## Joe S. Harper, PMA Director, Tells Lions Of Problems Facing Farm Industry

Jeff Graham of Knox County, Lions Club zone chairman, was a guest of Haskell Lions at their regular meeting Tuesday, when said farm producers would be called upon to produce food for 38 million more people by 1975.

"For every four persons setting down to a meal in 1950 there will be another person at the table in 1975," Harper said, pointing out that a 20 per cent increase in farm production from all land now being farmed would be necessary by 1975. Accenting the need for building up the nation's soil, Harper explained there was not enough new land suitable for farm use to meet the increased production load.

"Productivity of our present cultivated land must be increased through proper conservation practices that will halt the depletion of the soil that has gone almost unchecked until recent years," the farm specialist said. Illustrating the tremendous increase in demand for farm products, Harper cited figures showing that farm production of 3.56 acres was available in 1920 for each person in the nation, while today only 2.25 acres of farm production is available per capita.

Harper in his talk, told some of the things the department of agriculture is doing in the counties. He pointed out that lack of cover crops and conservation of soil are the most serious problems confronting agricultural industry in the county. Sketching briefly the progress made in soil conservation, Harper said that little more than 6,000 miles of terracing had been done in the county since 1945; the water control program in the county is adequate as a result of terracing done; but the imperative need, he declared, was for more legumes and cover crops to hold

## W. O. Holden, Wm. J. Kemp and Floyd Rich, Elected Trustees

In an apparently spontaneous turn-out of the largest number of voters balloting in a school trustee election in years, W. O. Holden, Dr. Wm. J. Kemp and Floyd R. Rich were elected trustees of the Haskell School District Saturday from a field of 9 candidates whose names had been filed for the three posts by friends and supporters.

The total vote of 451 ballots was believed the highest ever polled.

No issues were involved in the annual election, and the record turn-out of voters was attributed solely to the fact that all candidates on the ballot were prominent business men and civic leaders.

Vote totals for the individual candidates, based on unofficial returns: W. O. Holden, 190; Dr. Wm. J. Kemp, 186; Floyd R. Rich, 183; C. E. Smith, 144; Fred Gilliam, 143; Sam P. Herren, 123; Ted Marugg, 119; Belton Duncan, 115; Gene Elliott, 94.

John A. Couch, president of the county school board and candidate for re-election as trustee-at-large, was returned to that post without opposition.

For trustee in Commissioner's Precinct No. 2, Hubert Segoe was elected with 171 votes over W. B. Guess, 128 votes.

In Precinct 4, Trustee Will Stegemoeller was unopposed for re-election.

Hold-over trustees Tolbert E. Beason in Precinct 1 and Roy Overton in Precinct 3 complete the county board.

## Army Reserve Unit To Reorganize In This City

Re-organization of a unit of the Army Reserves in Haskell appeared likely this week, according to information received by Lt. Col. H. K. Henry, who has briefly summarized the project in the following paragraphs:

Since June of 1949 the 4272nd Replacement Depot has been functioning in Haskell. This is a reserve training unit, and since Jan. 1, 1951, members have not received pay. Reserves from Munday, Rule, Stamford, Anson and Hamlin as well as Haskell do now, or have belonged to this unit. And, the Haskell unit is the only one between Abilene and Wichita Falls.

Almost all training organizations have been disbanded or changed to "T. O. and E" units. These Table of Organization and Equipment units receive pay for drills and are, as a rule, part of a division or higher unit in one of the bigger cities. In addition to the regular drills of T. O. and E. units, a two weeks period of active duty is made.

Information has been received this week by Lt. Col. H. K. Henry, Commanding Officer of the local unit that a Replacement Battalion, T. O. and E. unit is available for Haskell. This is a smaller unit than a Depot, but paid drills are an incentive to regular attendance. In addition to pay, members of a T. O. and E. unit would in case of all-out war likely be kept together.

All reservists in this area, whether still members of the 4272 Depot, are urged to attend a meeting at the G. E. School in Haskell Friday night, April 11, if they wish to become members of the new unit.

## Secretary of State Lists Voting Rules For Servicemen

AUSTIN—Rules governing absentee voting by servicemen of Texas have been sent to all county clerks by Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd.

The instructions list the various qualifications servicemen must meet to vote without a poll tax and outline the procedure to be followed.

Shepperd said he hoped the instructions would eliminate the confusion prevailing for the past few years.

