

John Barry's Will Hold Meeting at Benjamin Church

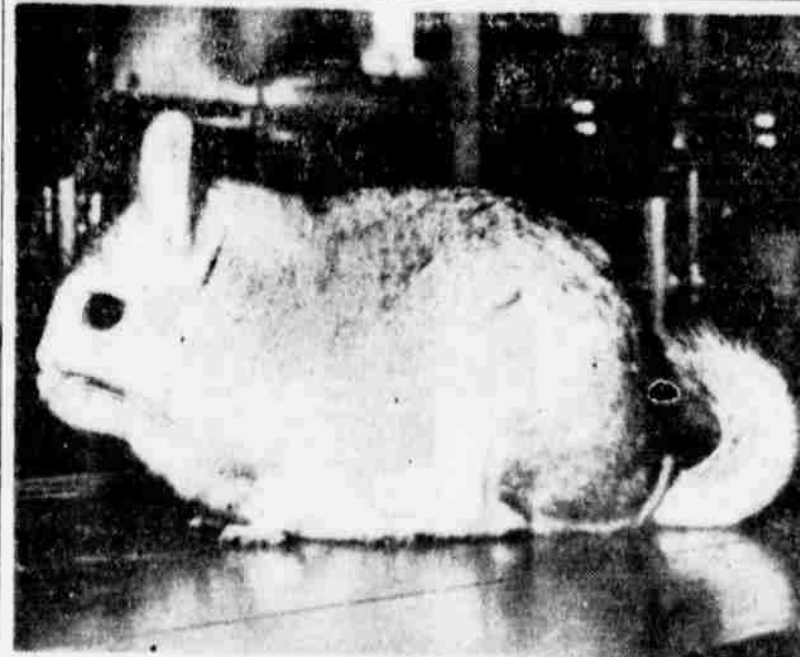

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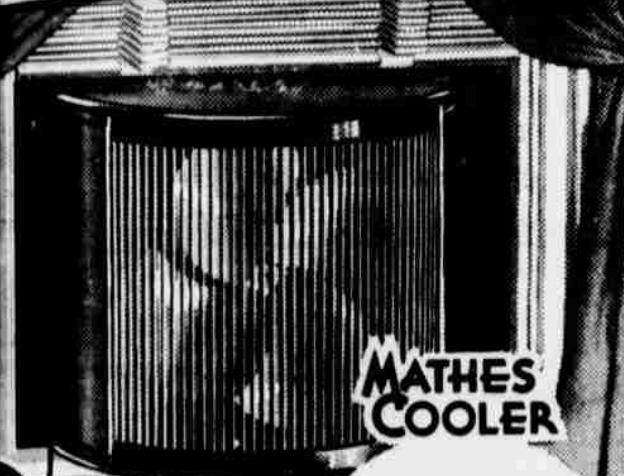

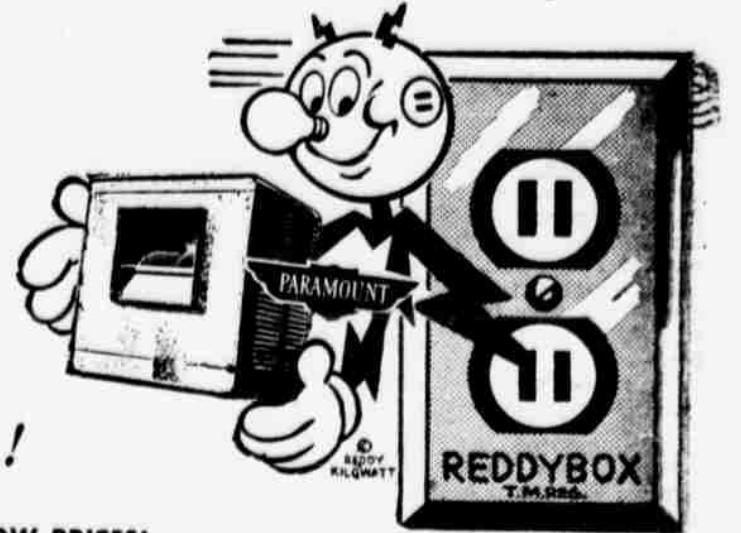

11 Amendments To State Constitution Will Be Submitted To Voters In 1954

The Legislature left 11 proposed constitutional amendments for the vote of the people.

The election will be held on the same date of the General Election in November 1954.

This is the biggest package of proposed changes the legislature has fixed up in recent years. It will make 213 suggested changes offered to the people since Texas adopted its present Constitution in 1876. Only 110 of these have been adopted.

