## Three Seriously Injured; Two Receive Minor Hurts In Car Collision Sunday

Three persons were seriously injured, two others suffered minor injuries, while five others escaped unharmed in the collision of two automobiles at the intersection of North First Street and East Avenue B Sunday at 12:45 p. m.

Most seriously injured were Mrs. Hollis Howard and her two daughters, Billie Lois, 12, and Bonnie Jean, 4. Mrs. Howard suffered a compound fracture of her right arm at the elbow and cuts and bruises on her face and body. Billie Lois received a severe cut on her right shoulder and body bruises, and 4-year-old Bonnie Jean suffered shock and a slight concussion.

Slightly injured were Dan Howard, 24, of Haskell, driver of the car in which his sister-in-law and her two daughters were riding, and Joe Doyle Briscoe, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Briscoe.

Howard received cuts on his face and a painful scalp injury while the Briscoe boy received cuts on his face and body bruises.

Cars involved in the collision were a 1952 Pontiac coupe owned by Dan Howard, and a 1937 Plymouth sedan driven by R. D. Briscoe, 34, Haskell laborer. In the car with Briscoe were his wife and four children, Theresa, 10, Joe Doyle, Katherine, 6, and Tyrone, 4. All escaped unharmed except Joe Doyle.

Investigating officers were told that the accident occurred after Briscoe, driving south on East Avenue B, had made a left turn at the intersection with North 1st and was driving back across to the north side of the street without seeing the Howard car approaching from the east, and drove into the path of the oncoming car. Both cars were badly damaged.

Ambulances summoned from Holden funeral home rushed occupants of both cars to the Haskell hospital for emergency treatment. All members of the Briscoe family were dismissed after 8-year-old Joe Doyle had received treatment for cuts.

Dan Howard was dismissed after receiving treatment for scalp injury and facial cuts. Mrs. Howard and her daughters remained under treatment at the hospital.

With the injury of Mrs. Howard and her two little girls Sunday, four members of the family are now confined to bed with accident injuries. The husband and father, Hollis Howard, well known Haskell farmer, received a severe leg fracture several weeks ago when his car went out of control and overturned.

### Special Venire of 100 Called For Murder Trial Here Monday

A special venire of 100 prospective jurors has been called for Monday, July 7 in 39th district court, for the scheduled trial of Thomas Clifford Livesay, charged with murder and transferred here from 64th District Court in Swisher County.

A change of venue transferring the case to Haskell was ordered by Judge E. A. Bills of the 68th district court last May. Judge Bills will preside for the trial in 39th district court here, and District Attorney Joe Sharp of the 64th district will direct the prosecution. Assisting will be District Attorney Wm. P. Ratliff and County Attorney Royce Aekins of Haskell.

District Attorney Sharp, of Plainview, was in Haskell Monday conferring with local court officials concerning the pending trial.

Livesay, who has been held in the Swisher County jail for some time, was transferred to the Haskell County jail Monday, pending his trial here. In talking to County Attorney Royce Aekins after being brought to the jail here, Livesay said he was in Haskell in 1948, when he worked as a painter.

Livesay, 36, is one of two Amarillo men charged in the death last August of Joshua Blocher, aged Bailey County recluse, near Muleshoe.

The trial scheduled Monday is the third attempt by the State to bring Livesay to trial. The case originally was set at Muleshoe in Bailey County; was moved to Farwell, then to Tulsa, and row to Haskell.

Livesay and Lester Douglas Stevens, 51, also of Amarillo, were charged last fall with the death of Blocher, 85-year-old founder of the Bailey County town of Progress, six miles from Muleshoe. Statements by the two men, each accusing the other of the crime, ended an extended investigation launched after Blocher disappeared from his home last August 12, only to be found dead in a cotton field three days later.

Robbery was advanced as the motive behind the killing, but the two Amarillo men said they found only 13 cents when they searched the old man's shack after dumping him from their car near Progress. Authorities later found almost \$10,000 in the dirt-floored shanty where Blocher had lived.

Stevens is already under a death sentence for his part in the slaying. He was tried last December, but Livesay's case was transferred to Farwell in addition to Tulsa.