The instructions point out that any member of the reserve on extended active duty, selective service draftee or member of the National Guard, on duty with Federal forces, and members of the Maritime service and Merchant Marine is qualified to vote

without a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate provided he was at least 21 years old on the day of the election, a citizen of the United States, has resided in Texas at least one year preceding the election and for 6 months within the county in which he offers to vote. Time spent in the military service after the beginning of the above periods may be counted in determining if these time limits have been met.

To qualify to vote a serviceman cannot be a member on active duty of the regular or permanent military establishment of the Army, Navy, Air Force or Marines.

The Democratic Primary in Texas will be held July 26, the run-off August 23 and the General Election November 4th.

Details of how servicemen can determine whether they are eligible to vote without a poll tax are as follows:

Armed service personnel who are qualified to vote in Texas and who are on extended active duty may vote during 1932 without paying their poll tax and without obtaining a poll tax "Exemption Certificate." Whether the poll tax is levied by the State or any political subdivision the serviceman need not pay it to vote in any election.

Shepperd's instructions also detailed how servicemen can make applications for ballots and the procedure for voting:

Servicemen may make application for absentee ballot at any time. Application should be made to the county clerk of the county in which the serviceman has his residence. **Schools For Texas Gin Operators Scheduled**

In order to improve one of the steps in the 7-step cotton program—pick and gin for a high grade—Texas cotton gin owners have requested assistance. It will be given in a series of 2-day ginners schools which are scheduled for the latter part of April and early May.

According to E. H. Bush, cotton gin specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the schools will give gin owners and operators an opportunity to pick up practical information on the function, construction, adjustment, operation, repair and maintenance of gin machinery and equipment. He says the schools are sponsored by the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association, various manufacturers of cotton gin machinery and the Extension Service.

The first school is scheduled for April 28-29 at the Murray Company of Texas plant in Dallas. On April 30 and May 1, the second will be held at the Lummus Cotton Gin Co., Dallas. The third will follow on May 5-6 at the Centennial Cotton Gin Company, Dallas, and May 7-8 the series will be completed with the school at the Continental Gin Co. plant, also in Dallas.

Because of a lack of facilities, the Hardwick-Etter Company of Sherman and the Gullett Gin Company of Dallas will not participate in the 1952 schools, says Bush.

Each piece of machinery and equipment will be completely torn down and rebuilt, points out Bush. Instructors will be top-flight gin machinery engineers who will explain during their lectures the finer points that make for high quality ginning. Such machinery and equipment as gin stands, driers, overhead burr machines, cleaners, extractor feeders, fans and pneumatic systems, lint cleaners and lint

conveying and pressing systems will get major attention. A question and answer period and a tour of the plant will wind up each school.

Bush adds it is the hope of the sponsors of the schools that the men who actually operate gin machinery will attend. In addition to the lectures on machinery and equipment, the latest research findings from the U. S. Cotton Ginning Laboratory will be given. Fire and accident prevention will be discussed and hints given for cutting the losses caused by both.

Better ginning, points out the specialist, results when operators fully understand the finer points of construction, adjustments, maintenance and repairs of the machinery they are operating. Better ginning also means improved grades of cotton, more income for the producer and better satisfied customers, says Bush.

The State Agricultural Mobilization Committee urges farmers to re-examine their planting plans and where possible make every effort to increase materially their plantings of feed grain crops.

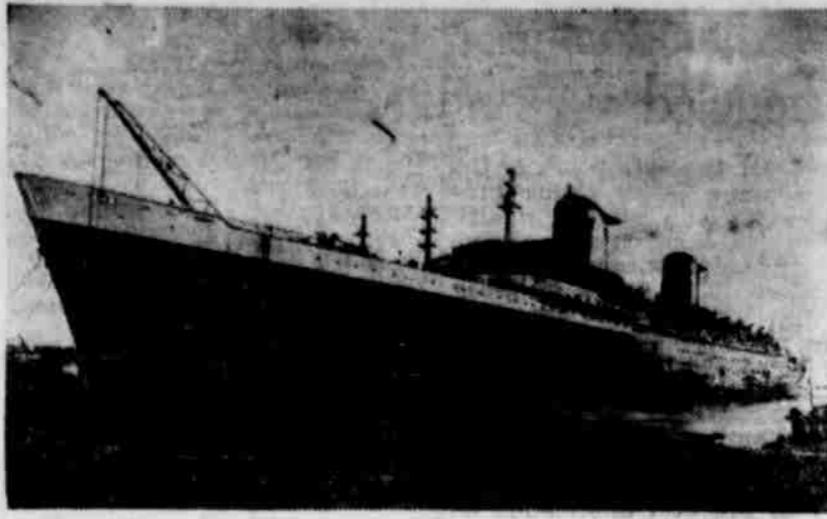

### Seagoing Beauty is Groomed for Debut



The giant liner United States, largest and fastest passenger ship ever built in this country, looms large against the winter sky at her outfitting dock in the Newport News (Va.) The new vessel is now 85% completed, with interior installations well under way, and is scheduled to make her maiden voyage from New York to Southampton and Havre early next summer. Her peacetime capacity will be 2,000 passengers and a crew of 1,000, although in wartime she could carry a complete division of 14,000 men a distance of 10,000 miles without stopping for fuel, water or food.

