The accident occurred in the River Oaks sec-tion of Fort Worth Friday night shortly after Mr. Smith had said goodbye to his wife and daughter who were leaving on a trip to Boston. They were stopped in Texarkana and returned to Fort Worth and were with Mr.

Smith when he died. According to investigating of-

ficers, the accident occurred at an intersection at 4400 River Oaks Blvd. in North Fort Worth when Mr. Smith, who was driving a small foreign car, was forced to stop suddenly to avoid hitting a car which had stopped in front of him. A panel truck struck his car from behind, throwing it on top of the car in ront The impact knocked the gas cap

off the Smith car and gasoline spilled over the wreckage. In the flash fire which followed, Mr. Smith received third degree burns over all his body. He died 13 hours after the accident.

Final rites were held at 10 a. m. Monday at Weatherford. At the time of his death, he was manager of the hardware department at Clarks Discount Store in Fort Worth. Mr. and Mrs. Smith and their twin daughters, Shirley and Sharon, lived in Baird in the 1940s while he was employed with the T&P Railroad. They moved to Wea-therford where he established an automobile store and surplus store. He had lived in Fort Worth for the past year and a half. Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Stiffler of Baird, former neighbors of the Smiths, attended the funeral services.






