## Additional Oil Tests Oil Activity In County

### Campaign Costs Ranging From \$8.85 To \$90.00 Listed In Candidate's Reports

Candidates for office in Haskell County have spent amounts ranging from \$8.85 upward to \$90.00 in campaigning for office, according to expense reports filed in the office of County Clerk Horace O'Neal. First report of campaign expenses was required to be filed May 27, followed with reports at 30 day intervals, the second due June 16.

Largest expense item listed on the reports was for newspaper advertising and printing, followed by money spent for gasoline and oil.

## New Water Well Is Tied Into City Water System

One of the new water wells completed by the city several weeks ago has been connected with the city mains and will be used in operation last Saturday, City Secretary T. J. Arbutle said Monday.

The well has a maximum output of 504,000 gallons of water daily, inners of the city water department estimated, based on tests made when the two wells were completed. The second well has been connected with city water mains but has not been placed in service due to abundance of water available from other wells that have been providing domestic water in the past.

Mayor Courtney Hunt said Tuesday that the two new wells had made available a reserve supply of water adequate to meet any demand that might arise.

## Rodeo Events Tuesday Night Attract Hundreds of Spectators

The first of a series of night rodeo programs planned at the John Wisdom arena east of Haskell was reeled off Tuesday night before an estimated 800 spectators from Haskell and neighboring towns.

The smooth-running show was declared one of the best programs of its kind staged in a number of years, and included a variety of contests and exhibitions that held attention of the hundreds of spectators for a full two-hour performance.

Top winners in the contest were John McCrary of Munday in calf roping, Claude Riley of Albany in bareback bronc riding, Twain Mickler of Haskell in brahma calf riding, and Jerry Christmas of Abilene in the cutting horse contest. Forty contestants were entered in the various events, and 27 men and women rode in the grand entry led by Haskell City Marshal Brooks Middleton.

Special events and exhibitions adding variety to the show included a cutting horse exhibition presented by John Wisdom, riding "Baldy J" using a second worlder horse "Rusty" working riderless and hazing for Wisdom after he had selected a calf from the herd, Rex Felker, Haskell C. of twirler with H-SU Cowboy Band gave an exhibition of twirling and trick roping, assisted by Thomas Sadler as rider in the stunt roping events.

In another feature event, the clover leaf barrel race, Lavada Reese placed first. Two other young women in this event were Opal Lee Wallace and Dwanna Matthews.

A similar program will be staged again next Tuesday evening, June 24, with the show starting at 8 o'clock.

## Ban On Dual Offices Cited To County Demo Committee

The right of several members of the County Democratic Executive Committee, including County Chairman John A. Couch, to serve on that body while holding other "offices of trust" was challenged Monday when the County Board met to estimate expenses of the July and August primaries and to apportion the cost among the various candidates.

In a group appearing before the committee after it had convened in the district courtroom were Mayor Courtney Hunt, Clarence Burson, John R. Watson, Sr., J. M. Crawford, Norman Nanny and Jim Ferguson. Citing provisions of the Texas Election Laws, members of the group called attention to the fact that County Chairman John A. Couch also was president of the County Board of School Trustees, and that Precinct No. 1 chairman Wm. P. Ratliff was now serving as 39th District Attorney after his appointment to that office last April. "Possibly other precinct chairmen also are school trustees, and thereby disqualified," a spokesman for the group pointed out.

## Weinert Lad, 12, Is Stricken By Polio

A twelve-year-old Weinert lad, Donald Griffin, was admitted to the polio ward of Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene for treatment of bulbar polio.

Donald, the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Griffin, and a 6th Grade student in the Weinert schools, became slightly ill Sunday. His parents brought the boy to the Haskell Hospital Monday, where physicians diagnosed possible symptoms of polio and advised that the young patient be carried to the Abilene hospital.

Physicians and attendants at Hendrick Hospital said Donald apparently had been stricken with a light attack. No evidence of paralysis had developed Wednesday, although Donald's eyes had been slightly affected, Haskell relatives were told.

