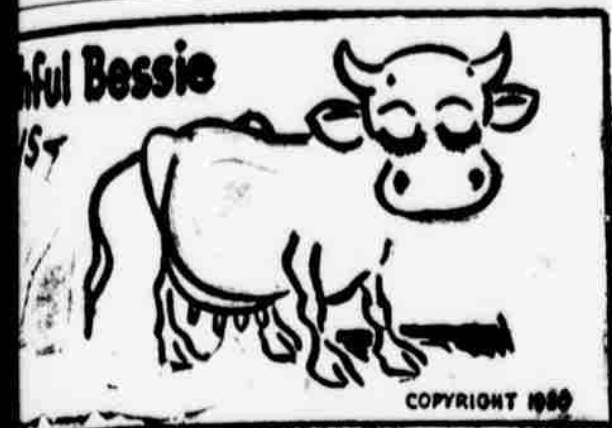

time and effort, farm and ranch families seem to have more leisure time than in 1903 when the first farm demonstration was established in Texas.

Better roads, cars, pickups, trucks, school buses and even planes have wiped out the horse and buggy boundaries. For a while, there was no replacement. People liked running into town for their recreation, but gradually found something was missing. So they began to center the recreation again in home and community.

Miss Moore says in 1952 these leaders were given training for recreation programs in the communities. She personally conducted 26

recreation training schools with more than 1500 leaders attending from 56 counties. During the 5-day sessions the group learned to sing and play together, and to study the philosophy of recreation for their communities. They practiced the necessary planning and conducting of recreation techniques.

As a result, the specialist says county extension agents conducted more than 1200 recreation training meetings attended by nearly 40,000 persons. The leaders themselves held more than 3,500 meetings where recreation was included for more than 85,000 persons attending.

During 1953, the specialist said several special features of recreation were emphasized. Family recreation was one of the more important because of the need for all members of the family to plan and play together. Special training was also included in camping and song leadership.

Harvest of Fresh Fruits Heralds Preserving Time

The first fresh fruits are coming in and preserving time is just around the corner. For that little bit of sweet so good with hot bread at meal time, start filling the pantry shelf with luscious red strawberries, preserved at the peak of their goodness, adding other preserves and sparkling jellies as the action progresses, suggests Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

When making strawberry preserves, remember, the specialist says, their color and flavor are easily destroyed by heat, so cook them only a short time.

Select four cups of firm, tart berries, wash, drain, remove the caps. Juice will be lost if caps are removed before washing. Prepare syrup by boiling two cups of sugar and a cup of water until the mixture begins to form a thread from a fork dipped into the syrup. Add 2 cups and cook 10 minutes. Add the other 2 cups of berries with 1 cup sugar sprinkled on top and one tablespoon lemon juice. Boil another 10 minutes until it reaches jelly stage.

Remove from the fire and shake the pan gently until the foam collects in the center and can be scooped off easily. Pour into flat pan and let cool about eight hours or overnight to allow the berries to plump. Drain without reheating and fill hot sterilized jars 3-4 full with berries. Boil syrup rapidly until it thickens and pour boiling hot over the berries to 1-4 inch of top of jar. Cover the berries with hot paraffin and seal at once.

For fresh strawberry jelly, use a mixture of slightly underripe and ripe fruit, the underripe to furnish pectin and acid, and the ripe to contribute flavor and color. Work with two to four cups of berry juice at a time, adding 3-4 to one cup of sugar to each cup.

Remember to cook jelly in a large, flat-bottomed pan to permit rapid evaporation, stirring only until sugar is dissolved. Test for the jelly stage, by dipping a large spoon into the boiling syrup and lift the spoon so that the syrup runs off the side. When the

syrup no longer runs off the spoon in a steady stream but separates into two distinct lines of drops which sheet together, then stop the cooking. For further information and recipes for jelly and preserves, consult your county home demonstration agent.

