Not only have the charges of railcoads been reduced, and the value of their properties enhanced; but there has been an immence increase in their milcege since 1879.

The records of this office show that for the five years previous to establishment of the commission in 1879, there were built in this state less than one hundred miles of railroad, showing an anual average of about twenty miles, and since 1879 to the present time there have been built in Georgia two thousand miles of railroad, making an average of two hundred miles per anumn.





There was no further development until early in 1884, when the town of Haskell was laid off and by donating lots a few settlers were induced to build residences, and in January 1885 the county organized with a polled vote of 57 electors.

THE RED MAN'S POLITICS.

Campaign for Governor in the Choctaw Naton-Indian Philosophy.

PARIS, Tex., July 9 .- The campaign for governor in the Choctaw nation is warming up. There' seems to be no issues particularly except the office. B. F. Smallwood is a candidate for re-election and is opposed by W. N. Jones. They are cousins and nephews of old Ben Leflore, the famous Chootaw chief. Jones claimes to be a progressionist and favor individualizing lands and the fullest development of the country. Smallwood adhears to fundamental principals. The election comes off on the first Wednesday in Augst and the voting strength of the nation is about 3000, but it is not likely that Chaetaw does not make as big a fool of himself about politics as the red man does not bother about
