GROVER'S LETTER

TO GEN BRAGG IN RESPONSE TO AN INQUIRY.

He Thinks the Democrats Should Think Ever So Careful About Whom They Put in Nomination.

BRAGG'S LETTER.

MILLWAUKEE, Wis., March 14.—Gen. Edward S. Bragg, author of the famous "We love him for the enemies he has made," has been urging ex-President Cleveland to make a public avowal of his position in connection with the approaching Democratic presidential convention. Under date of March 9th, he wrote a letter to Cleveland from Fon du Lac, containing the following paragraph:

"The danger to public interests which a failure of the Democratic party would involve seems to me now to require an open avowal of your willingness to submit to any service to which your party and people may assign you."

In reply the ex-president writes as follows:

"If in answering your questions I might only consider my personal desires and my individual ease and comfort, my response would be promptly made and without the least reservation or difficulty. But if you are right in supposing that the subject is related to duty I owe to my country and my party the condition that exists which makes such private and personal considerations entirely irrelevant to the question. I cannot, however, refrain from declaring to you that my experience in the great office of the United States has so impressed me with the solemnity of the trust and its awful responsibilities that I cannot bring myself to regard the candidacy for the same as something to be won by personal strife and active self assertion. I have also an idea that the presidency is pre-eminently the people's office, and I have been sincere in my constant advocacy of the effective participation in political affairs on the part of our countrymen. I consequently believe the people should be heard in the choice of their party candidates and that they themselves should make nominations as directly as is consistent with open, fair and full party organization and methods. I speak of these things solely for the purpose of advising you that my conception of the nature of the presidential office and my conviction that the voters of our party should be free in the selection of their candidates precludes the possibility of my leading and pushing a self seeking canvass for the presidential nomination, even if I had a desire to be again a candidate. Believing that the complete success of our party depends upon the few errors committed and turned into personal matters for the personal place and honor of the individual. The Teach, but

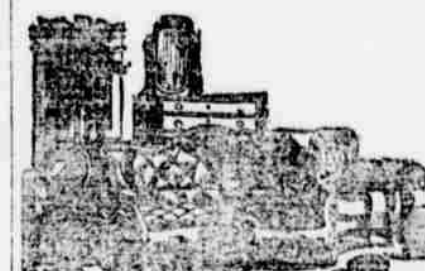

The Postal Laws Respecting Newspapers

About two years ago, Messrs. Geo. P. Rowell & Co., of New York, the publishers of Rowell's Newspaper Directory, and several other publications of great value to concerns wishing to do business with the newspapers, started a very unique weekly, both in form (12 mo.) and name (PRINTER'S INK).

It was a new idea all through, and like new ideas generally, require large capital, much experience and utmost push to make it go. The publishers had to educate people and make a market for the publication. To what extent they succeeded may be judged by the fact that its editions now exceed 80,000, and the business probably \$300,000 per year. We doubt if any publication published once a week is read with more avidity. In fact we have seen it in many instances carefully preserved just as monthly magazines are preserved, so highly is it valued.

Now, after allowing the publishers to proceed on these lines for several years, the Post-Office Department rules that the journal is not a legitimate newspaper and cannot be admitted to second-class rates, but as third class matter.

The postage on the issue of January the 13th amounted at third-class rates to \$805, besides the labor of attaching 80,500 stamps to that number of papers. At second-class rates the proper charge for postage would be \$69.72, making a difference in cost of mailing this one issue of \$733.24. In other word about \$3,627 a year at second-class matter, against \$41,860 as third class. In the mean time Rowell & Co. are paying this enormous sum under protest, until the Department can further consider the case.

Of course it is outrageous that the law is so ambiguous that the Post-Office authorities themselves can blunder in construing it, as they do according to the whim of the person in charge of the matter, and it ought to be changed immediately in justice to those compelled to suffer by such ambiguity.

If PRINTER'S INK is not a newspaper then there is not a weekly newspaper in the country.

