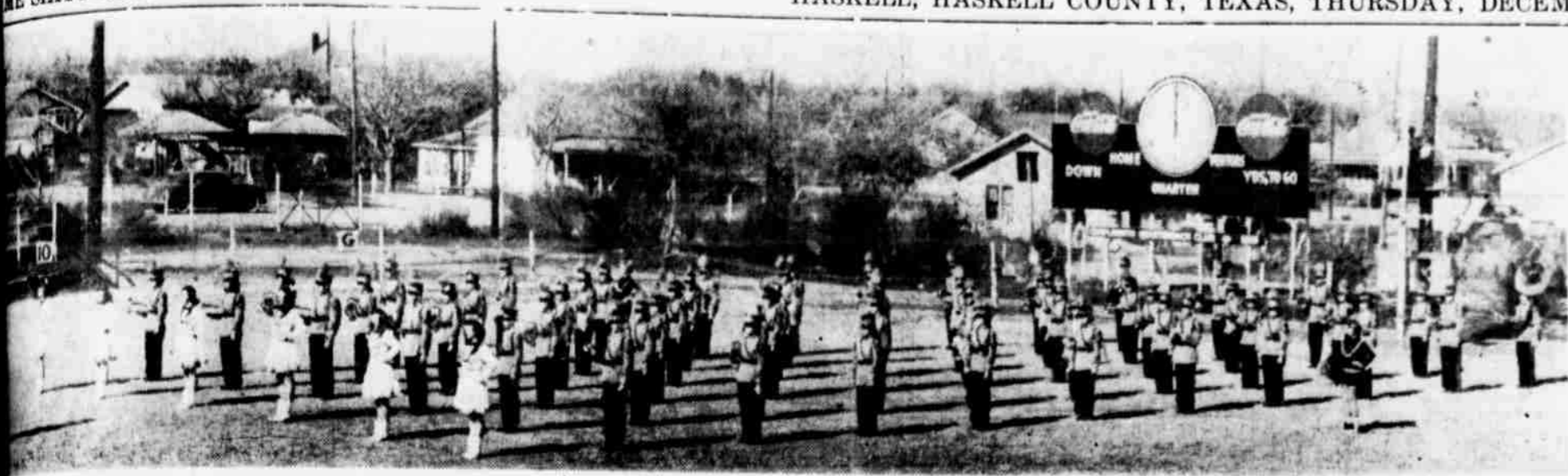

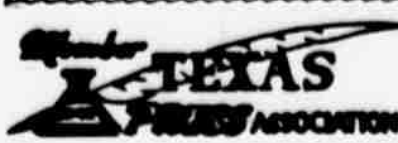

Haskell County History

20 Years Ago—Dec. 14, 1913

According to H. K. Henry, the turkeys sold under the pool system by possibly half the farmers of the county for the Christmas market brought nine and one-half cents a pound. At least two cars of turkeys were sold in this manner, Henry reported. During the month of November, the sum of \$40,839.10 in current

and delinquent taxes has been collected in Haskell County, according to Tax Collector Ed F. Fouts. This compares with \$36,312.47 collected during the same period last year.

