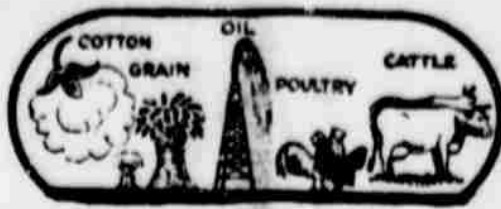

## City Council Holds Meeting

Members of the Haskell City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with Mayor Belton Duncan presiding over the meeting.

Other councilmen present included Loraine Johnson, Kennedy, Buster Gholson, Jimmy Browning.

Members of the Council re-elected Dr. J. F. Cadenhead as City Health Officer and also appointed Joe Wilcox to the board of directors of the Community Action Program.

Other appointments, John Brown, Gaston Tidrow, Stanley Furrh, were made to the Tax Equalization Board.

Following a discussion on cleaning up of Rice Creek, the Council requested assistance from the Soil Conservationist Service to aid in deciding what to do about it. The Council also adopted a resolution requesting help from the State on the project.

Mr. Sherman met with the Council and presented samples of carpet suitable for use in the City Hall offices. Members of the Council voted to purchase carpet for the office.

Mr. Hale, president of the Haskell County Fair Association, and J. R. Perry of the Association Board, met with the council and requested the Fair Association be allowed to lease the fair grounds. Members of the Council agreed to lease the grounds to the association for one year with a one year option. Discussion was also held on a possible improvement of the fair grounds.

Mayor Duncan read a copy of a letter to General Johnson from Bryan Sloan requesting information on the rate increase in the rate.

Members present at the meeting were City Attorney Williams, Water Supt., Collins and City Clerk, Desmond Dulaney. The meeting of the council was held May 27.

Local residents are urged to attend a special concert by Haskell bands this Friday at 8 p.m. in the High School Gym.

The "Parade of Music" will feature the sixth grade band, the band, junior high band and Indian band.

The bands are directed by Gideon.

Local residents are urged to attend the free concert.

