

Oklahoma Man Killed In Car Wreck Here Monday

George Fifer, 67, resident of Seminole, Okla., died Monday morning in a car wreck on Highway 277 south of Haskell. The car was driven by Fifer's son, Richard Dalziel, 28, and was carrying Fifer, his wife, Eleanor Luck, 14, and two other occupants. Grand Jury Hits At Delinquent Fines

Citing a total of \$3,714.74 in delinquent fines owed Haskell County that has accumulated in County Court since November 1951, a 39th District Court grand jury Wednesday recommended that "fines should be collected in money or the defendant should be remanded to jail until the fine is paid."

The grand jury, recalled into session Tuesday morning, was in session two days and examined 13 witnesses in investigating two matters filed on the grand jury calendar. No bills were returned in the two cases, grand jurors finding no evidence to justify indictments, they reported.

Report containing the recommendation was signed by R. L. Burton, foreman of the grand jury, and was unanimously endorsed by the 11 members of the body present when the report was read to Judge Ben Charlie Chapman. One member of the grand jury, O. S. Covey of O'Brien, had been excused because of his inability to be present Tuesday. Foreman Burton explained to the court.

In submitting the report, the grand jury requested that a copy signed by the foreman, be given the County Judge and each Justice of the Peace in the county.

All of the delinquent fines were listed on the County Court records. In records of the justice courts were not checked by the grand jury.

Making up the total of \$3,714.74 was a list of 43 unpaid fines ranging in amounts from \$12.20 to \$222.20. Offenses for which the fines had been assessed included 13 for driving an automobile while intoxicated, and 17 liquor law violations (possession or sale), the list compiled for the grand jury showed.

Two Races Remain To Be Decided In Second Primary

Haskell County voters polled 3586 ballots in the first primary Saturday to decide all county and precinct races with the exception of two precinct contests that will go into the second primary, August 23.

In state-wide races, only one run-off contest was indicated. It will be between Frank F. Culver Jr. of Fort Worth and Spurgeon F. Bell of Houston for Place 1 on the State Supreme Court.

Run-Off in Commissioner.

Weigher's Races

In the County Commissioner's race in Precinct 3, the run-off candidates will be M. B. Cobb, incumbent, and Estell Gilleland. Vote in the first primary was Gilleland 236, Cobb 219, and A. J. Mansker, third candidate, 54 votes. Voting will be at Haskell Box 3, Paint Creek, and Cobb voting boxes.

In Precinct 7, O'Brien, a run-off in Public Weigher's race will be between S. J. Reeves, Jr., and Sam Johnson. Balloting will be at the Jud and O'Brien boxes in this race.

In a write-in campaign for County Chairman of the Democratic Party, John Couch was re-elected with 934 votes to 624 received by Oliver Cunningham.

In district races, John Kimbrough of Haskell, was elected without opposition as State Representative from the 83rd district. Vote in Haskell County in the Governor's race was: Shivers 1443, Yarbrough 2002, Mrs. Taylor 89.

Adkins Wins DA Post

In the race for District Attorney of the 39th district, Haskell County voters gave Royce Adkins a total of 2300 votes to 1210 for his opponent, Dale Condon of Throckmorton.

Sheriff R. M. (Bob) Cousins, received 2122 votes to gain a 683-vote majority over his two opponents, A. L. (Lloyd) Conner with 1153, and W. T. Holley with 286 votes.

In a four-way race for Justice of the Peace in the Haskell precinct, C. K. (Charlie) Jones won re-election with a 320-vote margin over three opponents. The vote was: Jones 1139, Earl Treadwell 412, James A. Yancy 126, J. L. Robertson 281.

For Commissioner of Precinct 1, A. C. (Pete) Sego with 1238 votes was re-elected over J. V. (Jake) Jenkins, who polled 554 votes.

In Precinct 2, Commissioner W. A. (Drew) Leonard was re-elected, receiving 416 votes while his opponent, P. L. Newton received 373.

