Despite apparent lack of advance interest in county politics Haskell County voters will likely mark between 3600 and 3700 ballots in the first primary election Saturday, out of a potential voting strength of 4400, based on current poll tax payments. Poll tax receipts and exemptions issued total 3829, Assessor-Collector R. A. Coburn reports.

Balloting will be at 20 polling places in the county, four of which are in Haskell, two in Rule, and one each in the 14 remaining towns and communities in the county. The polls will open at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m.

### County Chairman To Be Elected By 'Write In'

A county chairman of the Democratic executive committee will be elected by "write in" voter in Saturday's primary.

This situation arises from the fact that no candidate for the post now held by John A. Couch, is listed on the first primary ballot.

With this fact becoming generally known during the past week, friends and supporters have drafted two candidates—Mr. Couch for re-election, and Oliver Cookman, prominent farmer-stockman and a former attorney and State Senator.

Supporters of the two candidates have indicated, they would conduct active campaigns advocating election of their respective candidates.

Mr. Couch who has served as county chairman for a number of years, had filed his application for the post again this year, but later asked that his name not be printed on the ballot.

In balloting for a County Chairman, voters may write in the name of either of the two candidates, or any other person they desire.

In the higher bracket of legislative and congressional races in which Haskell County voters will ballot, all candidates are likewise unopposed. This list includes Congressman George Mahon of the 19th District; State Senator George Moffett of the 23rd District; and John Kimbrough for State Representative in the 83rd Legislative District. The former All-American football player, a newcomer in politics, has made an active campaign in the four-county district, despite the fact he has no opposition.

Unopposed county and precinct candidates seeking re-election include: County Judge Alfred Turnbow, District Clerk Jesse B. Smith, Tax Assessor-Collector R. A. Coburn, County Clerk Horace O Neal, County Treasurer B y r o n Wright, Commissioner D. S. Strickland of Precinct 4.

Justice of the Peace H. P. Findley of the Rochester precinct. Also unopposed is Curtis Pogue for County Attorney. The Haskell lawyer has previously served in that capacity, retiring as County Attorney Jan. 1, 1951.

Likewise unopposed is F. J. McCurley, candidate for Public Weigher of the Haskell precinct, a post he held several years ago. In the race for 39th District Attorney, opposing candidates are County Attorney Royce Adkins of Haskell and County Attorney Dale Condon of Throckmorton.

Sheriff R. M. (Bob) Cousins, seeking re-election, has two opponents, W. T. Holley, grocer and trucker, and A. L. Conner, local building contractor.

County Commissioner A. C. (Pete) Sego, seeking re-election in Precinct No. 1, is opposed by J. V. (Jake) Jenkins.

In Precinct No. 2, Commissioner W. A. Leonard is opposed for re-election by P. L. Newton.

M. B. Cobb, seeking re-election as Commissioner in Precinct No. 3, has two opponents, Estle Gilkiland and A. J. Mansker.

Four candidates are listed in the race for Justice of the Peace in the Haskell precinct, with the incumbent, C. K. (Charlie) Jones opposed by Eal Treadwell, James A. Yancy, and Leon Robertson.

For Constable of Precinct 1, Sterling Edwards, incumbent, is opposed by J. L. (Happy) Hendrix.

For Constable at Rochester, Precinct 5, the incumbent W. D. Loper is opposed by J. R. Morrow.

Largest number of candidates for a single office, six, seek the job of public weigher at O'Brien. They are Billie Wilcox, Marvin T. Robertson, C. B. Banner, Sam Johnston, R. H. Duncan, and Billy Gene Hudson.

The weigher job at O'Brien, in the heart of a banner cotton producing region, reportedly has paid as high as \$20,000 during a single season.

Also to be elected in the first primary is a county chairman of the Democratic Party to succeed John A. Couch, who did not place his name on the ballot for re-election. He has been a member of the Democratic Executive Committee for more than 40 years, and has served as county chairman during the major part of that time.

Haskell Black Indians slammed a 9-6 defeat on the Munday Moguls in that city last Sunday for their seventh win of the season, and will play the Snyder Black Tigers here Sunday in seeking their eighth victory.

