#### Foods For Denfense Plans Studied By **Economists**

If your family became isolated during a disaster or atomic at-tack, would the pantry and refrigerator provide enough food until help arrived?

The Texas State Nutrition Council believes each family in the state should have a food supply for home use in case of such emergencies. Plans for operation Food were made at a joint meeting at Mineral Wells with the Texas Home Economics Association, May 8-9. Sylvia Cover, rural home research department for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, chairman of the Council, says detailed suggestions for three types of food supply plans have been devised.

For families living in target areas such as cities where water and fuel facilities would suffer from enemy attack, a supply of food for the family and two other persons for seven days is recmmended. The list of foods, suplies and equipment for cooking ncludes suggestions for storage nd replenishing to keep fresh.

Families living in urban comnunities not in probable target reas where the normal provision or the food supply and any availble food used for community feeding, would, under the plan. need enough food for the family and two others for three days.

In rural areas where water night be contaminated and trans-portation halted, the Council's plan suggests family store liquids in particular, since farm and ranch families usually have quantities of stored food.

Miss Cover says suggested food lans were made and tested by a special committee of the Council and will be made available through members of the organization, county home demonstration agents and other home economists in the state. The committee, headed by Jennie Wilmot, home economics department of the University of Texas, retiring chairman, based the plans on the Texas Food Standard as a guide. The State Nutrition Council

founded during emergency organization of home economists in 1940, is providing the information in connection with its objectives. W. L. McGill state coordinator of defense and disaster relief, Austin, speaking to the meeting complimented the Council on its achievements and plans. You have already given evidence of your awareness of the demands of our present situation," he said. "The State Nutrition Council was the first organization in Texas to complete a registration of its members- a registration of their skills and capacities for service when major calamity

comes upon us."

The State Nutrition Council is composed of representatives of all agencies and organization Texas working in the field of foods and nutrition.

## Danger Season For Made For Home Food Poisoning

The coming of warm weather W. Cox, State Health Officer, for all persons to be on the alert re-garding food poisoning. Most cases investigated by the State Department of Health disclosed that improper food handling was responsible for the illness.

Food poisoning is commonly caused by bacteria in food. In general there are two types, food poisoning and food infection. Food poisoning is caused by bacteria in the food that produce a poison and usually the symptoms appear within a few hours. In food infection, the bacteria do not produce a poison, but attack the body. This takes longer so symptoms usually do not appear for 12 to

24 hours after eating. In both kinds of illness the symptoms may be similar: nausea, comiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain and fever may all occur. In food poisoning nausea and vomiting may be the prominent symp-

As a prevention Dr. Cox suggests that all food be protected against flies and other pests. Refrigerate all perishable foods inluding meats, poultry and cream filled pastries. Many outbreaks of food infection are caused by eaving food out of the refrigerator. Also, avoid handling food f you have a sore or infection on our hands or if you are sick.




