

### First Bale Cotton From '53 Crop Is Ginned Here Today

First bale of cotton from the 1953 crop was ginned in Haskell today, forerunner of what is expected to be one of the largest crops in years.

The bale was brought in by O. J. Tibbetts, who lives several miles northwest of town, and was ginned at the Haskell Co-op Gin. Tibbetts brought in 1875 pounds of pulled cotton gathered from seven acres and ginned out a 445 pound bale. The yield was from hybrid cot-

ton, planted around May 1. Weldon Turnbow, manager of the Co-op Gin, said the cotton was exceptionally good grade and staple for a first bale. Tibbetts will receive the an-

# Haskell Schools

Haskell public schools began their 1953-54 session Tuesday morning with a total enrollment of 997-an increase of 62 over opening day last year.

These figures cannot be counted as representing the total enrollment for the term, Supt. C. D. Allen said today, as additional pupils will likely be enrolled during the first weeks of the term. Supt. Allen, who is beginning his first year as head of the local system, was optimistic over the outlook for a successful term. Enrollment in elementary school this week was 467 compared with

430 last year, officials said. In Junior High School 231 are enrolled this year, a gain of 10 students over last year's opening week total.

High School enrollment was 226 students this week, compared with 205 at the beginning of the last term. Central Ward Colored school has 73 pupils in all grades this year, compared with 70 on the



A check with the county agent will provide the best combination for the

### Poultry Industry Brings Millions To Texas

Recently released figures reveal the economic importance of assistant economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, it takes a lot of eggs to satisfy Texans' appetite for "hen fruit." In fact, he adds, the supply from Texas sources lacks almost three eggs per capita of meeting the demand

In 1951, 2,921,000,000 eggs were produced in Texas. The per capita consumption was 397 eggs. Therefore, says McHaney, 259,000.000 had to come from other states to make up the difference. The existing favorable egg-feed price ratio, the rapidly increasing population within the state and generally favorable economic conditions over the country as a whole, leads McHaney to believe that egg producers in the state would be justified in further increasing the size of their laying

Final figures for 1952, he says, show that 21,474,000 hens were on the farms of the state. Figures released on July 1 indicates some reduction in this number while the hen numbers for the nation remained about the same as for a year ago. Gross sales in Texas from eggs in 1951, he says, amounted to \$96,871,000.

The Texas broiler industry has grown by leaps and bounds during the past few years and in 1951 grossed \$42,343,000 for the state's


Turkey producers in 1951 had gross sales of \$18,124,000. Final figures for 1951 show that eggs represented 61.2 per cent of the total gross poultry income for the state; broilers 27.3 per cent and turkeys 11.5 per cent.

> A proclamation of cotton acreage controls by Secretary of Agriculture Benson is expected in October which would impose acreage allocations county by county based upon a five-year average of acres in cotton in 1947, 1948, 1949, 1951 and 1952, and wheat controls have already been voted.

> "Texas, particularly the western half of the state, will lose heavily when this average is computed because of drouth condition unless the intent of public law is followed," R. M. Fielder of Abilene stated. He estimated that more than a million acres historically dedicated to cotton were lost to the drouth in Texas in both 1952 and 1953.

> Fielder, chairman of the agriculture and livestock committee of the regional chamber of commerce, said that Section 344 (b) of the Agriculture Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended in 1950, gives the PMA authority to make

> adjustments in drouth areas.

Legumes when properly innoculated can help reduce nitrogen fertilizer requirements of the crops which follow the legume. Research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in 11-year study have found that the top growth of hairy vetch contains an average of 102 pounds of nitrogen an acre. Legumes are the only plants which have the ability to take nitrogen from the air and store it in the plant but must be innoculated with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria before they can do so, says Spears.

He recommends the use of commercial innoculants which are readily available. Be sure and check the label on the container he says to make certain the right

innoculant is being used. Legumes, like other crops, re

maximum growth. Phosphorus is needed in almost all areas of the state. Potash and calcium may also be needed particularly in the eastern half of the state, says Spears. On soil low in organic matter a small amount of commercial nitrogen applied at planting time will help get the legumes off to a good start.

The effects from plowing under a heavy growth of legumes usually lasts for more than one year. The legumes add organic matter to the soil and thus improves the soil structure. This allows deeper root penetration and increases the water holding capacity of the soil. The increased water holding capacity is particularly evident in dry years and two examples which show the value of legumes, Spears cites. Wayne Anderson of Lamar County this year combined 105 bushels of oats an acre from land that was locally known as "old land." The field for three previous years had been planted to vetch. only 7 bushels of wheat an acre. Too, in the Blackland area, sweet clover has proved its value in the fight against cotton root rot. Using this legume in the crop rotation can make a considerable difference in the pounds of lint from an acre, says

Right now livestock producers re in need of grazing crops and egumes can be used with success for supplementary pastures. They will provide high protein feed at a lower cost than purchased feeds.

With the favorable moisture conditions that exist in many parts of Texas at this time, Spears points out that prospects are good for winter legume crops. Dry weather during the past two or three years at planting time has been responsible for reduced plantings of legumes but the moisture now available should be a big inducement for farmers and stockmen to greatly expand fall seedings of the adapted legumes. Spears suggests that local county agents be contacted for detailed information on the best adapted legumes and fertilizer needs

past wheat harvest and warns it will be worse this year unless precautions are taken at planting time. He lists these as planting the best variety for tthe section, cleaning the seed to remove weed seeds and smut balls which may be present and chemical treatment of the planting seed.

Stinking smut is the disease which should get major attention. If untreated seed are planted there is no good way to deal with which are infected with smut spores, a good crop of stinking smut will develop next spring in the wheat heads where the grain should be, says Dines. Smut reduces the yield in the field and smutty grain is docked on the market. This smut is hard to recognize in the field except by its foul odor and the somewhat greener color of the infected heads. The kernels of the infected plants change to smut balls, and when the grain is combined, these smut balls are broken and millions of black spores are scattered over the healthy wheat seed.

Oats and barley smut on the the black, carren heads in the of oats ond barley can be controlled by chemical treatment of that producers check with their local county agent on the kind and amount of the chemical to use. The cost is very small and in addition to controlling stinking smut, the treated seed germinate faster, more seed germinates which means a better stand and yield, says Dines.

Loose smut of wheat is something else, explains Dines, It too leaves empty black heads in the field but cannot be controlled with chemicals. It can be controlled by a difficult hot water trolled by a difficult hot water treatment, however, Dines sug-gests that it might be better to get clean wheat seed from growers who were not bothered with loose smut last season.

Helminthosperium blight is a relatively new disease which attacks roots. It affects the roots and stems of oats causing weakened stems and later lodging. It can be controlled by the same chemicals used in treating seed for protection against stinking smut, however, points out Dines, the control may not be as complete as for the smut. Oat varieties which 33112. are attacked by the blight include some of the Victoria crosses as Futex, Rustler, Ranger and Victor
