Council Discusses Law Suit

Members of the Haskell City Council Tuesday accepted the resignation of Councilman Carl Anderson.

Mayor Belton Duncan read the letter in which Anderson stated that due to a continued illness, he was resigning. He also stated in the letter that he was in the process of working on several projects as a member of the council and he would do everything possible to complete the projects. Anderson told the council that he would assist them in any way possible during the future.

His resignation was accepted with voiced regrets by both members of the council and Mayor Duncan.

Anderson has served on the council since 1963 and also served one term in the early 1950's.

The major portion of the meeting was spent in discussion of a law suit filed August 4, by General Telephone Company of the Southwest against the City of Haskell, Mayor and City Council; City of Rule, Mayor and City Council; City of Rochester, Mayor and City Council and the City of Weinert, Mayor and City Council.

The suit was filed after all four of the city councils rejected a proposed telephone rate increase.

The 24 page document requests a temporary injunction against the cities allowing General Telephone to raise the rates pending approval of a permanent injunction.

A hearing on the temporary injunction has been scheduled by District Judge William P. Ratliff for 10 a.m. August 27, in the courtroom in the Haskell County Courthouse.

During other council action a rate increase was granted Lone Star Gas Co.

The increase is to cover only an increased cost of natural gas to Lone Star. The overall average monthly increase in residential customers' bills will be \$1.36 according to a report submitted by Curtis Jennings, local Lone Star

Manager. Jennings also told the council that the increase is the exact same amount as Lone Star is having to pay for gas effective July 1.

Gaston Tidrow met with the council to request financial assistance on behalf of the Haskell Little League which finished its season with a deficit. The council agreed to pay \$200.00 to help defray the expenses. Tidrow also stated that he had met with members of the Commissioners Court and requested assistance from them.

Meal Program Outlined

Sams today announced the following family meal policy for free milk for free meals and free milk.

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the

purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy the principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to R. K. Sams, Superintendent, Box 666, Haskell, Texas, or telephone 864-2860 for a hearing to appeal the decision.

The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Health Dept. Reports On Rule Water

In a recent chemical analysis of the Rule public drinking water supply, the State Department of Health, it was reported that the sample contained 70 mg/l of nitrate.

The limit is set at 45 mg/l according to the letter received by Mayor L. W. Norman.

Five other content test all proved satisfactory and were equal or below recommended limits set by drinking water standards and the State Department of Health.

The amount of nitrate may cause methemoglobinemia in infants according to the report and should not be used in infant feeding.

24-0 Season Record

Warriors Win State Title

For the first time in Haskell's Junior-Teenage Baseball League's history, the Haskell Warriors battled their way to the State Championship. The tournament consisted of eight teams, Port Lavaca, defending State Champions, Dist. I; Haskell, last year State runner-up, Dist. II; Killeen, Dist. III; Palestine, Dist. VI; Brownwood, Dist. V; Conroe, Dist. VI; Mexia, Dist. VII; and Big Springs, Dist. VIII.

The Warriors went into the tournament with a 19-0 record and finished with an unblemished record of 24-0.

Haskell's first win in the play-offs over Port Lavaca, defending state champs, was 11-1. The superb pitching of Nathan Frierson with eight strike-outs and good moves by relief pitcher Mark Guffey (Anson pick-up) in the 4th ending by picking off 2 opponents helped place Haskell in the winners bracket.

Also a double play by Chris Colbert, short-stop, to Rex Pittman, 2nd baseman, and

from Pittman to first baseman, James Norman, (pick-up from Anson) in the 6th ending helped hold the opposition to one run.

The second game Oscar Lozano, Anson pick-up, set the pace by averaging two strike-outs per inning for a total of 14 to carry the Warriors to a 11-3 win over the Palestine Rangers. Jerry Tumlinson lead the team with 3 hits for this game.

