THE TARIFF DID IT.

ARKANSAS.

Republicans Claim the First and Second Districts.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 5.—The Republican state committee claim the election of Langley (R.) in the second district and Featherstone (R.) in the first.

ALABAMA.

Democratic Congressional Delegation.
MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 5.—The entire Democratic delegation is elected to congress in Alabama.

CONNECTICUT.

Legislature Apparently Republican.
HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 5.—The legislature is apparently Republican on a joint ballot.

CALIFORNIA.

The Republican State Ticket Elected.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—The Republicans have carried San Francisco by a majority of 3700 against a Democratic majority of 3000 in '88, McKenna (R.) in the third district, and Bowers (R.) in the state. The first and second, fourth and fifth districts are in doubt. The entire state Republican ticket is undoubtedly elected.

IOWA.

Both Claim a Plurality.
DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 5.—Returns indicate a Republican plurality on the state ticket of from 4000 to 10,000. The Democrats claim the election of their state ticket by 5000 plurality.
The State Register this morning says the returns indicate a plurality of 450 to 1000 for the republican state ticket in Iowa. The Democrats are claiming the election of their ticket, but the Republicans are holding to the state and have a barb wire fence around a considerable portion of it.

KENTUCKY.

Democratic by Increased Majority.
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 5.—Of the eleventh congressional districts in Kentucky, ten have gone Democratic by increased majorities. The eleventh is in doubt.

KANSAS.

Second Kansas District.
FORT SCOTT, Kan., Nov. 5.—Congressman Funston (R.) is re-elected in this, the second district, over Chapman (D.)
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 5.—The Times, Democrat, claims that the Farmers' Alliance has swept Kansas and has elected the entire state ticket by from 10,000 to 15,000 plurality. It also claims the defeat of all Republican congressmen, Furston, alone, excepted.
The Republican committee claim that on a joint ballot in the legislature Ingalls will have a majority.

LOUISIANA.

Democratic Victory for Congressmen.
NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 5.—The latest return indicate that Meyer (D.) has defeated Alarmonth (R.) for congress in the first district by 20,000 majority, and that Logan (D.) has defeated Colman (R.) for congress in the second district by 3000. In other districts there was no organized opposition to the Democrats.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Two Democrat Congress Gained.
BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 5.—The Democrats have gained two congressmen at least.

MISSISSIPPI.

A Solid Democrat Congress.
JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 5.—The Democratic state committee has received returns which assures the

election of a solid Democratic congress by majorities ranging from 200 to 4000

MARYLAND.

A Solid Democratic Congressional Delegation.
BAKTMORE, Md., Nov. 5.—Maryland elected a solid Democratic congressional delegation.

MISSOURI.

Vest's Re-election Claimed.
ST. LOUIS Mo., Nov. 5.—The Democrats claim a majority in the Legislature, and consequently the re-election of George G. Vest to the United States senate.

MONTANA.

Republican Majority Wiped Out.
HELENA, Mont., Nov. 5.—Returns show heavy Democratic gains. The Republicans elected their congressman last year by 1800 majority. Returns so far have wiped this out. Secretary Steele of the Democratic committee claims the state by 1000. Secretary Walter of the Republican committee says Carter has carried by from 200 to 500.

MINNEOTA.

Figures Favor the Democrats.
ST. PAUL Minn., Nov. 5.—Late figures are against the claims of the Republican committee and favorable to the claim of Democracy. Chairman Campbell of the Democratic state committee says he thinks they have gained three congressmen and the governor.
The Minnesota delegation in the next congress will have at least one Democrat to four Republicans in it, and the Democrats are claiming four out of five

NEBRASKA.

Prohibition Defeated.
OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 5.—Returns from over the state indicate the election of Boyd (D.) for governor, the choice of the three Democratic congressmen and defeat of prohibition.

NEVADA.

Republicans Claim a Victory.
CARSON, Nev., Nov. 5.—The indications are that Concord (R.) for congress carried the state by 1000

NEW MEXICO.

The First Time in Twenty-Four years.
ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 5.—The territorial election was for a delegational congress, members of the council and county officers. Anthony Joseph, (D.) delegate has carried ten out of fourteen counties, with a majority of at least 1500. The Democrats have probably a majority of both houses of the legislature, the first time in twenty-four years.

NEW JERSEY.

A Democratic Majority in the Assembly and Senate.
JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 5.—Chairman McDermott of the Jersey state Democratic committee says the Democrats will have a majority of twenty in the assembly and two in the senate.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

A Close Contest.
CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 5.—Indications are that there is no choice of governor by the people of this state, that McKinney (D.) is elected to congress in the seventh district, and that the second district is very close, the chances being in favor of Moore (R.)

A CLOSE STATE VOTE.

The Democratic state committee claims Amaden as elected for governor, also a majority of the house, with the senate in doubt. The vote

LARGEST MAJORITY ON RECORD.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 5.—The Globe says: With only a half dozen towns to hear from in this state Russell (D.) for governor is leading by over 10,000 votes. The Democrats probably have the largest majority on record in the lower house, having not less than 100 members against 76 last year, and from 17 to 19 senators against 11 last year. Lieutenant-Governor Hildt gets through with 3400 plurality, but Auditor Ladd is beaten by William T. Treilly by 6650 plurality—the first Democrat chosen to any of the lesser state offices since the first year of Republican administration.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Quay Says it's Democratic.
PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 4.—A Dispatch received from Mr. Quay, dated Beaver at 2 a. m. says: "I think the state is Democratic."
PATTERSON'S ELECTION CANCELED.

