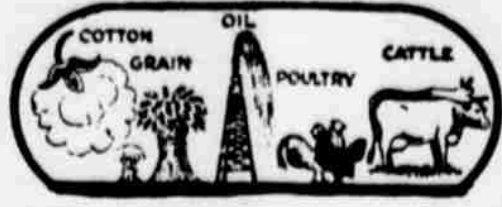

## Dist. Governor To Visit Rotary Club

"Leading In Service" will be the subject of an address to members of the Haskell Rotary Club at noon on Thursday, Aug. 7, by Dr. Joe B. Rushing, Governor of Rotary International District 579. Dr. Rushing, Chancellor of Tarrant County Junior College District in Fort Worth, also will confer with Mr. Haskell Stone, President of the Haskell Rotary Club, and other officials, to obtain information on the club's service activities planned for this year. He also will offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters to members of the club, which is one of 41 clubs in District 579.

Dr. Rushing is one of 355 Rotary Governors throughout the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization, has more than 752,000 members in some 16,000 clubs serving in 151 countries.

A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Fort Worth, Dr. Rushing was elected to office at the Rotary International Convention in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, in June. He will serve until June 30, 1976.

A seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of District Governor, Dr. Rushing attended an international assembly held in May at Boca Raton, Fla., at which all Rotary Governors for 1975-76 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their assignments. One of his major projects will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary Clubs later this year.

The District Governor, named a Paul Harris Fellow in 1972, is married and has three children. During his visit to the Haskell area, he will address members of the Rule Rotary Club at noon on Monday, Aug. 4, the Stamford Rotary Club at noon on Tuesday, Aug. 5, and the Hamlin Rotary Club at noon on Wednesday, Aug. 6.

important to Haskell County as it provides needed blood to the Hospital for all residents of the county. The Red Cross provides the trained medical, technical and administrative staff, as well as the equipment and laboratories to provide the life saving blood when it is needed. For each paid staff person, there are 168 volunteers who recruit blood donors and assist in bloodmobile operations. Over 70 percent of all voluntary blood in the nation is provided through the Red Cross and the purpose of the organization is to provide the highest quality blood at minimum cost to the patients.

There is never a charge made for blood from the Red Cross since all blood is voluntarily given, only part of the cost of collection and processing is passed on to the patient by the hospital. This fee is usually much lower than in hospitals not serviced by the Red Cross.

Blood cannot be manufactured, it must be given, and when donated it is only good (by law) for 21 days. The Red Cross Regional Blood Center provides blood needs for 35 hospitals serving over 350,000 people in a 20,000 square mile area of Texas and Oklahoma.

## GROW YOUR OWN GROCERIES

Freezing, one of the simplest methods of preserving fruits and vegetables, retains their natural color, flavor, texture and food value, points out Barbara Elliott, county Extension agent.

Frozen-food quality varies with freshness of the product used, preparation methods, packaging and freezing conditions.

Select high-quality products for successful freezing, as it cannot improve low-grade food.

Before freezing, vegetables require blanching—a simple process of heating vegetables in boiling water to stop enzyme growth and retain freshness.

Also, to avoid drying out of flavors or undesirable flavor or appearance, use moisture-vapor-proof packaging.

Use glass, metal, rigid plastic or plastic bags, but do not use ordinary waxed

containers, cottage cheese and ice cream cartons, cautions Mrs. Elliott.

Freeze fruits and vegetables at 0 degrees F. or below.

Space packages of unfrozen food at least an inch apart since they must give off heat before freezing. Put no more unfrozen food into the freezer than will freeze within 24 hours.

For quickest freezing, place packages against freezing plates or coils.

Freezing does not sterilize food, but the low temperature prevents the growth of harmful yeasts, molds and bacteria, explains the agent.

One example of the easy freezing process is green snap beans.

Select only fresh tender young beans. Harvest them in the cool of the morning. Wash, snap or cut off tips and sort for size. Leave small beans whole if desired. Cut or

break larger ones into one to two-inch lengths.