The pressure game of the tournament was the first bout with Conroe who was also undefeated. Starting on the mound for Haskell was Jerry Tumlinson and relieved by Nathan Frierson in the 4th. James Norman lead the pack with 3 hits which included a home run with one on base. Outstanding defensive plays by centerfielder Jim Browning helped capture a 10-7 victory for Haskell.

The championship game Haskell jumped on Conroe the first inning by scoring 3 runs. Rex Pittman's grand-slam broke Conroe's back in the 3rd

inning bringing in teammates Lozano, Guffey, Colbert and himself. Others scoring in the inning were Norman, Frierson and Andress. On the mound was Nathan Frierson the first six innings giving up 1 hit, 1 run and 8 strike-outs. Jerry Tumlinson came in to windup the game in the seventh inning with a score of 13-1.

Outstanding catcher for the series was Vonnie Hise. Because of his excellent signals to teammates, many exciting pick-offs were made. Thru determination the Haskell Warriors came thru as State Champions not only for themselves but for their Coach Sgt. Jirick and teammate Vonnie Hise, who due to illness was unable to play the last game.

All the teams in this tournament were from towns of 10,000 to 35,000 population. This is quite a victory for a town the size of Haskell.

The Warriors defeated teams from Haskell, Anson, Stamford, and Hawley to win District.



Mayor and members of the Haskell City Council have, since last October, been faced with a problem that cannot be completed to the satisfaction of the council.

The General Telephone requested a rate increase and members of the council last October and that they were not qualified to assess the situation presented, the council hired a CPA.

Mark Sloan, CPA of Austin, began work on the problem and recommended recently that no increase be granted by General Telephone.

At that time General Telephone has filed a law suit against the cities of Haskell, Rule, Rochester, and Weinert in an effort to have the increase granted through court action.

Mayor Belton Duncan, Councilmen Carl Anderson, Lorraine Johnson, Guy Kennedy, Jimmy Brown, and Buster Gholson, have taken a stand on this issue and consider the best interest of Haskell.

Facing a law suit they are continuing to stand against a corporation which employs more than reside in Haskell.

At times we are very critical of actions taken or decisions by the council and are very vocal with our opinions, but how often do we tell these six men we appreciate their efforts to make Haskell a better place to live.

Councilmen receive \$60.00 per year as salary. That is \$2.50 per meeting if no special or called meetings occur. The mayor receives \$32.00 per meeting.

Considering the amount of time spent by these councilmen it becomes obvious that they are concerned with the future of Haskell and are not serving in their own office for the money.

They would make their jobs much easier if local citizens made their wishes known, complained when necessary and most of all complimented them when they were due.

Lunch tickets will also be sold during registration. Prices will be the same as last year.