When polio is around, the National Foundation cautions parents to watch for these signs: headache, fever, sore throat, upset stomach, tenderness and stiffness of neck and back. A person showing such symptoms should be put to bed at once, away from others. Then, call your doctor and follow his advice. ## Specialist Gives Hints On Care of Summer Lawns

A neat, well kept lawn will add to the value of a home, and lawns properly managed will provide a cool, restful cover for the home, even during summer months. J. R. Watson, Jr., of the agronomy department at Texas A. & M. College, says that by recognizing the basic conditions necessary for lawn care the home lawn enthusiast may have a lawn that will provide pleasant relaxation and prevent soil from blowing and washing.

A grass should be selected that is suitable for the particular locality. Some of the grasses best suited to Texas are Bermuda, St. Augustine, and Buffalo grass. Others not so popular are Centipede and various strains of Zoysia grass. Bermuda grass is probably the most popular and best suited for all around purposes. However, St. Augustine grass is the best for shaded areas. Watson points out that the grass selected should be adapted to your locality and one that suits you.

Lawns should be fertilized in the spring and fall with a complete fertilizer, such as 10-5-5, 5-10-5, or 8-8-8. During the summer it is not necessary to add a complete fertilizer, but nitrogen should be added every 30-40 days, for grasses are heavy nitrogen feeders. Ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate may be added at the rate of three pounds of ammonium nitrate and five pounds of ammonium sulfate per 100 square feet of lawn. (reminder: length times width of your lawn area equals the square footage.) Controlled watering is one of the most important considerations

in the care and management of lawns, Watson says. The prevailing tendency is to overwater rather than underwater. Excessive water, as well as too frequent applications, cause plants to develop shallow root systems. Water should be applied to mature turf only when the plants begin to wilt. At this time, the lawn should be soaked to a depth of four to six inches. When the water starts running off the surface, it should be cut off. If the soil is not soaked to the required depth, wait until the moisture has percolated downward and apply additional water. Lawn turf should be mowed at about 1 to 1 1/2 inches. Watson points out that only about 1-4 to 1-2 inch of leaf surface should be removed at any clipping. Serious injury to the plant may result if a greater amount of leaf surface is removed at one time. A sharp, properly adjusted lawn mower is essential if the lawn is to be kept neat and trim.

House Plan No. 19

**Straight Lines For Economy**

This farm and ranch Plan No. 19 is convenient and well-arranged, and can be built at a minimum cost, yet it has the little extras that mean so much in daily living.

The floor plan of the kitchen shows space for a heater. It may be a gas or oil fired hot air heating unit. Placing the heating unit here makes the trunk line air duct lead over the central hallway, supplying hot air to the rest of the house. The returning air is brought back under the floor, with a minimum of duct work required. However, if you do not want this kind of heating unit, the space can be used for a closet.

The workroom, adjacent to the kitchen, is big enough for a washing machine, lavatory, hot water heater, and freezer chest. Also there is a large storage closet.

Since the kitchen, workroom and bathroom adjoin, the plumbing is run in a straight line along the rear wall, which is an economy.

The bedrooms are roomy and well ventilated, and have an unusual amount of closet space.



Two large linen closets open into the hall, and the bathroom contains storage space for bathroom linens.

In the living and dining rooms a sense of spaciousness is created by the wide opening between them.

The front entrance in the small off-set in the living room offers a certain amount of privacy when someone calls at the door. And the large front porch will always be a comfortable spot for a warm summer evening.

If you like this general arrangement, but prefer a smaller house, just leave off the large bedroom

with its closets. Your house will still be attractive, and the bedroom can be added later without making any structural changes.

**Texas Publishers Demand Accounting of Public Funds For Benefit and Criticism of Voters and Taxpayers**

Texas newspaper publishers expressed strong objection to the failure of state officials to publish accountings of receipts and disbursements of public tax monies at the 73rd Annual meeting of the Texas Press Association in Houston, June 14.

Resolutions were passed calling attention to the fact that, even though required by law, such publications are seldom made by city, county and school board district officials. Resolutions pointed out that such public notices are required for the "understanding, benefit and criticism of the voters

and tax payers," and that the light of publicity could place a curb upon the "careless, wasteful extravagance and often uncorrupt handling of public funds."

