## AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

The past week has been the busiest thus far this session. There have been numerous committee hearings on bills of wide-spread interest. Over one thousand filling station operators attended a Senate committee hearing on a bill affecting that business. On the same night over five hundred people attended a committee hearing over in the House of Representatives which related to changes in the Workmen's Compensation Law, which provides payment for workmen injured on the job. These hearings brought out many points of information that must be considered in framing a law which applies to the particular business affected.

The mail is getting heavier each week. It is not unusual for a member to receive fifty letters daily. For this reason each branch of the Legislature usually adjourns at noon on Thursday in order for the members to catch up over the week-end with their heavy correspondence. This is particularly true in the Senate, where each member receives approximately five times as much mail as a member of the other branch.

The Legislature is daily giving more thought to Senate finances. I am often asked about taxation on natural resources. In order to provide reliable information I requested the State Comptroller to furnish me with accurate figures concerning taxes on crude oil over a 20-year period. Oil and gas taxes are paid to the State Comptroller. His records show that in 1932 the crude oil production, 653 brought in \$4,127,000.00. In 1932 the State collected \$117,804,900.00 from the tax on crude oil, or 29 times as much in 1932 as was collected in 1932 from this tax.

The Legislature increased the rate of taxation during the 20-year period, and the amount of oil produced has likewise increased several times over. The tax on crude oil now brings in more dollars than any other tax levied by the State. However, since the war boom is beginning to slow down, the amount of oil being pumped out of the wells of Texas is decreasing. It is to be hoped that this decrease will not continue, for if it should do so it will complicate the State's finances at a time when more money is needed for necessary purposes, such as school support and highways. More on this subject later.

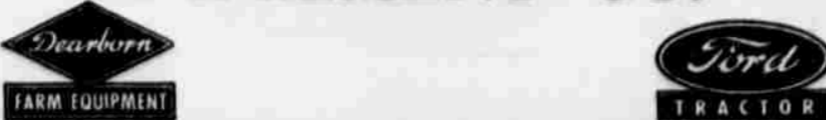

## Home Landscaping Despite Drouth Mokes Progress

In spite of the drouth of 1952 more than a thousand farm and ranch families managed to landscape their homes to the extent of reaching the "result demonstration" status. According to Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, this figure falls far short of the usual total for completed homestead improvement demonstrations. In 1951 nearly 3,000 families reported to county home demonstration agents the completion of their landscaping plans. The 1952 report was not as large, for the dry weather killed many shrubs and trees. However, demonstrators planted nearly 200,000 trees for windbreak and shade, and approximately 50,000 shrubs. They sodded more than 3,000 lawns. The specialist says the agents and demonstrators realized that definite steps would have to be taken to prevent loss of plantings and possible damage by fire. Special training was planned at four workshops held in different areas in Texas for agents and leaders. At these meetings demonstrations were given on making safe trashburners and as a result 197 counties reported the construction of nearly 3,000 during the year. The workshops also included demonstrations planning and using outdoor living rooms, showing equipment for cooking, eating and playing in this area of the landscape. They reported nearly 1,500 outdoor living rooms, and about 800 barbecue areas provided. Miss Hatfield says similar workshops are planned for 1953. The first will be held at Texas State College for Women at Denton March 12-13. Another is planned for Texas A&M College, April 29-30. Details on the workshops planned for home demonstration and garden club leaders are available in the county extension agents' office or by writing the specialist at College Station.

## Refund Of Income Tax Keeps Pace With Early Returns

While a majority of taxpayers are still working on their income tax returns, which must be filed by March 16, the Bureau of Internal Revenue's Refunding program is keeping pace with early returns, Ellis Campbell, Jr., Director of Internal Revenue, announced today. About 170,000 persons who filed early tax returns have already received refunds. At the present time, returns are being processed as received and taxpayers usually get their refunds within two to four weeks after filing. The director warns, however, that taxpayers who wait until March 16 deadline for filing 1952 tax statements may expect a longer wait. It is the policy of the Internal Revenue Service to issue refunds to those who are entitled to them as soon as possible, but in cases of extra delay, the Bureau pays interest on the amount due, Director Campbell said. The director also advises that taxpayers who change residence after filing their tax forms should notify the director's office of their new addresses. Each year tens of thousands of refund checks are returned to Revenue offices, and over one million remained undelivered at the end of 1952. These checks, some issued ten years ago average \$32. The director says that positive identification and claiming of old checks is difficult, and that taxpayers with claims should be able to supply information on the amount of refund and the taxable year involved. Last year, the Bureau made refunds to 31 million taxpayers.