Nine cases of polio developed in Haskell County last year, records of the Haskell Chapter of the National Polio Foundation show. In addition, the local Chapter had a carry-over of seven cases from 1950, where patients were still receiving treatment, Chapter officials said. All of the cases were of mild nature they explained.

## Drowning Takes Life of Former Haskell Man

Wilburn Barnett, Fresno, Calif. plumber who was born and reared in Haskell, drowned Sunday near that city, relatives here were advised Monday. Two companions with the former Haskell man also drowned, according to information received here. The three men were on a fishing trip and the tragic accident occurred around 6 p. m. Barnett's body was recovered at 8 p. m. Monday.

Barnett, 29, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. (Bill) Barnett, former Haskell residents who moved to Fresno some 10 years ago. The drowning victim was a Marine veteran of World War II.

Funeral service for young Barnett was held in Fresno Wednesday at 3 p. m., and burial was in that city.

He is survived by his wife; his parents; a brother, Billy Earl Barnett; and three sisters, Betty Jean, Frances, and Patricia, all of California.

Several uncles and aunts also survive, including Mrs. J. R. Barnett and Albert Barnett of Haskell.

## Ban On Dual Offices Cited To County Demo Committee

After a brief discussion, District Attorney Ratliff announced his resignation as Precinct 1 Chairman and member of the county committee. County Chairman Couch, after absenting himself from the committee session, returned and announced he had tendered his resignation as County School Trustee to Mrs. Iva Palmer, County Superintendent of Schools. He declared he had no intention of quitting his post as County Chairman.

Two other members of the county executive committee, Preston Weinert of Weinert and Pete Huntsman of Rochester, excused themselves from the committee session.

The executive session of the committee was resumed shortly before noon, with County Chairman Couch presiding. Other members present included C. A. Smith, secretary; Glenn Merchant, Pete Moeller, Wayne Perry, Alfred Rinn, V. A. Brown, J. C. Coleman.

Filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Ratliff, former County Judge O. E. Patterson was appointed chairman in Precinct No. 1.

### Wichita Valley Ry. Co. Merged Into FW&D System

Approval by Interstate Commerce Commission of proposed reorganization plan paved the way for Fort Worth and Denver Railway to assume ownership and control, effective 12:01 a. m. June 18th, of the Wichita Valley Railway and five other subsidiary companies of the Burlington Lines in Texas.

The Wichita Valley Company actually comprised three roads: the Abilene and Northern, Stamford to Abilene; Wichita Valley Railroad, Stamford to Wichita Falls; and Stamford and Northwestern Railway, Stamford to Spur.

The FW&D lines were Fort Worth & Denver Northern, Childress to Pampa; Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Railway, Childress to Lubbock; FW&D Terminal properties in Fort Worth; and former FW&DC Railway which under a change in name to FW&D in the new operating company of all the properties from Sixela, N. M., southward to Houston and Galveston.

The new company was known as Fort Worth and Denver City from the date of charter by the State of Texas May 26, 1873, until its charter was amended August 7, 1951, when the word "City" was dropped from the corporate name. At the same time, State of Texas approval was given to absorb the other companies.

The refinancing plan, approved by ICC, permitted the retirement of all outstanding indebtedness of Fort Worth and Denver Railway and Colorado and Southern Railway, owed to Reconstruction Finance Corporation or represented by bonds in the hands of the public. Final approval thus allowed FW&D to assume control of the properties under the new name, FW&D.

A Plan of Adjustment adopted in March 1943, has resulted in these railroads reducing bonded indebtedness from more than \$52,000,000 to \$17,000,000, the amount approved for retirement of all obligations.

Headquarters will continue to be located in Fort Worth and no change in present personnel is planned, it was announced by R. Wright Armstrong, vice president of the FW&D, Fort Worth.

