John Kimbrough of this city today announced his candidacy for the office of State Representative from the 83rd District. Kimbrough, former All-American football player for Texas A&M back in 1939 and 1940, is now a wholesale oil distributor and rancher-farmer and is now serving as a member of the board of directors of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce. So far he is the only candidate to announce for the job of representing Haskell, Knox, Baylor and Throckmorton Counties in the Texas Legislature. The present state representative, Clyde Whiteside of Seymour, announced last Sunday that he will not be a candidate for re-election. Whiteside had been a member of the Legislature since 1949. Wichita Falls Colored High School Band Booked For Concert Here May 1st

Since the first annual Texas-Oklahoma Colored High School Football Colored Classic was played here last Fall there has been a popular demand for the performance of another Colored High School Band. In response to this demand the Lions Club of Haskell in cooperation with Central Ward School have secured the Booker T. Washington High School Band of Wichita Falls for a program on May 1, 1952, at the High School football stadium at 8 o'clock. Wm. P. Ratliff Appointed 39th District Attorney After John H. Banks Quits Post

Wm. P. Ratliff, prominent Haskell lawyer and resident here since boyhood, Wednesday was appointed District Attorney of the 39th Judicial District to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of John H. Banks. Appointment of Mr. Ratliff was announced by Gov. Allan Shivers at Austin. In accepting the appointment, Mr. Ratliff said he would not be a candidate for the office, but that he had agreed to Governor Shivers request that he take the temporary appointment as a service to the people of the 39th district. Resignation of former District Attorney Banks from the post he had held since January, 1947, was submitted to Gov. Shivers last Thursday. First news of his resignation came in news dispatches from Austin late Thursday. Banks has made no announcement of his future plans. As District Attorney, Mr. Ratliff will assume his duties on the eve of the April term of district court, which opens here Monday. He is a junior member of the law firm of Ratliff & Ratliff, in which he is associated with his brother, Dennis P. Ratliff, former 39th District Judge. He will continue his partnership in the firm during the interim appointment to the district office. A resident of Haskell since his youth, he was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law here in 1933 as an associate

in the law firm of his father, the late L. D. Ratliff, Sr. Active in civic affairs, he was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Haskell School District four years, and secretary of the board two years. He also served as City Attorney of Haskell several years. His wife is the former Margaret Grant of Abilene. They have three daughters and one son, Paula, Gloria, Leah, and William Grant.

Plans Completed For Annual Program Of Haskell County Singing Convention

Plans are being completed this week for the 28th annual program of the Haskell County Singing Convention, to be held Sunday, April 27, in this city, Hallie E. Chapman, president of the organization, announced today. The convention will be held in the American Legion Building, several blocks south of the square, where adequate parking space is available for several hundred automobiles. The convention program will begin at 10 a. m. April 27 and will continue throughout the morning and afternoon. A brief business session will be held at 1 p. m. at which time the annual election of officers will be held. Present officers in addition to Chapman as president are Bailey Guess, Weinert, vice president; and Mrs. Troy Ash of Haskell, secretary. The Haskell County convention, one of the oldest organizations of singers in West Texas, each year attracts hundreds of singers and visitors for the annual program. Plans are being made to arrange accommodations for a capacity audience in the large Legion building, and a public address system will be installed to carry the program to listeners outside the auditorium. Due to widespread interest and the large number of out-of-town singers, quartets and other groups who have accepted invitations to attend, the attendance at this year's convention is expected to be the largest in several years, Chapman said. Among some of the well-known quartets and song leaders who have accepted invitations to attend the convention are the Stamps Ozark Quartet of Wichita Falls, Henry Shipp Quartet of Lubbock, the Friendly Four Quartet of Fort Worth, and the Tankersley Quartet of Knox City, and others. Also the Haskell IOOF Quartet and other local groups and song leaders. Dinner will be served all out-of-county singers as a courtesy of the convention, Chapman said.

All arrangements have been completed for staging Haskell's first Western Day program, an afternoon round of entertainment Friday April 18 that will include a huge parade of bands, mounted riders from Seymour, Abilene and Haskell riding clubs, rodeo events, band concerts, and a downtown program by a delegation of musicians and entertainers from H-SU, Abilene. All events and attractions will be free to the public as a community program for Haskell and vicinity. It is being sponsored by the Saddle Tramps riding club of Haskell. In addition to some 60 or more members of the local club taking part, members of the Seymour Remuda will have at least 30 mounted riders in the parade, sponsors have been advised. The program will get under way at 1:45 p. m. Friday, with the H-SU Rhythm Ranch Hands presenting a program on the south side of the square. At 2:15 bands and riding groups will assemble at the Fair Park to form a parade. At 3:30, the HHS Band will give a concert at Fair Park, and rodeo events will be started. These will include matched calf roping contest, cowgirls barrel race, cutting horse contest, trick roping, and jackpot roping. Attractive prizes in the cowgirls barrel race have been offered by Lane-Felker, The Personality Shoppe, and Warren's Booterie. With Buford Cox as general chairman, other Western Day events will be directed as follows: Myrom Biard, parade captain; flag bearers, Scott Greene, Buford Cox; Band Director, Bill Dean, music; welcoming committee, Wix Currie, John Kimbrough, Harold Spain, Hallie Chapman, Willard Warren; announcers, Olen Dotson, T. \$15,000 to be Spent In First CWT Fair Expansion Project

