

Cash registers at two checking sands in the front of the store were looted, and culprits also searched and emptied shelves and drawers in the checking stands.

Leisurely fashion in which the culprits worked was indicated by apparently at leisure in gaining the fact that they drank several bottles of milk taken from the dairy case in the store and ate one or two packages of cookies. The empty bottles and cookie wrappers were found on the floor at the back of the main retail section of the store.

Evidently familiar with the interior of the store, the burglars gained entry by boring holes to cut out a section of the roof approximately 18 inches square. After getting through the roof, section of metal ceiling was forced off just above the large meat vault from where the culprits made their way to the balcony and the main floor. Sheriff B. T. #### Vacant Farmhouse **Believed Fired** By Thieves

Thieves who took several bushels of cotton seed and a quantity of junk iron from an unoccupied farmhouse southeast of Haskell and then set fire to the structure are being sought by Haskell County officers this week.

The 4-room vacant house, located on the old Haley farm several miles north east of Paint Creek school, burned Friday night about 9 o'clock. A quantity of cotton seed, estimated at between 80 and 90 bushels, had been stored in the structure, and was lost in the fire.

A considerable amount of junk iron near the house was missing. Officers who investigated the fire surmised that the persons taking the junk had also taken several bushels of cotton seed from the house, after finding where some seed had been spilled on the ground a distance from the building. Further investigation disclased that gasoline had been drained from a tractor nearby, owned by Otis Elmore, who is working the Haley place, and officers said the vandals evidently poured gasoline on floors throughout the building in setting the

#### RFC Disaster Loans Available to Area Storm Victims

Distaster loans for repairing of ebuilding homes in the areas of Haskell and Knox Counties hit by the disastrous March 13 tornado are now available through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to storm victims who are able to qualify, the RFC has an-

nounced. J. C. Smith, a representative of the Dallas Loan Agency of RFC. has been assigned to Knox City as interviewer for those desiring to apply for these loans.

Distaster loans for repairing or rebuilding homes bear interest at the rate of 3% per annum. The same type loans for repairing business property bear interest at the rate of 5% per annum. Repayments are to be made on a monthly basis and will be geared to the borrower's ability to pay. but in no event will such loans be extended beyond a ten year period. Disaster loans are limited in amounts required to restore the victim's as nearly as possible to pre-disaster status. Expansion of pre-disaster facilities may not be included in such loans.

Mr. Smith may be contacted in the building, in Knox City, west of the Citizens State Bank, being the same building in which the American Red Cross is now headquartering. The American Rec Cross and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation serve two distinct purposes and there should be no confusion in the mind of any one because they are housed in the same building.

If you expect to make application for a disaster loan, your first step should be to have some competent contractor give you an estimate of the cost of repairs or new construction together with an agreement of his willingness to accept the responsibility of making such repairs or new construction at the estimated figure.


