The following is an extract from a speech delivered by Ex-Governor Ireland at Austin the other day.

ONE WORD TO LADIES.

Unless you take your boy to your knees and there instill in him the truth of manhood and love of justice you had better never let that child enter the school room. Their citizenship depends on this instruction, and if they receive it, even if they cannot write their names, they will make their mark in the world while with vicious instruction their destruction is certain.

You are a progressive people out here, but let me point you to the growth of the city of Denver, which I visited last summer. Not one word of any thing is raised there, it is one of the prettiest cities on the American continent. Planted there in a gorge of the Rocky mountains, it has been built by men who dig in the hills for minerals, and has a population of 125,000; while I was there they raised \$80,000 in three hours to finish a church in which men pay \$50 to \$1000 a year for seats. The lonely tent found upon our border is far advanced over our houses erected to mammon in point of civilization.

You took up your residence here upon the frontier with that vim so necessary to development. When I first went to Seguin I saw the best men of my country in the jury box. Here I am pleased to see men of intelligence in your jury boxes, and hope you will never have a change.

What a mistaken idea the world has of

A FRONTIER COUNTRY!

I entertained such an idea myself until I came to Texas, but now how different! You want to erect a school building, this is right. My education was received in an old log house, unbewitched and with but two openings. We had one plank put up for a writing desk and put benches for seats.

Diplomas are not always necessary, for their receivers are too often ruined. The college boy walks off from the university boy thinks the diploma will carry him through. The time that he has poured over dead languages is lost to him forever. I am not opposed to universities, but I have

seen so many that have been ruined by attending them. Boys should be taught to rely upon their strong arm. Ladies soon forget the piano when they assume the cares of a household, and so it is with the university boy. I received most of my education after I arrived at the years of manhood, by pine-knot fire and dip-tallow candles. In the little advancement that I have made in life, there is no boy but whose chances are not better than those I enjoyed. Start out in life with an object in view, or nothing can be accomplished.
