THE PLATFORM.

Recommended by a Majority of the committee on platform.

For the convenience of delegates EVERYING TRUSTEE publishes the majority report and would have given the minority report but for the fact that the convention refused the use of the copy.

The Platform. Galveston, Tex. Aug. 12, 1886. To Hon. R. M. Wynne, President Democratic Convention of Texas: The Democratic party of Texas hereby declare the following platform of principles:

1. We the Democrats of Texas, express our hearty satisfaction with the administration of our distinguished president, the Hon. Grover Cleveland, and testify our confidence in his ability, purity and integrity.

2. We pledge ourselves that the current public expenditures shall be confined within the current revenue.

3. We recommend the submission to the popular vote of an appropriate amendment to the judiciary article of our constitution, so as to secure a more efficient and prompt administration of law.

4. We favor the best system of education for white and colored children in separate common schools, which may be provided by liberal, without excessive, taxation. We believe that the education of the children is a matter of State right and duty, and that the Congress of the United States has no right to appropriate money to its aid.

5. We congratulate the people of Texas upon the successful establishment of our State University, and we recommend the enactment of legislation to remove the same, as far as possible, from all political influences, and that its properties and revenue shall be strictly guarded, increased and so far as it can be done without taxation upon the people.

6. We believe that the true policy of the State with respect to her public lands is to provide for their sale, in tracts of reasonable size, with reference to their quality and uses, at fair prices and upon long credit to bona fide settlers for homestead purposes. We favor such a classification of the school, university and asylum lands as may permit the unconditional leasing for short terms of lands only for grazing and that the remainder may be leased temporarily and entirely subject to the right of the state to sell to actual and bona fide settlers, and to those and we favor the enactment of laws to compel the removal of trespassers and free-grazers from the public lands, and to force the payment of rent for their use and to fix absolutely the rental price of lands to be leased. There should be such legislation as will make it practicable to enforce all laws intended to prevent the illegal use of the school or other public lands of the state.

7. We denounce the unlawful interference with or injury to corporate rights, as equally intolerable as such interference with or injury to the rights of citizens. And while we recognize the high obligation of the Democratic party to control and subordinate all public corporations to the general good we pledge ourselves to enact and enforce all laws that may be necessary to protect their property from every danger from whatever source the same may come.

8. The Democratic party looks with apprehension upon the fact that foreign railway corporations have acquired control of the railway of Texas in violation of the provisions of the constitution; and protest against the methods by which they are being operated. We pledge ourselves to pass laws to correct abuses and prevent unjust discriminations; to compel all railways doing business in this state to maintain an office in the state in compliance with Section Three, Article V of the Constitution; and we bind ourselves to secure by the right of the state to inspect all the books, belonging or appertaining to the organization, operation and business of the railways of Texas. We protest against the consolidation of parallel and competing lines in the state and pledge ourselves that laws shall be passed and enforced to correct this evil. We pledge ourselves to pass general laws forbidding to

the state all lands heretofore granted to railway corporations, where such corporations have failed to comply with the terms of their charters, or have failed in good faith to alienate their lands within the period fixed by law.

9. We believe that stockholders in private corporations should be held liable to pay the debts of the corporation to the amount due on their stock, and an additional amount equal to the stock owned by them, and that the legislature shall regulate and fix the term upon which private corporations may do business in this state. And that laws shall be passed prohibiting corporations not chartered by the laws of this state from buying or leasing the public lands of this state or any of the School, University or Asylum lands.

10. We believe that the existing law of our state for the protection of mechanics and laborers by lien should be comprehensive and efficient, to the end that the rail laborer may be thoroughly protected.

11. We declare that all state convicts should be confined within the walls of the penitentiary; and it is the duty of the legislature to provide penitentiaries sufficient for this purpose. We are also in favor of a reform school or house of correction for minors and females convicted of offenses to the end that they may be separated from the adult convicts of the state.

12. We do not believe that the views of any citizen upon the question of local option should interfere with his standing in the Democratic party; and we declare the question to be one in which every Democrat may indulge his own views without affecting his Democracy.

13. The Democrats of Texas declare that it is the duty of the general government to protect and defend the humblest American citizen against the unlawful act of any and all nations; and that decisive action in demanding indemnity for past and existing grievances, and security for the future will meet with the unqualified approval of the Democracy of Texas. The following is the assignment of causes to the court of appeals at Ft. Worth for the term beginning on the first Monday in October 1886.