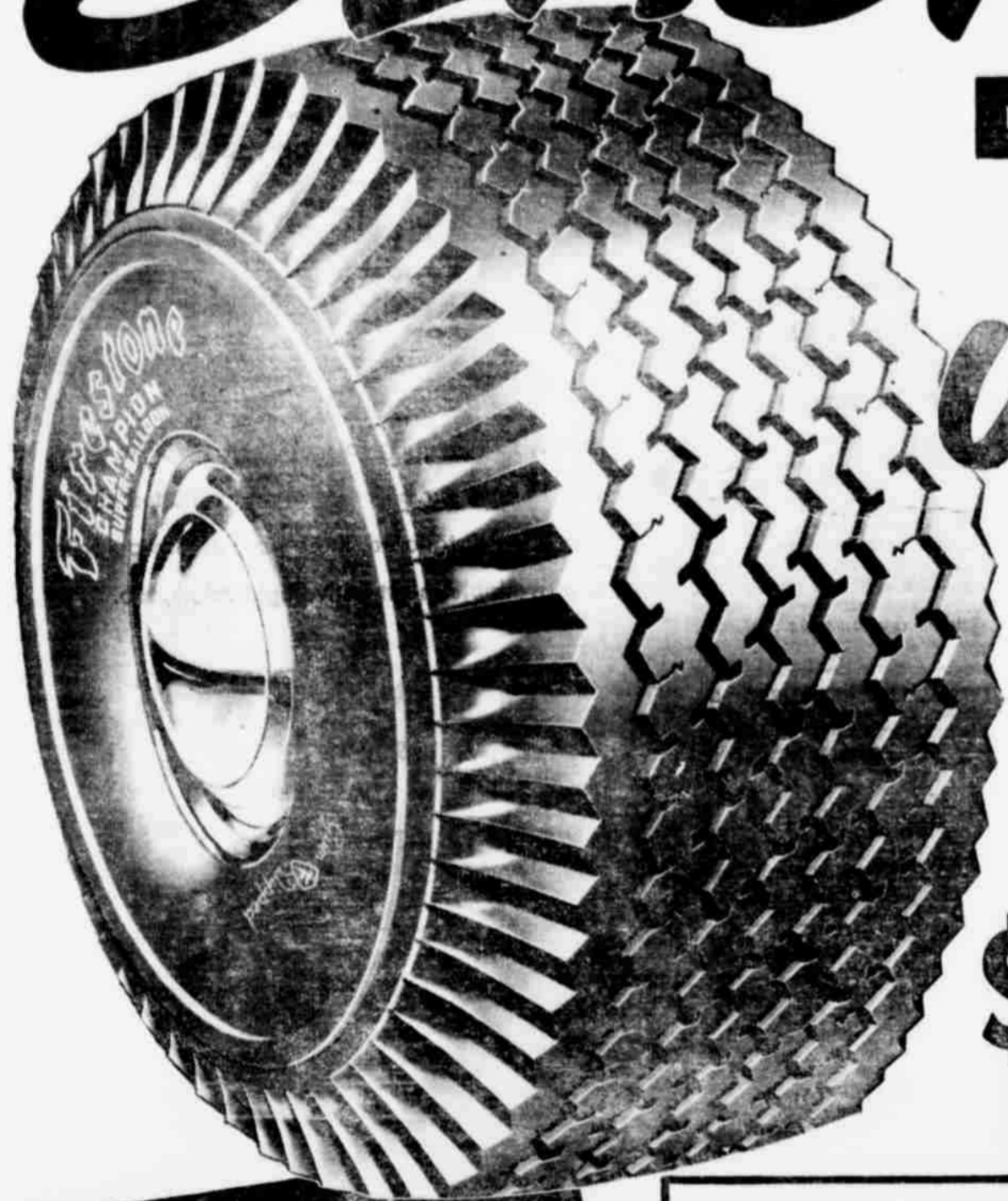

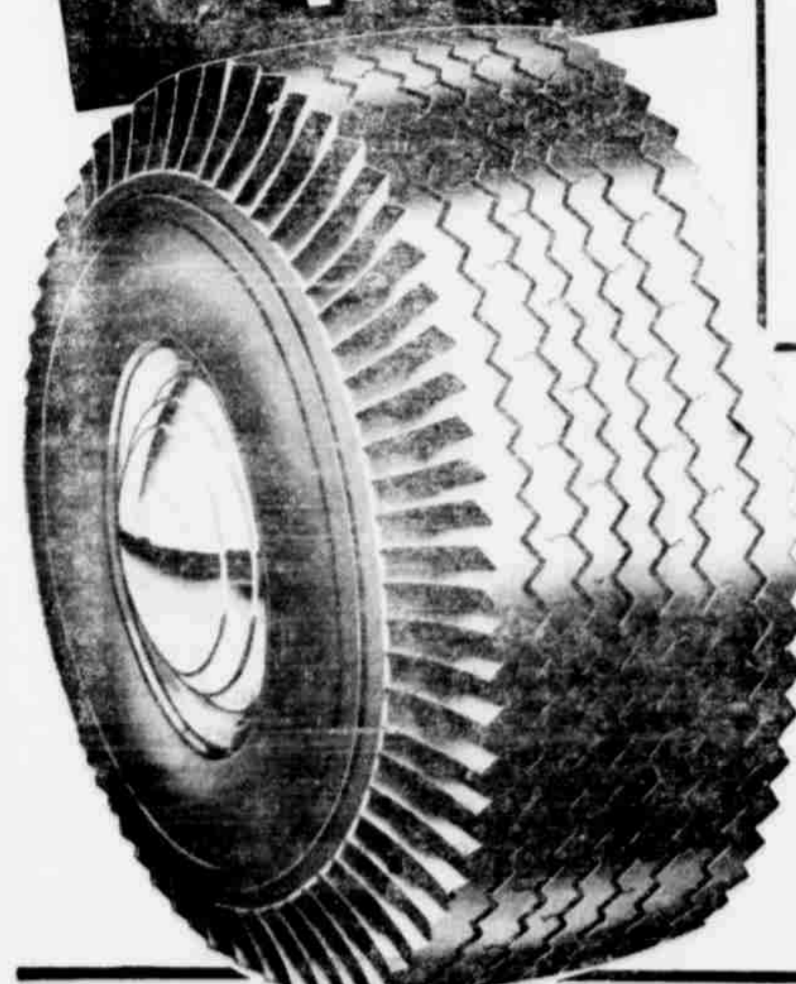

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### Dow Chemical Company, Vast Industrial Plant on Gulf, Visited by Newspapermen

The Texas Press Association took a look at the booming Brazos coast on June 14 as the guests of the Dow Chemical Co. Brazos County newspapers and the county's three chambers of commerce.

They visited Freeport and Lake Jackson as one of the features of the TPA's annual meeting in Houston.

A highlight of the visit was a tour of the 3,000-acre Dow plants, built in the 12 years since the refinery built here to extract magnesium and bromine from the seawater of the Gulf of Mexico. Now Dow makes 85 chemicals, employs 5500 people, and is in the midst of a large expansion program.

"We regard the frontiers of the district chemistry as still being unexplored," Dr. A. P. Beutel, Dow vice president and Texas division

general manager, said in welcoming the TPA. "In the years since Dow first came to Freeport, many chemical companies have also found that coming to Texas is mighty good business. It is good business for everybody concerned—this multiplication of nature's resources for the use of man by chemistry."

"Dow is working steadily to put many of nature's most bountiful and largely-neglected resources into the service of man," he continued. "Out of seawater, out of salt, out of natural gas—out of many other previously-unutilized fluids, minerals, and gases—have come hundreds of chemicals which help make our lives more enjoyable and secure."

The TPA members were guests at a barbecue at Lake Jackson and heard a musical program played by the famous Dow Community Band.

### Interest Grows In Improvement of Farm Unit

The continuing trend in farm unit and community improvement is toward unified action in family and community welfare and away from individual methods. Consolidation of rural schools and shifts in rural population have brought about renewed interest in community organizations for improvement with the farm family as the pivot.

