





in Texas, 367 chapters filed en-tries in the contest, which is under the supervision of Texas Vocational Agricultural instructors The contest is in the nature o demonstrations by the various participating FFA chapters in the control of stored grain insect with the use of Pyrenone Grain Protectant, a powdered insect cide which protects grains against nsect infestation.

The competition for the cash prizes, offered by Southwest Sprayer & Chemical Co., of Waco one Pyrenone Grain Protectant treatment demonstration pe chapter shall constitute the chief basis for the purposes of judging and awarding prizes.
