## What is the best way to KILL BOLLWORM?

Close rival to the weevil as a destroyer of cotton, the bollworm has always been more difficult to control.

The mature bollworm in the illustration has been feeding inside the boll for several days. During this time the boll itself offers the protection that makes it extremely difficult to get a high kill with insecticides. For this reason, proper timing of insecticide application is essential: Early bollworm infestations must be treated as soon as worms are found; later broods should be treated within a day or two after hatching and while young worms are still feeding outside the boll. A good measure for this is when 4 to 5 small worms (or 10 to 15 eggs) are counted on 100 terminals.

As the bollworm season approaches, every cotton grower wants to know "What's the best insecticide?" Actually, no one chemical so far tried will provide top control of bollworm. But... field tests in widely separated areas prove that certain combinations of chemicals (chlorinated hydrocarbons) do give effective control. At the same time, these mixtures kill almost all other insects that destroy cotton.

A mixture of dieldrin and DDT, for example, is one of the most deadly bollworm killers of all... more lethal than either insecticide alone. Used as a dust or a spray, the combination provides excellent control with relatively small dosages. The same dust or spray gets the boll weevil, fleahopper, tarnished and rapid plant bug, grasshoppers and a host of other pests.

Where large areas of cotton must be protected from bollworm damage, and low cost is a primary consideration, aldrin-DDT mixtures provide profitable control at the lowest cost per acre.

Which combination is used, the timing and form of application (dust or spray) should follow the practice proved best in the area.

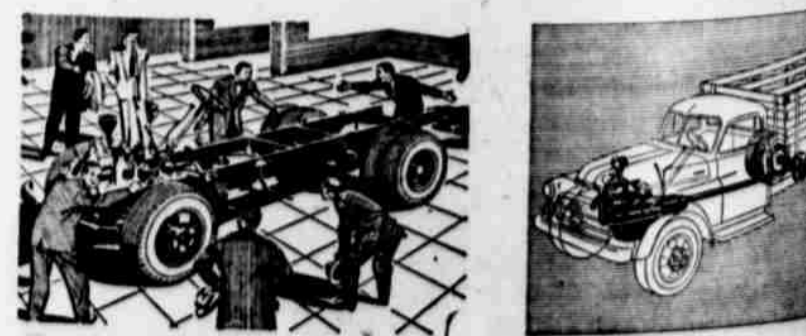

The Agriculture Department said Texas plantings of American-Egyptian cotton—the long-staple irrigated variety grown principally in extreme West Texas—totaled 35,000 acres, or 140 per cent of 1951 plantings.

Nationally, the department reported 26,051,000 acres of cotton in cultivation as of July 1.