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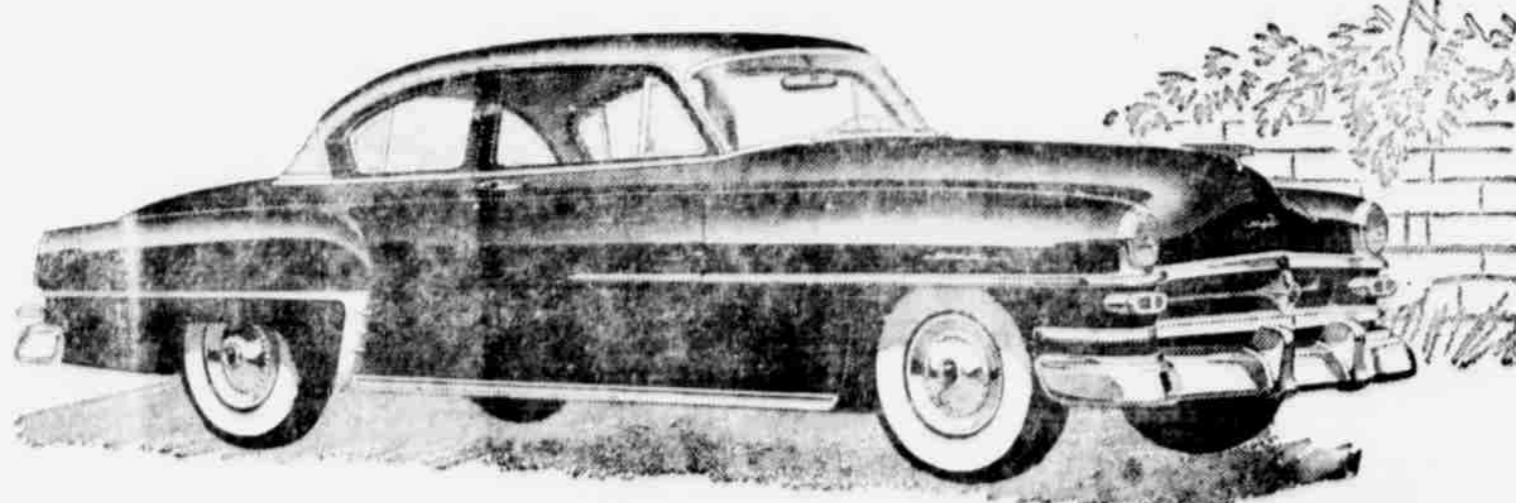
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**State Draft Quota For April Will Be For 2,876 Men**

The state draft quota for April calling for induction of 2,876 men has been announced by state Selective Service headquarters. This number is 113 less than the March quota.  
Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said that more than 5,700 men would be examined in April, compared with March examination call of 6,800.  
Local board quotas for the April induction call will be figured and placed in the mail "the first week in March," the state draft director said. Board quotas for the April examination were mailed Tuesday.  
General Wakefield said that local boards will be authorized to induct men in April down to the age of 19 years and 6 months, as compared to 19 years and nine months in March.  
Local boards will be advised to fill April calls to greatest extent possible with men 20 years or older. At present, the state draft director said, most of the examined and acceptable men are in the 20 year old group. Following is a breakdown of examined and acceptable by age as of Feb. 1, 21 and older, 1,541; 20 years old, 6,167; 19 years old, 1,951.  
General Wakefield pointed out that the number of 19 year olds in the examined and acceptable group is increasing. The following shows how the number has grown: Dec. 1, 43 men; Jan 1, 536 men; Feb. 1, 1,951 men.  
The state draft director stressed in a statement that present inductees in the armed forces are replacements for drafted men who are now getting out after two years service.  
Texas has inducted nearly 55,000 men since fighting in Korea began and has examined nearly 132,000 men during the same period.

**Waterfowl Begin Heading North**

**AUSTIN**—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission reported that waterfowl wintering along the Texas coast are "getting uneasy about leaving" but that no mass migration northward has occurred yet.  
He said field men have noticed considerable movement of some species such as pintails, mallards and gadwall from the southern part of Texas to the larger northern waters. He added that the migration movement, depending on the weather will begin late this month.  
J. R. Singleton, wildlife biologist, stationed in the marshes around Winnie, said some of the hardier varieties are getting ready or have begun short hops northward. He said this is preparatory to probing the winter-embalmed central states and even northern states where first breaks in ice-covered streams usually attract the pioneering advance guards.  
Singleton reported that the snow and blue geese have been moving inland. He said that the spoonbills, bluewing teals, a n d baldpates are the last to leave this area. One species that does not leave is the mottled duck which occurs only in Texas and adjoining coastal areas and seldom travels more than 100 miles between wintering and nesting grounds.  
Julian Howard, manager of the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge at Austwell, reported that waterfowl has scattered since the shooting season pressure ended but that it is a little early yet to notice any northward trend. Howard's prize clients—the stately whooping cranes—are sitting tight. They don't leave until about mid-April. He said the whoopers' wintering grounds have been closed to the public because the giant birds, now numbering only 21, have been usually shy, apparently because of the prolonged drouth's effect on their feeding areas.

**Livestock Prices Steady at Ft. Worth Market; Hogs Advance 25 to 50 Cents**

Fat lambs advanced at Fort Worth in the opening session this week, reflecting the strength of the dressed meat trade for that item in the Eastern states. Feeders were steady to weak, a n d yearlings and older sheep were in small supply and drew firm prices.  
Hog runs all around the market circle were again far below a year ago, and pork product prices were stronger, and this was responsible for a 25 to 50 cent advance Monday on top hogs and sows drew strong prices. Top hogs sold for \$21.25 to \$21.75. Sows drew \$16.50 to \$19.50. Pigs were quotable around \$12 to \$17.  
Most classes of cattle and calves ruled steady, except fed steers and yearlings, which sold weak to 50 cents lower. Heavier weight steers were under pressure. Stocker trade was extremely narrow again.