Fierce Blizzard.

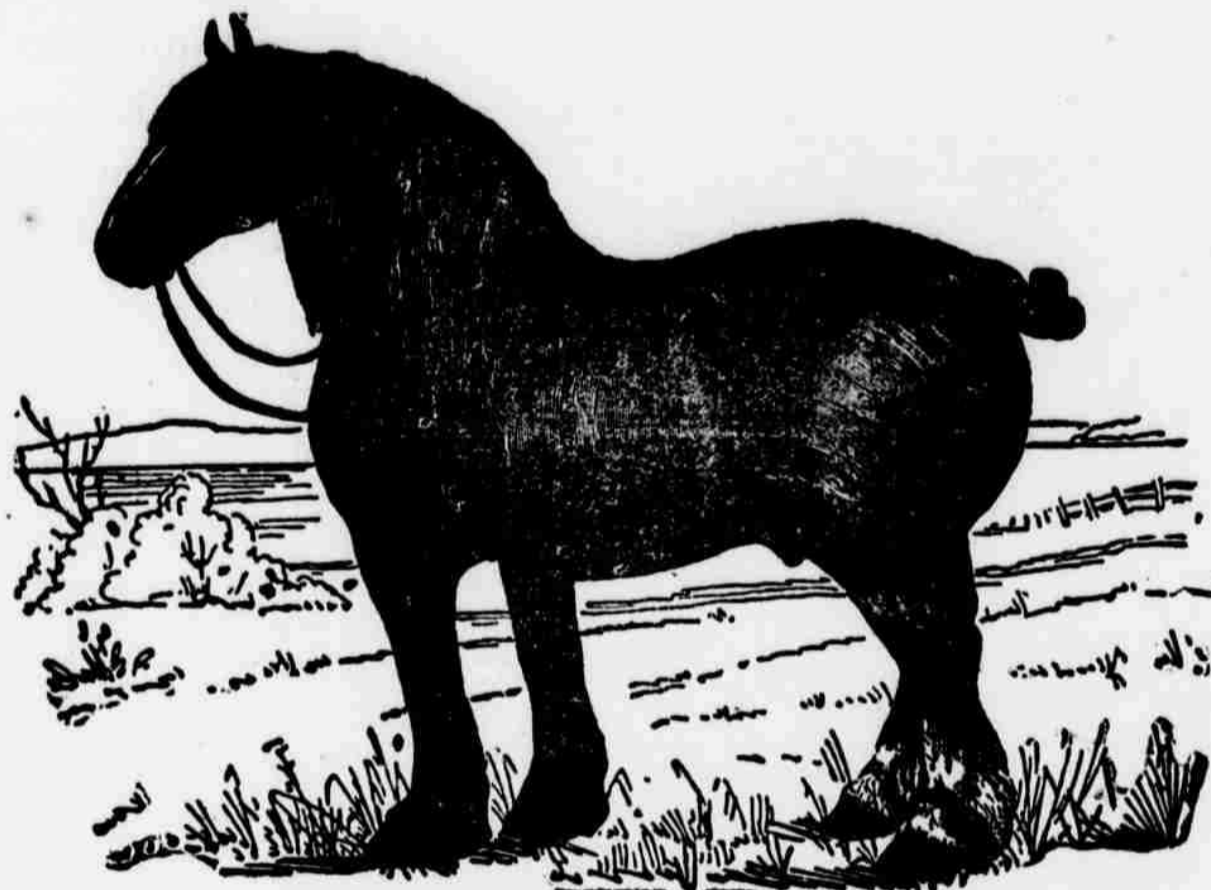

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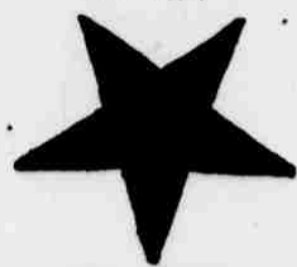