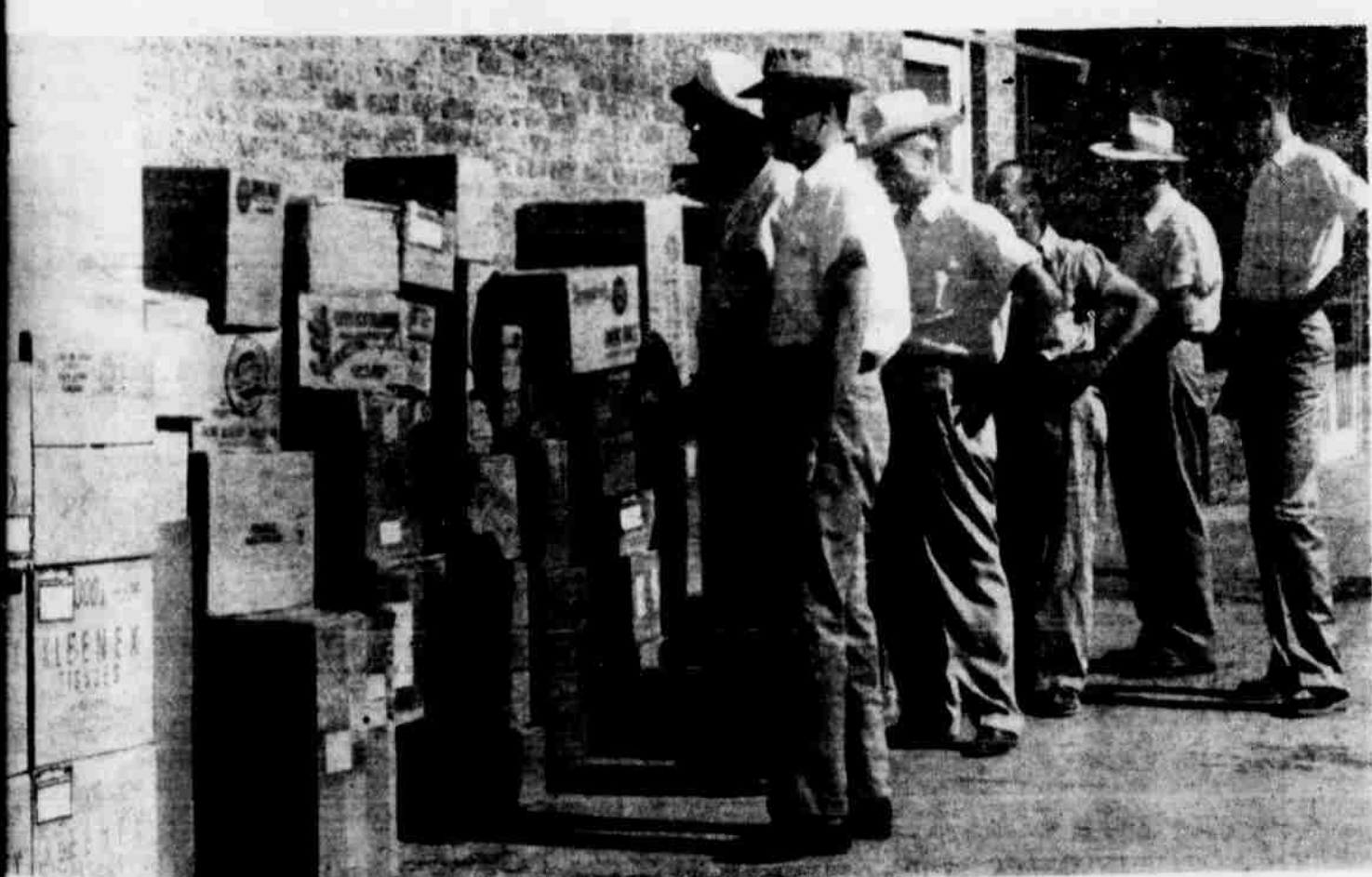

## Castor Beans Being Grown In 122 Texas Counties

Haskell County farmers who have planted castor beans this year for the first time will be interested in a report which has just been compiled covering castorbean plantings in the state. Up to June 25, 75,148 acres had been planted in 122 counties under the Commodity Credit Corporation program. In addition, the Baker Castor Oil Company has some 16,800 acres under contract in northwest Texas.

According to W. I. Ross, assistant agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, castorbean production is new to a majority of counties. The beans, says Ross, have been planted on many types of soils from light sands to creek bottoms and in many instances on land too low in fertility to make a fair return on any kind of a crop. Ross adds that producers no doubt will be disappointed from the returns where the beans have been planted on the low fertility soils. He says 11,884 acres are under irrigation and the remaining 63,263 acres under the CCC program are on non-irrigated lands.

He says the dry land acreage and where the Conner variety has been planted, the plants should be spaced from 24 to 30 inches in the drill. The Baker variety on irrigated land should be spaced not less than 12 inches apart in the drill. If the plants are left too thick in the drill, the specialist says the plants will be small and the size of the seed spikes reduced.

He offers this word of advice to producers, especially, in the counties where harvesting will soon be starting. Timing and correct harvesting methods are very important. Spikes should be cut from the plant because the stems contain excess moisture and this may cause the beans to mold. Do not harvest beans, he says until they have turned brown and white lengthwise cracks appear in the capsule wall. Timing the beginning of harvest is especially important with the first or summer spikes. When hand harvesting the beans, strip the capsules from the spike and protect the hands by wearing leather gloves. Growers are warned not to begin harvesting operations too soon and to keep foreign matter out of the beans at harvest time. Both practices may cause a dockage when the beans are marketed.