Put beans in a blanching basket, lower into boiling water and cover. Keep on high heat and begin counting heating time immediately. Heat small beans for three minutes and large beans for four minutes.

Plunge basket of heated beans into a large container of ice water or into running water. It takes about as long to cool vegetables as to heat them. When beans are cool, remove them from the water and drain.

Pack the beans in moisture-vapor-proof containers, leaving one-half inch headspace. Or pack in plastic bags. Label

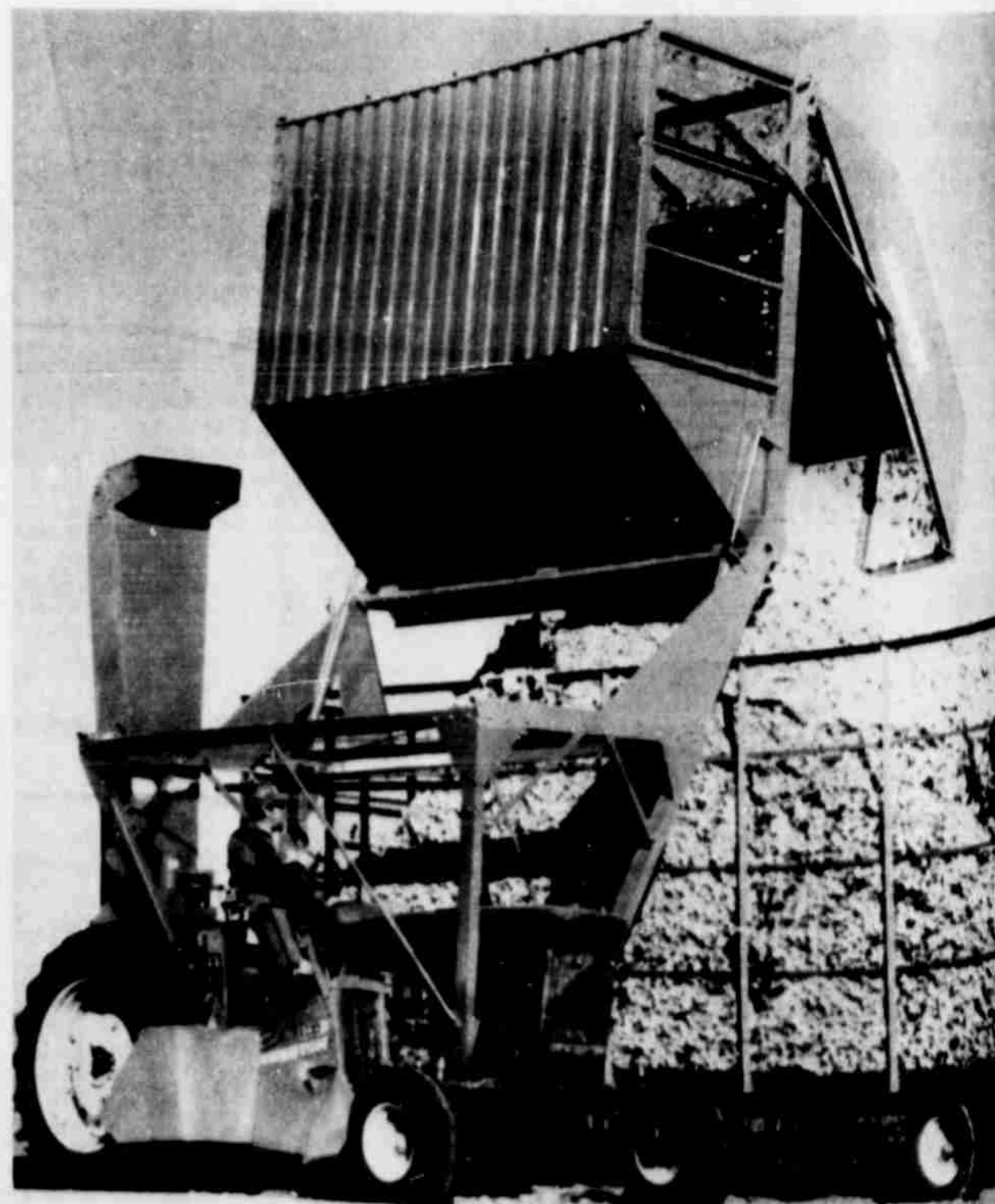

land use planning among the  
 concrete and apartments can  
 be duplicated every where.  
 Therein lies the problem and  
 the challenge.