ILLINOIS.

A Republican Falling off.
DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 5.—Canons election is claimed by the republican committee by a majority of 5007.

Election Returns from Shackelford, Throckmorton and Baylor Counties.

THE returns from Shackelford county show 395 votes polled, and the following candidates were elected: L. M. Keener, Co. Judge; Theo Mack, Co. Attorney; W. A.

Williams sheriff, J. C. Dolson, Co. Clerk; W. L. Massey Tax Assessor; M. T. Gallage, Co. Treasurer, and J. J. Meyer, Co. Surveyor.

Throckmorton county polled 209 votes, of which Cockrell received 82 for District Judge, and Canningham received 121. A. M. Craig of Anson received 29 majority for District Attorney. The county officers elected were, E. C. Smith, Co. Judge; J. B. Massey, Co. Clerk; M. L. McCabe, Sheriff; H. T. Moore, Assessor; H. D. Butler, Treasurer, and Hugh Pettigrew, Surveyor.

RAILROAD MEETING.

On last Saturday the citizens assembled at the court house in mass pursuant to a call issued by the railroad committee. The house was called to order by Oscar Martin Esq., who stated the object of the meeting.

Judge P. D. Sanders was elected Chairman and Oscar Martin Secretary. A. C. Foster Esq., addressed the house upon the subject of organizing a company and procuring a charter. J. C. Baldwin Esq., Ed J. Hamner Esq., and Hon. J. S. Rike addressed the house, and gave some good advice. Upon motion Dr. J. E. Lindsey, Ed. J. Hamner Esq., Judge H. G. McConnell, Oscar Martin Esq., J. C. Baldwin Esq., and S. H. Johnson were appointed a committee to correspond with the several railroad companies whose charters call for this county and ascertain what bonus would induce them to take some immediate action, and also ascertain what amount of money could be raised for such purposes and to correspond with the committees of neighboring towns. On motion A. C. Foster Esq., A. H. Pandy, R. E. Sherrill, R. C. Lomax Esq., and J. S. Rike were appointed a committee to canvas the feasibility of organizing a company for the purpose of building a road.

Both committees were instructed to report at the next meeting.

The house adjourned to meet at the court house on the 29th inst. at 3 o'clock p. m.

CHICAGO'S TOWERING TEMPLE.

An Eighteen Story Building that will Look Like a Monster Temple.

Morman T. Gaspette, prime mover in the big project of the masonic temple, said: "The grand structure will have its halls and corridors on the various floors named, as are the streets and avenues of a city. The reasons of this is to do away with all idea of altitude. Suppose a timid woman wants to see some one whose office is on the eighteenth floor. She will draw a long sigh, murmur 'eighteenth floor,' and probably go back home without seeing the person, or perhaps try to cover the case by telephoning. But if she is told by the elevator boy that her friend is up on Morris street, why of course, there is no

idea altitude; she steps into the elevator and is shot up to the eighth tenth floor. There will be sixteen streets in the temple. They will be named after men who have been prominent in Masonry. The first street above the main floor will be named Gurney, in honor of the late T. T. Gurney, at one time city comptroller of Chicago, who was in Masonry Past Grand Commander of Illinois as well as Past Grand Master. That's the only name yet selected.

The foundation will be of steel rails. Each floor will be like a span of a cantilever bridge. They will be drawn together with red-hot bolts, so that there can be no vibration. The atmospheric pressure has been figured in an exaggerated way. So has the velocity of the wind. To particularize, the temple will be built so as to resist successfully the wind at a velocity of 135 miles per hour. Such a wind would level all the ordinary business blocks of the city. The weight of the people on each floor has been overestimated. We have provided to sustain a weight of as many people as could be packed in solid as sardines on every foot of space on every floor. We have also exaggerated the weight of the beams and of fireproofing. The upper floor will be as strong as the lower. They will so depend on each other as be of uniform strength. But on this principle it could safely be made forty stories high on that foundation. The only objection would be, it would require too much room for elevators. We now will have fourteen elevators, eight-foot cars, all arranged in a circle. That's more elevators than there are in any other place in the city. The superstructure and foundation are alike solid. Externally the four sides of the temple will be exactly alike. Even the alley sipes will be a duplicate of State and Randolph streets sides. It will appear exactly the same, no matter from what direction viewed.

The general appearance of the temple will be that of a gigantic monument. The lower five stories, in terra cotta, forming the base, then rising in smooth-faced brick will gleam the shaft, while the frieze or top comes out in terra cotta. It is to be, you see, monumental. It will be the grandest structure in this city, famed for its great buildings. The temple will be completed and occupied on May 1, 1891, an even year before the World's fair opens.—Chicago Herald.

WASHINGTON.
Republican by the Usual Majorities.
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 5. Returns indicate the election of Wilson (R.) for congress beyond a doubt. Both branches of the legislature will be republicans by the usual majority.

WISCONSIN.
Peck's Election for Governor Assured.
CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 5.—The Times says of the election in Wisconsin: Judging from returns already received, Peck's plurality in the city will be at least 800, and county 9000 for governor. This will be increased over his plurality in the spring of 25,000. It is a change over the vote of 1888 of 12,000. Chairman Wallick claims the state by upwards of 10,000 plurality for Peck and the state ticket.

WEST VIRGINIA.
Large Democratic Gains.
CHARLESTON, W. V., Nov. 5. Indications point to a large Democratic victory in the congressional and senatorial districts. The Democrats have made large gains in this city and county.