Ross says producers may obtain the latest production and harvesting information by contacting the local county agent or Production and Marketing Administration county office.

 person's pocketbook out of his pocket. He was looking for keys to his truck. Then we forced drugs (I think it was phenobarbital) down his throat to ease his pain.  
 "Not finding the keys we went to the shack and I tore off a screen and climbed in through a window. Stevens told me where the money was hidden but I dug around the floor but could not find it. Stevens got nervous so we started back to Amarillo."

Sheriff Freeman testified that when the statement was taken, Livesay told him where the pocketbook was hidden, where the gun was and where he had burned his blood-soaked clothing.  
 The officer then testified of recovering these articles with Livesay's help.  
 After this statement was read to the jury, Prosecutor Sharp read another made to him at Muleshoe in 64th District Court and witnessed by County Judge Cecil Tate. This statement was made on October 4, 1951, and varied little from the one made in Amarillo.

Defense Attorney H. J. Blanchard and W. R. Shaver, both of Lubbock and court appointed, put 14 character witnesses on the stand in behalf of the defendant. Livesay never took the stand.  
 Dr. J. H. Hanson of Plainview testified for the defense that he treated Livesay in 1947 for severe injuries received in a car accident which left him unconscious for four days.  
 Prosecutor Sharp in rebuttal testimony, had Dr. Richard O'Laughlin of Lubbock, a psychiatrist, testify he examined the defendant on Oct. 6, 1951 and found

him sane. There was no defense rebuttal.

### Plenty of Fresh Water A "Must" For Chickens

Chickens are not unlike humans during the hot days of summer. They like to be comfortable and a mighty important part of comfort, says Prof. E. D. Parnell, poultry husbandry department of Texas A&M College, is having plenty of cool fresh water to drink.  
 Water is usually plentiful on most farms but many flock owners fail, during the summer time, to provide their chickens this very important item. Parnell isn't guessing about the failure because he annually observes management practices used by many flock owners in Texas. Water is generally a pretty cheap item on the farm but when it is not provided in sufficient quantities, chickens just don't do well, he says.

He urges every poultryman to take another look at the poultry house equipment. Spot the things that are wrong. Study the flock as never before and chances are the changes made will insure greater profits from the flock.  
 Chickens not only like their water fresh and cool but they want it handy too, says the professor. If the fountain is more than 10 feet away from the chickens, it may go thirsty rather than make the trip. Check the location of fountains as well as the total supply of water and add fountains if they are needed.  
 Parnell points out that it is sometimes necessary to give medicine to the flock in the drinking water but warns there's a danger in doing it. He says some drugs just don't taste good to chickens and turkeys and they quit drinking. Watch the birds carefully when medication is used in the water, and if they quit drinking, better find another way to give the medicine, says Parnell for unless they drink lots of water, there'll be few eggs or little meat produced.

