velopment Tests will be given in Rule High School Saturday Dec. 6th at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for College entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15 is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and has been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.

Following the business session conducted by Mrs. Howard Perry, president, several observations concerning the theme, "A Return to Values" were made by Mrs. R. W. Herren, program director for the evening.

Mrs. Herren introduced Larry Suttle, Minister of the Church of Christ. Mr. Suttle remarked that the theme is appropriate to this time of the year, and also appropriate to this time in this century. He said that great changes have taken place - a change in issues, styles of living, fashions, words and the language of communication.

"We are beginning to see a re-emphasis on old values - a return to the old-fashioned ways, to the "natural", rejecting the "synthetic". But we must exercise caution in looking longingly into the past, for dwelling on the past paralyzes us and prevents us from attempting new things."

We are apt to remember that in the good old days children said "Yes, sir" and everyone went to church, and forget such things as dirt roads, the boiling washpot and the lack of medicines for many diseases, he said. Citing Ecclesiastes 7:10 he noted that Solomon recognized that distance lends enchantment to view

"Though standards have been modified this may not be the worst time that mankind has known", Mr. Suttle stated, giving scripture from the Old and New Testaments that recorded a dismal picture.

He suggested the reemphasis on several values that have existed all along: 1. There is a God and we are made in His image. 2. The Bible is the Word of God and in it we find the directions for having a successful country, a happy life, and the recipe for every human need.

3. There is a Right and Wrong. 4. Sin is ugly and produces ugly fruits. 5. Marriage is a holy institution. 6. Honesty is the best policy.

TFB To Hold Annual Meet

ANTONIO-Some SAN 1,500 persons, including more than 1,000 voting delegates. are expected to attend the 42nd annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau at the Convention Center here Nov. 30-Dec. 3.

Highlighting the convention will be an address by Gov. Dolph Briscoe at the general session on Monday morning, Dec. 1. TFB President Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart will also speak at the session.

Policies to guide the state's largest general farm organization next year and recommendations on national policies will be adopted during the final two days of the meeting. Election of directors and president will be the final order of business.

The Texas Farm Bureau has 180,470 member families in 210 organized county Farm Bureaus. The number of voting delegates from a county is based on the total number of members in that county.

The convention will get under way with registration beginning at 2 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 30 in the Convention Theater Lobby

The Vesper Service, which traditionally opens the TFB annual meeting, will be held at 6 p.m. that day, featuring the Providence High School Choral Group from San Antonio. Speaker will be Rev. Delmas L. Luedke, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church in San Antonio. He was recently named Texas' 1975 "Rural Minister of the Year.

District finalists will compete in a state Discussion Meet that evening with the winner representing Texas at the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation in January in St. Louis.

The state finals of the TFB Talent Find will be held immediately following the Discussion Meet. A representative from this competition will be selected to perform at the national meeting in St. Louis

The Monday morning general session, which features speeches by the Governor and the TFB president, will also include a report by Reed Lang of Rio Hondo, TFB secretary-

Community Services, Cotton, Poultry. Wheat and Feed Grains, Rice, and Farm **Bureau** services.

Conferences slated for 3:30 m. that day are Field Crops, Research and Education. Farm Labor, Young Farmers and Ranchers, Natural Resources, and Dairy.

The annual Queen Contest, with 12 district winners competing for the state crown, will be held at 7 p.m.

Tuesday morning activities will begin with district caucuses at 8:15 a.m. and the convening of business session at 10 a.m. It will continue through the remainder of the

The business session will reconvene at 9 a.m. on Wednesday and will continue until all proposed resolutions have been disposed of. Summer Job Examination **Deadline Set**

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Congressman Omar Burleson (D-Tex) said today that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1976 competitive examination for summer employment with the United States Government. The examination leads to eligibility for appointment to most temporary summer jobs in the clerical field and as of nine book-length projects aides in engineering and science occupations.

The Commission has announced the filing deadlines. Those who file by December 12 will be tested in January. Those who file by January 16 will be tested in February. No test application postmarked after January 16 will be accepted. The Congressman Trinity and on up to the urges students to file early for the test to enhance their chances for employment.

29515, or from Federal Job Information Centers, most college placement offices, or from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

The Commission will not automatically send forms to those who qualified in the previous year, and who wish to remain on the lists for consideration in 1976. Those who qualified for summer employment in 1975 must update their applications by submitting a form enclosed in the summer employment announcement by February 27. 1976. They are not required to retake the written test.

The U. S. Postal Service is not participating in the 1976 summer employment examination. Inquires regarding summer employment with the Postal Service should be sent to the post office where employment is desired.


Mrs. Cass was a member of First Baptist Church in Haskell.
