## Gen. Eisenhower Gets Heavy Majority; Haskell County Vote Favors Stevenson

A record avalanche of votes throughout the Nation Tuesday elected Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as next president of the United States, and his running mate on the Republican ticket, Richard Nixon, as the next vice president.

The smashing victory came as a record turn-out of voters was registered in every State, with the Republican ticket carrying all except nine States. Tabulation Wednesday night of 57,193,110 votes gave "The General" 55.4 per cent of the total popular vote at that time. Texas, for the first time since 1928, gave the Republican nominee a majority over Stevenson and Sparkman, Democratic nominees.

State vote tabulations Wednesday night gave Eisenhower 1,014,814 votes to Stevenson's 878,706.

Haskell County voting broke all records for general election balloting, with 3,745 votes polled according to unofficial tabulations.

The county gave the Democratic ticket virtually a 2-to-1 vote, with Stevenson receiving 2,492 against Eisenhower's 1,253. The Republican nominee carried five voting boxes in the county, Irby, McConnell, Sagerton, Plainview, and Bunker Hill.

A straight Republican vote of approximately 300 was indicated by the cross-filing vote recorded in the Governor and Senate race. Governor Shivers received 283 votes in the Republican column and 285 in the Democratic column, with Price Daniel, nominee for U. S. Senator, received 291 in the Republican column and 301 in the Democratic.

"Democrats for Eisenhower" who waged an intensive campaign in the county, accounted for approximately 1,000 votes for the Republican nominee.

With the exception of Gov. Shivers and Price Daniels, all nominees for State, district and county offices received virtually the entire Democratic vote of 2,492, although a scattering written in vote for Sen. Tom Connally, Beckworth, Yarbrough and McCraw was recorded.

Haskell County voters turned down two proposed constitutional amendments, the workmen's insurance proposal by a vote of 831 for and 929 against; the medical education fund by 722 for, and 1020 against. Latest State tabulations Wednesday showed however, that both proposals were carrying by a slight majority.

The 3,745 ballots cast in the general election exceeded the county's vote in the first primary, when 3,586 votes were polled. This is the first time the general election voting has exceeded primary balloting in the history of the county, political observers declare.

Thomas B. Russell, 77, early day businessman in Haskell, died Wednesday afternoon in Root Memorial Hospital, Colorado City, after a brief illness.

Following funeral services at the Russell home in Colorado City Friday morning, the body will be brought to Haskell and final rites will be held at Holden's Funeral Chapel at 3 p. m. Friday. Burial will be in Willow Cemetery, under the direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Mr. Russell was born June 20, 1875 in Wise County. He came to Haskell as a young man and for a number of years was associated in the hardware and furniture firm of Jones, Cox & Company in this city. Later he was in business in Ranger before moving to Colorado City in 1924.

He married Miss Ethel Jones of Haskell in September, 1901. Survivors, in addition to his wife, are a son, Wayne Russell, also of Colorado City; one brother and one sister.

Enlarge and Deepen Dry Tanks, Game Commission Advises

AUSTIN—The assistant Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission suggested that Texans utilize the drought to improve tanks, ponds or lakes that have dried up.

He said that the tanks and ponds could be deepened and enlarged and silt removed from the bottom since, contrary to popular belief, silt is harmful rather than beneficial to water bodies.

The assistant chief pointed out that the enlargement will increase the surfaces and thus benefit fish life since most fish foods are produced in the upper one foot of water.

Future food facilities also may be improved, he said, by planting legumes in the dried-up bottom areas.

Farmers and ranchers also were advised to capitalize on the opportunity by planning to restock their tanks and ponds with desirable species and thus keep down the rough fish which prey on the game fish.

The Game and Fish Commission cooperates with persons with tank or pond or small lakes since they provide increased facilities for the fishing public and since private waters oftentimes supply such as brood bass for state hatcheries.

The assistant chief reminded persons who have ordered fish from state hatcheries to notify the nearest hatchery if their tanks or ponds have dried up or are about to. Such persons, he said, will be given priority when wet weather returns and deliveries are resumed.

Sharp Reduction In Livestock Supplies Noted In Receipts at Ft. Worth Market

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—Sharp reductions in available supplies of livestock at major markets featured the trade this week. On Monday at Fort Worth, cattle and calf receipts were over 1,800 below last week, and at the 12 major public

markets of the nation, cattle and calf receipts were over 61,000 below a week earlier. Similar smaller supplies of sheep and hogs were reported.

This short supply would normally have been a factor to induce sharply higher prices at the outset, but the impending election caused Monday's trade at Fort Worth and other markets centers to be uneven and inclined to drift upward and downward without a definite pattern.