First assignment—Two weeks commencing Monday, October 4, 1886, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Nacogdoches, San Augustine, Cherokee, Anderson, Sabine, Gregg, Harrison, Wood, Upshur and Smith.

Second assignment—Two weeks commencing Monday, October 18, 1886, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Bowie, Cass, Camp, Franklin, Martin, Morris, Titus.

Third assignment—Two weeks commencing Monday, November 1, 1886, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Delta, Hopkins, Hunt, Kaufman, Rockwall, Kainer, Red River, Navarro.

Fourth assignment—Two weeks commencing Monday, November 15, 1886, are assigned for hearing causes from the counties of Panoia, Tusk, Shelby, Van Zandt.

Fifth or special assignment—Cases transferred from other branches of the court, and felony cases sent direct to the court from other counties not named in preceding assignment, will be taken up at any time during the term upon submission by either the state or the applicant, and the authority by which such cases are sent direct to that term, must appear in or accompany the record.

On Wednesday and Saturday of each week will be set apart for delivering opinions and hearings arguments. Arguments will be heard on no other days, and will be regulated by rules 11 rules for supreme court, and rules 76, rules for court of appeals.

Hon. FREDERICK DOUGLASS is to have his portrait painted by a Boston artist.

An interesting statement is made by Col. Barrow, who was the chief organizer of the British expedition to the Sudan. The horses of the 15th Hussars were Arab stallions of foreign lands, whose average age was between eight and nine years, bought in Syria and lower Egypt. Out of 300 horses, during nine months in a hard campaign, only twelve died from disease. This he attributes, firstly to the climate of the Sudan being most suitable for horses, and secondly to the Spanish horse having a wonderful constitution. The distance marched, irrespective of reconnaissances, etc., was over 1,500 miles, and the weight carried averaged 1,100 pounds. The weather during the last four months was very trying, food was often very limited, and during the desert march water was very scarce. When Gen. Stewart's column made its final advance, the 153 horses of the 14th had with them, marched to the Nile without having received a drop of water for 24 hours, and only one pound of grain. Some 15 or 20 had no water for 70 hours. At the end of the campaign, and after a week's rest, the animals were handed over to the 20th Hussars at Assouan in as good order as when they left Wady Halfa nine months previously.

The skeleton story.

Pedestrians on William street have had their attention called to the window of a dealer in musical instruments the past several months by the complete skeleton of a human form slitting back upright in a corner at each corner. Close beside it a skull, in which it is encased, "Alas! poor Yerrick!" When asked regarding the trade in this curious article, the merchandise by a "What is your business?" the dealer said: "Well, my dear friend? For, sir, comparatively speaking we sell lots of them, although you didn't see the article quoted in the market reports. Why, we usually average to carry on hand a stock of from twenty-five to forty skeletons and a complete line of skulls. We sell them to museums, medical colleges and physicians.

"The price of a skeleton varies from \$30 to \$50, according to its perfection and completeness. The demand is not very large, from 200 to 300 a year is probably the limit of the number of complete skeletons sold in this country. Our sales are about 150 a year. "A curious feature of the trade is that all that are sold are imported. They come from Paris, where a regular business is done in preparing them for the trade. Nearly all the skeletons imported to this country come to this city. Where do they get them? Oh, from morgues and the many cases of suicides that occur in France."

"Why can't they be prepared in this country?" was asked. "There is no establishment of the kind in this country that I know of, and the process is such that people do not seem to have the facilities or inclination to go into this kind of business. Besides, it necessitates a costly outlay and the business here is not of sufficient size to make it pay. A few years ago a Frenchman did come over here with the idea of starting the business. He did make a start in Philadelphia, but soon had to give it up after considerable loss, for he couldn't make it pay.

"That skeleton you noticed in the window is from France. It is a defective one, so we have had it out exhibition there. It attracted the public notice, and the other day a man came in here and with a supply of express on his face asked where that man could be found. We told him it was a Frenchman whose first name was Yerrick, and the name of the dealer was Yerrick. The water was very muddy and he was very much annoyed over the poor skeleton sitting there in that painful position day after day, when he ought to be lying at rest in his grave."—New York Mail and Express.