Poor land use planning can  
 put your storm cellar, base-  
 ment of home foundation in  
 shambles. It has happened  
 before and it will continue to  
 happen until architects and  
 home builders realize that  
 there is a possibility of bad soil  
 and water problems in many  
 locales. Haskell County has  
 had a soil survey report  
 available since 1961. It in-  
 cludes interpretations of var-  
 ious soils found in Haskell  
 County for builders before  
 they start construction.

Poor land use planning can  
 mean you face-or file-a law-  
 suit. City Officials have been  
 known to file suit against a  
 land owner of a vacant lot after  
 heavy rains washed large  
 quantities of his bare, eroding  
 soil into nearby streets and  
 sewers. The city had to  
 purchase special cleaning  
 machines to open the clogged-  
 up drains.

Poor land use planning can  
 make you sick. A nurse went  
 to visit several young children  
 who were home with a  
 mysterious illness. As she  
 parked her car, she spotted a  
 wet, smelly area in the lawn.  
 The sewage had backed up  
 and overflowed-and children  
 were playing in the area! The  
 homes were built on soil that  
 was slow to absorb septic tank  
 effluent. Several families had  
 to sell their homes and move.

Poor land use planning can  
 wreck your house. It's hap-  
 pened to numerous home-  
 owners, including some that  
 exist right here at home. The  
 soils were unsuitable for the  
 type of foundation built, and  
 the foundation and brick walls  
 cracked-some to the extent  
 that repairs were very costly.

And the list can go on and  
 on of similar cases of poor land  
 use planning.

But let us look at Good Land  
 Use Planning, and implemen-  
 tation of the plans. Good land  
 use planning can save you tax  
 dollars. The proper routing of  
 new highways can save hun-  
 dreds of thousands of dollars in  
 excavation and construction  
 costs. Engineers at San

Antonio discovered that parts  
 of their city were underlain  
 with a special soil that triggers  
 and electro-chemical process  
 which destroys metal. Under-  
 ground utility pipes going  
 through such soils corrode in a  
 few years. This is happening  
 at Paint Creek School, and the  
 Housing and Urban Develop-  
 ment Commission are suspecting  
 that it is happening right  
 here in Haskell.

Good land use planning and  
 implementation can protect  
 your water supply. In the  
 planning and construction of  
 the Paint Creek Community  
 Water Co., planners used  
 plastic underground pipe  
 which is non-corrosive to bad  
 soils to prevent future damage  
 to their pipelines. The soils  
 within the drainage area of the  
 Miller Creek Reservoir were  
 checked carefully for salt  
 contributing areas and cor-  
 rosive soils prior to the final  
 planning and implementation  
 of the North Central Texas  
 Municipal Water system that  
 will furnish water to Haskell,  
 if and when Miller Creek  
 Reservoir fills.

Good land use planning  
 means not having to say you  
 are sorry when you finish