Constable Sterling Edwards of Precinct 1, Haskell, was re-elected, polling 1275 votes over his opponent, J. L. (Happy) Hendrix, who received 499.

In the Rochester precinct, No. 5, W. D. (Bo) Loper was re-elected, receiving 259 votes to 145 polled by his opponent, J. R. Morrow.

In a seven man race for the Public Weigher's job at O'Brien, Precinct 7, S. J. Reeves, Jr., received 78 write-in votes to lead the ticket, and goes into second primary with Sam Johnson, second high man with 62 votes. Vote for the four other candidates for the post was: R. H. Duncan 52; Billie Wilcox, 34; Billie Gene Johnson, 22; C. B. Banner, 18; Marvin T. Robertson, 16.

County and precinct officials re-elected without opposition were District Clerk Jesse B. Smith, County Judge Alfred Turnbow, Tax Assessor-Collector R. A. Coburn, County Clerk Horace Oneal, County Treasurer Byron Wright, County Commissioner D. S. Strickland of Precinct 4, and Justice of the Peace H. P. Findley of Precinct 5, Rochester.

Elected County Attorney was Curtis Pogue, Haskell lawyer and former County Attorney who was the only candidate filing for the place. Also elected without opposition was F. J. McCurley as Public Weigher of the Haskell precinct. McCurley formerly held that office several years ago and was the only candidate seeking the post.

W. E. Robertson was elected Public Weigher at Rochester, without opposition.

Re-elected at Rule were Justice of the Peace W. R. Mason and Constable O. R. Kittley.

Highway 277 To Be Widened, Resurfaced Through County

A highway improvement project in Haskell County that will cost an estimated \$1,300,000 was given the green light by the State Highway Commission in Austin last week.

Authorization was given for immediate improvement of 32.4 miles of U. S. Highway 277 from Stamford and the south line of Haskell County to the Knox County line between Weinert and Munday.

Highway 277 will be widened three feet on each side, to make the roadway 24 feet wide. Also, an entirely new surface will be placed on the entire stretch embraced in the project. This improvement phase is expected to consist at least a 6-inch layer of topping to entirely resurface the highway.

Contracts for the project will likely be awarded in August, with the work to be completed by the end of the year, if possible. Highway Department officials indicated.

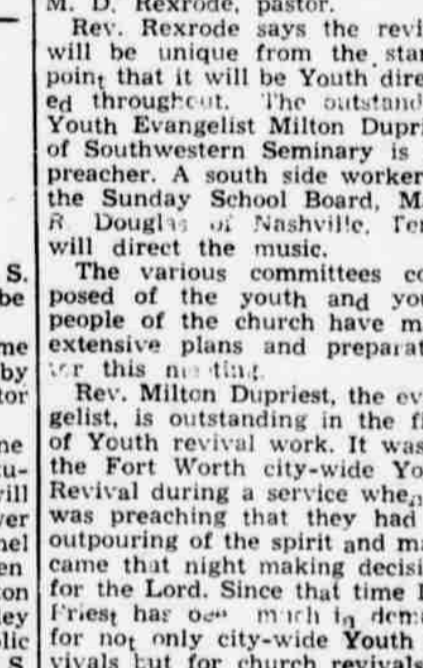
Youth of First Baptist Church To Direct Summer Revival Beginning August 3rd