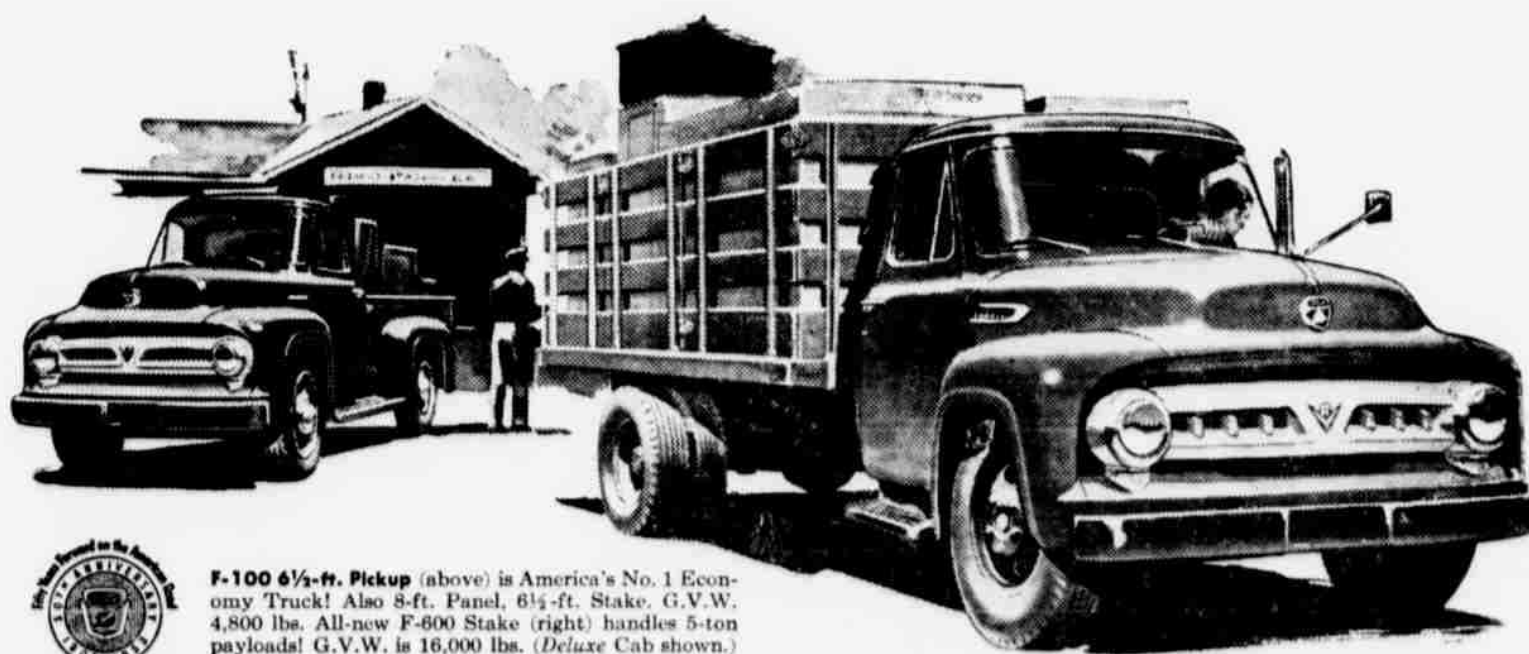

Creep Feeding of Calves Advised By County Agent

Beef producers can put extra pounds on their calves—faster and more efficiently by creep feeding. That word comes from F. W. Martin, county agent. Right now, he adds, every "trick-of-the-trade" must be used by producers if they are to realize a profit from their operations. Creep feeding will put additional weight and finish on calves and thus increase their market value. The mother cow, nursing creep fed calves, will remain in better condition; usually less time is needed to get the calves in top market condition and they go to market before losing their bloom.

Grain prices are still high, but since the cows have had a pretty rough time, calves were weak when they arrived and the grain should give them a chance to overcome this condition between now and weaning time. It will also, he adds, give the cow herd a chance to more fully utilize the good range growth for getting back into top condition.

One of the best growing feeds for calves is whole oats. Additional protein feeds may not be needed for this can be supplied by milk and grass. When calves reach four months of age, they are old enough to take on corn or milo and these two grains may be added to the oat ration.

Martin suggests a ration of 65 pounds of corn or milo and 35 pounds of oats for calves when they reach four months of age. When the green grazing disappears, consideration should be given, he says to the addition of protein to the ration. If protein is needed, add about

10 pounds of cottonseed meal to a mixture of 25 pounds of oats and 65 pounds of corn or milo. The total supply of the protein should probably never amount to more than 15 per cent of the ration—with the balance grain.

Generally early calves started on creep feeders make more economical gains and learn to eat in less time than do calves started at later dates. It is not necessary to grind the grains since young calves can efficiently utilize threshed grains. However, the older midsummer calves being creep fed should have their grain cracked or ground.

Don't overlook having bone-meal and salt available at all times for the calves. He likes to locate the salt and bone-meal supplies near the creep so both cows and calves can get their necessary minerals.

