Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Bland, longtime residents of Haskell who are making their home in San Angelo temporarily, observed their golden wedding anniversary Monday, April 21.
And if they had had their way 50 years ago, they would have reached a half century of married life two days earlier.
But they met with opposition on that April 19, in 1902. Mrs. Bland, the former Miss Minnie Lee Pippin, made her home with her uncle and aunt. Her aunt was Mrs. Bland's mother's sister, and the uncle was Mr. Bland's brother. And it was the brother who objected to the marriage.
The prospective groom found that he could not obtain a marriage license in Navarro or Ellis Counties as his brother had given authorities definite instructions. But the young man was not to be deterred too long, so he informed his brother rather definitely, secured his license, and the couple were married April 21, 1902.
Mr. Bland was born in Ellis County on Jan. 10, 1881, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram E. Bland. His wife was born Jan. 2, 1885. She is the daughter of the late Ace Pippin and Mrs. M. M. Miller, who now resides in Dallas.
After their marriage, they farmed near Ennis for a while, later moving to Haskell. They lived in Haskell until their arrival in San Angelo last fall. Both are in ill health and make their home there with a daughter, Mrs. H. M. Martin, and Mr. Martin. They still maintain their home in Haskell, however, and own ranching and farming interests near here. A son, Buck Bland, is caring for the farm.

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Petition Filed Contesting Recent Kent County Courthouse Election

A petition was filed in 39th District Court at Clairmont Saturday contesting the March 29 election in which a proposal to move the courthouse from Clairmont to Jayton failed by one vote.

Judge Ben Charlie Chapman of this city is judge of the 39th district.

The petition, signed by 23 persons, is filed against the Kent County Commissioners Court and the Kent County Attorney, R. C. Hamilton. It alleges voting irregularities including persons voting out of the proper precinct, challenges length of residence of some voters, and questions the vote of two persons on citizenship grounds.

The petition is signed first by M. V. Jay, Jayton Ford dealer. Second and third signatures are by G. L. Hamilton, Jayton dirt contractor and C. C. York, Jayton rancher. The petition was filed by Wilson, Wilson & Logan, San Angelo attorneys.

Vote in the March 29 election was 610 for moving the courthouse to Jayton and 308 for leaving it in Clairmont. A two-thirds majority of 611 for moving, was required for the proposition to carry.

Kent County Judge Euel D. Harrison said the opposition had 20 days to file an answer. Judge Harrison said the petition questioned the citizenship of D. G. Brooks of Girard and of T. McGuffey. Judge Harrison said he did not know where McGuffey lived.

Local Church To Join In Observing Lutheran World Action Sunday

Trinity Lutheran Church here will join May 4 with 100,000 other Lutheran congregations throughout the United States in observing Lutheran World Action Sunday in giving an offering for spiritual and material aid in this country and overseas. The Rev. B. F. Gaskamp, pastor of the congregation, will emphasize this phase of church work in Sunday's program.

100,000 Lutherans in 51 churches around the world will be sending delegates to the second quinquennial assembly of the Lutheran World Federation to be held in Hanover, Germany, July 25 to August 3.

The local church is one of more than 10,000 affiliated with the eight Lutheran bodies participating in the National Lutheran Council, the agency which supervises the gathering and distribution of Lutheran World Action funds. The Council's participating bodies are the United Lutheran Church in America, the Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Augustana Lutheran Church, the Lutheran Free Church, the Suomi Synod, the United Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Lutheran World Action goal for 1952 is \$2,900,000. This is the 12th year LWA has been in operation. Members of the Trinity Lutheran Church will contribute mostly through a budget system. Direct contributions will also be made. In addition to the cash gifts, it has gathered several hundred pounds of used clothing and shoes, which have been shipped abroad by Lutheran World Relief, material aid arm of LWA, and LWR gifts since 1940 exceed \$51,000,000.

Of the 1952 goal, \$350,000 has been earmarked for spiritual service to Lutheran men and women in the armed forces. This ministry is conducted by the Council in cooperation with the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and provides pastoral care for service personnel while they are in training camps in this country and on duty abroad.

The program at present includes 32 service centers and nearly 100 contact pastors in the United States, Alaska, Panama Canal Zone, Formosa, and Hawaii. It provides religious literature and helps home congregations keep in touch with their members in service.

A friend of Mrs. Britton gave her a discarded three piece overstuffed living room suite. She reconditioned it by re-tinting the springs and putting in new padding. It took 30 yards of material to make the slip covers. Mrs. Britton says, "I have saved more than \$100 by reconditioning the furniture and making the slip covers. The covers are beautiful. I don't know when I have enjoyed a task more nor received such satisfying results."

Four neighbors helped with the work and 12 have seen the finished results. At present two other club members are making slip covers.

Miss Sealy says that Mrs. C. C. Homan of the Country Club district, has reconditioned and upholstered a divan with the help of 12 neighbors. She intended to make a slip cover but after finding a good buy in material she decided to upholster it instead. The total cost of the completed divan was \$50 and has an estimated value of \$125. The results of the demonstration were shown when Mrs. Homan was hostess to her home demonstration club.

According to Miss Sealy members of the Canutillo home demonstration club are making plans to obtain a room in the local gin to use as a work shop. The members then can, on certain days, come and work on their individual pieces of furniture.

Information on reconditioning furniture, upholstering and making slip covers can be obtained from the local home demonstration agent.

Project Undertaken For Protection of Bob White Quail

AUSTIN — The Texas Game and Fish Commission and farmers and ranchers are working together in a project designed to help the bobwhite quail in its fight for survival.

This popular game bird has decreased in numbers because of depletion of food and protective cover on extensively cultivated farms and heavily grazed ranges.

One method which is being used to help restore these vital needs is explained by the Commission's director of Wildlife Restoration.

The Game and Fish Commission has established a nursery near Buna, where bicolor lespedeza plants are grown. These plants, which provide quail with splendid shelter and an abundance of food when properly cared for and cultivated, are distributed without charge to farmers and ranchers.

Several years ago when the value of bicolor lespedeza for quail was established, the demand immediately began to exceed the limited supply of seeds and plants. The shortage still exists.

Last year the Game and Fish Commission's nursery produced 392,000 plants at a cost of \$3.53 per thousand. The purchase of 200,000 more by the Commission at a cost of \$8 per thousand still failed to meet the demand.

However, the nursery was able to increase production from 129,000 plants during the 1950-51 season to 392,000 this year, and there are hopes for further increases next fall.

Persons receiving plants must agree to plant them properly, to fence them against livestock, and to cultivate them.

"Proper game management is never an easy job," the Director of Wildlife Restoration points out. "However, the demand for bicolor lespedeza seems to indicate there are many Texans willing to work hard in order to keep the bobwhite in our state."