In part the resolution read: Whereas, laws in other states recognize the need of such detailed publication of all expenditures of public monies, wherein said expenditures are listed in the local or regional newspaper, item by item, dollar by dollar; and that experience in other states proves that the cost of publication is more than justified by its enormous savings in the tax payer's money. Therefore, be it resolved that the Legislative Committee of this Texas Press Association be called upon to study this particular phase of our state law and that said committee be empowered to suggest corrective measures by the State Legislative body."

J. C. Smyth, publisher of the Liberty Vindicator is chairman of the TPA Legislative committee.

A second resolution passed by the convention urged the election of officials who will pledge themselves to call a halt to tax increases. A third called for revision of the state election code to "create a basis of equity between and among candidates for any one particular office." Another endorsed the efforts of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalistic fraternity, in their fight for freedom of information and the people's right to know.

Attempts by certain groups to place a curb on advertising for selfish purposes and the TPA's objection to false or misleading advertising also were cited by the Resolution Committee. Canadian manufacturers of newsprint were

condemned for their increase in price of their product, and domestic producers were urged to maintain their present prices, in another resolution.

**Old Glory Man Is Named On Farm Credit Board**

The Farm Credit Board of Houston announces the election of Chas. C. Thompson of Colorado City as chairman of its board, and J. B. Pumphrey of Old Glory as its vice chairman.

Twenty-One Persons Sent To Prison From Haskell County In Past 10 Years

Huntsville, July 1. — Haskell County in the past ten years has committed 21 prisoners to the Texas Prison System.

This was revealed recently in a study conducted inside the prison by graduate students at Sam Houston State Teachers College. Under the supervision of Dr. Rupert C. Koeninger head of the college's sociology department.

In number of commitments per thousand population, the County ranked 191st in the State with 153 persons per thousand committed the study further showed.

Ten counties during the period, 1942 to 1951, representing 41.73 per cent of the total population based on the 1930 census, committed 30.27 per cent of the prisoners.

In the order of the number of commitments they were Harris Dallas, Bexar, El Paso, Tarrant, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Travis, Cameron and Wichita. These counties committed 11,424 of the 22,705 total commitments.

Highest among them in percentage of population in commitments was El Paso County, which sent 5.77 men per thousand and ranks ninth in the State in percentage of commitments. Next was Hidalgo, which committed 4.51 per thousand, nineteenth in the State. Others and the number per thousand committed were Harris, 4.07; Wichita, 3.76; Dallas, 3.38; Cameron, 3.13; Jefferson, 3.18; Bexar, 2.27; Travis, 2.74; and Tarrant, 2.60.

In 1951, the order of number of commitments ran according to the ten year average, except Nueces County, which ranks seventh in population, is twelfth in number of commitments.

In number of commitments per thousand, Culberson County heads the list through the ten years, having sent an average of 14.25. Next is Sterling with 11.7. Dallas County is third with 10.21. Fourth is Hartley with 7.32; then Stephens with 6.98.

Poll Shows Hunters Favor Later Dove Season In Area

The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game & Fish Commission said the sportsmen's poll on fall hunting dates has produced some "strange preferences."

He explained that the most unexpected trend in the balloting centers around a reversal of opinion as between the north and south zones for mourning doves dates.

The executive secretary said the greatest block of south zone votes—443—suggested Oct. 1 for the opening date for mourning doves. The largest north zone—408—suggested November 1 for the opener.

Ordinarily the north zone season is opened earlier (it was September 1 last year) and the south zone season is opened much later (it was November 15).

The final decisions are made by the United States Fish & Wildlife Service since mourning doves are migratory. This top level agency usually bases its decision, where possible, on recommendations of state game and fish units.

This year the Texas Game & Fish Commission sought to give sportsmen a voice in the dove as well as waterfowl seasons which are set on the same basis.

The bulk of the votes to date on waterfowl shows a preponderance of south state ballots for an opener on ducks and geese before November 15. Most of the north Texas sentiment favors an October opener. October 15 was suggested by 426 north state sportsmen and November 1 by 189.