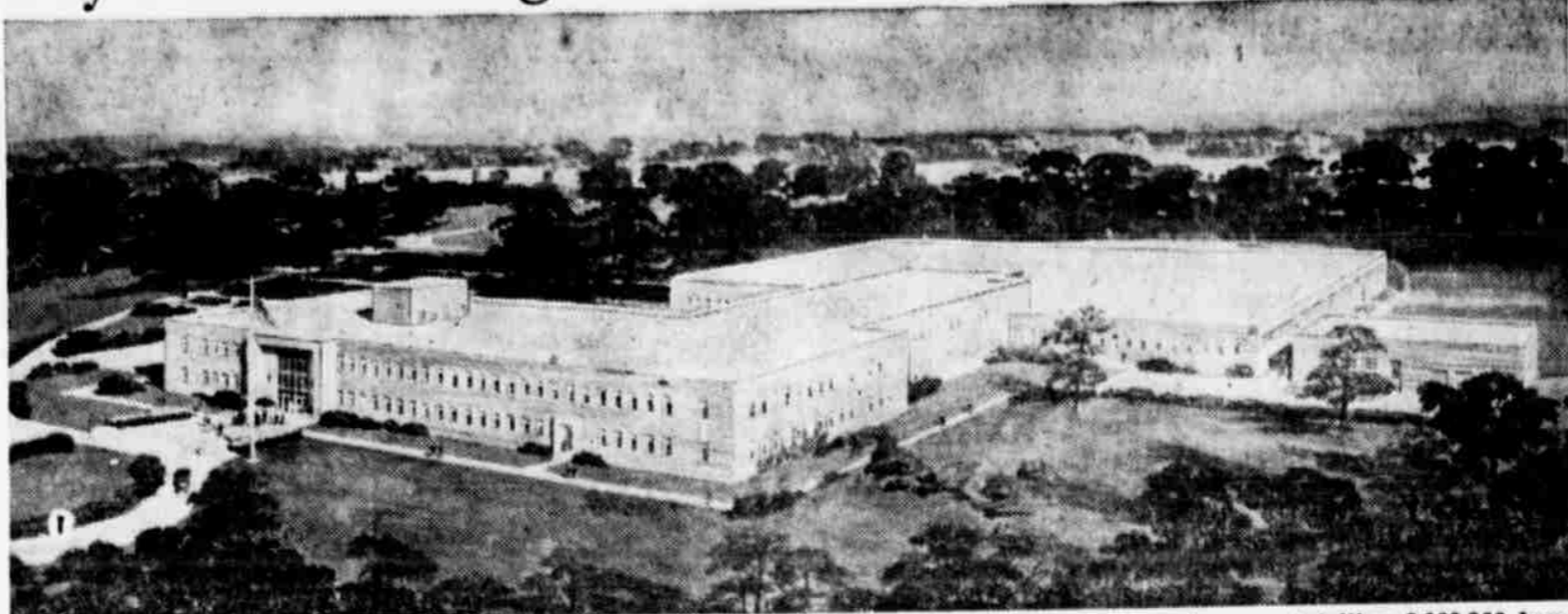

Social Security Man Will Be Here On December 17th

E. Glen McNatt, representative of the Social Security office in Abilene, will be at the Chamber of Commerce office at 10 a. m. in Haskell Thursday, Dec. 17, 1953. Persons wishing assistance in connection with applications for retirement payments or applications for survivor's payments should call at that time. Every year many workers who obtain temporary jobs during the Christmas season fail to get proper social security credit for their earnings, according to Ralph T. Fort Worth, Dec. 7—Monday was the 12th anniversary of "Pearl Harbor Day." Americans recalled this tragic day when the infamous attack took place in various ways.

A group of us at the Fort Worth stockyards got talking about it and the question came up, "How do livestock prices today, compare with those the week before the Pearl Harbor attack?"

We looked it up and got a surprise. We think the comparison of pre-World War II prices with those paid at Fort Worth Monday will be interesting to you, too.

One thing sure is that you agree "a lot of water has run under the bridge since Dec. 7, 1941."

At Fort Worth Monday fat steers and yearlings and slaughter cows were about steady in a slow trade. Some tippy fat calves were strong to 50c higher. Bulls and stocker and feeder cattle and calves were fully steady.

Comparing prices with Dec. 7, 1941: Good and choice fed steers and yearlings today sold for \$16 to \$22.50 — the same grade 12 years ago sold from \$9 to \$11.75 at Fort Worth.

Common and medium slaughter steers and heifers at \$10 to \$15 Monday, sold from \$6.50 to \$9.

