

Western Day Sept. 5 Expected Attract Record Attendance

Four thousand persons are expected to attend the "Western Day" street arena activities sponsored by the local Saddle Tramps. The second annual event will be held here on Sept. 5th when a much larger street parade and bands is expected to attract a large crowd of spectators.

Of ten contestants in the night performance, the one who will begin at 8 p. m. in the arena will be the one who is expected to have the most spectacular performance.

Mr. Eastland died unexpectedly at 5:30 a. m. Friday. He became ill at his home about 11 p. m. Thursday and was admitted to the hospital of which he was manager about 4:30 a. m. Friday.

Mr. Eastland was born June 5, 1913, in Haskell County. He had lived here all his life except for three years service with the Army Air Corps during World War II.

He was married to the former Miss Elyse Bradley of Haskell on April 20, 1940.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church here and a member of the Board of Stewards of that church. He had been a member of the Methodist Church since the age of 10.

He entered the Army Air Corps in October, 1942 and served in the European Theater spending most of the time in Germany. He was discharged in December, 1945. He was a member of the American Legion.

Mr. Eastland was graduated from Haskell High School in 1933. He was employed as assistant manager of the Brazelton Lumber Co. here before entering the service. Upon his discharge, he sought the office of Haskell County treasurer and was elected in 1947. He served in that capacity until 1950, when he did not seek re-election.

He was named manager of the Haskell County Hospital early in 1951. He had served in that job until his death.

Survivors are his wife, a daughter, Jan Eastland of Haskell; his mother, Mrs. Sue Eastland of Haskell; two brothers, Ray Eastland of Stamford and Holt Eastland of Wickert, Texas.

Active pallbearers were Bud Herren, Wallace Kimbrough, Cecil Gregory, Clay Smith, Gene Campbell, Viars Felker, R. C. Couch, Jr., and Robert Simmons of Spur.

Named as honorary pallbearers were members of the board of stewards of First Methodist Church, the Haskell County Hospital board members, all doctors on the hospital staff, the hospital nursing staff, members of the Commissioners Court and county officials.

New \$80,000 County Jail Is Authorized By Commissioners

Commissioners Court of Haskell County, meeting in regular session Tuesday with all members present, approved an order calling for the erection of a modern new county jail building and employed a Fort Worth firm of architects for the proposed new building.

Cost of the proposed new jail building is estimated at approximately \$80,000 by the architects, Scott, McDonald & Harrell of Fort Worth. Paint Creek Power Station In Operation By WTU

West Texas Utilities Company's 33,000 KW unit was put in service at the Company's Concho power plant in San Angelo. At the present time West Texas Utilities Company has five major steam generating stations, 1 gas turbine plant and fourteen standby oil engine plants. The Concho station at San Angelo has a capacity of 65,000 KW; the Abilene station, 32,000 KW; the Pauline station near Quanah, 49,000 KW; the Rio Pecos station near McCamey, 18,000 KW; and the new Paint Creek station, 33,000 KW. The Fort Stockton gas turbine plant has a capacity of 5,000 KW; and the fourteen standby oil engine plants can generate 10,470 KW.

Haskell County History

20 Years Ago—Aug. 31, 1913
A deed was filed yesterday by Hardy Grissom and G. C. Carothers changing title to 8,000 acres of land in Haskell County. The land is part of the Colbert Ranch property known as the old Queenie Taylor Ranch and was recently acquired by the Dallas Joint Stock Land Bank.

A truck was backed up to the barn of R. H. Rife, farmer living near Sagerton, Friday night of last week and about 50 bushels of wheat was hauled away. Mr. Rife was in town Monday morning and reported the theft to officers who are working on the case.

Deeds transferring the title to the second largest ranch in Haskell County this week, were filed in the office of County clerk Jason W. Smith Tuesday morning. The property consisted of 12,353 acres in the southeast corner of Haskell County, and a portion of the property in Shackelford County. The lands comprised the old Proctor Ranch and were bought by T. G. Hendrick of Taylor County. The consideration was

given at 153,000 and the deed required \$161 of government revenue stamps.

A. H. Wair and L. B. Watson have purchased the gin plant of the Farmers Gin Company from the Haskell National Bank and other mortgage holders and are rebuilding the plant and placing the gin in shape for the coming season.

