THE SAMOAN WAR CLOUD.

Stirring Private Telegram.

St. Louis, Mo., March 8.—The Globe Democrat pirats a cable special from Breslau which says the Schlesiache Zeitung prints the following sensational private telegram from Samoa:

"The German frigate Olga has bombarded Mataafa's camp. The captain of the American man-of-war protested, but seeing his protest disregarded he opened fire on the Olga. The shell burst between decks doing much damage. The Olga then directed a torpedo at the American ship, blowing her up with all hands."

San Francisco Cal., March 8.—Great prominence is given in the papers here to the rumor that an American man-of-war was sunk in Samoan waters in a fight with the German corvette Olga. While no credence is given to the report the publication has occasioned a sensation. The fact that the name of the vessel alleged to have been sunk is omitted adds to the disbelief in the report, but it is assumed that the vessel is the Nipsic, Capt. Mullane commanding.

 The L— wagon on the Wichita, the M wagon in the 9 9 range, the H 4 wagon in Jones county on Little Stinking, The Wcross and QB wagons on the Brazos river. Neighborhood work beginning on Lake creek at Howard Lake April 18th, work down Lake creek and up the Brazos and through Little Arizona.

Speedy Justice.

On last Friday evening at about four o'clock A. S. Kauffman was placed upon the witness stand as a witness for the defendant John Kegans who was being tried for theft of cattle. After he had given his testimony for the defendant the District Attorney asked him if he had ever lived in Kansas, and if he had ever been convicted in that state for forgery in the second degree to which he very promptly answered no, to the astonishment of the bar and court who heard him testify in the case of Tom Pitner who was sentenced in this court about two years ago for theft of cattle, when he identified himself as the A. S. Kauffman mentioned in a judgement, a certified-copy of which was introduced in evidence in that trial, which was a judgement of a court of Kansas convicting him of forgery in the second degree. Though questioned at some length he continued to contradict his former statements. The court then ordered him arrested and the grand jury which was in session promptly indicted him in two cases for perjury. He was found guilty on a plea of guilty of false-swearing in each case Saturday by ten o'clock and sentenced to the penitentiary for two years in each case, which was several hours before the jury in the case in which the offense was committed returned a verdict. There is no sympathy for him except with a very few of his associates.
