





The primary food supply of lady beetles is aphids, therefore when all the pits have been eliminated. aphids are present, the beetles are not likely to feed on other insects, Before any beneficial ininsects, Before any beneficial in-sects increase in cotton or any other crop, there first must be an adequate food supply avail-able. Perhaps one of the most important factors that influence the lack of abundance of bene-ficial insects is weather. Weather conditions may favor the increase in harmful insects but may suppress or completely stop buildups of beneficial insects. When ups of beneficial insects. When adequate food supplies and fa-vorable weather conditions exist, predators and parasites will in-crease rapidly. Rapid increase of harmful insects will often se-verely damage the crop before the beneficial insects can build the beneficial insects can build up or be added in sufficient numbers to control the injurious in-

Reseach data and observations Reseach data and observations by trained entomologists shows that lady beetles disperse rapidly when released in a field, and after a very few days the beetles may not be any more numerous in the fields where released than in other surrounding fields. Other predators such as flower

sects.

Other predators such as flower bugs, lace-winged flies, spiders and wasps are much more effective in suppressing many injurious insects, especially boll-worms, than are lady bugs.

Beneficial insects are helpful in preventing increases of some pests, but remember, the lady beetle is primarily an aphid feeder and one of the least effective for bollworm control. No substi-tute has been found for making frequent and regular checks for destructive insect infestations and using recommended insecticides when the damaging pests build-up faster than beneficial insects to control destructive pests of cotton.

State Welfare Director John H Winters asked Shepperd to dehide.