In the statewide election held last Saturday, Texas was the 23rd state to vote for prohibition repeal, also legalizing sale of 3.2 beer.

Haskell County voters said "no" on local option, relief bonds, legalizing beer, and repeal of the 18th amendment. They approved the amendment exempting homesteads up to \$3,000 from State and County taxation, and the

Home Rule amendment. A one cent advance per gallon in the price of gasoline has been announced by distributors of all major refineries. Prevailing prices for the three grades of gasoline handled by local stations are fifteen and one-half, eighteen and one-half, and twenty and one-half cents per gallon.

Paint Creek station was begun early in 1952, the generating unit itself was actually ordered in 1950. The general contractor for the plant was the Austin Building Company with R. V. Sass serving as West Texas Utilities Company's

construction engineer. A staff of 22 under the direction of C. O. Holt, Chief Engineer and J. R. Cook, Assistant Engineer, operate the plant on 3 eight-hour shifts 7 days a week. In June, heavy rains in the Haskell-Stamford - Hamlin area poured water into the Paint Creek Reservoir providing enough water for the operation of the plant. The plant uses water principally for cooling and condensing steam. Water at the rate of 30,000 gallons per minute is pumped from the lake on one side of the plant through the condensers and returned to the lake on the other side of the plant. Other than for sanitary purposes, the plant consumes very little water. Engineers point out that the water merely comes in contact with clean polished brass tubes and is in no way contaminated by plant use. While the plant is now classed as a working unit, actually a great deal of construction and other types of work remain to be done. The plant personnel estimate that it will require many weeks putting on the "finishing touches."

The building is of structural steel, masonry and brick, 100 feet by 76 feet, and is equivalent to a four-story structure in height. The entrance to the plant is double-doors into a small lobby. Directly in front is a door leading into the locker room, showers, wash room and rest rooms. On the right is the stairway to the second story. At the top of the stairway is another small lobby, with doors leading into the offices of the assistant chief engineer, and plant clerk record room. Joining on the west is the office of the chief engineer. On the east of the lobby is the entrance to the employees' meeting room; and

on the north is the entrance to the turbine room. On the south end of the turbine room, adjoining the meeting room is the plant laboratory, and on the opposite side are the rest rooms and kitchenette. The small kitchen is equipped with a double sink, a Frigidaire refrigerator and a three plate electric range. This has been included so that the employees can warm up their lunch, prepare coffee and serve light snacks. Looking north toward the temporary wall of the plant building, on the right is the 33,000 KW General Electric steam turbine generator. On the left are the switchboards and control panels and to the left of these are the controls of the Babcock & Wilcox semi-out-door type steam boiler. It has a capacity of 300,000 pounds of steam per hour, operating at 875 pounds per square inch of pressure at a temperature of 900F degrees. It is fired with natural gas, and is also equipped for fuel oil operation. The substation is located east of the plant building; the big boiler and stack are on the west side a short distance from the cribhouse over the inlet canal. A steel stairway leads from the turbine room to the basement in which are located the machine shop, pumping equipment and other gear necessary in the operation of a modern steam generating plant. On the east side of the basement is the big Allis-Chalmers condenser. There are two entrances to the basement on the west side, and one on the east side. Double doors open on the north side into the excavation which has been made for the installation of a second generating unit at the plant. Installation of the second unit is scheduled to begin in 1954. Just east of the substation is a landing field which will accommodate small aircraft. North of the plant grounds two modern homes have been built which are occupied by the assistant chief engineer and the plant maintenance foreman. A caliche-topped road from the plant intersects a farm-to-market road to Haskell where the majority of the employees and their families are now living.