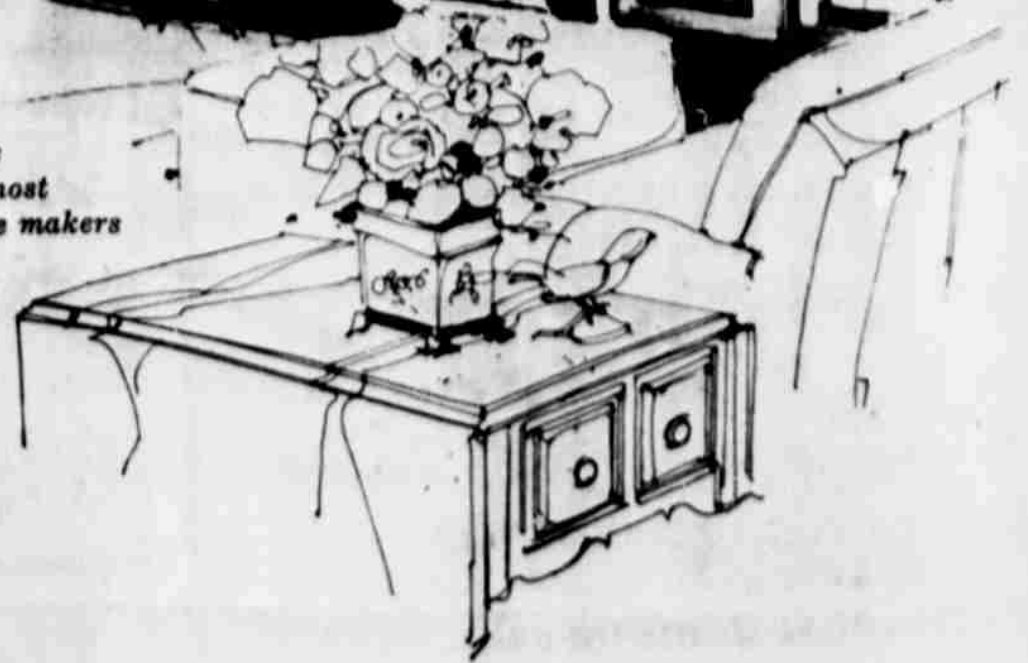

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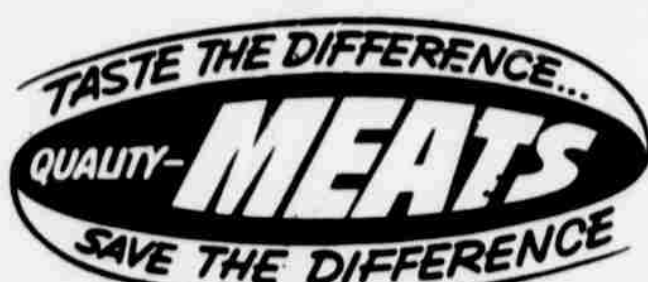