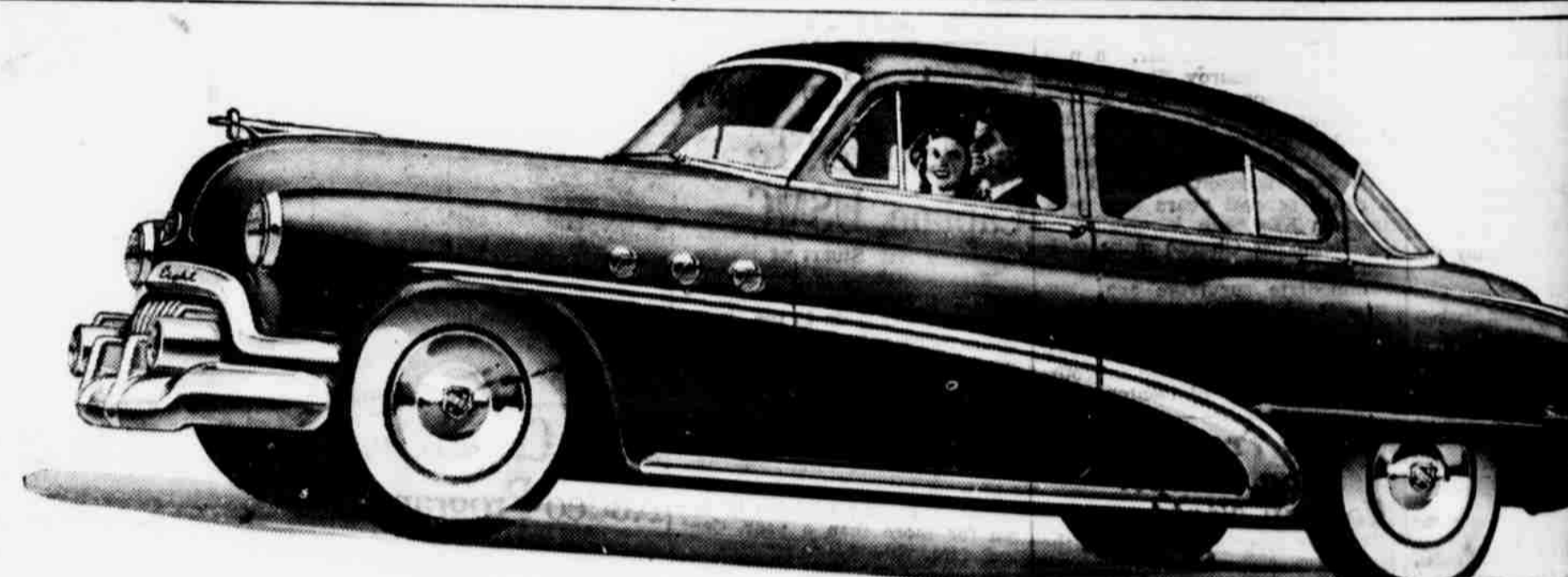

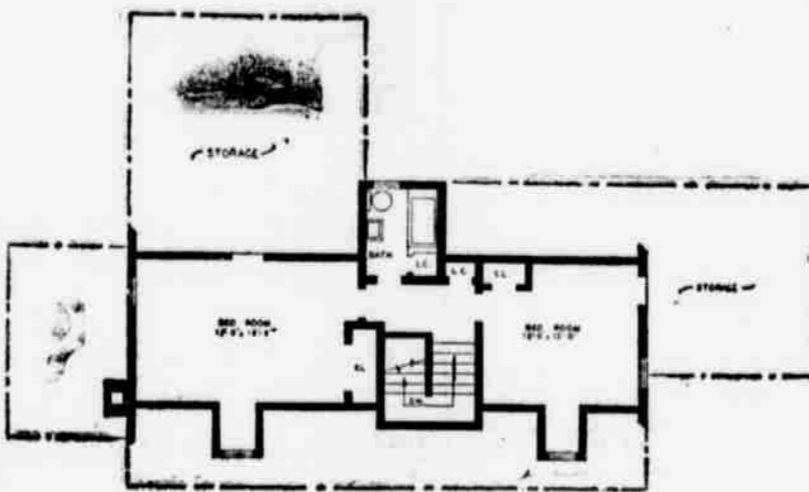

Red Cross Makes Urgent Call For Polio Nurses

The American Red Cross has
issued an urgent call for register-
ed nurses to serve during the polio
season. Incidence of the disease
so far this year is running 58 per
cent above the same period last
year, according to statistics re-
leased by the National Founda-
tion for Infantile Paralysis.

"The demand for more nurses
is particularly great in Iowa and
Texas," according to Kay Fitz-
patrick, Red Cross director of
nursing services for the Midwest-
ern area. Most of the available
nurses will be needed before the
epidemic is over, she said.