Fat cows at Fort Worth Monday brought \$9.50 to \$12.50, 12 years ago they drew \$6.25 to \$7.75. Canners and cutters sold for \$3 to \$6.25, then, and this week sold from \$6 to \$10.

Bulls at \$5.75 then, sold at \$7 to \$12.50 this week.

On Monday good and choice slaughter calves sold at \$14 to \$20, a load at the latter figure from Graham. Twelve years ago on the first Pearl Harbor day their value was \$9.50 to \$11.75. Cull to medium slaughter calves this week drew \$6 to \$13.50, and then they sold from \$6 to \$9.50.

Good and choice stocker and feeder steers and yearlings drew \$14 to \$18, and calves reached \$10. Stocker cows the first of Dec. 1941 sold from \$5.25 to \$7.50, this week from \$8 to \$13.

Heifers and stocker heifer calves presently sell around \$2 under steers, and at that time averaged \$1 or \$1.25 less.

Hogs had the best market at Fort Worth Monday and topped at \$24.50, or 50c higher. During the original Pearl Harbor Week, top hogs ranged from \$8.50 to \$9.35.

Sheep and lambs sold at steady prices at Fort Worth Monday and

good and choice fat woolled lambs sold at \$18 to \$19, and good and choice shorn lambs sold from \$17 to \$17.50. A dozen years ago comparable lambs sold here at \$9 to \$10.50.

Slaughter yearlings sold Monday at \$10 to \$14, compared with yearlings at \$8 to \$9.50 12 years ago. On Monday slaughter ewes drew \$6 to \$7, and breeder ewes sold for \$7 to \$10. Old wethers at \$7 to \$10, and old ewes at \$3 to \$4.

John Esser, manager of the General Mills guar plant in Kennedy, Texas was in the California Creek Soil Conservation District last week. He was through here checking on guar production in this area. At present the guar plant at Kennedy has a capacity of fifteen million pounds of guar seed. Guar seed are having to be transported from India to supplement the small supply due to the drought. The present price given for field run seed is 4c pound. Yields have been running 400 to 900 pounds per acre. Guar after it is processed can be used in making of paper, ice cream, pharmaceutical, face cream, and many other products. Esser pointed out that due to acreage allotment that there would probably be an over supply of guar seed next year in this area and that his plant would not be able to use it all if there was. Tests are now being conducted at Woodward, Okla., on the feeding value of Guar as compared with cottonseed meal. Field run Guar seed contains 30% protein. Esser wanted to stress that Guar should be considered in importance first as a soil improving crop to be used in increasing production and, secondly, as a cash crop from sale of seed.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

By VERN SANDFORD Texas Press Association

AUSTIN, Texas—CIO officials cried "politics" at John Ben Shepperd for disclosing several DPOW leaders as Communist sympathizers.

The attorney general's reply was that he not only did not intend to run for governor, as they indicated, but that he was going "to fight to the finish to rid Texas and Texas unions of Communists and Communist sympathizers."

He elaborated by saying that he could do more to whip subversive influences in Texas as attorney general than he could as governor.

Shepperd was considered as one of the very top contenders for the chief executive's post.

Clamps on Communist connections of three labor unions were being tightened this week by the Texas Industrial Commission after grinding sessions of state evidence and testimony by witnesses.

A full report with recommendations will be made to Gov. Allan Shivers.

He called the five-man board into action as pickets harassed 22 Port Arthur retail businesses, and following charges by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd that strike organizers were Communist-dominated.

Two former Communists and an ex-undercover agent for the FBI who was in the party for nine years were called on during the investigation.

In addition, several officials of the three accused unions replied to the charges.

Involved in the Port Arthur strike was the Distributive, Processing and Office Workers of America. The other unions were the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers and the International Fur and Leather Workers.

Assisting the state's case were Harvey Matusow of New York and Louis F. Budenz, Fordham University professor, both of whom had turned against the party and helped the FBI.

Matt Cvetic of Pittsburgh, Pa., the former FBI agent, also volunteered his testimony.

