




School Supt. Dan McRae said the fire was first noticed in the north end of the L-shaped building, which is located just north of the main school building Flames had broken through the roof, and spread quickly through the frame structure, which was approximately 70 feet north and south by 100 feet east and west. A few minutes after discovery of the fire, accumulated heat inside the building caused an explosion

which blew out the south front of the structure, McRae said. As the flames spread through the large structure, REA electric ines serving the school plant were out of commission, cutting off water being used by voluneers from the school's well which s powered with an electric pump.

Modern equipment in the lunchroom included a complete kitchen ranges, deep freeze, and other appliances, all installed within the past two years. The lunchroom had facilities for accomodating 200 pupils, and Supt. Mc-Rae said that approximately 150 of the 185 students enrolled for the current term took their meals at the lunchroom.

The vocational Ag building also housed a complete farm shop, ir which much new equipment had seen installed in the past few years, E. A. Howard, Jr., Voe Ag teacher, said equipment included a complete assortment of power tools, wood lathe, a n d other tools. Only shop equipment saved was a portable electric welding mit and some of the farm implements kept outside the building. Howard had 24 boys enrolled in his farm shop class, and loss of the equipment will be a Church of San Antonio. He has severe handicap, he said.

## Almost Inch Rain **Revives Hope of** Drouth's End

Hopes for an early end to this section's prolonged drouth were revived by a downpour of almost an inch which fell early Tuesday morning, and was of sufficient intensity to fill furrows in cultivated fields and provide some run-off water for dry surface tanks in some areas.

Precipitation here was gauged at .94 inch, and was by far the best rain in several months, farmers declared. Rainfall varied over the county, and southeast of town was reported extremely light. Heaviest fall was in the vicinity of Haskell and to the north and west.