### Control Measures Advised To Help Prevent Polio

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during the summer months.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the housefly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate community sewage disposal systems are not available or feasible, it is important to build and properly maintain sanitary septic tanks. In the event a water carriage system of sewage disposal cannot be secured it is important that at least an approved pit-type toilet be constructed and properly maintained.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

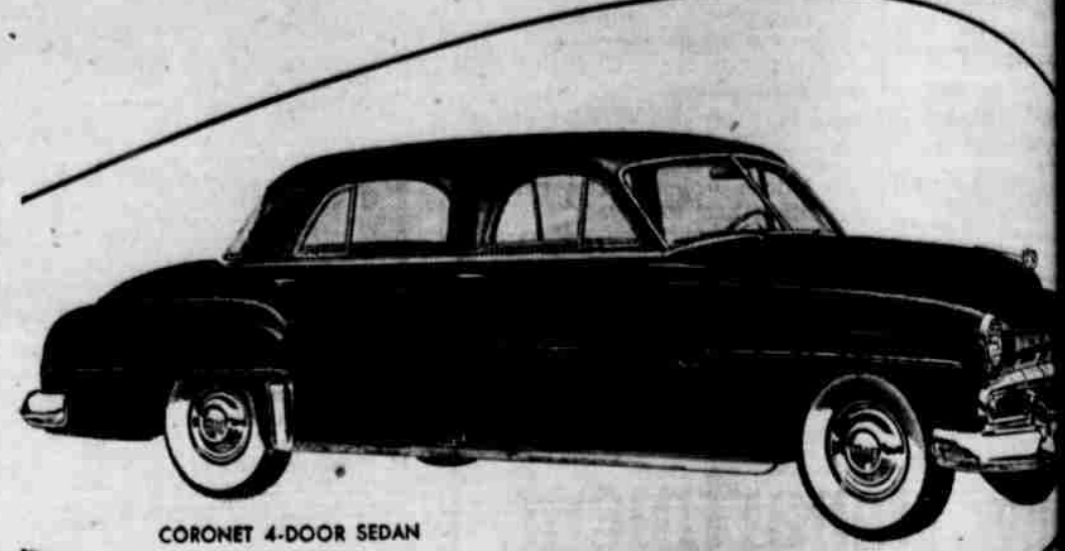

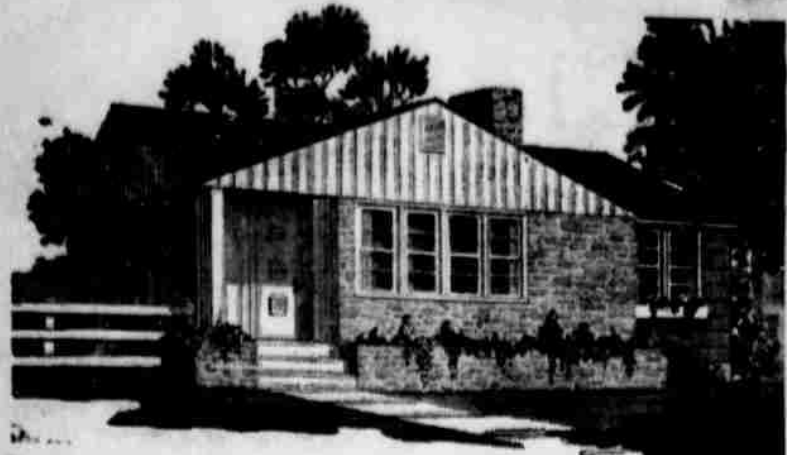

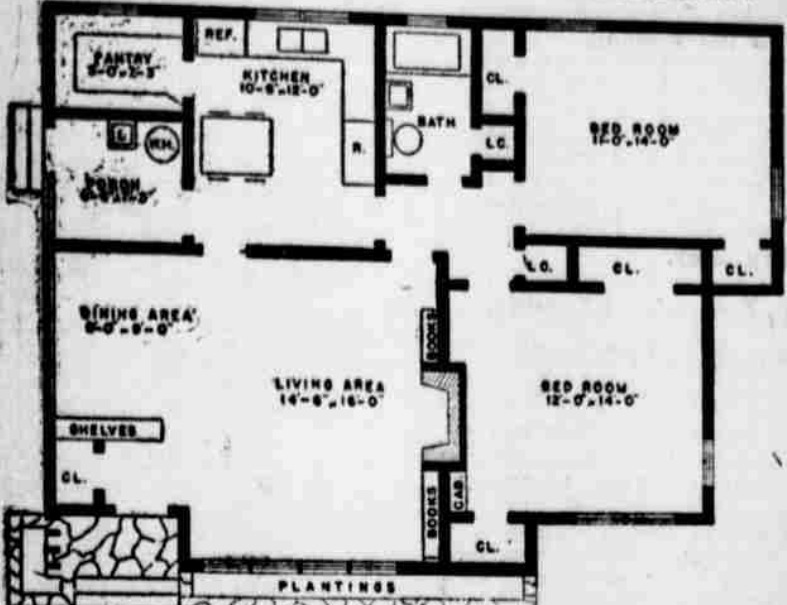

House Plan No. 29



Like an eye-appealing modern beauty, this Farm and Ranch House No. 29 is outstanding for its clean-cut, simple lines. But the girl must have more than an attractive appearance if she's the type you want to settle down with—and so must a house. This one meets all these requirements.

The flexible arrangement of this house makes it well suited to a growing family. The living room is a pleasant optical illusion. It is comparatively small, but because of the arrangement appears very spacious. If necessary, this room can be used temporarily as a combined bedroom-living room and serve all the meals in the kitchen.

Two comfortable-sized bedrooms are located conveniently to the bathroom. Each has plenty of well-arranged closet space.

The closet at the front entrance is good for the storage of wraps or raincoats, and occupies an otherwise wasted space. Plans give details for the construction of shelves for the china and the bookcases which surround the fireplace.

This house can be built rather cheaply because of its plain roof, simple lines, and easy frame construction. To increase the economy, we have arranged the bathroom and kitchen on the same wall, and the drains from the bathroom fixtures on one wall. There is an absolute minimum of plumbing required to serve both the kitchen and bathroom fixtures.

Something else which will keep the construction cost down and also keep maintenance at a minimum is the use of double-coursed, prefinished cedar shingles. We suggest you use these on all walls except the front, where brick or masonry is shown.

**WTCC Sees Federal Control of Water Resources Near**

Introduction of a measure in congress designed to bring under federal control all water resources of the United States may be expected almost any time, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce told members of its water resources committee in a bulletin issued this week.

