Last year, approximately 16,000 cres were sprayed in Haskeil County with fairly good results as regards top kill. It appears that only about 15 to 25 per cent root kill is evident at this time. Producers should bear in mind that the operation is a contro rather than a permanent kill, Harper explained.

Individual letters have been sent out to all producers holding 1953 approvals for spraying, and it was pointed out that only these producers who signed an intention sheet in the fall of 1952 would be eligible for assistance in 1953, and then only to the extent of the minimum guaranteed funds as shown on the approval which has already been issued to those who