Commission members are C. E. Fulgham of Lubbock, a rancher who was elected chairman; L. E. Page of Carthage, state commander of the American Legion; Walter Buckner of San Marcos, newspaper publisher; E. G. Rodman, Sr., of Odessa, head of an oil supply company; and William J. Harris of Dallas, president of the Texas Federation of Labor.

Shivers told the commission that the investigation must not be allowed to turn into even an attempted blow at thousands of union members in Texas who are conscientious and patriotic.

In serving as commission counsel, Shepperd said that his office would not be in position of prosecuting unions but would merely present evidence of Communist infiltration.

Testimony taken by the commission could be the basis for court action against unions linked with subversive organizations as listed by the U. S. attorney general.

Purpose of such action would be to prevent organizing or other union activity within the state by such groups.

A ruling by the U. S. Supreme Court is feared as a knockout blow against the Texas gas tax law as a source of money to raise teachers' salaries.

Authority of the Federal Power Commission to fix the price of natural gas at the well was upheld by the court.

Observers interpret this to mean that the entire gas industry will be considered "interstate" in nature.

Texas' gas tax law is under attack as an illegal state effort to tax interstate commerce.

It is expected to come before the U. S. Supreme Court in January.

While the prospect loomed that this source of money would be lost, Texas school officials were poring over a compromise plan to raise teachers' pay a flat \$402 yearly.

As worked out by a committee representing the governor and the Texas State Teachers Association, the plan would make two major changes in school financing:

1. It would make the state and the local school district share costs on an 80-20 percentage basis, respectively. The districts now pay a fixed amount of \$45 million a year.

2. It would make the state pay about 20 per cent of school building costs. The state now pays nothing for this.

School officials are to report opinion of the plan in their areas to State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar prior to Dec. 20.

If approved, there will just be another money problem. In addition to teacher pay, where will the money come from to pay the state's extra share of the school program?

Governor Shivers has struck out

against excessive oil imports as undermining the economy stability of Texas and the nation.

State revenues have fallen sharply during the past few months due to large stocks of oil and forced cut in production allowances.

Shivers told a congressional committee investigating the question that he is "deeply concerned with the effects of excessive imports" on national defense, the economy of Texas and the nation.

Texas Young Democrats seemed further along the road toward a showdown in their two-faction fight for control.

State Democratic Chairman Wallace Savage was to confer with other senior party officials on calling a convention for the young Demos.

Members of the faction aligned with the senior group in power asked the latter for a policy statement on obtaining a charter and procedure for holding a legal state convention.

Young Demo Bill McKnight of

Dallas, a leader of the liberal faction, said they were going ahead with an organization drive. McKnight said they would "work for the Democratic Party."

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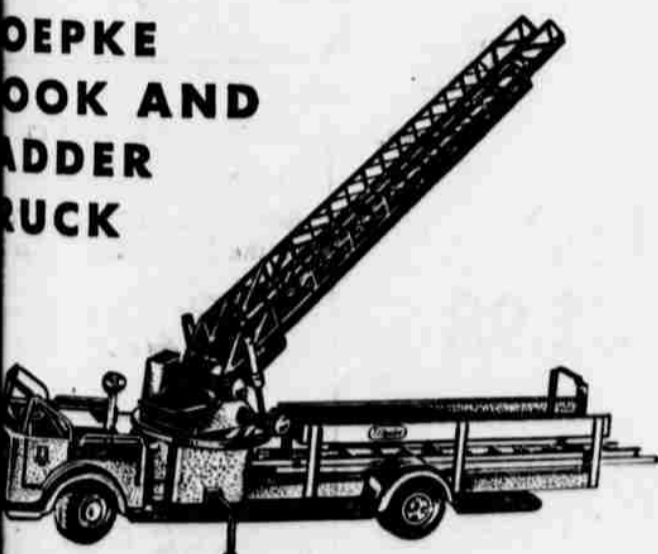
