

WTU to Build Power Plant Southeast of Haskell

Construction of ating power plant to be built southeast of Haskell on the Paint Creek reservoir was formally an-nounced March 5 by Price Campbell, president of the West Tex-as Utilities Company.

Formal announcement of the project was made before a group of city and county officials of Haskell, Stamford and Hamlin, and company representatives from Abilene who gathered at the plant site Wednesday afternoon.


WTU chief engineer, described the new plant, on which the company will spend \$7 million during the next two or three years. If the plant is fully devel-

oped during coming years to the maximum envisioned in present plans, the utilities company investment may run as high as \$15 million eventually, company officials said.

The Austin Building Company of Dallas, has been awarded the general contract for the plant

Work on the project was ac-tually started early this year, principally on the basement for the huge plant and placing of an 8foot pipeline leading to the bed of the Paint Creek reservoir. R. V. (Bob) Sass, veteran construction engineer with WTU, is resident engineer on the project.

The first unit of this new pow-plant to be installed will be 33,000 kilowatt turbo generator a 33,000 knowart torod generation unit. This unit, which was order-ed in August, 1950, and is sche-duled for delivery in the spring of 1952, is to be put in operation during the summer of 1953. One hundred thirty-two thousand volt lines will interconnect the plant, which is located near the center of the utility company's system, with three other major steam generating stations in the company system.

Future expansion plans call for installation of additional generat-

"This new generation. "This new generating station providing additional electric pow-er for the industrial and agricultural development of the Haskell - Stamford - Hamlin region," said Price Campbell, "will be used as a basic generating unit in our interconnected company system."

"Knowing that an abundance of low-cost electric power is essential to the continuted growth of an area, our company is constantly planning and building for the future," Campbell said. "When this new 33,000 kilowatt the when this new 33,000 knowatt unit goes into operation in 1953, we will have increased, since 1946, the company's generating capacity by 150 per cent." The plant is to be located ap-proximately 14 miles southeast of Haskell and 16 miles north-cast of Stamford on the north-


Haskell Teachers Will Attend 2-Day **District Meeting**



Steam from this unit will be gen-erated by a boiler designed to operate at a pressure of 1,000 lbs. per square inch. The boiler, fired by either natural gas or oil, is of the latest out-door design being placed entirely out of the plant building except for controls which will be enclosed in the tur-bine room. Four stories high, the boiler is capable of converting 300,000 pounds of water to steam per hour. It is of the pressurized integral furnace type with a fuel-air mixture burning in the con-ter instead of at the bottom of the boiler.
