# Woman Awarded \$145,000

A seven man-five woman jury awarded Mrs. Opal Gilliam \$145,618.05 in damages during a week long civil suit held last week in 39th Judicial District Court.

The suit resulted from an accident which occured November 8, 1971. Testifying during the suit, Mrs. Gilliam stated that she had sprayed her hair and walked some sixteen feet into another room and struck a match to light a cigarette. As she struck the match her head and upper body became engulfed in flame.

Mrs. Gilliam was hospitalized for a total of 84 days in Haskell, Dallas and Abilene following the incident.

Four expert witnesses were heard during the three full days of testimony. The expert witnesses and attorneys performed several experiments during the suit showing the explosive characteristics of the

#### Bicentennial **Bonds Now** On Sale

County Judge B. O. Roberson and Mayor Belton Duncan, in special ceremonies at Haskell National Bank May 1 marked the start of American Bicentennial activities in Haskell, by proclaiming the week of May 5 through 9 as "Minute-Man Week". In doing so, they purchased the first "Bicentennial-Design Series E Savings Bond" to be sold in the county from R. W. Herren, who is Volunteer County Chairman for Savings Bonds.

The "Minute Man of Concord" has served as the symbol of Savings Bonds. since the E Bond was first issued on May 1, 1941. The issuance of the "Bicentennial-Design Series E Savings Bond"-which will remain on sale through 1976--commemorates both the start of the Revolutionary War. 200 years ago at Lexington and Concord, and the 34th anniversary of

the Bond Program. In his remarks. Herren praised the Savings Bond as 'an investment of prudence''. He urged county citizens to purchase the new "Bicentennial-Design Series E Savings Bonds" to "rededicate the doctrines of our democracy. We can retain no more impressive nor valuable souvenir of our heritage of 200 years of freedom under God".

The suit was filed against Whitehall Laboratories Inc. et al, manufactors of Sudden Beauty hair spray.

The suit began April 28, with the selection of a jury. Testimony was heard Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Jurors were read the charge Friday morning by presiding judge William P. Ratliff. Attorneys began their closing arguments about 11 a.m. Friday morning and finished shortly after 2 p.m.

The jury deliberated from 2:20 p.m. until 6 p.m. before reaching final agreement.

Listed in the 11 page charge were a total of 19 questions. The jurors agreed on the following amounts to the questions requiring monetary answers: Physical pain and mental anguish in the past, \$60,000.00; future physical pain and mental anguish,

\$20,000.00; future loss of earning capacity, \$30,000.00; future loss of capacity to perform household services. \$1,000.00; disfigurement and physical impairment in the future, \$15,000.00; and medical and hospital care received for treatment of injuries. \$16,788.05.

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# **Traffic Lights Receive Changes**

Most Haskell residents have already noticed a new traffic signal light at the intersection of US 380 and US 277

The fullycontrolled light was installed April 30, and is handling traffic extremely well according to Bob Whisenhunt of the State Highway Depart-

In addition to the fully controlled light, the two remaining lights, (South 1st and US 277, and North 1st and US 380) have been changed from four-way stop lights, (blinking red on all sides) to

caution lights along the highway routes and stop lights crossing the highways.

The changes were completed by the State Highway Department following a request from the City Council to study the possibilities of placing fully controlled lights at all three corners.

Whisenhunt said that he was very pleased with the way the public had adjusted to the new signals.

He stated, "One way to expedite traffic through the intersection is to be extra

careful to use your turn signals at this location so other motorists can make a more positive decision about your direction of travel." He also pointed out that it is permissible to turn right on red after stopping and waiting until the intersection may be entered

Whisenhunt said that he felt that the new lights would be a big help for motorists and pedestrians in downtown Has-

A new human irondeficiency diagnosis method is attracting international attention. Dr. George W. Bates, the Texas Agricultural Experi ment Station biochemist who developed the technique, says it should help us to better understand and measure the extent of human iron deficiency in both developed and undeveloped nations.

Several standard iron deficiency diagnosis me thods have long been used, but these can be inconsistent and misleading. Therefore, Bates and Graduate Student Gary Graham of the Texas A&M University Biochemistry and Biophysics Department developed what they call "differential chelation-ultrafiltration," or simply, DCU. They believe it provides "unparalled accuracy."

