

Mexico Labor Agreement Signed at Meeting Here

Cotton farmers were pointed out that the new agreement signed in June is a result of compromises made by both Mexico and the United States.

He explained that U. S. negotiators worked for days to get the Mexican Government to agree on making black listings of localities of individuals possible only as a result of a joint decision by officials of both countries. "Before this agreement was obtained, numerous communities were black-listed that were not at fault," he explained.

J. B. Kirklind, president of the Trans-Pecos Cotton Association which has contracted thousands of the laborers during the past two years, warned the farmers to keep complete records on their transactions with the laborers. "Be ready with the figures when any item is questioned," Kirklind told them.

Farmers and ranchers present got an opportunity to secure answers to all questions in a question and answer period that followed.

Earlier, 22 speakers and guests had lunch here as guests of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Courtney Hunt and a welcoming committee composed of John Couch and J. M. Crawford greeted them.

Couch, director-at-large of the WTCC, welcomed the group to Haskell, "not only the greatest agricultural section of Texas but of all the South."

The meeting here Monday was one of a series being sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Present at the conference were Fred Husbands, manager of the WTCC, and Loyan Walker, agricultural head.

Fire Burns Over 10 Sections On Swenson Ranch

A grass fire set off by an electrical storm on the Swenson Ranch around 3:00 p. m. Wednesday about six miles east of the Haskell County line in Throckmorton burned over approximately 10 sections of grassland before being brought under control.

Firemen from surrounding towns who joined ranch employees in fighting the spreading fire finally brought the blaze under control about 7:30 Wednesday night. The fire, which burned a path about two miles wide and four miles long, destroyed a first truck that answered the call from Seymour. It also threatened power poles of the West Texas Utilities Company's 66,000 volt transmission line running from Albany through Throckmorton to Munday. A WTU truck from Haskell went to the scene to patrol the line and help fight the blaze.

Ranch hands first noticed the blaze about 3 p. m. and began fighting the fire and sending others to get help. The fire caught about four miles north of the headquarters ranch house about 6 miles east of the Haskell County line. It is located north of the Throckmorton-Haskell highway.

Fire trucks from several adjoining towns answered the call for help. Among these were Seymour, Munday, Throckmorton, Haskell, Stamford and Graham. Many volunteer firemen accompanied the trucks to the fire to help quell the blaze.

The Seymour fire truck, a rural truck especially built to fight fires of this type, was destroyed and one of the firemen, Frank Baldwin, received minor burns about the face. Baldwin and Bill Thornhill, both of Seymour, brought the truck to the scene of the fire.

Firemen were fighting the blaze when the wind changed and blew the fire on the truck. Before firemen could move the truck, it caught fire and burned.

W. A. (Will) Gilmore is Named City Alderman in Special Election Friday

W. A. (Will) Gilmore, farm implement and tractor dealer, was elected a member of the City Council in a special city election Friday. Gilmore received 198 votes, while E. G. (Gaston) Hattox, hardware and furniture merchant, received 111 votes in the two man race for the vacancy on the Council created by the resignation of Payne Hattox.

Former alderman Payne Hattox, who resigned in June to move to Cherokee, Okla., was re-elected in April to a full 2-year term on the Council. He held the position of city street commissioner.

Gilmore will serve as city alderman for this unexpired term which ends in April, 1954.

The total vote of 309 ballots polled in Friday's special election was the largest number cast in election of city officials in recent years.

Gilmore, Navy veteran of World War II and former commander of the local post of the American Legion, will take office at the next meeting of the City Council. Regular meetings of the council are held on the second and fourth Tuesdays in each month.

Holdover members of the council are Aldermen Olen Dotson, A. M. Turner, Joe Thomson and J. E. Welling, Jr.

Virgil A. Brown was presiding judge of Friday's election. He was assisted by Mrs. Claude Jenkins and Mrs. Richard Bischoffhausen, clerks.

"Back To School" Program Planned Week of Aug. 25-30

Sponsored by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, plans are being arranged for a "Back to School Program" during the week of Aug. 25-30 which will feature several novel and entertaining events, C. of C. manager Rex Felker said this week.

One event expected to create wide interest is a letter writing contest for students on the subject: "Why I Am Glad School Days Are Here." with \$36 in cash awards to be given the six winning letters.

These letters are not to exceed 300 words in length and are to be addressed to the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, and must reach the C. of C. office not later than Tuesday, August 26. A competent committee will be selected to judge the letters and cash prizes of \$8 for first, \$6 for second, and \$4 for third winning letter will be awarded in each of two divisions.

The first division will include students of the primary grades up to and including the seventh grade. The second division will

be for students in the eighth grade and through high school.