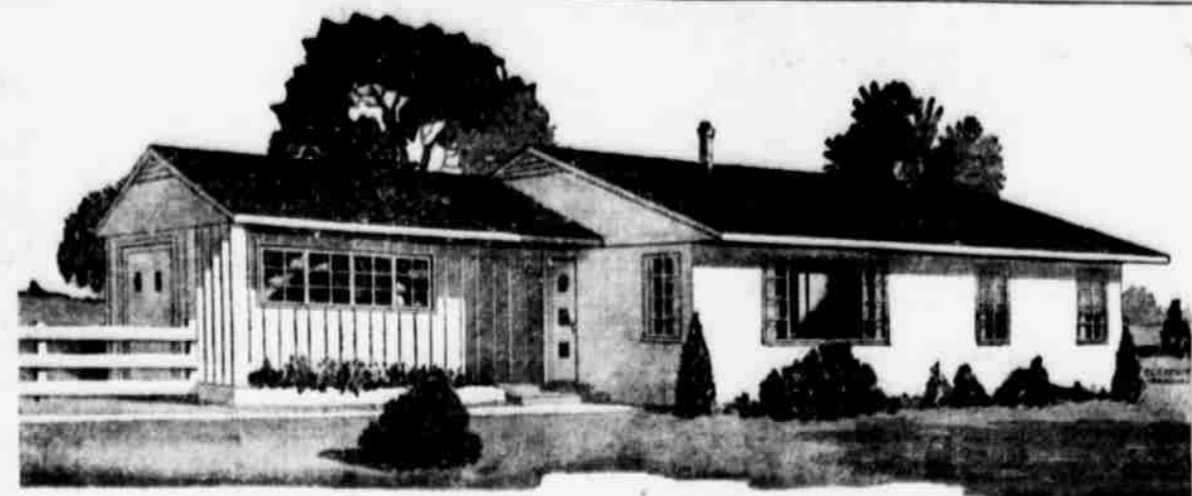

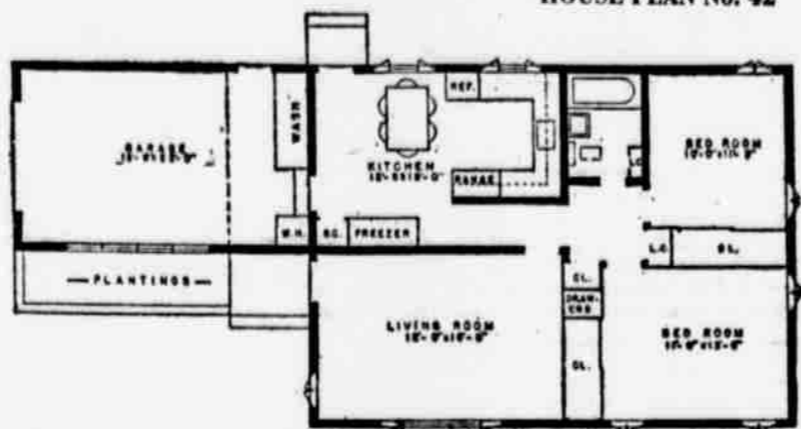

## Cotton Classing Service Direct Help To Farmer

Farmers have better bargaining power in selling their cotton if they know the grade and staple, according to H. J. Matejowsky, who is in charge of the Abilene cotton classing office, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.  
 Best and most economical way to get your cotton classed is to join a cotton improvement group, he points out.  
 This a group of farmers organized primarily to promote the improvement of cotton. When they organize, adopt a variety of cotton, file an application, arrange for sampling and meet certain other requirements, the group is eligible for benefits of the Smith-Doxey Act.  
 These benefits include classification for group members and USDA price quotation sheet. Both are provided without cost. Group application forms may

be obtained from the county PMA office, county agent or ginners. After all members have planted their cotton, the application should be mailed to the Abilene cotton classing office. Deadline for taking applications is August 1st.

**Majority of Adults Have Overcome Virus of Polio**  
 It is believed that the majority of adults have at one time been infected by the virus of poliomyelitis, usually without manifestations, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. In view of the above it is expected that most of the recognized cases will be among children.  
 Only a small proportion of infected persons are clinically recognizable. When symptoms are manifested, they usually comprise an acute illness with fever, headache, and almost always characteristic stiffness of the neck and spine. Some degree of paralysis may or may not occur during the first few days of illness.  
 During the poliomyelitis season the following measures are recommended:  
 1. Insist upon safe waste disposal so that human excreta is not exposed to disease transmitting vectors.  
 2. Insist on elimination of fly breeding sources and do not depend upon community wide airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for basic sanitation.  
 3. Food supplies, including milk, must be protected against contamination.  
 4. Always demand safe water for drinking or swimming pools.  
 5. Insist that garbage be kept in covered containers and disposed of by incineration or sanitary fill.  
 6. Eliminate all insanitary conditions on your own premises.  
 7. Practice good personal hygiene, with particular attention to personal cleanliness.  
 8. Avoid excessive physical strain during poliomyelitis season.  
 9. Isolation in bed of all children with fever pending diagnosis by physician.

