Organization of the Highway 277 Association was perfected Monday at a meeting in Stamford of representatives from Haskell and other area towns. A. C. Humphrey of Stamford was elected to the presidency of the organization.

John A. Couch of Haskell was elected vice president, and Lee Walker of Stamford, secretary-treasurer. Representatives from five towns were present at the meeting, and other points along the highway route from Wichita Falls to Abilene have been invited to make nominations for directors from their respective towns.

Fifteen directors will be named, which include two from Wichita Falls and two from Abilene and one each from Holliday, Mankins, Dundee, Seymour, Gore, Munday, Weinert, Haskell, Stamford, Anson and Hawley.

Purpose of the organization is to improve Highway 277 and to encourage tourists. It is not planned to rush for any starting point. Improvement of the highway route. Work on the highway, roughly 150 miles, will have to be done in sections since there will not be enough money to rebuild that length at one time. Jury Verdict For Plaintiff Returned In Damage Suit

A verdict favoring the plaintiff was returned by a jury in a civil case styled Harry T. Stapler, a minor, vs. the Texas Employment Insurance Association. The case was heard Tuesday and Wednesday before District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman. Stapler sought to recover judgment for total and permanent disability for injuries received in an accident on the Rule-Jud farm to market road while he was employed as a truck driver for an oil field concern.

In answering special issues, the jury found the plaintiff was entitled to partial compensation for 40 weeks. Stapler, in his petition, asked relief for total and permanent disability which would have amounted to 401 weeks.

The jury verdict will amount to something in excess of \$1,900. Counsel for the plaintiff was A. J. Smith, Sr., of Anson, assisted by Tom Davis, Haskell attorney. Defendant company was represented by Lee Sellers of the law firm of Nelson, Montgomery, Robertson & Sellers of Wichita Falls.

Slow Rain Friday Brings One-Half Inch Moisture

A slow drizzling rain, intermingled with scattered snowflakes at intervals, fell during most of the day Friday, reviving hopes of farmers for late winter moisture badly needed on ranges and the small acreage of wheat that has survived an unusually dry winter.

Total moisture received during the day amounted to one-half inch, according to John B. Martin, Government weather observer here. It was the first appreciable moisture received this year, something like .12 of an inch having fallen during January.