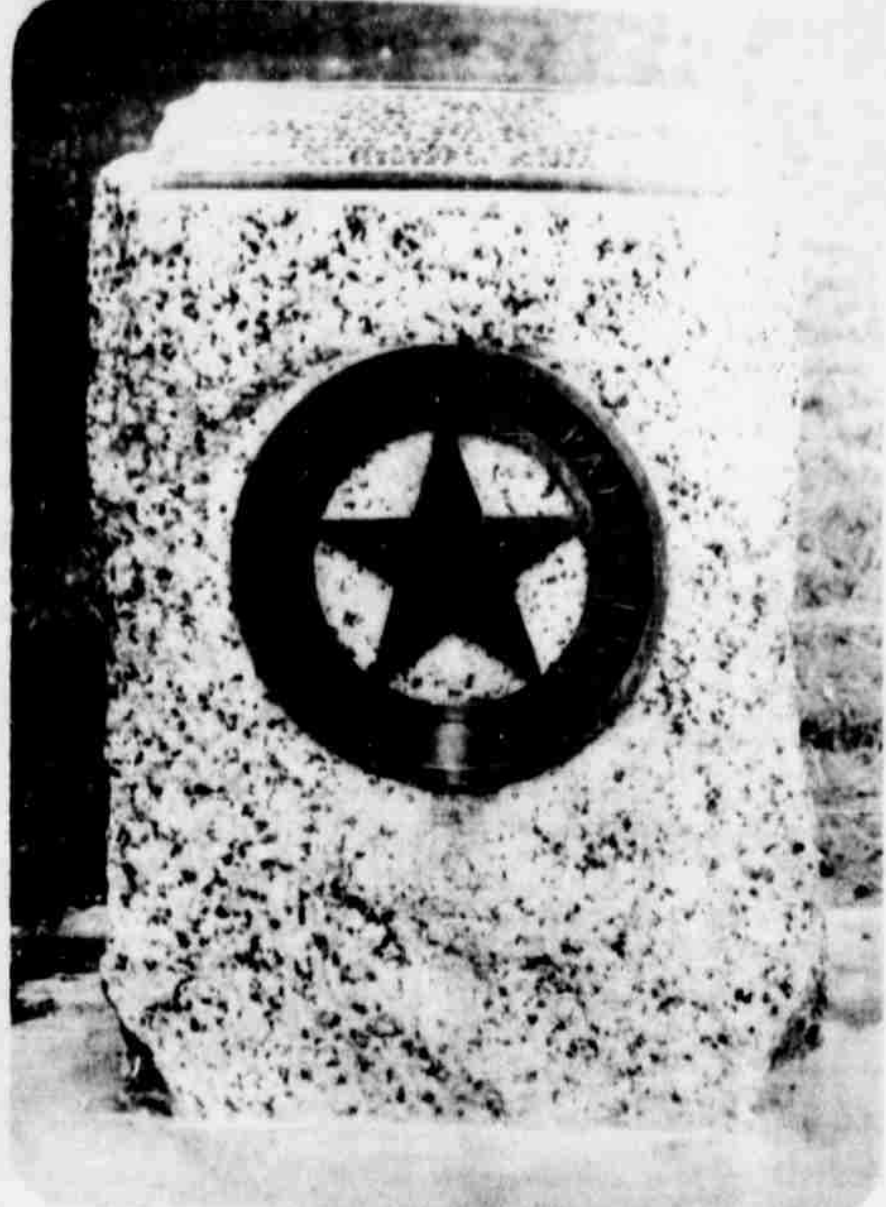
Reading Program

## Group Attends Seminar

The Big Country Bicentennial Seminar, held in the Abilene Civic Center Friday, gave those in attendance an opportunity to share ideas and discuss plans for formulating them into action.

Joe Hodges, Abilene Bicentennial Chairman, directed the day's activities which began with registration and luncheon at 11:30. After a ceremony of allegiance and invocation by Chaplain Gerdes, an inspirational speech was given by Dr. Thomas Kim, President of McMurry College. He received a standing ovation from the audience after he recounted some of the events that brought him from Korea by way of China to the United States.

His family fled from oppression, always driven on by the parent's determination to give their children an education and to help them live by Christian values. Dr. Kim was 18 years old when he arrived in the United States with two suitcases and 36 cents in his pocket.

"Our American Heritage" was presented in music with appropriate costuming by a

group of second grade students. Mrs. Gene Brownrigg, executive director of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, gave an overview of the state's plans, and mentioned aspects of the celebration to be headed by Heritage, Festival and Horizon designations.

## Commissioners Hold Meeting

Members of the Commissioners Court of Haskell County met in regular session Monday with all members present and faced a lengthy agenda.

Following the approval of minutes, auditors monthly report, and bills, the court accepted the recommendation of Tax Assessor-Collector Jimmy Owens to employ Betty Weise at a salary of \$325.00 per month.

Commissioners set board of equalization meetings for June 2 and 3 at 9 a.m. in the courthouse. The oil, gas and utilities board will meet June 2, and the personal and real property will meet June 3.

Members of the court approved a request for furniture in the new County Extension office.

Pay for County and District Jurors was set by the court at 10.00 per day for jury service and 5.00 for responding and being excused.

Members of the court agreed to pay up to \$5,000.00 for improvements at the County Fair Grounds if the funds are matched by the City Council of Haskell.

Commissioners Edwards, Turnbow, and Byrd voted to appoint John Estes Justice of the Peace Prec. 6, at a monthly salary of 100.00 per month effective June 1, to serve until the next general election. Commissioner Perry voted against the appointment.

In other court action the Commissioners voted to purchase four new typewriters to be placed in the County and District Clerks, County Extension and County Judges offices.

County Judge B. O. Roberson read an order from District Judge W. P. Ratliff increasing the salary of the Court Reporter, Lanny Beauchamp.