Home management specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service point out in their 1951 annual report that county extension agents helped 212 families study their needs in relation

to current economic outlook and plan improvements for their farms and homes. In turn these families assisted 5,065 other families to make farm and home plans. Farm unit tours—138—were conducted and resulted in 2,658 families adopting improved home practices.

The specialists cite as an example of progress in the farm unit demonstration the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Belton Snider, Matagorda county. In 1950 the Sniders planned as their major goal a farm drainage system which they completed that year. Mr. Snider said this resulted in a 25 per cent increase in crop yields. At the end of 1951 new fences had been built, an insect control project started, 20 acres of legumes and 30 acres of cover crops planted. Just as much attention was given to plans for the family food supply and has resulted in 95

per cent of it being produced at home. The Sniders and their children, who are 4-H club members, are proud of their home and welcome all to see the improvements that have been made. Mrs. Snider is an active home demonstration club member and attends all leader training meetings where she gets up to date information on farm and home management.

When farm families were assisted with making their plans, the specialists stressed the importance of farm and home records. As a result, 2,238 farm unit demonstrators and 22,829 other families have set up a system of keeping farm and home records.

Statistics show that in 71 counties 1,383 leaders were trained in developing community programs. The 257 organized communities in Texas based their programs on goals set up to increase and man-

age family incomes, improve health conditions and services, make farm and home improvements and encourage participation in social activities. The specialists cite the Forest Chapel - Chicota community, Lamar County, as one that required and painted the community building and landscaped the yard; graveled the parking area and put the water system back into use. The general goals for the farms and homes of the community were to test pressure cookers; do homestead improvement; eradicate gophers and moles and expand the acreage of cover crops.

The community approach provides an opportunity for local, state and federal groups to coordinate their work in helping farm and ranch families solve their problems.

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### Draft Boards Begin Review of Student Deferments

Texas draft boards have started to tackle—or will soon tackle—the job of reopening and re-considering the cases of some 8,000 college students to determine their eligibility for further deferment to study.

A point stressed by Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, is that students desiring deferments for the next academic year should make written request to their local boards as soon as possible.

"If your present deferment is up," he advised students, "and you want to get it renewed, you had better ask for such renewal. A board isn't required to hand out deferments or give consideration to them unless the individual makes a request."

General Wakefield also advised students that colleges and universities are not required to advise a local board of a student's standing during the past academic year on the printed form provided for the purpose unless the student requests the educational institution to forward it.

"If the student wants this form—called SSS Form No. 109—forwarded by the school to support his request for deferment," Gen. Wakefield said, "it is his responsibility to ask the school to send it."

Most schools, colleges and universities are expected to have class standings figured and be in position to advise local boards within 30 days after the end of the academic year just concluded.

Local boards have been advised to wait 30 days for this information, and a "longer period when, in an exceptional case, more than 30 days is necessary."

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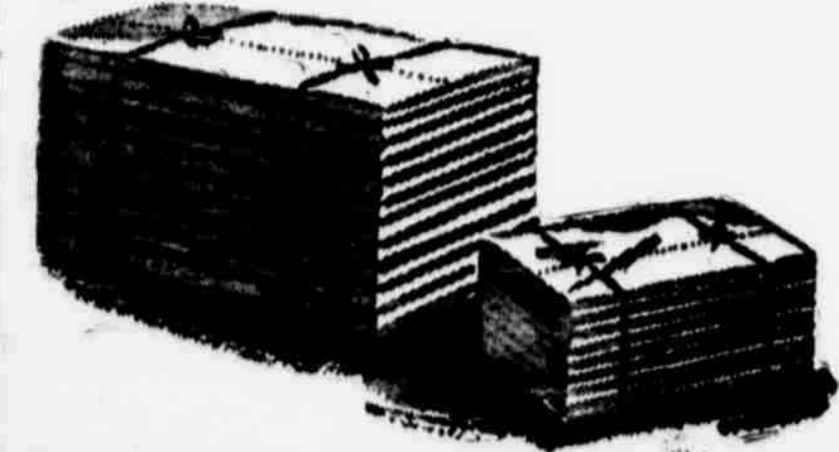
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