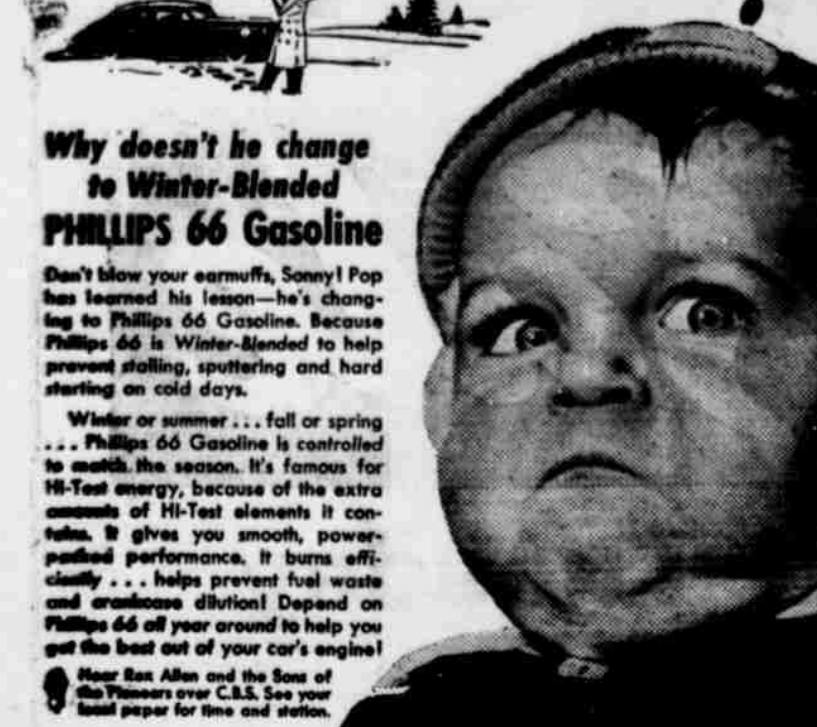

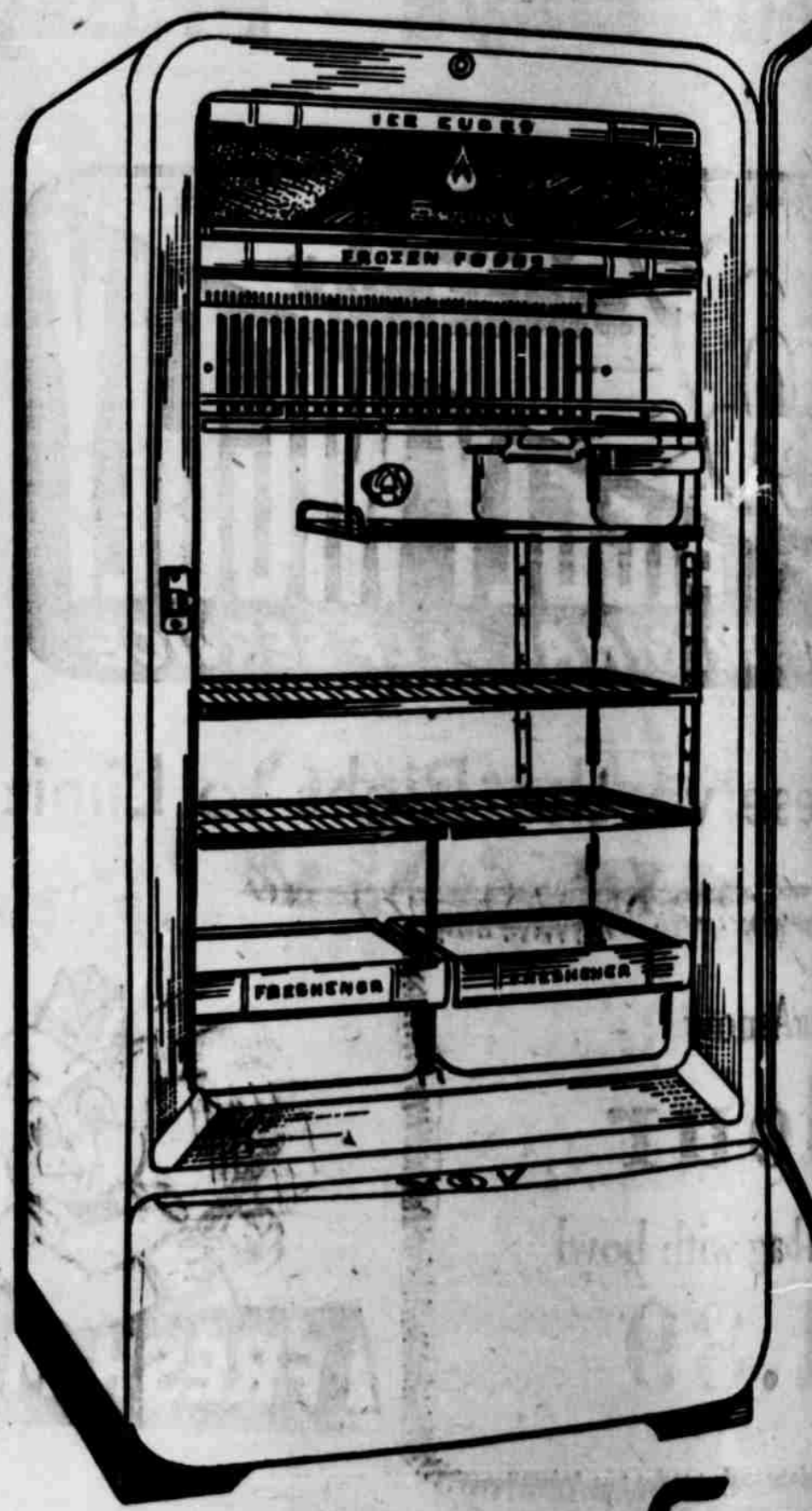

It will be a meeting of Haskell and Jones County singers, and the program will begin promptly at 2 p. m.