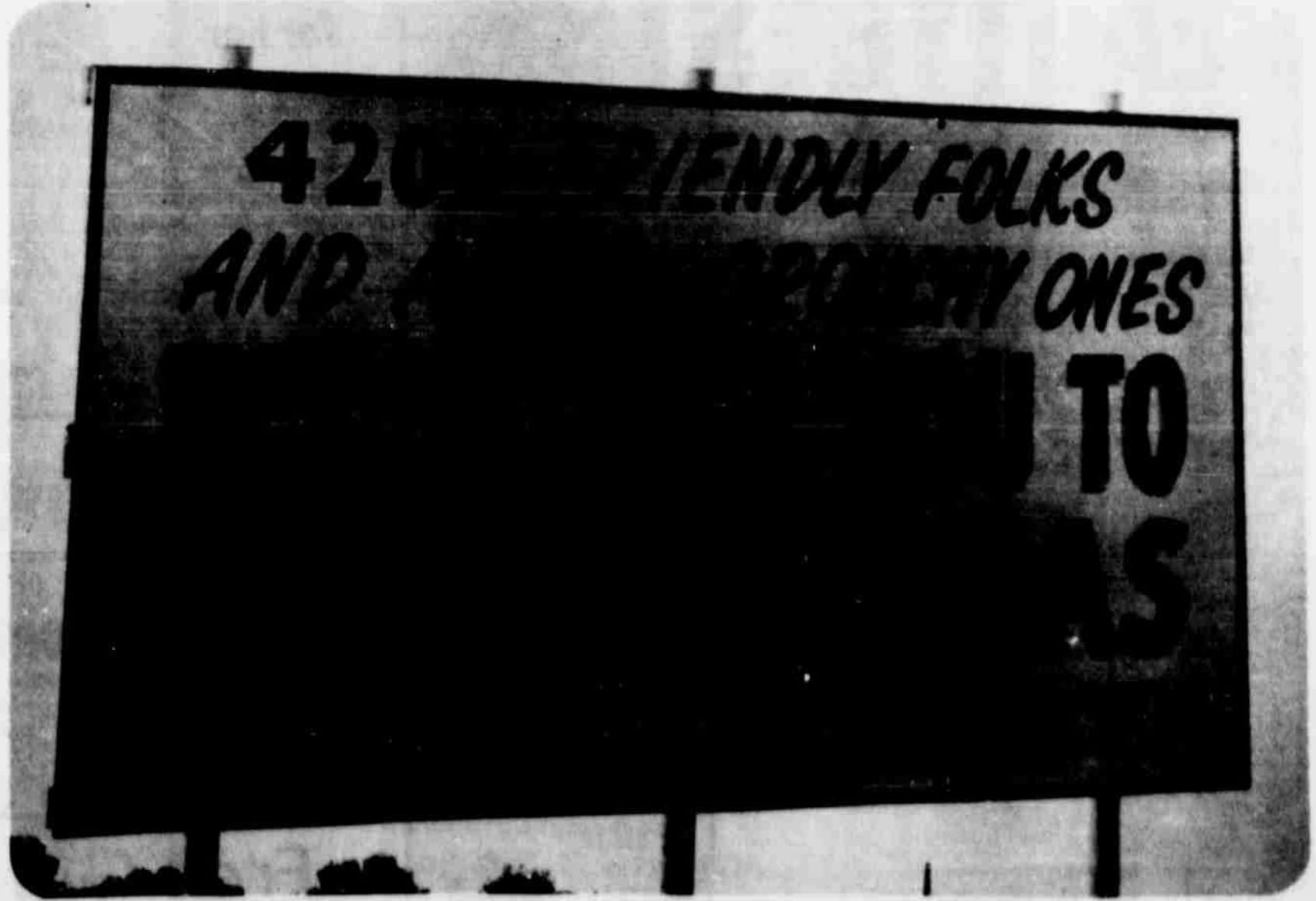
## Volleyball Tourney Set May 16 & 17

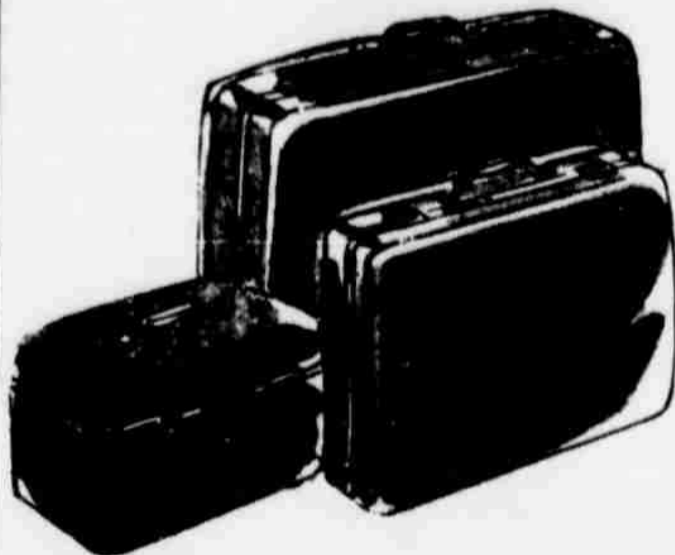

## Harvest Underway... Carryover To Be Up Crops Progressing... How Many Texas In Top Ten... Rice Planting

1975 wheat harvest is underway in South Texas; less than 10 per cent of the bountiful crop has been harvested. And while that is going on in the southern portion of the state, wheat is making excellent progress across the rest of the state with the crop now headed out. Nationwide prospects for the 1975-76 season range from more than two billion bushels to around two and a half billion bushels.

Production for the 1975-76 marketing year for wheat ranges from two to two and a quarter million bushels. Total supply ranges around 2.5 million bushels. As of June 30, 1976, is expected to be around 2.5 million bushels; this year's carryover as of June 30 is expected to be around 230 million bushels.

**WHILE, CROP PROSPECTS** throughout the state are bright. Cotton planting is about 20 per cent completed, which is slightly behind 1975 plants at this time. Planting is virtually completed, except for some areas in the Blacklands and Trans-Pecos areas. Seedbed preparation is about finished on the High and Low Plains, and the first of the 1975 crop is now in the ground in that area. Corn planting is more than 60 per cent finished; in the Rio Grande Valley is headed out. A few acres have been planted in the High and Low Plains. Seedbed preparation for the state is about a fourth completed. Planting is about two-thirds completed compared to 90 per cent at this time a year ago.

**MANY ACRES** are planted to sunflowers in Texas. That's one of the questions the Texas Crop and Reporting Service is going to find out in its crop report. 24,000 crop questionnaires go in the mail this year. Producers throughout the state. If you receive one, you are requested to fill it out as accurately as possible and return it promptly. Information in the report will be the basis for crop reports to come out this year.

**YOU LIKE WATERMELONS**—and who wouldn't? You'll be happy to learn that watermelon season is a little early this year—about a month earlier, to be exact. The Texas watermelon producers are planning on a bumper crop. Texas, in case you didn't realize it, is first in the nation in production of watermelons.

**AS CONTINUES IN THE TOP 10** in dairy states in the nation. It is also in the top 10 in numbers of milk cows that have calved.

Winn County continues as the top dairy county in the state in both production and in numbers. Other counties in the top 10 in Texas in milk production are Erath, Wise, Grimes, Comanche, Cooke, Franklin, Archer, and