Immediate start on an expansion project for the Central West Texas Fair plant that will include the addition of a race track, grandstand, and several additional buildings was assured this week, when directors of the association at a meeting Tuesday made available \$15,000 to finance initial phases of the project. First work to be done, and expected to be started within the next few days, will be the erection of a livestock barn to replace the structure burned early this year. Also work will start on an automobile race track, with a grandstand also in the plans, and building of a lighted baseball field. The expansion program will be under the supervision of Bill Wilson, vice president of the Fair association. Rhythm Ranch Hands Will Visit Haskell Friday

A western musical show featuring the Rhythm Ranch Hands will be in Haskell Friday afternoon, April 18, to publicize the Sixth Annual Hardin-Simmons University Intercollegiate Rodeo which will be held in Carl Myers Memorial Arena April 24-26. A short western jamboree will be given on the courthouse square, and the visitors will take part in the Western Day parade while here.

The Ranch Hands is one of the newest musical groups on the Hardin-Simmons campus, having been organized early this year by a group of varsity footballers living in Cowden-Paxton Hall, athletic dormitory.

Only one member of the nine-man band is not a football player. He is Don "Lopin" Logan, featured vocalist with the group.

Other members of the troupe include Sherry Nall, Loving; Travis Kelley, Bandera; Bill Davis, Memphis; Jimmy Riddle, Wichita Falls; Maurice Waguespack, Destrehan, La.; Pat Tone Monahans; Jake Collins, Fort Worth, and George Miser, Chicago. Nall and Kelley are billed as the feature attraction of the band, each playing the banjo, guitar and mandolin.

More than 125 cowboys and cowgirls from more than a dozen western states are expected to participate in the three-day rodeo which will have matinees Friday and Saturday at 2:30 and night shows Thursday, Friday and Saturday. A parade through downtown Abilene will get things rolling Thursday afternoon.

This year's show is expected to be the biggest in the history of the school, with six cowboy events and two girls' contests slated. Featured attraction of the show will be a cutting horse contest.