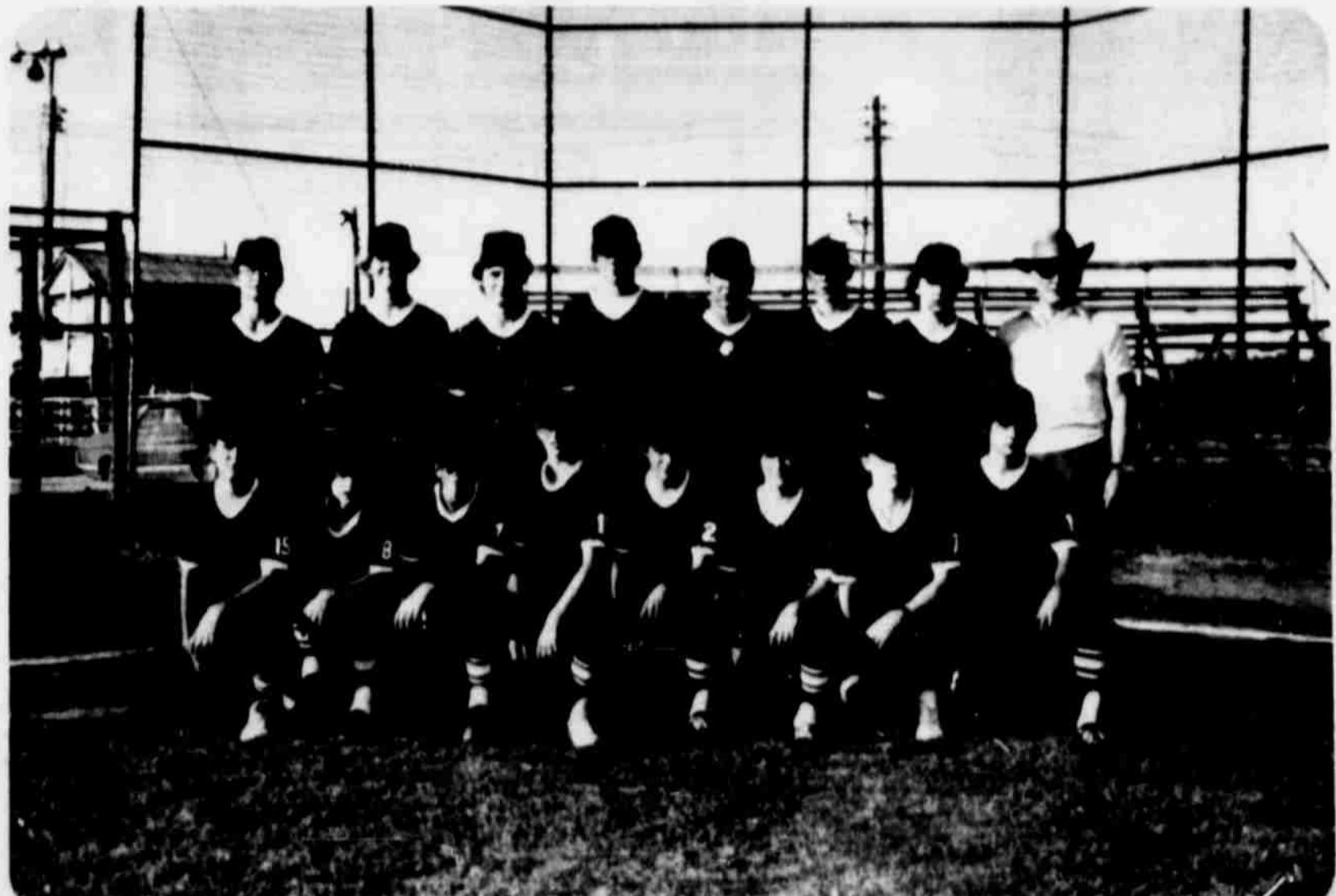

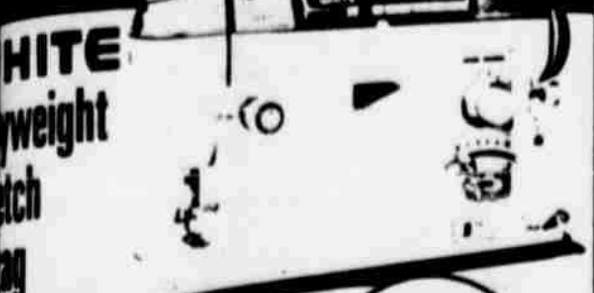

ing a vegetable brush; handle gently to avoid bruising. Take care to remove blossoms. Drain on rack or wipe dry.
Place half the pickle spices and a layer of dill in a 5-gallon crock or jar. Fill the crock with cucumbers within 3 or 4 inches from the top. Place a layer of dill and remaining spices over the top of cucumbers. (Garlic may be added if desired.) Thoroughly mix the vinegar, salt and water and pour over the cucumbers. Cover with a heavy china or glass plate or lid that fits inside the crock.
Use a weight to hold the plate down and keep the cucumbers under the brine. A glass jar filled with water makes a good weight. Cover loosely with clean cloth. Keep pickles at room temperature and remove scum daily when formed. Scum may start forming in 3 to 5 days. Do not stir pickles, but be sure they are covered completely with brine. If necessary, make additional brine, using original proportions specified in recipe.