If DCU is accepted by the science world, Bates says it should prove especially valuable in nutrition studies of iron deficiency. The new tech-

Germany have shown 65 percent of the women work is gaining attention tested to have latent iron deficiency and 14 percent to have overt anemia. These figures compare with 10 percent and two percent for males.

"In Sweden, 40 percent of the women tested showed signs of iron deficiency and 25 percent were anemic.

"In the United States, iron deficiency anemia may be found in 12 percent of nonpregnant and 20 to 58 percent percent of pregnant women.

"It is estimated that the iron assimulation for the average American or European diet is generally not sufficient to satisfy the nutritional demands of women in their childbearing years."

Basic blood chemistry research conducted by Bates and his associates is giving medical science new insight into this complex, but basic problem of animal and human metabolism.

When something containing iron is eaten, it

enters the digestive system in Ireland and eventually comes into chemist was a contact with the membranes surrounding the small intestine. Here it is absorbed into the blood stream through a process involving a blood protein called transferrin. Apparently, the transferrin protein finds its way to Houston. the intestinal membranes where it loads up with iron and returns to the blood stream. trips, perhaps one or two trips per month. My amendment to this legislation is simply an effort to more closely tailor this bill to the circumstances that exist in the rural areas and smaller cities. The amendment recognizes a difference in their economic capabilities and in the level of service they can provide. With this change the bill allows large cities in metropolitan areas to meet these standards but it exempts smaller areas which simply couldn't afford this and still have any kind of an ambulance

Senator Farabee also noted that many volunteer organizations in rural areas, such as volunteer firemen, strive to provide ambulance service to areas that would otherwise be without it. Farabee said he thought it would be wrong to force these people to undergo the training requirements originally set out in the bill since the time and expense involved would be prohibitive for many of these volunteers. Farabee also said that if improvements were needed in ambulance service he hoped the state would work with local communities on a voluntary



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

West lexas Utilities

In Texas as of April 1, there were 1,122,000 cattle in feed. This is four per cent above the number on feed a

month ago. But it is 49 per cent below the total a year ago. Feedlot operators in the state reported intentions to market 700,000 cattle now through June 30. This would be 62 per cent of the total on feed as of April 1 and would be 37 per cent lower than marketed during the April to June

Nationwide, cattle on feed in the 23 major feeding states are the lowest number for April in 12 years.

In the seven major feeding states-Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas-the number on feed is two per cent above a month ago, but is 37 per cent below those on feed a year ago

CROP QUESTIONNAIRES will be mailed to 24,000 Texas farmers during the latter part of May

They will be the basis for compiling information about Texas crops for 1975. Texas farmers, incidentally, have the reputation throughout the nation of being the most cooperative of any group in answering these questionnaires.

If you are one of those receiving the questionnaire, you are requested to fill it out as accurately as possible and return it promptly. Accurate returns are needed to get as true a picture of Texas agriculture as can be obtained.

BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION EFFORTS are being speeded up throughout the state. The Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) notes that misunderstanding about the program is causing some difficulties.

"Most cattlemen are cooperating with the program, and they are to be commended for that," Dr. H. Q. Sibley, executive director of the TAHC, said.

If you have a question about the program, you can get the correct answer to it by contacting the Texas Animal Health Commission in Austin or TAHC field veterinarians.

The state-federal program was begun in 1934 on a voluntary basis to eliminate the disease. Since 1954, regulations have evolved into a system which includes testing cattle to find infection and sending infected animals to slaughter. Only about one per cent of the nation's cattle population is infected with brucellosis.

CROP REPORTS OF ACREAGES planted by farmers for most crops will be released earlier this year than in past years. The reports are usually released in July, but the Statistical Reporting Service says it will now release acres to

The planted acreage and acres for harvest estimates to be released June 30 will be based on surveys as of June 1. The report will include acreages of feed grains, food grains, oilseeds, hay, and other crops which in previous years were included in the July crop production report.

GROSS INCOME FOR DAIRY PRODUCERS in 1974 was up 16 per cent from 1973. However, the figures do not show the increases in production costs (which for many ingredients doubled and tripled) for Texas dairy producers

The average number of milk cows was down one per cent in 1974 compared to 1973. Total milk production was three per cent above the 1973 figure.