Numerous shipments of cattle afflicted with hyperkeratosis (X-disease) were again in the run and sold for immediate slaughter.  
Good and choice fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$19 to \$22.50 a load of 1,230 lb. steers from Jim Hubbard of Lancaster at \$21, and some 811 lb. cattle from M. E. Harrison of Byers at \$19.25. A load of 1,029 lb. steers from Throckmorton sold for \$20.25. Two loads of Oklahoma steers drew \$22.25. Common and medium offerings sold for \$12 to \$19, some shells for less.  
Fat cows sold from \$14 to \$16, with canners and cutters mostly from \$10 to \$13.50, some old shells for less. Bulls drew \$10 to \$18. Good and choice fat calves bulked at \$19 to \$22.50 and plain and medium kinds sold from \$13 to \$19 with culls around \$10 to \$13. Stocker calves were quotable around \$23 down, and yearlings around \$22 down. Stocker cows sold from \$12 to \$18.

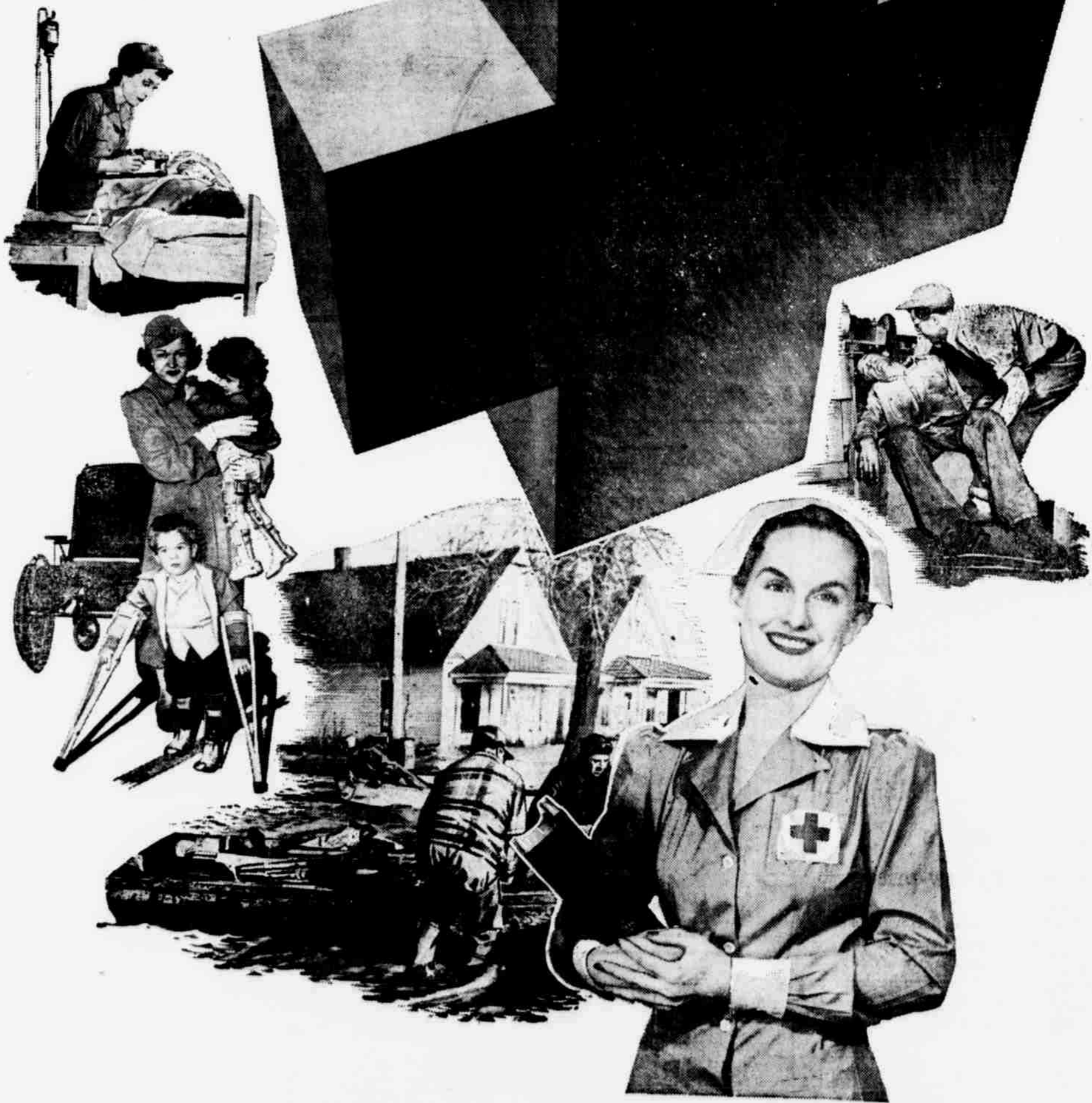