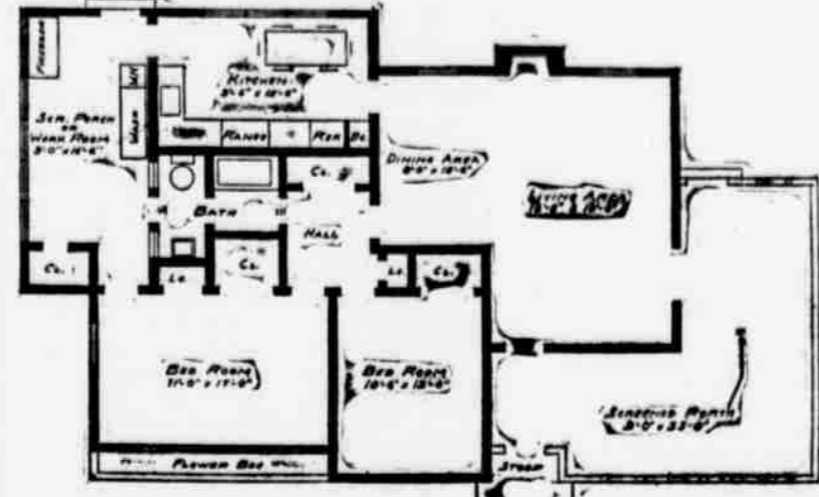

You will find the kitchen especially attractive. The counter space is well divided on both sides of the range and there is a broom closet. Family meals can be easily served in the kitchen.

The bedrooms are of very comfortable size. The master bedroom has two closets; the smaller bedroom has one. The large closet in the workroom and that in the bathroom hall will accommodate wraps and clothing which are not conveniently stored in the other closets.

Our plans show the screened porch or workroom enclosed, but ventilation. This enclosure is optional since the porch would be



very nice in milder climates when just screened; however, in cooler areas it would be more usable when enclosed.

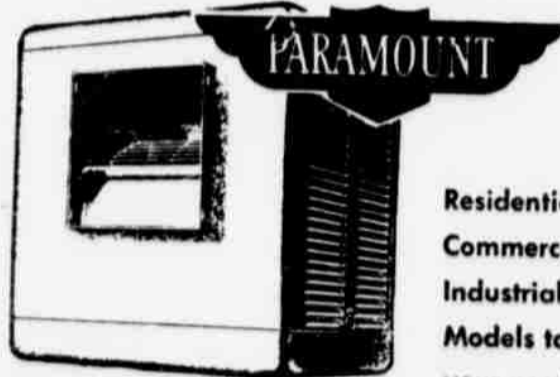

**Aug. 1 Deadline To File for Cotton Classing Service**  
Cotton farmers have seven more days to file applications for free classing and market service, according to H. J. Matejowsky, PMA's Abilene cotton office, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

He said group applications should be mailed to his office, P. O. Box 2001, Abilene, Texas, before the deadline date, August 1.

By filing applications early, farmers will be in position to take full advantage of these marketing services which are provided for them under the Sindhoxey Act.

If applications back up in the cotton classing office at deadline date and are delayed, some farmers who gin early may not be able to take advantage of these two benefits on their entire crop.

This is National Farm Safety Week and a mighty good time to plan the practices that will make your farm safe for the next 51 weeks. Don't be an accident victim.

**Use of Chlordane Will Rid Premises Of Cockroaches**  
A dime store paint brush and a few ounces of chlordane are the only tools you need to run off those pesky cockroaches, State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox advises.

But he says keeping them off is a bigger job.

Roaches are disease carriers from way back, the health officer pointed out. They've been found naturally infected with poliovirus. And that alone, is reason enough to declare war against the filthy ridden pests. Here's the way to do it.

First: Get a 2 per cent chlordane spray and a two-bit paint brush from the drug store. Then take all the pots, pans and dishes from the kitchen cabinet and wash them in soapy water.

Now paint the chlordane into all the cracks where join walls, and around the drain and water pipes. That's all—don't paint the whole cabinet. While the spray is drying in the cabinets, paint the corners of baseboards, behind the stove and the hot water heater where water and gas pipes enter the house.

Take off the motor panel of the refrigerator, and treat the floor and corners of the motor

compartment. Paint the walls behind the refrigerator, because roaches will hide any place they can find protection. Be sure to paint around bathroom pipes.

In older houses it's possible that roaches will be hiding in cracks between the wall boards and door and window frames. So don't pass up a crack because it looks too small to harbor roaches. The young insects are mighty small.

After the spray in the cabinets has dried thoroughly, cover the shelves where dishes and food are stored with paper.

You can get a can of caulking compound for just a few cents which makes filling cracks permanently an inexpensive process. Dig out some of the spray into cracks before sealing them up. This will kill ants, too.

All this will help you get rid of roaches, Dr. Cox emphasizes. But if you leave food exposed, they'll be back at the same old stand.

Fish in farm ponds may die from parasites and diseases, however, the shortage of oxygen is the most common cause of fish die-off in the summer time.

Serious drought conditions have both a short and long time effect upon agriculture. Immediate result is limited crop and livestock production.