The letter writing contest will be county-wide and students enrolled in any school in Haskell County are urged to submit letters.

Winners in the contest will be recognized and prizes awarded Friday night, August 29 at ceremonies on the high school football field. At that time the Haskell high school band will parade and play several numbers. The HHS Pep Squad and members of the 1952 football squad also will take part in the program, which will be designed to emphasize the "back to school" spirit.

All local merchants will be asked to display the school colors either in window displays or in front of their establishments during the entire week of the "Back to School Program."

County Democrats Compose Differences In County Convention; Urge Party Unity

Opposing factions in the ranks of Haskell County Democrats composed their differences at the county convention held here Saturday afternoon, and adopted five resolutions in each of which support of party nominees was stressed.

First gesture of harmony in Saturday's convention came when John A. Couch, county chairman and head of the conservative Democrats who won out in the May county convention, was nominated as permanent chairman by Courtney Hunt, Haskell mayor and leader of the Loyal Democrat faction which booted the county convention.

Couch was unanimously elected and Mrs. Norman Nanny, a member of the Loyal Democrat dele-

gation to the State Convention was elected secretary of Saturday's county convention.

Named on the resolutions committee by Couch were John M. Crawford, C. G. Burson, Courtney Hunt and O. E. Patterson. Five resolutions submitted by the group were adopted in substance, the were (1) Urging the State convention to adopt a resolution in support of Texas tideland claim, and to pledge support of party nominees; 2, Pledge the State convention to support nominees for president and vice president; 3, request State convention to endorse National platform in entirety; 4, endorse Democratic loyalty pledge and elect only delegates to State convention who would take the loyalty pledge; 5, request to State convention that names of Adlai Stevenson and John Sparkman be placed in Democratic column of state ballot, and that all electors be required to vote for these nominees.

In announcing the letter writing contest as a means of stimulating interest in returning to school, a spokesman for the Chamber of Commerce said: "We realize that a great many students were glad when school was dismissed for the vacation season, but in most instances all are glad when the school bell sounds in September denoting that school is underway once more. It is hoped that a great many letters will be written on this subject and each letter is assured of consideration when the committee selects the winners of the awards."

Each student, submitting a letter in the contest should state the school attended, and also the grade in which they will be enrolled for this year's term of school.

Seven top-notch calf ropers were contesting for the two-calf average with first place going to J. Oxford of O'Brien with total time of 24.7 on two calves. Second place went to Brooks Middleton of Haskell with 34.7 on two calves and third place to John Wallace of Haskell with total time of 38.5 on two calves.

The Brahma steer riding was on an exhibition basis with ten steer riders making various and sundry attempts to stay aboard for the eight seconds required. Highlight of this exhibition riding was a made by little Tommy Furrh seven-year-old son of Ike Furrh of Haskell who successfully rode one of the larger steers the required eight seconds.

"Car Inspection Reduces Accidents" Lions Are Told

"A reduction of 10 per cent in automobile accidents has been accomplished in states where motor vehicle inspection laws are in force," J. R. Whitmire of the Vehicle Inspection Division of the Department of Public Safety told members of the Lions Club at their meeting and luncheon Tuesday.

Whitmire was guest speaker, and he gave an informative talk on the Texas vehicle inspection law. Deadline for the first inspection is Sept. 6, he explained.

"Sole reason for the law is to make driving safer," Whitmire pointed out. "Traffic wrecks in Texas cause a property loss estimated at \$100 million dollars, and 30 per cent of wrecks are caused by defective equipment," he continued, illustrating the purpose of the program.

"It is a good program—but not a cure-all. It should eliminate approximately 10 per cent of the accidents in the state and save about 250 lives a year," Whitmire estimated. He said that 14 items were covered in the inspection, and all except one is a safety measure. An inspection fee of \$1.00 is set by the State. Of this amount, 75 cents goes to the inspecting station, and 25 cents to the State for administrative purposes.

In closing his talk, Whitmire reminded his hearers that local inspection stations would be rushed during the next few weeks, with several thousand cars in Haskell County remaining to be inspected before Sept. 6th. Whitmire, who lives in Spur, supervises the inspection program in 11 counties in this area.

One new member was introduced in the club. He is Kendall Henderson, who recently purchased the John E. Robison service station here and has moved to Haskell from Odessa.

Calling the Soviet leaders "murderers, robbers and gangsters" Rev. Gruber emphasizes that these men are not representatives of the occupants of that country.

"These leaders are not elected in the sense of an American election. There is only one party and one candidate. One votes for him, or else."

Gruber has, since World War II, been a leader in aiding Latvian displaced persons, 40,000 of these people have immigrated to America in recent years.