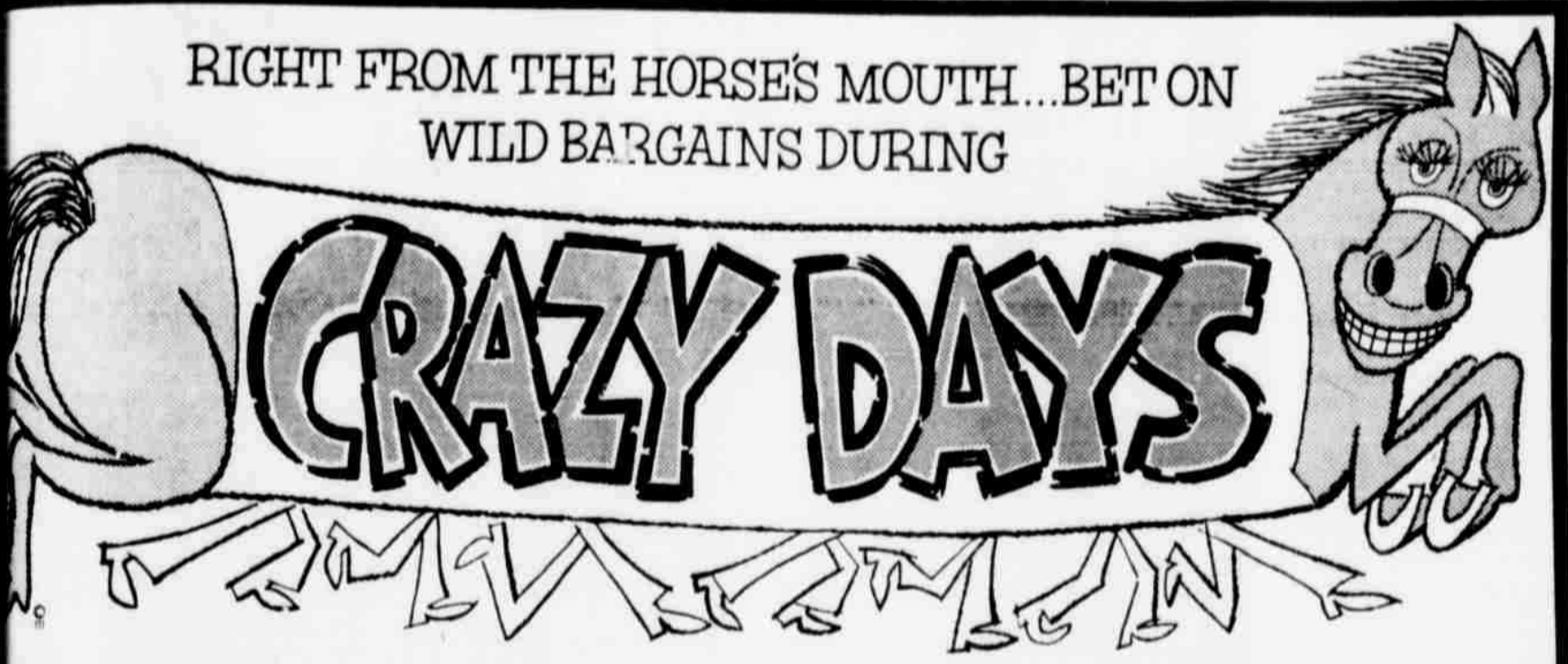

leave a transportation crisis, particularly in the North-eastern part of the United States. In the response to that appeal, Congress took out its checkbook and gave the rail magnates \$347 million, even though the railroad lost \$198 million last year. It is expected to lose close to \$300 million this year. Although this transference of taxpayers' money has enabled the Pennsylvania R.R. to hang on to its operations, it does not appear that the corporation is doing very much for itself. As a matter of fact, it would appear that the corporation was not in the terminal condition which the Congress and the people of the Country were led to believe in the first instance. The reason for this apparent situation is that the Penn Central's management found enough money to award 44 top executives with over \$200,000 in pay raises, increasing salaries from \$2,000 to \$20,000 each.

THE PENN CENTRAL IS NOT UNIQUE in attempting to tap the Federal Treasury to relieve its financial difficulties. Lockheed Aircraft and a few others set the precedent some time ago. On the other hand, there are some other

corporations who are trying to do something about their situation through their own efforts. Top officers of Pan American Air Line have taken a 10% pay cut as an austerity measure. Chrysler's executives have taken a 25% pay reduction in addition to which the auto firm is now paying no bonuses to big management, reducing this item of expense by about 50%.

THE ECONOMIC SITUATION TAKING PLACE in some of the biggest corporations of the Country, with the Pennsylvania R.R. being a prime example, would seem contrary to what we used to hear. We used to assume that hard-charging managers who brought a profit to a company were rewarded; when the red ink began to flow, the men at the top had to sacrifice to survive. It hardly makes sense that if the railroad's loss this year is \$300 million, the top brass can look forward to more pay increases.

THERE ARE OTHER REASONS WHY SOME BIG CORPORATIONS may be in trouble. Antiquated working rules permitted under law is one. This hardly encourages investors who want to have some return on their money. Capital formation according to the best advisors is a serious situation at the present time. It is reason for the Congress to give immediate attention to adjusting tax laws and work rules to create incentives for capital investment but hardly reason for a handout subsidy which could eventually mean the nationalization of the railroads and possibly other industries.

THIS BRINGS UP THE POINT of what we often hear—the Government should operate like a business. The opposite may be the case of some corporations, such as the Pennsylvania R.R.,—operating like Government.

EITHER WAY THERE IS DANGER INVOLVED. Vital public services are involved in rail transportation and there is legitimate concern that without adequate transportation the economy will suffer. A deeper and longer range concern is that further deterioration in the operation of some industries such as these mentioned, will put the Government into the business of ownership of these vital facilities. Nationalization is the result.