Texas is ninth in the nation in milk production and cows that have calved.

**ROUGH RICE STOCKS** in Texas are up 23 per cent above a year earlier; milled rice stocks are seven per cent above a year earlier in the state.

Nationwide, rough rice stocks are 29 per cent higher than last year; milled rice stocks are 19 per cent below a year ago.

Throughout the rice belt in Texas, seeding is in its final stages. Planting had made good progress until interrupted by rains recently.

**The Consumer Alert**  
 by John L. Hill  
 Attorney General

**AUSTIN**—When most people hear the term "consumer protection" they realize that it usually refers to the elimination of fraud in the marketplace, sometimes by legal action.  
 Our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, for example, has a mandate from the Legislature to enforce the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act, which makes any false, misleading, or deceptive business practice illegal.  
 But there is another type of consumer protection, too, one that deals not with protection from fraud, but protection from danger—danger from unsafe products. And this type of consumer protection is the responsibility of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.  
 Of course, our Consumer Protection Division also has the power to take action to stop the sale of unsafe products if they were marketed knowingly. For instance, if a furniture dealer had reason to believe that a particular type of chair was likely to break and cause injury to someone sitting in it, yet sold it anyway without mentioning this, our attorneys could take action because of the deception involved.  
 Or if a toy manufacturer had noticed that a certain toy contained defective parts that might injure a child, yet sold the toy, he or she might be the object of a consumer protection suit.  
 Consumer protection in all its forms is important. And consumer protection from unsafe products is a major concern at present. Spokesmen for the Consumer Product Safety Commission estimate that un-