The changes the legislature approved this year would:

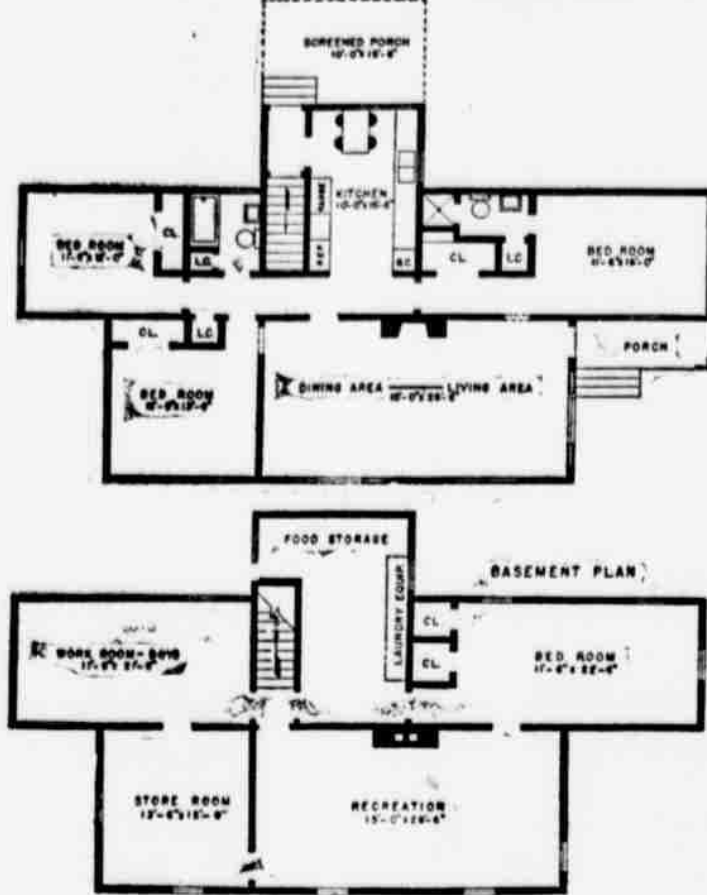
1. Require women to serve on juries in Texas. The people turned it down several years ago. Rep. DeWitt Hale, Corpus Christi, got it through the Legislature again.
2. Raise the present \$35,000-000-a-year ceiling on state public welfare to 42 million dollars for the needy blind and dependent children. Sen. Doyle Williams, Fort Worth, sponsored it. The people turned down the same proposal in 1951.
3. Raise the pay of legislators to \$25 a day for the first 120 days of a session and drop them to

nothing for any days thereafter of a session. They now get \$10 a day for the first 120 days and \$5 thereafter. The proposed change also would make the salaries now set in the Constitution for state officers the minimum salaries and let the Legislature raise them when they wanted to. The governor now gets \$12,000 a year, the attorney general \$10,000 and the rest \$6,000.

4. Allow military personnel from Texas to vote. It requires them to vote in the county where they resided before entering military service.
5. Permit use of the unused part of the Confederate Pension Fund to erect two new state office and court building in Austin, a memorial to Texas' Confederate soldiers who fought in the Texas War of Independence. Its sponsor, Sen. George Moffett, estimated six million dollars would be available.
6. Allow four-year term for precinct, county and district elective officers. They now have two-year terms. Sen. J. P. Fuller of Port Arthur sponsored it.
7. Prohibit pledging the state's credit to support toll roads, by Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo.
8. Allow a joint city-county hospital to be supported by a tax up to 75 cents per \$100 valuation, after approved in a county election. It applies only to Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, Galveston, El Paso and Jefferson Counties.
9. Allow counties of 10,000 or less to vote on whether they want a separate tax assessor-collector. The sheriff does the job now in such small counties.
10. Allow certain city employees

11. Allow certain city employees and teachers to get credit for prior service when they switch from one retirement system to the other. By Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris.

In all, 61 amendments were introduced.

Because of the number of entries expected, the first go-round will be held beginning at 8 p. m. on June 24 and the 12 highest will be seen in the rodeo, four horses at each show, with the finalists appearing of course on the last night.

A \$300 purse is offered by the rodeo and \$20 of the \$25 entry fee also will form part of the prize money, which will be divided 80 per cent in the go-rounds and 20 per cent in the finals. Zearl Williamson of Graham and Foster Richmond of Olney are in charge of arrangements for the contest. Douglas B. Mitchell of Fort Worth, secretary of the National Cutting Horse Association, will conduct the event.

get better prices for cotton when they know before going to market to H. J. Matejowski of the Abilene Cotton Office, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Then he explained that the cotton classing is a position to demand that they get a bale that will be likely to get the best price for farm-ers and at no cost. They are to be classed under the new program. To do this, they must contact their county cotton classing office, which is organized, and group leader files one with the cotton classing office.

"This is done," Matejowski said, "members will get free service on all their cotton. In addition, they can get price quotations each service is mailed free of charge."

His cotton is classed by the state. He will get back a green card showing grade and price. With this card, they can sell their cotton without both-ering samples to buyers. Matejowski reminded interested farmers to sign up before the date to insure their cotton in the 1953 program.

Pfc. John L. Grand Sees Test Firing Of Atomic Shell

Desert Rock, Nev.—Pfc John L. Grand, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Grand, Rt. 2, Haskell, witnessed the first test firing of an atomic shell from the Army's giant cannon at Camp Desert Rock, Nev., this week.

