They fed children and teenagers who did not have enough to eat, and on their own time, watched out for kids and assisted in keeping them out of trouble."

Many players still keep in touch with Coach Overton, decades after their high school years. Coach said, "I realized early in my career that I could do nothing more important than to work with young people. It was a thrill to watch them play football on Friday nights, but that's nothing compared to watching them live their lives today."