The statement referred to legislative proposals, made public recently, that are based upon a report of the President's Water Resources Policy Commission.

The statement commented upon the proposed legislation as follows:

"The proposed bill calls for completely federal planning and development of the water resources of the nation through 15 federally dominated River Basin Commissions and a Federal Board of Review.

"Only lip service is paid to giving the states and local governments a part in the planning and administration of their water resources, although the plans call for their assuming a much larger share of financial burden. All costs are to be reimbursable as far as possible, not just those allocated to electric power and reclamation. Wherever possible, costs are to be repaid by the direct beneficiaries, otherwise by state and local governments. Only the cost of intangible benefits are to be borne by the federal government. No project is to be authorized or built without approval of the Commission and the Board of Review."

## 1952 Grasshopper Threat Expected To Be Slight

Forecasts based on surveys and actual egg bed counts indicate grasshoppers will not be a threat to crops and pastures in Texas this year. In only a few spots were enough eggs found to rate the areas as threatening, says Allen C. Gunter, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The areas are small and are found in the upper northwest Panhandle, in the Trinity bottoms of Ellis and Kaufman counties; in Hill, Falls, Milam, Robertson and Washington counties, along the Brazos River. In these areas farmers should watch for the early hatches and if the young hoppers show up in large numbers, they should be controlled before they leave the egg bed areas, says Gunter.

Other counties in these same general areas may expect light infestations and some damage is possible. Serious damage may develop in the fall if the weather is hot and dry.

Gunter advises farmers and ranchmen that control measures if needed, should be used before the grasshoppers leave the egg beds and scatter. Wiping out this year's hatches will reduce the chances for major outbreaks next year, points out the specialist. And from this standpoint, the use of control measures is justified. For information on the best insecticides to use, Gunter suggests that farmers contact their local county agents. They can also advise on whether control measures should be used.

The spring season is the most critical growth period for range plants.