He was one of nearly 3,000 officers and enlisted men, most of them artillerymen, who crouched behind revetments 4,500 yards from ground zero as scientists fired the huge 280 mm artillery piece by electrical control from a tower ten miles away.

Before the firing of the atomic shell, the group was thoroughly indoctrinated in atomic warfare techniques and took part in experimental firing of conventional, non-atomic projectiles from the mammoth weapon.

Hog Prices Hit Highest Peak In Five Years At Fort Worth Market Monday

Let's Talk Livestock
By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth — Swine growers could enjoy a rueful smile Monday as hogs hit the highest peak since November 1948 at Fort Worth. Choice butcher hogs sold at \$25.25-\$25.75. The joy was tempered by the fact that several years of low prices for hogs had thinned down the hog population to where while the price was good, the numbers were few.

Most hog breeders are frantically trying to re-stock since a short time ago it was announced that the hog population was smaller than the numbers of cattle on the nation's farms. The ideal relationship is generally conceded to be 20 per cent more hogs than cattle in the country.

Sows and pigs were steady, sows mostly \$20 to \$22 and feeder pigs from \$21 down.

Cattle buyers were highly selective. The fed heaves were scarce and good and choice drylot fed cattle ruled strong. Bulls held steady.

Good and choice fat calves were steady but common, plain and medium in-between sorts sold weak to lower. High quality stockers were steady, but others drabby and plain stockers sold mainly for low grade killers. Demand for stocker sows was very narrow.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$18-\$22.50. I. S. Scott, Castro County, had a load weighing 758 lbs. at \$22.50. B. T. Woodward, Hunt County, had a load of cross-bred Brahmas at \$21 that averaged 810 lbs. Common, plain and medium steers and yearlings \$10-\$16, some rannies. Fat cows mostly \$9-\$12, just a

few higher. Scaling V. Ranch, Clay County, had 17 cows at 1,047 lbs. at \$13.75, and 20 cows at 1,108 lbs. at \$12.50. Odds reached \$14. Canners and cutters \$6-\$9. Bulls \$8-\$14. Larkin Renick, Castro County, had two top bulls at 1,530 lbs. at \$14.

Good and choice fat calves drew \$17 to \$20, with common and medium butchers at \$10-\$15. Culls \$8-\$10. Good and choice stocker steer calves \$16-\$20; good and stocker steer yearlings \$15-\$19; heifer calves and yearlings \$2 under comparable steers. Few stocker cows \$10-\$14.

Good and choice fat Spring lambs \$24-\$26.50; medium to good \$18-\$24; cull and common \$12-\$16. Stocker and feeder Spring lambs, shorn lambs and yearlings \$12-\$18. Cull old crop lambs \$8-\$12. Two-year-olds \$10-\$14. Old wethers \$8-\$10.50. Fat shorn old crop lambs and yearlings \$17-\$22. Ewes \$4-\$6. Old bucks around \$4.

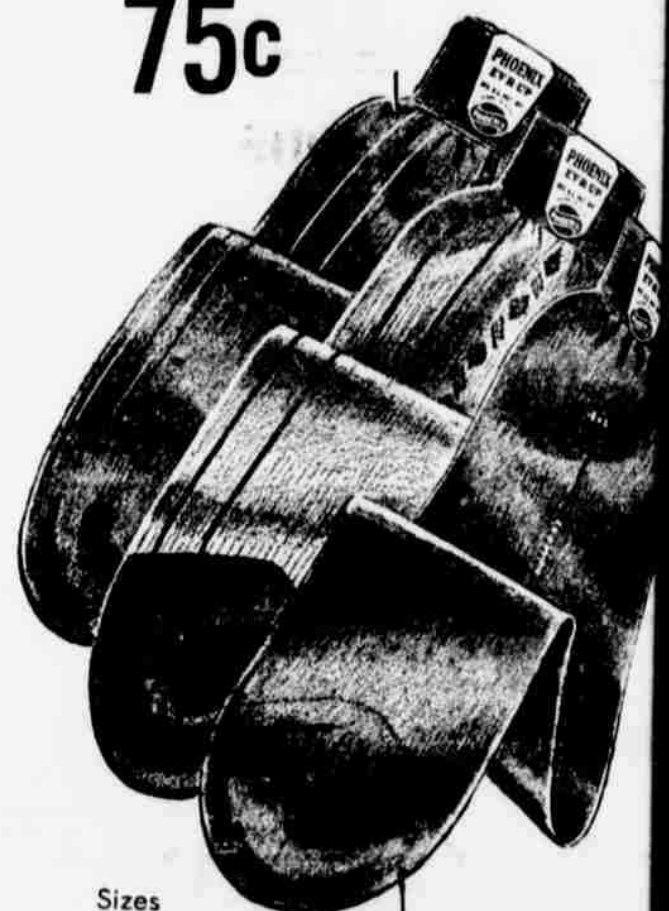
