I went up and down the length and breadth of the town looking for material for this week's column, and failing miserably called on Bill Comedy for help. He permitted me to look through his Bicentennial file for something that might be of general interest and I came up with a brochure on documents from America's past. Kept in our National Archives, these documents have been reproduced learned through and a listing is printed in the brochure.

We are all familiar with the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights.

But how about such things as the Plan for the Government of the Western Country. dated March 1, 1784. Written in Thomas Jefferson's hand, it contained suggestions of fanciful names for western states to be created as equal parts of the United States from territory acquired by the Treaty of Paris.

Or the design for the federal city, Washington, which was planned to rival the ancient capitals of Europe but was almost defeated by the Potomac marshes, the attack on it by the British, the Civil War and human indifference.

There are reproductions of 38 documents in the packet concerned with the formation of the Union, enough to keep a person busy for several hours absorbing our country's his-

As luck would have it, when I returned from the Free Press office, I found the October National Geographic in the mailbox and one of the nice long articles in it is entitled "Women of the Revolution: 'Patriots In Petticoats'." Reading it you sort of wonder how the fighting men would have made it without the ladies!

This has been a week of around British-held Boston while he served in the Continental Congress, even to sending news of enemy troop movements

Ahead of her time, Abigail foreshadowed today's Women's Lib by complaining to her husband: "Whilst you are proclaiming peace and good will--you insist upon retaining an absolute power over Wives"!

'Handy Betty the Blacksmith", born Elizabeth Hager in Boston, was noted for repairing Rebel muskets and other weapons, including captured British cannon.

When the British occupied Philadelphia a Quaker housewife named Lydia Darragh dropping at a keyhole of a coming attack against Washington at Whitemarsh and walked miles to give warning.

And did you know that Martha Washington, whom we think of as a sedate homebody at Mount Vernon, jolted over rough roads to be with General Washington in New York City, Morristown, Valley Forge and Middlebrook. In the winter of 1780 she was with her husband through two mutinies by his starving troops.

There are many stories of these petticoat patriots and it makes fascinating reading. Not the least of those whose lives reflected great dedication to their country was Mary Katherine Goddard, Baltimore postmistress from 1775 to 1789. She also ran a printing shop and turned out the first croies of the Declaration of Independence. As editor and publisher of a weekly newspaper she reported the war with patriotic fervor.

Now if this all sounds as though it is far afield from "Haskell Bicentennial Happenings", so be it!

But perhaps we need to be reminded that the men who wrote those documents and the women who fought for a young nation all rose to greatness because they merely 1id what they felt they had to

Public Forum On Arthritis Set Sept. 26

Interested persons are invited to attend a Public Forum on Arthritis, the Nation's Number One Crippler, at 8 p.m. Friday, September 26, at Kent County Community Center. The program is being jointly sponsored by the Family Living Committee of Kent County Extension Service and the Plains Division. West Texas Chapter, of The Arthritis Foundation.

Dr. William A. Riley. internist and specialist in rheumatic diseases in Big Spring, will moderate the forum. A graduate of Baylor University School of Medicine, Dr. Riley has been in private practice in Big Spring since 967. He is a member of American Medical Association, Howard County Medical Society, American matism Association and a member of the Medical Committee of the West Texas Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation.

Also participating will be Dr. Kenneth Scholz, associate professor of Orthopedic Surgery at Texas Tech University School of Medicine. He is also a graduate of Baylor Medical School and is the author of numerous publications. He is member of the American Board of Orthopedic Surgery. Lubbock-Crosby-Garza County Medical Society, Texas Society for Team Physicians. International College of Surgeons, and the Medical Committee of the West Texas Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation.

Especially is this so if you apply a cost factor to deterioration of soil structure, soil compaction, the loss of permeability and the other factors mentioned earlier.

Some examples of minimum tillage that are successfully being used are:

(1) Bedding and planting with one operation in residue without prior cultivation. Cultivation following planting would be no more than two operations such as knifing and sweeping; or two cultivations with sweeps.

(2) Application of herbicides just prior to planting followed by the procedure outlined in sample one may even eliminate one of the cultivations or both of them.

(3) Row or drilled plantings made in residue with no seedbed preparation. Herbicides are used for weed control with no cultivation following planting.

(4) Occasional "running" or sweeping out water furrows on irrigated lands may be required for proper functioning of gravity irrigation systems.

Veterans **Should Check** Benefits

The Veterans Administration today pointed to a good reason veterans should check with the agency before traveling or establishing residence abroad

Under the law, Jack Coker, Regional Director, explained VA cannot provide certain benefits in foreign countries. Thus, a veteran who knows what benefits are available is better equipped to plan wisely, Coker noted.

For example, before traveling outside the United States, a veteran should obtain a statement of his serviceconnected disabilities from the VA office which maintains his medical records.

In an emergency, an eligible veteran is entitled to VApaid hospitalization for service-connected conditions. The veteran or a representative must present the VA statement along with an application for medical benefits to the embassy or consular office in the foreign country within 72 hours of hospitalization. Notification of outpatient treatment must be made within 15 days.

Care for veterans with both service-connected and nonservice-connected disabilities is available only in the

however, veterans with nonservice-connected disabilities are eligible on a space available basis, and only if they are unable to defray expenses.

Only veterans who are retired from military service are eligible for medical benefits from military hospitals and

clinics, Coker said. Education benefits are available overseas to eligible veterans, wives, widows and children pursuing degrees in VA-approved foreign schools. Compensation and pension checks may be mailed to most addresses abroad, but GI home loans are not available to veterans living in foreign countries.

Whenever possible, veterans traveling in foreign countries should maintain stateside mailing addresses to insure prompt receipt of checks. Coker advised.