The County Agent has a new bulletin C-289, "Creep Feeding Beef Calves," available in the office, which gives more information about creep feeding.

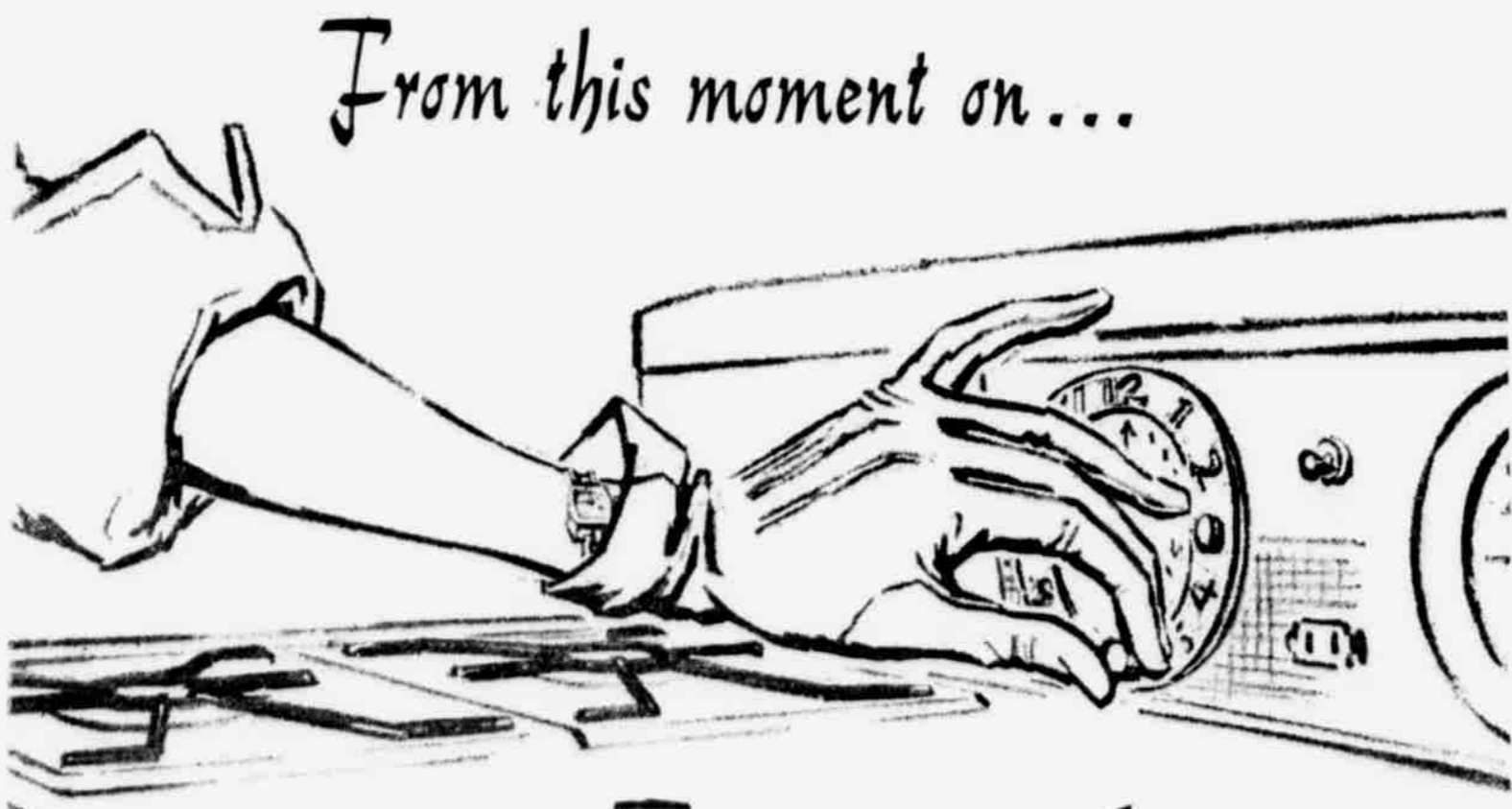

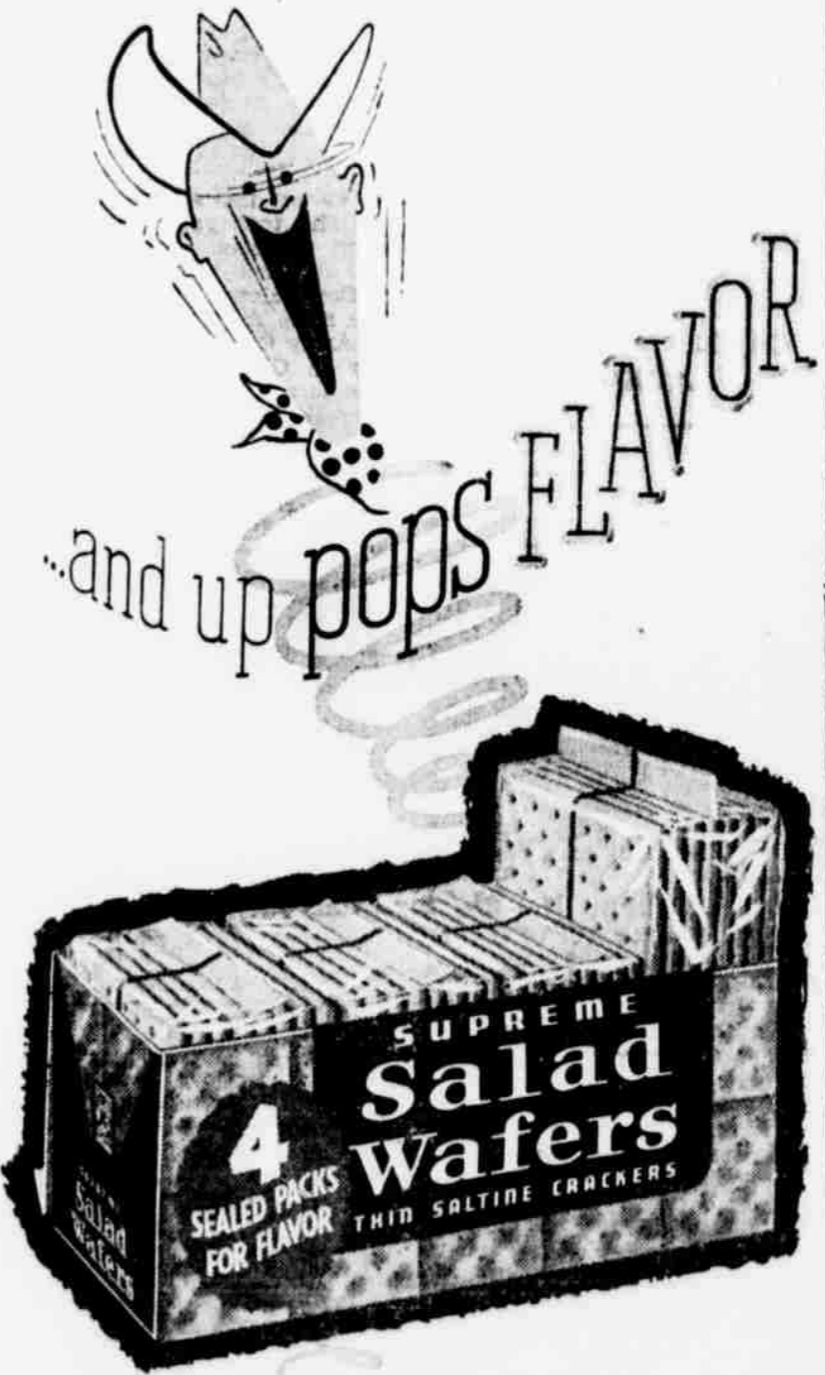

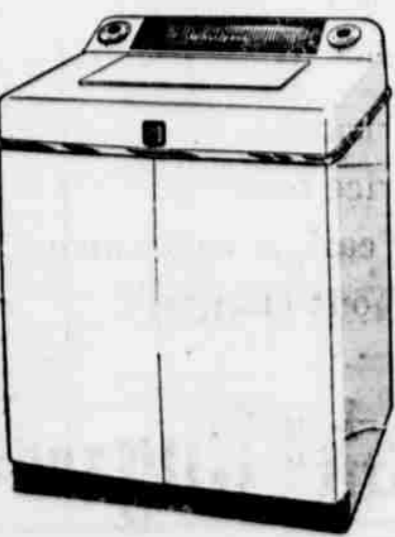

Game Experts See Good Outlook For Wild Turkeys

Austin—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said field reports indicate Texas' vaunted stock of wild turkeys is faring well.

"Our information from the men on the scene is that the big birds are into the nesting season with conditions favorable up to now," he said. "This simply is a progress report covering the pre-hatch period. What happens here after cannot be foretold because so many factors affect turkeys as well as other species of wild life."