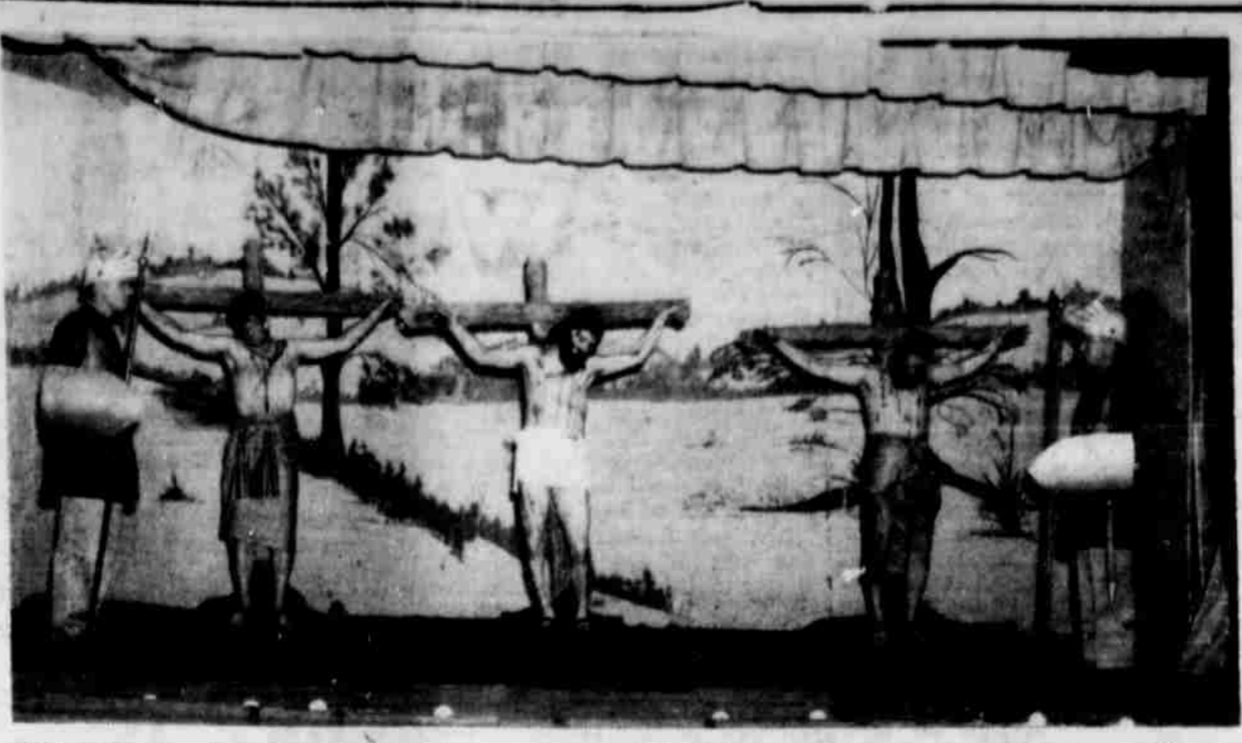

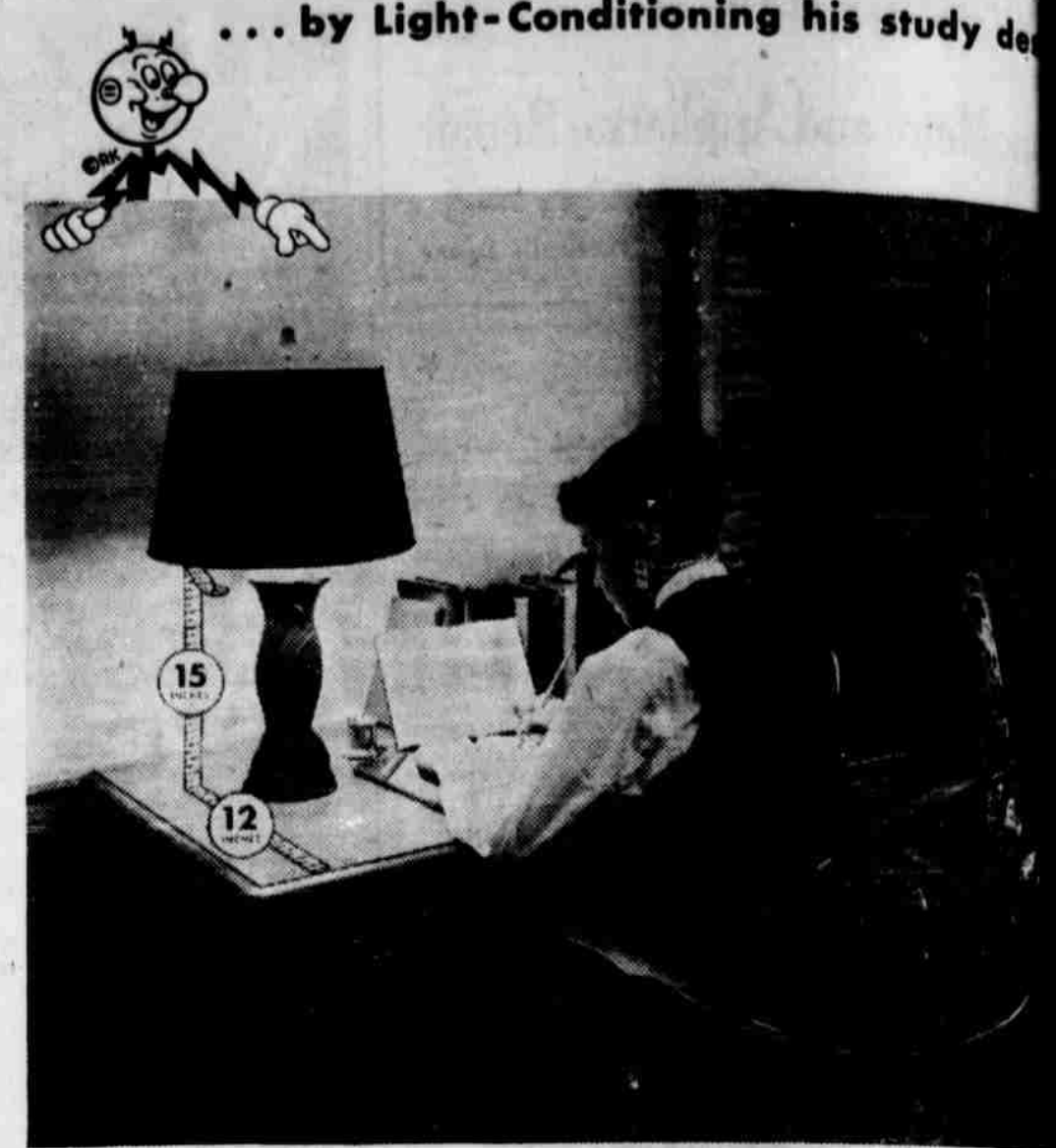
He believes that his business experience, and the sincere de-
