## NAVAJO INDIANS.

### In a Skirmish a Cattleman kills One of Their Bucks.

They Hold a Pow-Wow and Demand the Surrender of the Guilty Party or the Payment of \$200.

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 6.—The settlers of North New Mexico and South Colorado are in terror over a threatened outbreak of the Navajo Indians, the wealthiest and most powerful tribe in the West. The trouble has grown out of a skirmish between the Indians and some cattlemen in Juan county last December, during which John Cox killed one of the bucks. After the shooting the Navajos held a three day's pow-wow on the reservation, and H. C. Adams sub-agent of the Navajos, addressed a letter to Kit Carson of Juan county, in which he says:

"During the pow-wow the Indians reached the conclusion that either the man who did the killing of the Navajo must be arrested and punished, or they will take the law

IN THEIR OWN HANDS as those men appear to have done, and delay I fear, will lead to much trouble to settlers along the San Juan river."

The sub-agent says further that this meeting of the Navajos was of the most influential men in the tribe, men who claim to know what the results will be if those offenders are not brought to justice, and then, he adds, "they then sent young San Deval to me with the substance of their deliberations and asked me to write you and the commanding officers of Fort Lewis and Wingate, saying that they demanded the punishment of the man who killed the Navajo and that if steps were not taken toward it by the last of February they would know that there was no redress and will at once retaliate. They also said that the friends of the dead Indian could be induced

TO LET THE MATTER DROP, if \$200 was paid to the family of the deceased. While I do not approve of the plan of paying for a dead Indian, that is what they wanted me to inform the authorities and I do so although giving the idea of no sanction, leaving it to those most interested to see the best way out of the situation. Of one thing I feel assured, if the offender is not brought to justice or some settlement made with the Navajos at the end of thirty days, nothing but the presence of troops of cavalry will prevent great loss of property and prevent bloodshed."

PUBLIC APPREHENSION. The publication of this letter caused no little public apprehension, for the Navajos could put well armed men into the San Juan river settlements in twenty-four hours, against whom the comparatively small number of soldiers in these valleys, poorly armed as they are, would stand but a sorry show. The significant fact is also brought out that a new generation of Navajos has grown up who know only by traditions of the terrible punishment their nation received from Kit Carson in '58, and all they see, are the settlements along the these river, that would easily fall before them, and a

SAVAGE THIRST FOR REVENGE pushes them on to the attack.

Sub-Agent Adams also addressed a letter to the commanding officer at Fort Wingate setting forth the facts and requesting the presence of troops on the San Juan by the 10th of the month at farthest, but received an indefinite reply and at once started over the country to Fort Defiance where he will lay the matter before the agent there, and

through him try to induce the commanding officer of this military post to order Fort Wingate to comply with the request for military protection. It is 100 miles from San Juan to Defiance. Kit Carson is expected to reach there to-morrow or the day following.

## AN APPALLING SIGHT.

### Suspended in the Air With a Red Hot Rod

### PIERCED THROUGH HIS BODY.

Another Victim with Ten Feet of Wire at White Heat Curled Up in His Stomach—Another Killed by an Electric Wire.

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 6.—Two shocking accidents occurred yesterday at Roebling's wiremill, Chesapeake, aged 17, was pierced through the body and suspended in the air on a red hot rod about three inches in diameter. He is known as a "hooker up" in the mill. As the iron leaves the furnace he catches it and guides it to a hole which reduces the size.

As he attempted to seize a piece this morning it broke, and before he had time to take hold the redhot iron entered his right side, and passed through the lung came out beneath the left armpit. As the rod passed through the body the end caught in the machinery, and for an instant the boy was suspended in the air. His weight broke the iron and young Cheattle fell in front of the furnace on his feet. At the same time another long rod of hot iron was seen coming through the rollers. Cheattle still held the tongs when the iron left his body, and as he saw the second piece leaving the furnace he had presence of mind to raise the tongs and ward it off. Medical attendance was procured, but the case was hopeless.

Mart Molecky, a wire drawer of the same mill, was pierced in the stomach about midnight last night. He is a new man and did not understand how to arrange his wire which broke, entering the pit of the stomach, and he was pushed in a corner, and before the reel could be stopped about ten feet of it had curled up in his stomach.

William Merchon was killed in the same mill yesterday by the breaking of an electric wire. The mill closed down for to-day and the firm ordered a corpse of six of Trenton's leading physicians to relieve the men, but they say they can't live.

## Colored Men's Convention.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The colored men's convention to-day elected ex Senator Pinchback president of the national organization and issued an address to the people of the United States.