**Warns Consumers**  
J. C. Yeary, Jr., District Conservationist and more consumers are urged to home gardens for pleasures of home-grown produce and vegetables. An estimated 6 million Americans tried their home gardening for the first time. Economic uncertainty and the rising unemployment rate leads USDA to urge home-grown produce eaten or given away to help ease the burden of inflation. Home gardeners are urged to use safe, insecticides, quality products if the fruits and vegetables have been carefully inspected. Home canning may reduce the risk of botulism, a food poisoning which may cause death. As a result of 20 outbreaks of foodborne botulism in 1974, involving 30 persons, seven died-five from home-canned foods, USDA is launching a massive information/education campaign to alert consumers to the dangers of improper home canning procedures.

Improper processing may be avoided by following these guidelines:

1. Don't take shortcuts or experiment in Home canning. Use only tested, currently approved methods.
2. Use only jars, cans and lids made especially for home canning. Never use ordinary jars as mayonnaise or coffee jars.
3. Do not reuse sealing lids. The rubber ring deteriorates easily and prevents a tight seal. Get new rings for one-piece lids and new metal

lids with sealing compound for two-piece lids.

4. Do not use overripe food. Products change in chemical composition with age and lose acidity. Make sure the food is good quality, with no bruises or soft spots.
5. Do not overpack foods. Trying to get too much food into one jar may result in under-processing and spoilage.
6. Follow exactly the time and temperature specifications for foods and container sizes listed in the instructions. Adjust processing times according to altitude.
7. Test the seal according to instructions.
8. Do not use canned foods showing signs of spoilage. Watch for bulging lids, leaks, off-odors, or mold. If in doubt, don't taste. Destroy out of reach of children and pets.
9. Boil home-canned vegetables, covered, for at least 10 minutes before serving.
10. With tomatoes, follow established, recommended canning procedures closely.

For additional information on home canning and food safety, contact Mrs. Barbara Elliott, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent. If you live elsewhere than Haskell County, contact your local Extension Service Home Demonstration Agent. The fine people have many publications on Home gardening, canning, and freezing, and will be happy to assist you with your problems in this phase of conservation.

If you or a member of the SCS staff at Haskell, will be happy and more in a position to help you with any problems that you might encounter with soils, erosion, and watering of your home gardens, and so we will leave the canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables to the proper authority, Mrs. Elliott.

# Texas Taxes

AUSTIN—Texans who recall the pleasures during their youth of thumbing through a big, thick mail order catalog may be surprised to learn of the problems the mail order business creates for tax collectors.

The problem is a simple one: it's extremely difficult if not impossible to assess and collect sales taxes on goods bought and shipped into Texas from out of state.

The result is that Texas, and probably every other state, loses millions of dollars a year in sales tax revenue.

Texans who must pay state sales taxes on merchandise they purchase here in the state ultimately bear the burden of this situation. Although the sales tax is a tax levied on the consumer, we rely on the retail merchant to collect the tax for us. The plain fact is that the majority of these mail order houses in other states just do not bother to collect the tax and pass it along to us.

From a practical standpoint, it's easy to see, it's just plain impossible to make a guy pay the sales tax on a suit of clothes bought from a Chicago mail-order house.

Federal legislation granting the 50 states the authority to tax sales moving in interstate commerce would be one solution. It could make life much simpler for businesses who deal in interstate commerce and at the same time help the revenue picture for all states who try to collect the taxes on these goods.

This federal legislation would probably be more practical than giving states permission to require out of state retail mail order firms to collect the tax and then send it to the state where the buyer lives.

I think this approach with federal legislation is a dangerous involvement of the federal government in state taxation programs and sincerely believe that we have a better idea in the Comptroller's Department.

I have requested the Legislature to authorize 40 more auditors who will audit the books of no one but businesses outside Texas.

This will increase the scope and efficiency of the out of state audit program and the obvious result will be a great deal more revenue recovered. I can promise you that.

I believe this avenue of approach is the most sensible one and it will enable us to reach those mail order business houses which sell goods in substantial volume to Texans but escape paying Texas its proper taxes.