WASHINGTON, D. C .--IN DECEMBER, 1973, IN THE WANING DAYS of the first Session of the 93rd Congress, a National Flood Insurance Program was adopted and signed into law. As is often the case, in a hurry to pass what is often described as emergency legislation, the "fine print" is sometimes overlooked. In this legislation, there are some real "hookers" which should be corrected.

THE LAW REQUIRES THE DEPARTMENT OF HOUS-ING AND URBAN DEVEL-OPMENT to identify "flood prone" communities. These localities must then join the program and homeowners may purchase subsidized in-

surance. HUD, in the meantime, must draft land use regulations to reduce the risk of loss due to flooding. These regulations are now complete and the full provisions will go into effect in less than three

months from now. COMMUNITIES MUST IM-PLEMENT THE REGULA-TIONS DRAWN UP BY HUD or be excluded from qualifying for subsidized flood insurance.

THERE ARE TWO SEV-REQUIREMENTS WHICH CERTAINLY SHOU-LD BE corrected or some people are going to find their properties depreciated in value. The first is, as mentioned, the regulations required under the law. The other and most serious is that banks, savings and loan, or other lending institutions insured or Federally regulated can not make loans on property unless insured. This means that property could then only be sold to cash

PLEMENT THE LAND USE of an area could have the PLANNING AND OTHER effect of lowering all other real

from the program. If a community is excluded or does not join, the mortgage sanctions would be imposed Federally regulated or insured lending institutions make up 95% of mortgage financing for homes in this Country.

THIS KIND OF SANCTION SHOULD BE REMOVED. IT SHOULD BE A voluntary program and not have the coercive features now in this legislation. Such programs should be adopted locally on the merit and not because of sanctions unrelated to the plan's purpose. The plan puts local governments squarely in the middle on this matter. Localities must join and must enforce the plan since they have no real choice as to the terms on which they enter it.

THIS SORT OF ARRANGE-MENT COULD RESULT IN LOWER PROPERTY VAL-UES, not only in non-participating communities but also in adjacent communities. Low-COMMUNITIES MUST IM- er property values in one part

estate values proportionately. It is not fair to punish those communities which have done everything possible to accept and cooperate with what appears to be a meritorious and protective program.

OTHER FEDERAL LEND-ING AGENCIES SUCH AS FARMERS HOME ADMIN-ISTRATION, Federal Housing Administration, the Veterans Administration, and any other Federal second mortgage funds, would have to reduce any loans in accordance with a reduction in value for lending purposes. It would mean that these agencies could not refinance, extend or increase loans and would mean losses on sums already loaned.

THERE IS NOT MUCH TO DO ABOUT THE PART OF THE LAW WHICH REQUIR-ES planning in flood prone communities. If subsidized insurance is to be provided then obviously there must be some care taken not to increase unnecessary risks. but it remains to be seen how strictly these regulations will be applied. It has got to be a

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



Austin-A look at the gets from tobacco taxes might make one think the state smokes like a giant smudge pot.

> This current year we will take in more than \$250 million in taxes on cigarettes. cigars, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco and tobacco for roll-your-own.

> This revenue ranks tobacco as the state's fifth largest revenue producer, coming behind sales taxes, motor fuels, oil and natural

The historical pattern of our tobacco tax income indicates that smoking Texans apparently haven't been changed by the anti-smoking health campaigns of the past few years. In fact, in several past years Texas smokers have topped the national average of an annual four per cent increase in cigarette consumption.

The great bulk of our tobacco tax money comes from cigarettes. The cigarette tax is 18.5 cents per package and that produces more than \$240 million of our tobacco tax income.

Cigarette taxes have increased much faster than most taxes over the years, going from 5-cents a pack in 1955 to 8-cents in 1959, 11-cents in 1965, 15.5-cents in 1969 and on to 18.5-cents

The Comptroller's office administers the cigarette tax laws although the distributors make their actual purchase of the cigarette tax stamp for each package from the state treasurer's office. We deal with more than 35,000 cigarette wholesalers, distributors, retailers and vending machine operators.

From these various types of distributors the state also receives about \$300,000 a ear in permit fees. Everyone handling cigarettes is required to file monthly reports with us and we examine and audit their books once a year-which is certainly one of the most comprehensive audit programs of any state

Besides the cigarette taxes, the state gets just less than \$5 million a year from cigar taxes. Cigars are taxed according to size and price. These range from the little cigars which are packaged like cigarettes and taxed one