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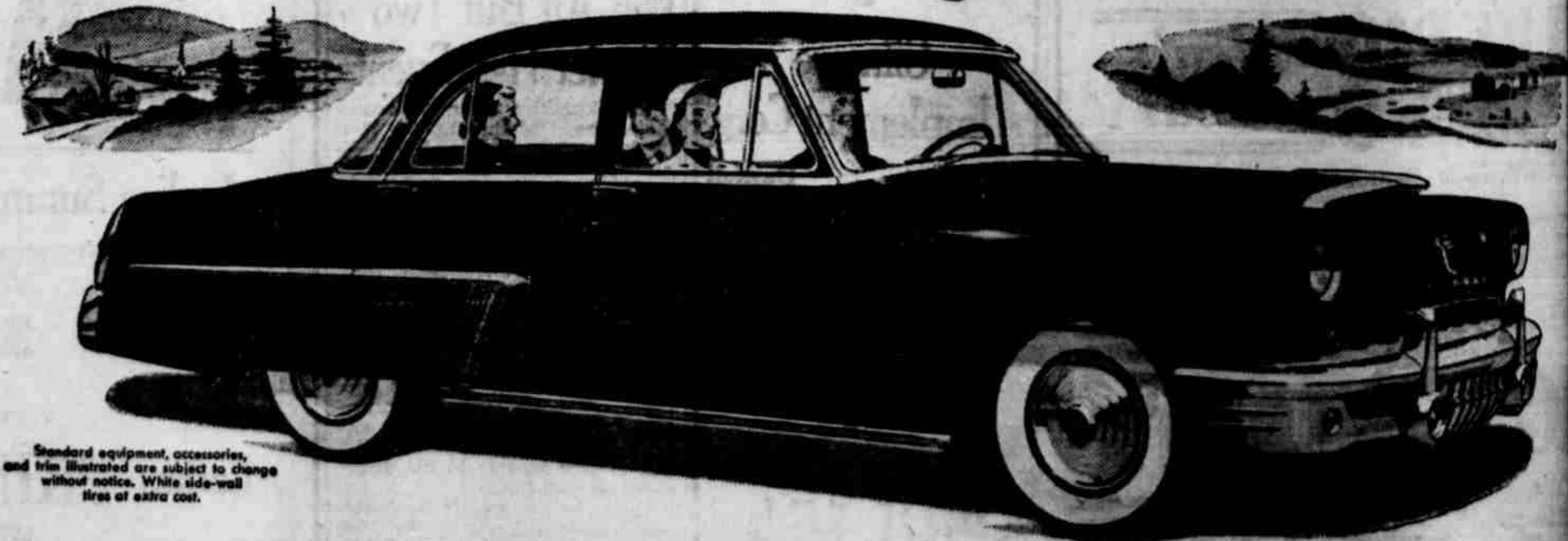
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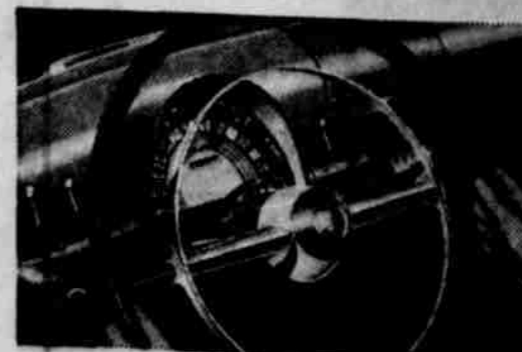

**Social Security Man Will Visit Haskell Thursday, April 17**

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Haskell at the Chamber of Commerce at 11 a. m. on Thursday, April 17. Persons wishing information or assistance in connection with old age and survivors insurance matters are invited to call to see him at that time. Fisher suggests that any self-employed person who plans to retire at age 65 or over during this year should check with the social security office before making his decision.

"Anyone who has been in work covered by social security continuously since 1950 and who reaches age 65 after April of this year will be eligible for old age benefit payments if he retires after that date," says Fisher. He points out, however, that it will not be possible for him to get the highest benefit payments provided for those insured on the basis of earnings after 1950. This is because self-employment income for the year a claim is filed cannot be used in figuring a benefit payment, and two full years of such work are required to get the largest payments provided for in the new benefit formula. In most cases, it will be to the advantage of the self-employed person to defer retirement until after 1952 or at least wait until January 1953 to file his claim.

Fisher suggests that the self-employed person contemplating retirement in 1952 come to the Abilene social security office and discuss the matter before making a decision or call to see him in Haskell.