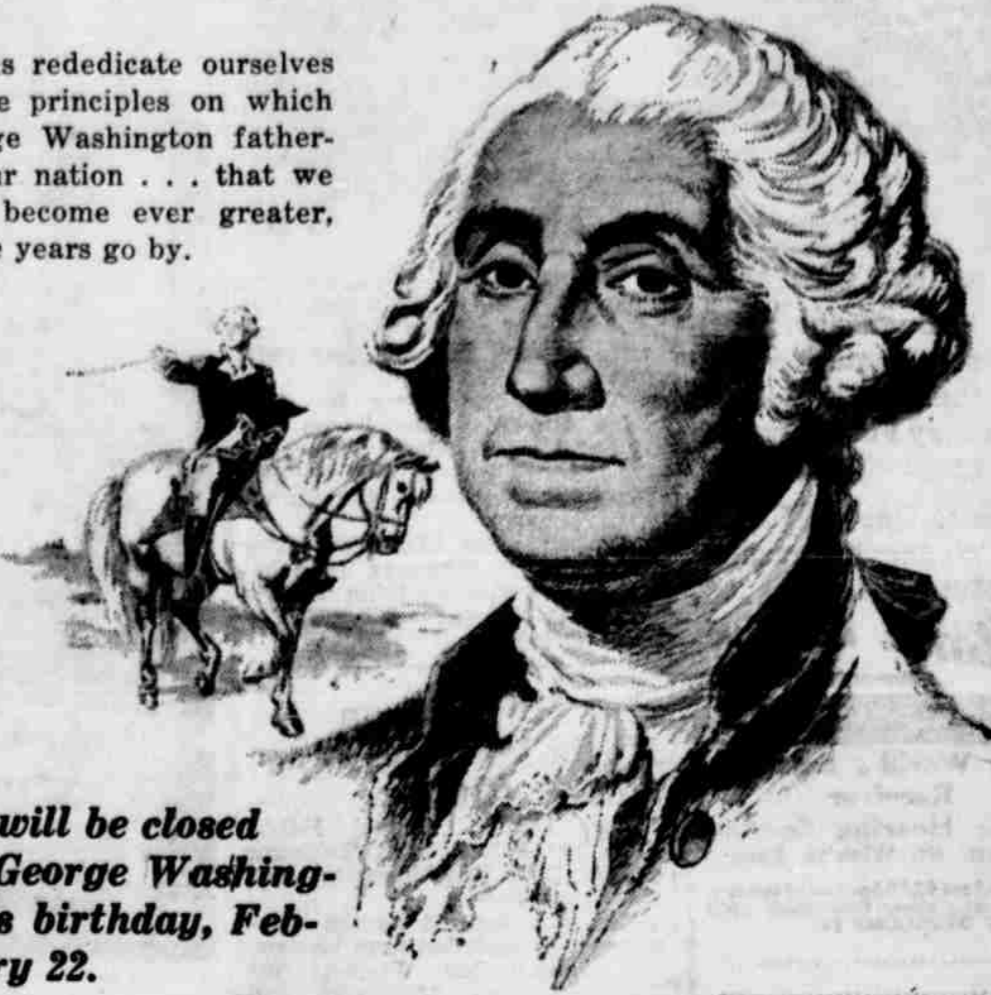

He is regarded as being an independent, middle of the road thinker, who votes his honest convictions. He voted against the Auto Inspection Law, while most members voted for it. He served as an enlisted man in World War I, and is the first native of this district to represent it in the State Senate.

"The time has come," states Mr. Moffett, "when we must conduct our public affairs with the greatest possible foresight, prudence and honesty. Essential functions of government must be continued, but waste must be eliminated. I will sincerely appreciate your vote and support in the July primary election."