"It is not our intention to drain
nurses from other duty in which
they are vitally needed," Miss
Fitzpatrick said. She added that
inactive registered nurses were
particularly being sought.

Nurses recruited by the Red
Cross are requested to serve for a
minimum two - month period.
Their salaries are paid by the Na-
tional Foundation for Infantile
Paralysis.

The Red Cross recruits nurses
at the request of the NFIP, the
organization which provides ex-
pensive polio care for all and meets
the cost of treatment when family
Foundation will pay the cost of
transportation to places of as-
signment and will provide main-
tenance in addition to salary
while the nurse is serving in polio
work.

Foundation figures show a total
of 4,176 cases of polio in the U.
S. since March. This compares
with 2,644 last year. Last week 34
nurses recruited through the Red
Cross in the Midwestern area
were assigned to hospitals in Ill-
inois, Kansas, Iowa, and Texas.
The need is especially acute in
Sioux City, Iowa, and Houston
Texas, where serious epidemics
have been reported.

Nurses able to serve during the
polio season should contact their
local Red Cross chapter, Miss
Fitzpatrick said.

We investigated two matters which were called to our attention for investigation and in the course of our work we have examined 13 witnesses. We found no bill in the two cases mentioned.

"In the course of our duty as the Grand Jury of Haskell County we have made a general investigation of County property, consisting of the County Court House and the County Jail and grounds. We find that court house and jail and the grounds to be in good condition and in good repair generally. We make no recommendation respecting County property.

"We have made an investigation of the records with reference to the collection of fines in misdemeanor cases and in this respect we find that there is now due the County, \$3,714.74 in delinquent fines according to information from the official records. We feel there has been a tendency on the part of the responsible officials to be too lenient in the collection of fines in misdemeanor cases. While we believe there are cases in which a lenient attitude may be justified we feel that in such cases the fine should be collected in money or the defendant should be remanded to jail until the fine is paid. We do not mean to be critical of any one officer but rather feel that the recommendation should be followed by all officers in the collection of fines and penalties. We trust that these officers will be a little more diligent in the collection of fines in the future.

"We beg leave of court to adjourn for more than 3 days.

that when the car overturned Mr. Fifer, who was riding with Steen and the driver in the front seat, was thrown from the vehicle when the right door of the car buckled and flew open. The six remaining occupants crawled and helped each other from the overturned car.

Crawford, driver of the truck, was unhurt. He and passing motorists gave what assistance they could to the injured persons and summoned an ambulance. One of the first persons on the scene, whose name was not learned, administered first aid to the more seriously injured until the ambulance arrived. He was believed to be an employee of Halliburton oil well service, others at the wreck scene said.

Mr. Fifer, unconscious and suffering with a fatal head injury, was rushed to the Haskell County hospital in a Holden ambulance. He was pronounced dead on arrival, hospital attendants said. A severe injury which crushed the left side of his skull was believed to have caused almost immediate death.

Richard and James Luck, brothers, and Homer Steen were dismissed from the hospital after being treated for shock and slight bruises.

Body of Mr. Fifer was removed to Holden Funeral Home, pending arrival of relatives.

The body was carried to Prague, Okla., Wednesday in a Holden funeral coach. Rites for the accident victim were to be held Friday in that city.

A native Texan, born in Fannin County January 1, 1884, Mr. Fifer had lived in Oklahoma for a number of years.

He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Luck of Odessa and Mrs. Edgar Johnson of Seminole, Okla.; nine grandchildren and one great-grandson; a brother, Alex Fifer who lives in California; and a sister, Mrs. Lynn Marple of Oklahoma City, Okla. and stepmother, Mrs. Jas. Fifer of Oklahoma City.

Circumstances surrounding the accident were investigated by Sheriff Bob Cousins, Deputy B. T. Gordon, City Officer Marion Josset and Highway Patrolman Ray Craft. No charges were filed in connection with the wreck.
