BUZZARD'S BAY, MASS., July 9.—Mrs. Cleveland has received a letter from Mary Frost Orsombly of New York informing Mrs. Cleveland of the formation of Frances Cleveland influence club, composed of the wives, sisters and daughters of Democrats, to do campaign work. The following letter has been sent in reply:

GRAY CABLES, BUZZARD'S BAY, MASS., July 6.—Mrs. Mary Frost Orsombly: My dear Madame—Mrs. Cleveland has referred to me your letter informing her of the organization of a "Frances Cleveland Influence Club." It is by no means pleasant to dissent from the methods which sincere friends adopt when their efforts not only demonstrate their friendliness, but when they also seek to subvert the public good and are therefore engaged in a patriotic service. It is, however, impossible for us to approve of the use of Mrs. Cleveland's name in the designation of clubs designed to a political work. We trust you do not under value our objection, because it rests on the sentiment that the name now sacred in the home circles as wife and mother may well be spared in the organization and operation of clubs created to exert political influence.

Barnhill dec'd, who was also a daughter of John Hanchin dec'd and the unknown heirs of Louvicy Eldridge dec'd, who was also a daughter of John Hanchin dec'd, by making publication of this citation once in each week for eight successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not then in any newspaper published in the 30th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Haskell county, to be holden at the

Court House thereof, in town of Haskell, on the third Monday in September, A. D. 1892, the same being the 19th day of September A. D. 1892, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 21st day of June A. Shelburne dec'd who was a daughter of John Hanchin dec'd, the unknown heirs of Margaret J. Barnhill dec'd who was a daughter of John Hanchin dec'd and the unknown heirs of Louvicy Eldridge dec'd, who was also a daughter of said John Hanchin dec'd are Defendants, and said petition alleging in substance that plaintiff was on the 1st day of January 1892 lawfully seized and possessed of a certain tract of land hereinafter described situated in the county of Haskell, state of Texas holding the same in fee simple and that he was then and is now in the actual possession and enjoyment of said tract of land, plaintiff further shows to the court that he holds, claims and owns said tract of land under a regular and consecutive chain of title and mesne conveyances from John Hanchin the patentee of said land one of said deeds was duly and legally executed and delivered by G. W. Hanchin, Wm. Hanchin, F. B. Shumake and wife Sarah Shumake, H. N. Eldridge and wife Louvicy Eldridge, Henry D. Shelburne and wife Martha H. Shelburne and Margaret J. Barnhill to A. J. Barnhill and J. D. Gidding in consideration of the sum of two hundred dollars and locative services and that said deed was duly and legally executed and acknowledged by said grantors in said deed in the terms and in strict conformity with the law—that said deed was as aforesaid duly and legally acknowledged by said grantors before Samuel A. Barnhill a remote vendor of this plaintiff and to an undivided 1/3 interest in and to 902 acres of land herein after described to J. D. Giddings a remote vendor of this plaintiff, which said deed conveyed to said A. J. Barnhill and J. D. Giddings the entire tract of 902 acres of land described as follows:

"All and singular the said 902 acres of land being balance of the Headright of John Hanchin except the equal and undivided one-third part the locative interest of J. D. Giddings which has been conveyed by us to him; the said tract being situated in Haskell county on Paint creek a tributary of the Clear Fork of the Brazos and bounded as follows to-wit:

Beginning at the N. W. corner of survey No. 150 made for S. Bottsford and in the S. line of survey No. 149 made for Joseph Roberts; thence south 1860 yds. to the S. E. Cor. of this Survey, and the S. W. Cor. of Sur. No. 150; thence west 2740 yds. to a stone in the prairie for the S. W. Cor; thence north 1860 yds. to a stone for the N. W. Corner in the S. line of No. 149; thence east with said line 2740 yds. to the place of beginning, containing 902 acres, 2/3 of which is conveyed to the said Barnhill and one-third to the said Giddings," said tract of land being patented to John Hanchin 9th December 1858, by patent No. 142, Vol. 6, and known as abstract No. 161, certificate No. 2901 and survey No. 154, said petition further alleging that after the death of Mary Hanchin wife of John Hanchin the said John Hanchin entered into an agreement with his children the granters in said deed herein before fully set forth who were the heirs at law of their

said mother to divide the community property of their said mother with their said father the said John Hanchin, which agreement was duly recorded in Austin Co. Tex. and that under said agreement the balance of said headright of said John Hanchin of 902 acres then in the hands of J. D. Giddings to locate and obtain patent thereon for one equal one-third part under a contract made by said John Hanchin in the lifetime of his wife was sold at public sale, and A. J. Barnhill became the purchaser of the same for the sum of two hundred dollars and that the said J. D. Giddings has located the said headright and obtained the patent thereon in conformity with said contract, and that in consideration of the aforesaid agreement of record in Austin county, and of the aforesaid sale to said Barnhill and the payment of said \$200 the said deed above mentioned and referred to was duly and legally executed and acknowledged as aforesaid and was dated 20 Oct. 1861.

Wherefore plaintiff prays that defendants be cited by publication in the terms and as required by law, and that he have judgement correct said certificate and putting the legal title under said deed in said Barnhill and Giddings and through them in this plaintiff, and removing all cloud from his title by reason of said defective certificate and for cost of suit and for general and special relief and he will ever pray etc.