Texas, which has more wild turkey than any other state, had a few bad seasons for its precious birds. Last year, for the first time in four seasons, a decline attributed mainly to the drought, was halted and the flocks began increasing again.

"Now as the flocks break up and the birds begin laying, with a few reported nesting, it seems that the gains made last year may

be held this season," the executive secretary said.

Game Warden Bill Garrett of Comfort, in the heart of the Hill Country turkey area, said 1 1/2 spring rains have provided the "green stuff" needed when wild turkeys turn from the mast crop.

He said turkeys are laying in his area with a few settings.

Game Warden Adolph Heep of Fredericksburg said his observation indicated the best stock of wild turkey in Gillespie County "in six or seven years."

Kerrville, county seat of Kerr County which harvested approximately 1,000 turkey gobblers last fall, said prospects were "good."

But everybody emphasized that "everything depends on what happens during the delicate hatching and growing season."

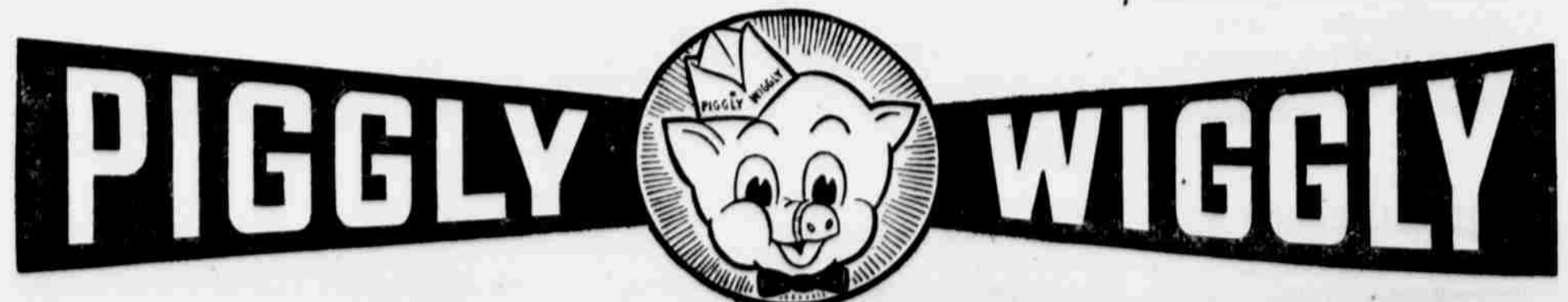

Fire Siren Signal Will Be Call For Observance of Mental Health Week

Chief J. C. Swadley of Grand Prairie and president of the State Firemen and Fire Marshals' Association has requested that the fire alarm of every city and town in Texas sound Monday, May 4, at noon, but its sound will mean more than a fire. The fire alarm will sound for Mental Health and will call attention to the State-wide campaign being conducted to acquaint Texas with Mental Health problems.

The sound to be heard will come from a bell which has been forged in chains and shackles formerly used in Mental Hospitals throughout the nation to restrain mental patients. The hospital at Rusk, Texas, donated this effort.

Fire Chief Ray Lusk of Haskell announced that more than 100 fire alarms throughout the state would be sounded Monday noon to signify the opening of the campaign. While its primary purpose is educational, and efforts are being made to place literature in the hands of a majority of Texans, the campaign will also attempt to raise \$148,798 which will be used to broaden the scope of mental health work at local, state and national levels.

R. L. Wheelock, Chairman of the Mental Health Fund campaign, said that

every effort had been made to organize campaigns in every county of the state. He also said that campaign contributions could be made by anyone by addressing an envelope to "Mental Health," c/o Postmaster of any post office in Texas.

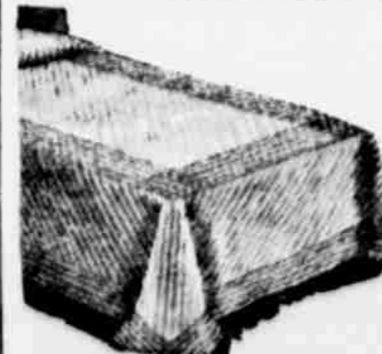

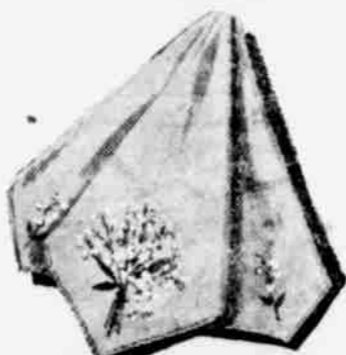