## Quality Eggs Can Be Produced In Hot Weather

Quality eggs bring more money. This is especially true in the areas of the state where producers have an opportunity to sell on the basis of grade. According to F. W. Martin, county agent, the supply of quality eggs in the state at the present time is far below the demand. He urges egg producers to improve their egg handling practices so more quality eggs can be marketed.

The temperature of the freshly laid egg, he says, is above 100 degrees Fahrenheit and if the quality is to be maintained, rapid and thorough cooling is a must. Eggs will cool from 100 degrees F. in three hours when spread in a wire tray. It will take five hours for them to cool if held in a wire basket, twelve hours when held in solid pails and eighteen to twenty hours when held in an egg case.

Martin explains the effect of heat upon quality eggs this way. He says eggs 100 days old may be better than some eggs that are only three days old because eggs held at 99.6 degrees F. drop to B grade in three days or less. Eggs held at 77 degrees F. will usually hold up for at least eight days, when held at 45 degrees F. they are still tops at 65 days and they retain their top quality for 100 days when held at 37 degrees F. This, he says, clearly indicates that age does not affect the quality of eggs as directly as does the environment the egg receives.

The importance of humidity in the egg holding room is reflected in the fact that only 31 per cent of the top grade eggs will be maintained when the humidity is allowed to drop below 75 per cent and the temperature to rise above 65 F. The failure of egg producers and handlers to pre-cool egg cases, casing eggs before the animal heat is removed and marketing eggs less than twice per week greatly affect the percentage of high quality eggs marketed, says the specialist and thus reduces the economic return to both producers and handlers.

Here is another item that is often overlooked. It does make a difference whether the big or little end of the egg is placed down in the case. Research shows that only 73 out of 200 improperly packed eggs graded A or better out of 200 when packed and transported with the large end up.

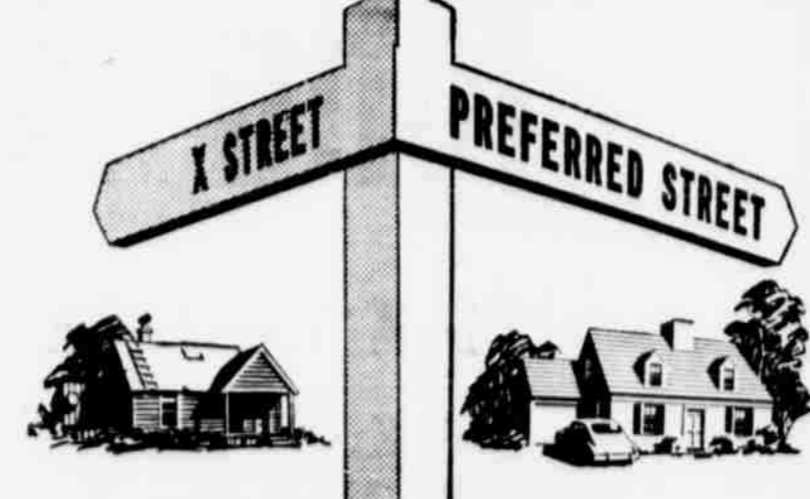

thing about getting quality eggs to market in the summertime and cites figures from the areas in which grading programs are operating to prove that it pays to produce and market quality eggs. Right now, he says, producers are averaging better than five cents per dozen more for their eggs where they are graded. He urges producers to participate in a quality egg program because it's a sure way to increase the returns from the poultry flock.

## Fly Control Top Need For Public Health

The control of the fly menace comes at the top of the list of necessary public health measures which should be applied by every city, community, and individual in the state, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The most effective measure for fly control is to prevent their breeding. Flies breed in filth and about eight days are required to complete a life cycle. During her life time of several months, one fly lays from 800 to 1,000 eggs.

To eliminate flies, breeding places must be destroyed. Manure piles, garbage, and other organic (in) sanitary requirements of moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise, they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drink, and by unwashed hands and utensils.

See that your windows, porches, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not molest your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.

The use of DDT and other sprays for the control of all varieties of adult flies and fly larvae have come into wide usage. However, their use should be, after all trash and breeding places have been eliminated. Otherwise, spraying will give only temporary relief and false sense of security.

## Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law, "Shall Change It or Repeal It" He Says

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it. (Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

A yen to get up into the wild blue yonder and stay there has resulted in a relatively rare peace-time job for Sue Persons, CAA control tower operator, according to an article in the July 13 issue of the San Antonio Light. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Persons of Haskell, she has worked in the San Antonio control tower since 1945.

Sue, 29, from Haskell, is one of the few remaining women operators in the nation's airport towers. Like many another U.S. career girl, she cast her fortunes with the CAA early in World War II when male employees were siphoned into the armed services.

Now she is in the exclusive group of only three women who scan the heavens and flip the switches in the little glass box nests at municipal airports in the southern region.