Cattle were uneven, and steady to weak, some bulls 50 cents lower. Stocker cattle were generally steady and enjoyed good demand. Slaughter calves were firm, some spots higher. Butcher hogs were 50 cents, spots 75 cents, higher, and best hogs sold at \$17.75 and \$18. Sows at \$16.50 down, were steady to 50 cents higher. Slaughter lambs were steady to 50 cents higher, and ewes were 25 cents higher, topping at \$ 50. Other sheep and lambs were fully steady. Two loads of fed heifers at \$32 that averaged 687 lbs. came from the Judge F. W. Fischer feedlot near Gainesville, and a load of fat cows at \$32. Some choice cows at \$32 also. 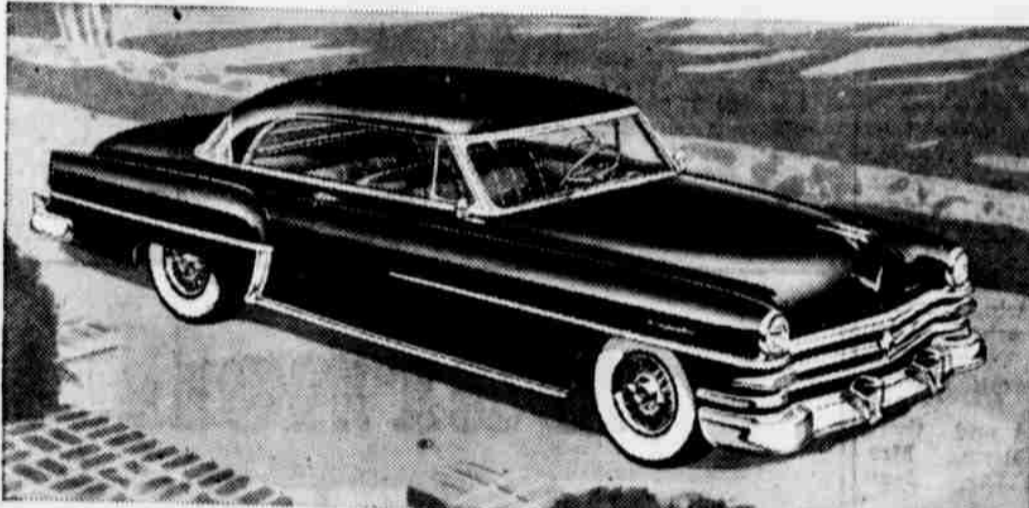

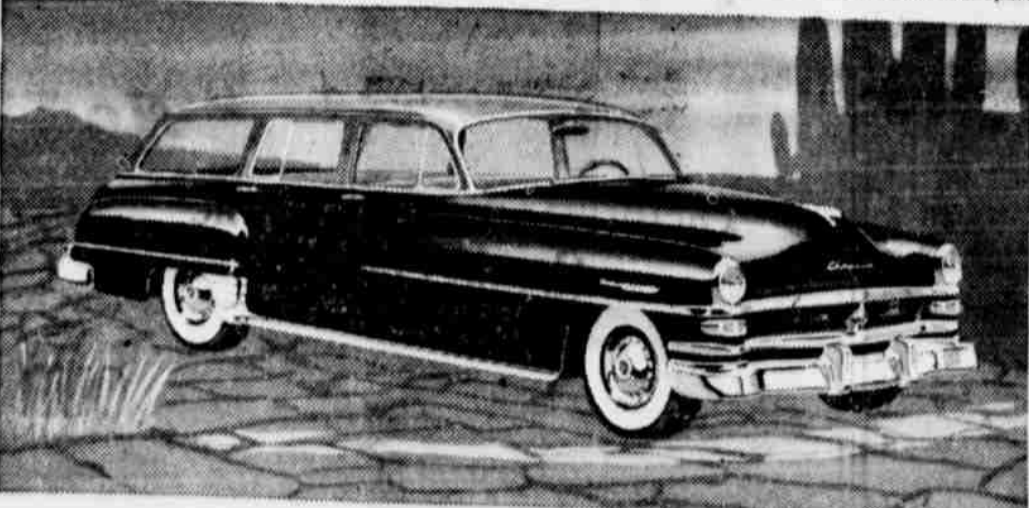

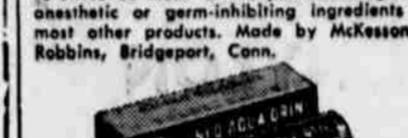

### Parallel Parking—

(Continued from Page One)

two streets. Heretofore, parking at a 45 degree angle has been customary in the section around the square. Recently, when the State Highway Department authorized a project to widen Highway 277 through Haskell County, a request was made to the City by the highway department that parallel parking be instituted. Members of the Council in a meeting Oct. 14, voted to comply with the request. This resulted in a protest from businessmen, who contended that parallel parking would hurt business in that it would cut down the number of cars that could be accommodated around the square, in comparison to angle parking.

Mayor Hunt assured the group that the Council desired to work with the businessmen for the best solution of the problem, but declared city officials had done all they could in an effort to get Highway Department approval for continuance of angle parking.

**Meters Suggested**  
A round table discussion brought out several suggestions concerning the traffic and parking problem, ranging from installation of parking meters and setting up a City Court, to transforming a part of the north and south sides of the courthouse lawn into parking spaces.

Suggestions that parking meters be installed drew expressions of opposition from several present, who pointed out that meters would not eliminate the requirement for parallel parking. Also a City Court and additional officer would be required, others pointed out.

Others present suggested that a committee take up the matter with State Highway Department officials, in an effort to see if a way could be worked out that would permit continuance of angle parking if all double parking was eliminated.

No definite action was taken on this suggestion after Mayor Hunt said he had worked on this step as a solution, but could reach no agreement with the highway department.

**Suggests Use of Courthouse Lawn**  
The idea for using a part of the courthouse lawn for parking space has been under consideration, Mayor Hunt told the group. He pointed out that permission of the Commissioners Court must first be secured, because it is county property. Cost of the undertaking would also have to be worked out between the county and the city, he explained.

Several present suggested that considerable additional parking space could be made available around the square if store owners and their employees would park their cars in the alleys or other parking spaces outside the main business section. Most all agreed however, that it would be almost impossible to secure cooperation to that extent.

At the Council session following the open meeting, Mayor Hunt declared that the City's only recourse was to mark the streets and begin enforcement of parallel parking as soon as possible, in order to comply with the highway department's request.

Parking spaces conforming to the new traffic rule will be painted on the curbs, and signs placed on these streets. Enforcement of the new regulation will be started as soon as curbs are marked and signs installed, it was announced.

Other business transacted at the session included adjustment of garbage collection and sewer rate for a local trailer court, which would involve an increase in rates for this service.

**New Street Lights**  
Alderman Gilmore also reported on selection of sites for 76 new street lights to be installed in various sections of town. Some
