

## Creek School District Approves \$70,000 Bond Issue

Bond issue for new additions and improvements to school plant of Paint Creek High School District was approved by almost a unanimous vote Saturday. Unofficially, the bond proposal, which showed 57 for and 10 against, was approved by the Paint Creek school board. The bond issue will be used to purchase the building and to include the addition of a business office, auditorium or all-purpose room to the present school building.

The firm of Caudill, Rowlett & Scott of Bryan, Texas, has been employed as architects for the building project.

Supt. McRae said that as soon as the bonds are approved by the State, trustees plan to advertise for bids and award contracts for the expansion and building program. Based on present plans, all construction work can be finished and equipment and furniture installed before beginning of the 1953-54 school term.

## Lt. Frank Spencer of Haskell Helps GI's In Korean War Cheat Death

U. S. Navy surgeons cheated death twice in two of the most amazing stories of medicine to come out of the Korean War, according to a United Press dispatch from the Western Front in Korea.

One of the surgeons mentioned in the dispatch and credited with performing a delicate and miraculous life-saving operation is Lt. (Jg) Frank Spencer of Haskell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spencer, Sr., of near Haskell.

The United Press dispatch, dated April 30, relates:

Twice in recent weeks shell fragments have cut gaping holes in the hearts of two American Marines. The ruptured hearts, gasping for life, spurted blood six feet in the air. One heart stopped beating.

But Navy surgeons, working calmly and quickly, plugged the ugly holes with their fingers and skillfully sewed the hearts together.

Both men are alive today, fighting an uphill battle that doctors expect them to win.

"Sure, we've seen a lot of men with holes cut in their hearts," medical officers said. "They're dead on arrival."

"We only had one such case in the past year," said Lt. (Jg) Frank Spencer, 27, of Rt. 1, Haskell.

## Aerial Spraying Of Mesquite To Begin Monday

Monday, May 11th, is the official beginning date for spraying mesquite in Haskell County by airplane, according to Joe S. Harper, PMA secretary.

Last year, approximately 16,000 acres were sprayed in Haskell County with fairly good results as regards top kill. It appears that only about 15 to 25 per cent root kill is evident at this time. Producers should bear in mind that the operation is a control rather than a permanent kill, Harper explained.

Individual letters have been sent out to all producers holding 1953 approvals for spraying, and it was pointed out that only those producers who signed an intention sheet in the fall of 1952 would be eligible for assistance in 1953, and then only to the extent of the minimum guaranteed funds as shown on the approval which has already been issued to those who are eligible for the work.

Harper said those spraying mesquite, and who have approval to do so, should call at the county PMA office as soon as possible and identify the pastures to be sprayed so that contractors doing the spraying work can determine the area for landing places, etc.

## 69-Year-Old Man Is Charged With Assault To Kill

George T. (Tom) Brown, 69-year-old Haskell man, was charged with assault with intent to murder and released under bond pending Grand Jury investigation of a shooting which occurred Friday around 9 a. m. in the southeast outskirts of Haskell.

Officers who investigated said that W. A. Drennan, also in his 60's and a neighbor of Brown, was slightly injured when struck in the chest and shoulder by pellets from a shotgun fired by Brown. The blast, from a double barrel 12-gauge shotgun, apparently was fired from a distance of 50 or 60 yards. Deputy Sheriff B. T. Gordon, who arrested Brown at the latter's home a short time later, found a loaded double barrel gun on a bed in Brown's house.

Jimmy Reeves, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. V. Reeves of Weirnet, will leave for Austin today where he will compete in the Texas State Schoolboy track meet. He will be accompanied by Connor Horton, track coach. Competition by young Reeves will be held Friday May 8 with finals in all events slated for Saturday.

Reeves won the thrilling mile run at Brownwood, being pushed hard by a lad from Wylie, who was a competitor in the State meet last year. This was the first defeat of the year for the Wylie miler who has won several class A meets this year. Reeves won the closely contested race and set a new track record for class B in the mile with time of 39.3. It bettered the old track record by 7.8 seconds, the old record being 47.1.

Jimmy is a freshman in Weinert High School and has taken an active part in all athletics. He is the lone entrant in the state meet from Weinert and the first the school has had in the schoolboy champion meet since 1947.

## Recent Burglaries Traced To Seven Teen-Agers

A series of petty thefts and burglaries occurring here over a period of several months has been traced to the activities of a group of teen-age boys who admitted the thefts when brought before Judge Alfred Turnbow in Juvenile Court this week.

Seven boys, ranging in age from 13 to 15 years, admitted having a part in recent burglaries of a barber shop, help-seily laundry, grocery store and service station, and Junior High School, Judge Turnbow said. Approximately \$10 in money was taken from the barber shop, and \$15 from the laundry, while bottled drinks were taken from the school building, and drinks, chewing gum and a small sum of money was taken from the grocery and station. The latter establishment was entered on several occasions, three of the boys told Judge Turnbow.

Investigation by city and county officers of thefts at the barber shop and the laundry, which occurred Friday and Saturday night of last week directed suspicion to two of the teen-agers, and they implicated others, officers said.

After the hearing in Juvenile Court, Judge Turnbow placed the seven boys under probation to their parents as delinquent children.