She has worked in the San Antonio tower since 1945 and first switched from a civil service clerk-typist's job to the CAA in 1942.

In the early days, when the government call for women was in its infancy, the aeronautics administration offered a 2-month training course for prospective aircraft control employees.

Sue went to classes in Fort Worth and learned, she relates: "The freshman facts about aeronautics—the introduction to cumulus and nimbus and other weather knowledge, plus the first steps toward understanding aircraft separation, approach control, VHS, ILS, MSL and other basic items."

Today she is as much at home in the air as any of her nine co-workers, all men, who call the signals with her at municipal airport.

She can interpret weather maps and instruments and separate almost anything that flies—guide ships to vacant altitudes as they approach the field.

She can "feed off the stack"—bring planes in one by one when several are jockeying to land—and knows how to rattle off minimum altitudes in terms of MSL (mean sea level).

ISL signifies instrument landing system. Sue explains, and the local airport is the only one in this district which boasts this type of radio-controlled equipment.

B-29s from Randolph AFB, practicing up on blind instrument-guided approaches, are among the most frequent callers for landing instructions via ILS.

The municipal tower can be contacted by plane over seven frequencies, Sue says—all of them VHF (very high frequency) and all of them identified by the actual number in megacycles.

By contrast, Randolph AFB and other bases identify themselves by the able-baker-etc. military code.

Although the major part of traffic control concern the 80 scheduled and non-scheduled daily flights at the airport, an ever-present sideline activity is the care and guidance of about 20 puddle-jumpers a day. Sue explains:

"There are the private ships without radios that fly around here during daylight hours. We have to signal them with the light gun—red for stop and green for go."

Sue is a pilot herself (she was licensed last year) and owns part of a plane in the Alamo Aerial club. She doesn't ever intend to make actual flying her chief





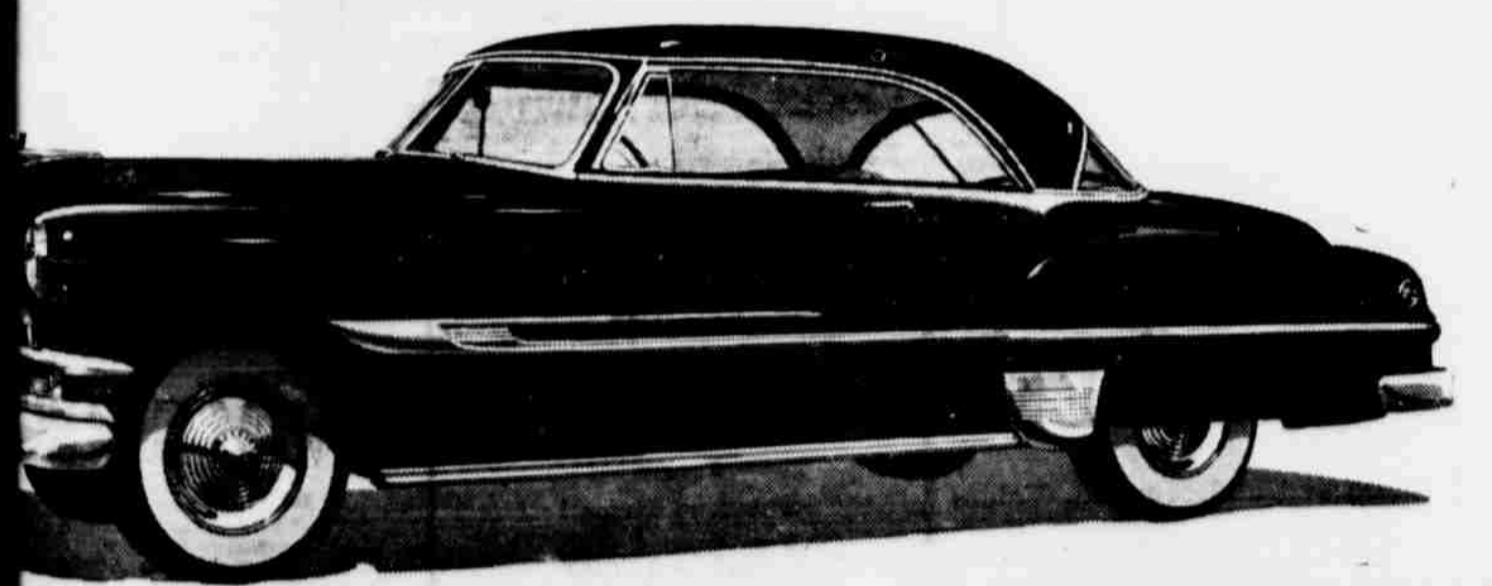
