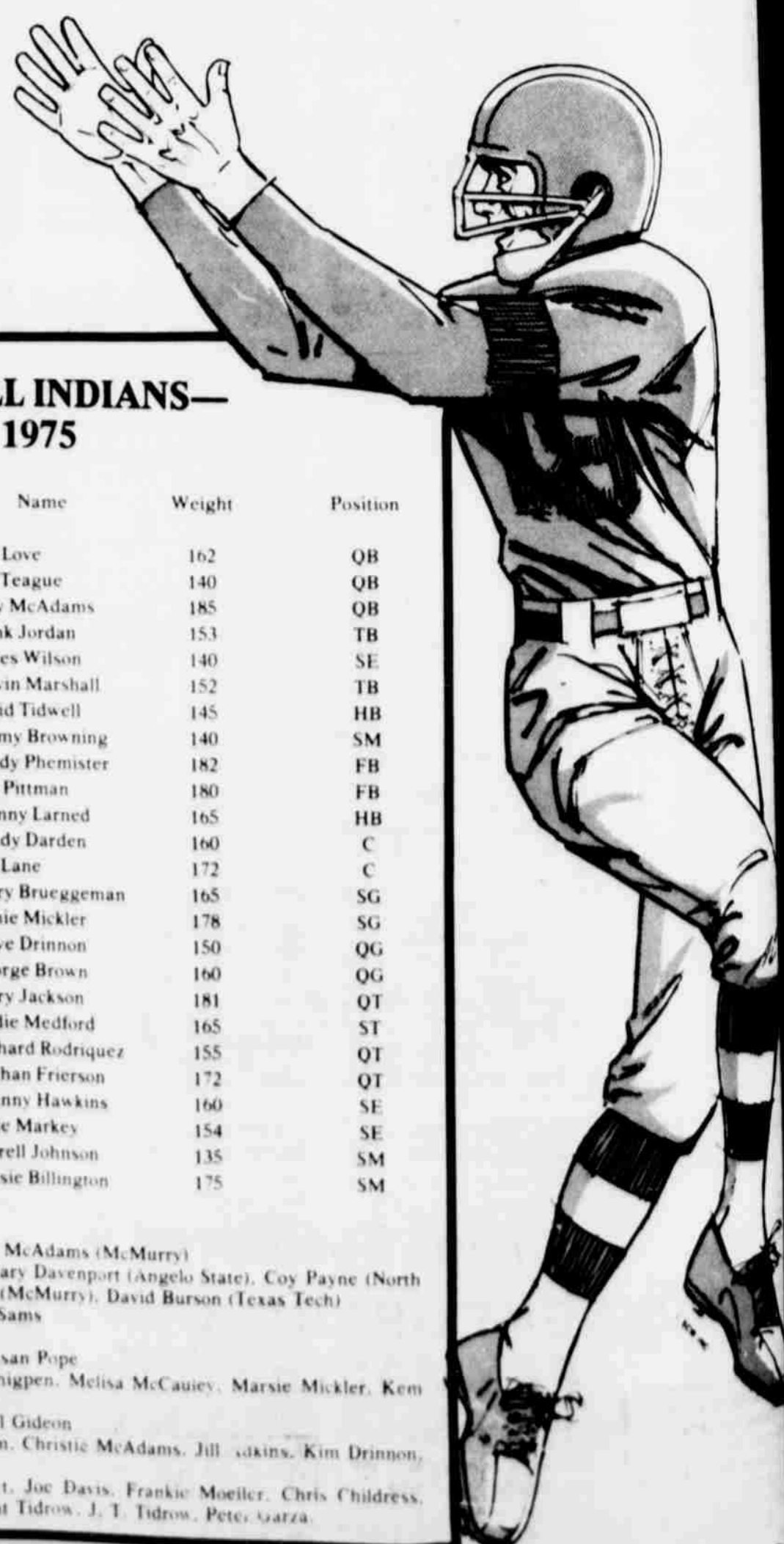