**Hints to Lighten Packing for The Vacation Trip**

Certain travel tricks make vacation time a happy experience. Minnie Bell, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers a few of these tricks as suggestions to vacation-bound travelers.  
 Don't take more items than needed. This advice is heard over and over again but still the luggage is over loaded with unnecessary cosmetics, clothes and other items. Plan the articles to take by making a list of the places to be visited and the clothes needed. Clothes that travel best are dark prints, soft finished wools, new crease resistant cottons, linens and rayons. Choose accessories that will go with several costumes and cut the shoe and bag problem to a minimum.  
 A make-up kit is almost a must unless there is a fitted overnight bag. Using small plastic bottles and jars eliminates breakage and stick-perfume never spills. Miss Bell says the purse size whisk broom which is no larger than a lip stick often comes in handy. And a traveling iron with a handle that folds over takes up very little space.  
 A hanger with a few clothes pins is useful for drying hose and other small pieces of clothing. One or two plastic or rubber lined envelopes should be included for wet wash rags and soap and a small roll of scotch tape may save the day... use it for a quick mend.  
 In the bottom of the suitcase pack the heavy and bulky articles, such as the iron, shoes and jewelry case. The specialist advises using plenty of tissue paper between articles and in corners. Fill up the depressions with lingerie, she adds.  
 If these suggestions are followed, Miss Bell says the vacationer will leave with a light heart as well as a light suitcase and have a carefree time while gone.

Social Security Representative To Be Here July 17

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Haskell at the Chamber of Commerce at 11 a. m. on Thursday, July 17. Persons wishing to file retirement claims or survivor's claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call at that time.

The social security office is receiving quite a few inquiries from persons over 65 asking whether they are required to pay the social security tax. Mr. Fisher states that there is no age limit in connection with social security taxes. Every person who is employed on a job coming under his social security pays his social security tax and receives credit on his social security account regardless of how young or how old he is. The same is true of those persons who are now under social security because they are self-employed.

Texas H-D Club Women Back Civil Defense Plan

In 1951, a Civil Defense program was initiated by Texas home demonstration club women. By July, defense chairmen had been appointed in 110 counties and 965 clubs had defense leaders. Maxine Hearn, state home demonstration leader, gives further facts on the development of the program.

She says participation by the women is voluntary and they receive training in first aid and home nursing from Red Cross instructors. Other emergency activities are blood typing, designating first aid stations and locating hospital and sick equipment. Each family is urged to set aside clean linens for one sick bed and make lists of friends and relatives in cities whom they might care for in an emergency. This training and information comes in handy in any kind of emergency such as fires, tornadoes and floods.

As an example of what has been done, Miss Hearn gives results from a few counties which have been sent in by county home demonstration agents. Leon County now has 27 trained Civil Defense leaders who have completed courses in home care of the sick and civil defense. Mrs. Wilma Adams, county HD agent, says the goal of these leaders is to give every woman in Leon County an opportunity to receive the training. There are no hospitals and very few doctors in the county. Because of this situation the leaders appreciate the training and are giving their time to train others.

Audrey Russell, district agent, reports 17 Civil Defense classes have been taught in nine counties of the extension District II, with 180 persons trained. These leaders are passing this information to friends and neighbors.

A course in first aid helped Mrs. J. T. Reynolds, Nolan County home demonstration club member when her small son broke his arm. She put the arm in splints before going to the doctor and was complimented on her skill.

A total of 4, 313 free chest x-rays were given in Ward County. More than 100 women working closely with the county chairman were responsible for this large number. An intensive survey in the county made the people tuberculosis conscious and desirous of being x-rayed.

Community cooperation with state health organizations resulted in 122,103 persons having chest x-rays or examinations at well-baby, pre-school, and food-handlers clinics.

Typing blood has been successful in Johnson County. Mrs. John Coke, civil defense chairman, re-

veals that 478 people have had their blood typed and the list is growing.

In San Patricio County, Mrs. L. R. Sarglee, county defense chairman, is working with the chairman of the American Cancer Society in securing sick room supplies for lending. These supplies are stored in a room set up for that purpose in the home of the chairman. Mrs. Standlee has been instrumental in getting defense chairmen in every club in the county.

Henderson County sponsored by Home demonstration clubs in

a Red Cross course in first aid which was taught by a local physician and highway patrolman. Six women who attended received certificates which entitled them to enroll in an instructors course taught by Jim Hamilton from Red Cross headquarters, St. Louis, Mo.

Miss Hearn says these stories can be duplicated in many Texas counties. She feels home demonstration women realize the need for training in civil defense and are assuming their responsibility for mobilizing to make America strong.