It expresses regret that it is necessary for colored American citizens to meet in a separate body for the consideration of questions national in their character, but says they are compelled to do so because they have been made special objects of attack and opposition. Attention is called to the fact that popular elections, federal and local, in many states of the south are farcical formalities. Whenever the votes of colored men are suppressed by violence or neutralized by fraud their rights are denied themselves. Their daughters, wives, mothers and sisters are special objects of unfriendly state legislation and are compelled to travel in filthy inferior cars. The address favors the Blair bill, placing of federal elections under federal control and emphatically denounced the bill for the deportation of colored men. All we ask, says the address in conclusion, is

justice, equal rights and fair play.

It was resolved that a copy of the address be presented to the president and that he be thanked in the name of the convention for his kind allusions to colored Americans in his message to congress.

## COLORED EMIGRATION.

### The Butler Bill Favorably Received by the Negroes in Alabama.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—A Birmingham special says: For several days the negroes of Bessemer, Ala., have been holding meetings and discussing Senator Butler's bill. The meetings have been largely attended by the best and most intelligent men of the colored people of the town. Yesterday they gave to the press the following address, which will also be forwarded to the senate and house of representatives at Washington:

"We, the negroes, have been holding meetings favoring the separation of the races and emigration of the colored people to Congo Free State in Africa, and we hope that Senator Butler's bill will pass congress. We want to go back to our country where we belong. We know that it will be better for the colored people, and we hope it will benefit the white people. We are a great political trouble here. We are sorry, but cannot help it. Time has brought this on us. Let knowledge now have her way and knowledge says go, and we will go if the government will pass the bill.

"In our meetings some have objected that the government will want the money back and take bonds on the state that we would find, and it would take us seventy five or 100 years to pay it. Other members say this is not the object of the bill, but there will be a donation of the money to the colonization society."

Many negroes in this section are enthusiastic over the Butler bill scheme.

## Hurricanes and Icebergs.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—A Philadelphia dispatch says: Reports of dangerous icebergs lying directly in the path of west-bound steamships still come in, and the hydrographic officers have warned mariners of the dangers attending the northern passage. Capt. Evans of the British steamship Mineola, which arrived from Hamburg yesterday, reports having passed within a few miles of floating island of ice 700 feet high and a mile long. Capt. Evans says by close observation he located it in latitude 44 34 longitude 43 40 The Mineola had a most thrilling experience during the passage which was accompanied by heavy gales and high seas. When in the vicinity of the region of the ice her coal was nearly gone. After a hard struggle the captain determined that it was impossible to continue and headed for Halifax. On Jan. 28 the crew were all huddled in the chart room.

A terrific hurricane having swept over the ship and the barometer registered 27. Capt. Evans said yesterday that he was once in a tornado in the China sea some years ago when the velocity of the wind registered 115 miles an hour but it was nothing in comparison with this storm. With a full head of steam on the ship's head could not keep within five points of the wind, the vessel makes 14 knots in ordinary weather but was driven astern while the storm continued.

### Commissioners Court

Commissioners court convened Monday with all members of the court in attendance, the court transacted the following business. Ordered that a tax of 25cts, on the \$100 valuation for common fund and 25cts. for court house fund and 15cts. for road and bridge fund be levied for the year 1890. Ordered that the bond of G. Couch to correctly run the line be approved. Ordered that the voting place in precinct No 3 be changed from Geo. Mason's to J. S. Post and D. R. Livingood be appointed presiding officer of election. Ordered that the lease money on county school land be apportioned to the available school fund of the county. Ordered that B. E. Malone be appointed presiding officer of voting precinct No 4. Ordered that the report of jury of view on the Vernon and Garren road be approved and that the road laid out by them be opened up. Ordered that S. W. Vernon, J. J. Crabtree, H. R. Jones, & J. B. Ashburn view out a 3rd class road from sec. 19 blk. 21 & T. C. Ry. Co. to the south line of the county. Ordered that the jury of view on the road to N. W., corner of county be granted until the 24th of March to report. Ordered that the resignation of E. W. Carter constable of precinct No 1 be accepted. Ordered that an election be held in school dist. No 1 to levy school tax of 15cts on the \$100 and that A. C. Foster be appointed to hold said election. Ordered that a school tax of 15cts. on the \$100 be levied in school Dist. No 4 and 5. Ordered that report of S. J. Preston county treasurer, be approved. Ordered that S. H. Johnson be appointed overseer on the Anson road from Haskell to Point creek. Ordered, that W. A. Puccio be appointed overseer on the Haskell and Stonewall road, and that Robert Tyson be appointed overseer on the road from Haskell to Benjamin and that J. D. Roberts be appointed overseer on the road from Haskell to Phrockmorton and that E. A. Reese be appointed overseer on the road from Haskell to Albany. Ordered that the road from Haskell to Anson be divided into two road precincts and that W. A. Clarke be appointed overseer from Pain creek to south line of county. The commissioners agreed to receive bids for a wind mill and 60 barrel tank and one 25 barrel tank for the public well. Bids will be received with the privilege of objecting any and all of same until March 24th. There was no further business except approving reports and auditing claims.