In about 3 weeks the cucumbers will have become an olive-green color and should have a desirable flavor. Any white spots inside the fermented cucumbers will disappear in processing.

The original brine is usually cloudy as a result of yeast development during the fermentation period. If this cloudiness is objectionable, fresh brine may be used to cover the pickles when packing them into the jars.
When making fresh brine, use 1/2 cup salt and 4 cups vinegar to 1 gallon of water. The fermentation brine generally is preferred for its added flavor and should be strained before heating to boiling.

Pack the pickles, along with some of the dill, into clean, hot quart jars; add garlic if desired. Avoid too tight a pack. Cover with boiling brine to 1/2 inch from the top of the jar. Adjust jar lids.

Process in boiling water for 15 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as the hot jars are placed into the actively boiling water.

Remove jars and set upright, several inches apart, on a wire rack to cool. The recipe yields about 9 to 10 quarts of pickles.

DILLED GREEN BEANS

4 pounds whole green beans (about 4 quarts); 1/4 teaspoon hot red pepper, crushed whole pint jar; 1/2 teaspoon whole mustard seed per pint jar; 1/2 teaspoon dill seed per pint jar; 1 clove garlic per pint jar; 5 cups vinegar; 5 cups water; 1/2 cup salt.

Wash beans thoroughly; drain and cut into lengths to fill pint jars. Pack beans into clean, hot jars; add pepper, mustard seed, dill seed and garlic.

Combine vinegar, water and salt; heat to boiling. Pour boiling liquid over beans, filling to 1/2 inch of top of jar. Seal with cap and ring according to manufacturer's directions.

Process for 5 minutes in large kettle of boiling water that covers the jars 1 or 2 inches and has 1 or 2 inches space at the top for water to boil. Place a rack in the bottom of the kettle to hold the jars off the bottom.

Start counting processing time as soon as the water in

the kettle returns to a boil. Remove the jars and complete the seal if necessary according to manufacturer's directions. Set jars upright, several inches apart on a wire rack to cool.

CONSERVATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

In-Service Training for most of our teachers begins next week, and the starting of school the following week. I want to take this opportunity of informing our school administrators and teachers of services available in the field of conservation and environmental education through the local Soil Conservation Service, and other state and Federal agencies.

Locally, the SCS staff at Haskell can furnish slide talks on many phases of conservation on fairly short notice. Our slide talk library is located in Abilene, and any given set of slides can be secured in two or three days. We are also

available on almost immediate request, for conducting tours, and giving talks on local conservation activities.

The National Association of Conservation Districts, League City, Texas maintains an extensive film rental library. Each school was furnished a catalogue of available films and rental costs last year. This catalogue should be in your school library or in your superintendents office. The Region XIV Service Center in Abilene also maintains a film library and other educational materials in the field of conservation.

If enough interest is expressed, we will be happy to establish an outdoor classroom, either on the school grounds or close by wherever

land can be secured. This type of service does require some intensive planning and co-operation of the Vocational Agricultural department as well as the teachers and administrators in each school in developing.

I will be sending to each school administrator, a leaflet entitled, "Conservation and Environmental Education—Materials and Services for Texas Teachers". This leaflet is published by the Texas Advisory Committee on Conservation and Environmental Education. It contains the names and addresses of the various state and Federal agencies from which materials can be secured. Ask your superintendent for it.

There is a small supply of bulletins available in the Haskell SCS Office. More can be secured if needed and requested.

If you have a need, or you wish to discuss your plans for materials and services, please feel free to call or come by the SCS Office in Haskell. We are located next to the Chamber of Commerce office, across the street from Pogue's Grocery on North Ave. E. (US 277). Our phone number is 817-864-3212.