The versatile minister has conducted glee clubs, served as an "America is my home now, I love America dearly, but my heart is with the people who are suffering under the yoke of Soviet aggression in my native land of Latvia." With these words Rev. Carlos Gruber began to tell a terrifying story of life behind the Iron Curtain.

Rev. Gruber, in West Texas to assist with the revival services at the First Baptist Church in Rule, is a well known speaker and lecturer on international subjects.

A native of Riga, Latvia, he forsok Lutheran religion, which is the State endorsed church in that country, at the age of 11 to become a member of the Baptist faith during a revival that swept that tiny Balkan country during the early 1920's.

At the age of 13, he was one of 2,000 Latvians who, for religious purposes, immigrated to Brazil and founded the city of Varpa in the State of Sao Paulo. He spent many years working in this area in the Baptist "Jungle Mission."

He came to America in 1937 and became an ordained Baptist minister in 1940. In 1948, one of his fondest dreams was realized when he became a citizen of the United States.

For six years the dynamic Latvian edited the Latvian magazine, Friends' Message in New York City. This publication was banned in communistic countries.

During these six years, Rev. Gruber established reliable contacts behind the Iron Curtain. From reports these sources have

been able to send him, he has pieced together a story that puts a minute dent in the formidable Iron Curtain.

When asked if these sources were relatives, Rev. Gruber stated that it was an impossibility for him to contact the several aunts and uncles still in Latvia. "If the Secret Police of the Soviet found any person in Latvia that acknowledged relation with me, they would be liquidated immediately."

Speaking in a heavily accented voice, Rev. Gruber declared there is tremendous discontent among the masses of people. "The people's hate for the Kremlin is such an intense, all consuming hatred that is beyond the conception of one living in this country."

"The people of my land pray daily for an American liberation. They look to the United States as their only hope. Thousands risk their lives twice daily to listen to the Voice of America broadcasts."

Rev. Gruber cited many pathetic, danger us and even humorous methods by which the people listen to the Voice of America. Among these was an incident that occurred during the early days of the Voice of America.

During this time, many people were unable to ascertain the time or wave length of the Voice. The night before an important Russian celebration, the Forest Brothers (Latvian Underground) received this information.

Before dawn banners carrying this long awaited announcement had been printed and hung across the streets of many Latvian villages. These went unobserved in the mass of Red propaganda banners.

As the people marched through the streets of their towns, each carrying a Kremlin-made sign hailing Stalin and denouncing Capitalism, they lifted their eyes and read in their native language the time to hear the Voice of America.

During the midnight hours, that night, the Voice of America had what probably is the highest "Hooper Rating" of any radio him, or else."

Ed Morris, Former County Surveyor, Is Victim of Forest Fire in Arkansas

News of the tragic death near Banner, Ark., of Edwin Morris, former Haskell resident and County Surveyor here at one time, was received last week by his nephews, Parks Woodson and Bill Woodson of this city. Death of Mr. Morris occurred July 26.

According to information received by his nephews here, Mr. Morris had gone to help fight a forest fire that was burning on a farm belonging to him and a sister, Mrs. B. M. (Burl) Height, several miles from the town of Banner, Ark.

When Mr. Morris failed to return home Saturday afternoon a searching party set out to look for him. They searched all night Saturday and throughout Sunday without locating the missing man. Then Monday morning Mrs. B. M. Height, searching a secluded spot on the farm which had burned over, found the body of her brother, badly burned.

Funeral services for Mr. Morris were held Tuesday morning.

July 29, and he was buried in the Banner, Ark., cemetery.

Mr. Morris will be remembered by many early-day residents here. His family moved to this section in the early 1900's and he was county surveyor from around 1908 to 1913.

He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Height of Banner, Ar., who also formerly lived here; Mrs. Fred Neal of Oklahoma City, and Mrs. J. M. Woodson of Haskell, who is making her home at present with a daughter, Mrs. Louella Squyres in El Monte, Calif. Several nephews and nieces also survive.

Matt Justice, one of Haskell's oldest and best known Negro residents, died at his home here Saturday at 5:30 p. m., after an illness of about two years.

According to best information available to surviving relatives—a niece and several great-grandchildren—Matt was between 103 and 105 years old. He had lived in Haskell 38 years.

Funeral rites were held at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday at Pleasant Grove Methodist Church, with Rev. K. F. Smith of Rotan officiating. Deceased was a member of the Hope, well Baptist Church, but the congregation has had no place to worship since the church building burned some time ago.

Burial was in Willow cemetery with Holden Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Matt, who brought his family to Haskell County in 1914 from Waco, was a native Texan, born in Falls County. His wife preceded him in death in 1934.