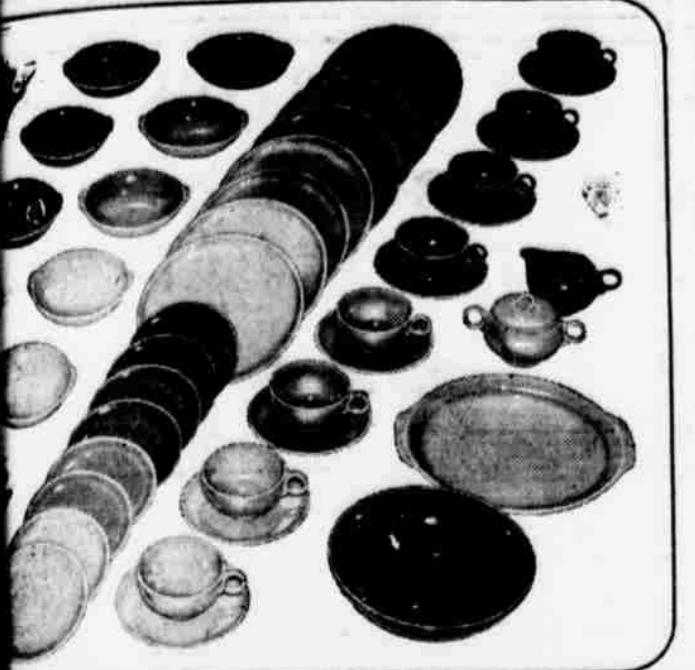

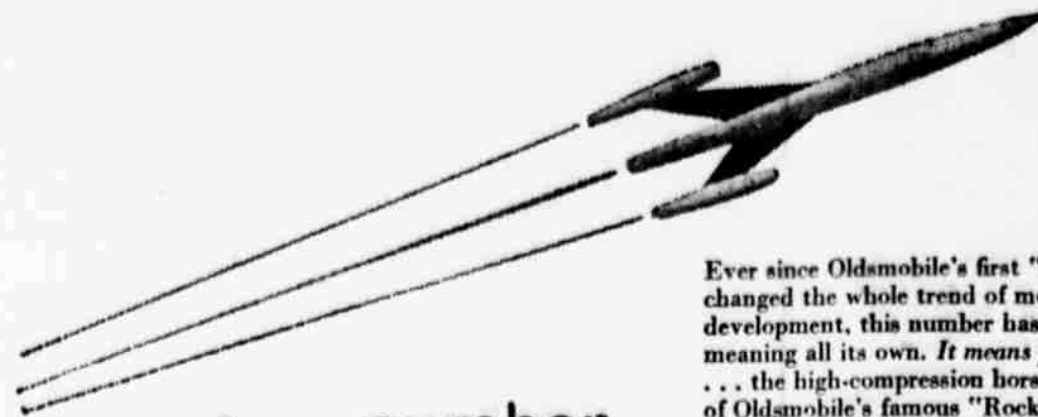

Inadequate Vision Serious Handicap To School Child

This fall 30 million children are on their way back to school and you, as a parent, hope for your child's success in school. Now, here's a simple question: On what will your child's good work in class mostly depend? The answer is reading.

In a recent study at the Public School Reading Clinic at St. Louis, Mo., inadequate vision was found to be the most serious handicap in learning to read.

The College of Optometry at Ohio State University ran a survey on approximately 1000 children using the old letter chart with the following results: 55 per cent of the farsighted; 45 per cent of the nearsighted and 25 per cent with astigmatic or distorted vision were able to pass the test. This significantly points out that the old letter test is inadequate.

Some children cannot read very well within arms length where most of their school work is done, which makes it very difficult for the two eyes to work together. Advanced techniques and modern instruments are used to uncover and correct these visual handicaps.

fects, the Court employed F. L. Peavy of this city as supervisor on the project.
As soon as the preliminary legal work is completed, Judge Turnbow said advertisements for bids would be published and date set for awarding contract for the new building.
Cost of the proposed new jail will not result in any increase in taxes or the county tax rate, the county judge explained.
Financing will be through the issuance of Time Warrants in the amount of \$80,000, Judge Turnbow explained. Later these warrants will be converted into Refunding Bonds, and the County will purchase approximately \$60,000 worth of the bond issue with surplus funds of the County Road & Bridge and the Courthouse and Jail Improvement Funds, he said.
County officials have the assurance of C. N. Burt Bond Company of Dallas that the Dallas firm will purchase any remaining bonds that cannot be bought by the County, Judge Turnbow said.
The proposed new jail will be built on the site of the present jail, which will be razed and all usable equipment salvaged and sold.
The new structure will be a one-story brick veneer building and the front section will be designed to provide adequate living quarters for a jailer and family. A connecting corridor will lead to the jail section, which will provide accommodations for a maximum of 40 inmates, including separate divisions for women and a juvenile ward.
The present jail, which occupies the second and third floors of a three-story brick building, does not have facilities for segregation of women inmates or juveniles.
The new building will include all modern facilities, including
