Callahan County Can Save Steel

FOR 1,061 MACHINE GUNS Housewives Are Urged To Buy Fresh Foods To Conserve Can-Metal For War

Callahan County housewives can save enough steel for 1,061 machine guns simply by replacing one can of fruit or vegetables a week during the next year with fresh or home-packed produce, a leading food distributor estimated today.

"This substitute, urged by the War Production Board, will not only save steel but also conserve food by using extra supplies of fresh produce made available by increased production, canning restrictions and reduced storage facilities," according to Earl R. French, marketing director of A and P's produce-buying affiliate, the tlantic Commission Company.

A number two "tin" can averages .235 pounds of steel plus a small amount of tin, and a single family can save 12.2 pounds of steel in a year by the can-a-week reduction, French said. Thus Callahan County's 3,044 families can save 37,136 pounds of steel, enough to make 1,061 thirty-caliber machine guns, each requiring 35 pounds of steel for manufacture, he pointed out.

"Reduced buying of canned produce doesn't mean reducing food consumption. Housewives can balance their family diets by serving more fresh produce, and our records how that many families are already doing this. 

A lot of retired cook books will go into active service in the hunt for meat allowance stretch out further. Cook meat with moderate heat until done and no longer. This way, meat is more tender, tastes better, and losses in cooking are low,

To stretch the meat allowance, try using potatoes, rice, spagetti or bread crumbs mixed with the meat, seasoned well and cooked and served as an appetizing main, ches wide. Spread with stuffing dish. Here are some recipes that may help you in using your family's share of meat and to give variety to your meals.

Stations To Get Increase In Pay For Gasoline

Gasoline service station operators may now correct their retail prices so they can realize a gross margin of three cents per gallon, it was announced today by the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board.

Where an operator of a retail service station selling gasoline adjusts his prices in this manner, tho, he is required to file a state ment with the local War Price and Rationing Board,

This report must set forth the service station's delivered cost. its maximum selling price per gallon before a margain adjustmentw as made, and the new maxi mum selling price.

Each time a service station operator's delivered cost changes and he increases or decreases his maximum selling prices he must refile this information with the local war price and rationing board. The board chairman explained that

when gasoline rationing was established, the Office of Price Administration recognized that the consequent reduction in volume would create hardship to service station dealers and other sellers of gasoline at retail who operated on narrow margins and who depended on large vlume sales and low cost marketing operations in

order to realize a profit. To provide relief to those operators, an amendment to Maximum Price Regulation No. 137 has been issued. This amendment permits dealers whose gross margin was less than three cents per gallon to increase their selling price so they can relalize a three cent gross margin. As an illustration of how the provisions of,

that gasoline delivered to his station was 17 cents per gallon. That left him a gross margin of two gents a gallon, Under this amendment has maximum price to 20 cents per gailon, thus giving him a three, cent gross margin. 


